COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

Negotiations Authorized for Acquisition of Property Needed for New Pilsen and West Lawn Branch Libraries.

The Committee on Finance submitted a report recommending that the City Council pass the following proposed ordinance transmitted therewith:

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. It is hereby determined and declared that it is useful, desirable and necessary to the City of Chicago, that said City acquire for public use for The Chicago Public Library two sites for two new library facilities, one in the vicinity of W. 19th Street, and S. Loomis Street, for the Pilsen Branch Library and the second in the vicinity of W. 63rd Street and S. Komensky Avenue, for the West Lawn Branch Library, to be financed by General Obligation Bonds for Capital Projects, as set forth in an ordinance passed by the City Council on March 31, 1981, as printed on Pages 5902 to 5909 of the Journal of Proceedings of the City Council, the sites for these facilities being described as follows:

Pilsen Branch Library

Parcel 1. Lots 55, 56 and 57 in Steward's Subdivision of Block 7 in Johnston and Lee's Subdivision of the Southwest $\frac{1}{4}$ of Section 20, Township 39 North, Range 14 East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois. Commonly known as Nos. 1849-1855 S. Loomis Street.

SECTION 1. Section 28-30(a) of Chapter 28 of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago, as amended on December 20, 1979, and published at page 2072 of the Journal of Proceedings of the City Council, is hereby amended by inserting the language in *Italics* and deleting the language bracketed as follows:

28-30(a). Commencing with the effective date of this ordinance, the rates of fare for taxicabs while being operated between a point of origin and a destination within the corporate limits of the City shall be as set forth in the following schedule, which rates are hereby declared to be just and reasonable:

For the first 1/5 mile or fraction thereof	[75¢] \$1.00
For each additional [1/8] 1/9 mile or fraction thereof	10¢
For each [3/4 minute] 36 seconds of waiting time	10¢
For each additional passenger over the age of 12 years and under the age of 65 years	50¢.

Ordinary hand baggage of passengers shall be carried without charge.

Immediately on arrival at the passenger's destination it shall be the duty of the chauffeur to throw the taximeter lever to the non-recording position and to call the passenger's attention to the fare registered.

It is unlawful for any person to demand or collect any fare for taxicab service which is more or less than the rates established by the foregoing schedule, or for any passenger to refuse payment of the fare so registered.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.
