761ST TANK BATTALION AND ALLIED VETERANS ASSOCIATION RECOGNIZED FOR COURAGEOUS AND MERITORIOUS SERVICE OF ITS MEMBERS.

WHEREAS, The 761st Tank Battalion were the first black soldiers to fight our enemy in tanks during World War II; and

WHEREAS, The men of the 761st distinguished themselves to the extent that their fighting skills were praised by most of the generals of the armies to which they were attached, including General George C. Patton; and

WHEREAS, The 761st Tank Battalion ended their combat mission by joining with the First Ukrainian Army (Russian) at the Enn River in Steyr, Austria; and

WHEREAS, The gallantry, courage and professional esprit-de-corp displayed by the 761st in combat on all assigned missions prompted historians at the War Department to research of the military and combat history; and

WHEREAS, This action finally resulted in their receipt of the Presidential Unit Citation on April 20, 1978 at Summerall Field, Fort Meyer, Virginia; and

WHEREAS, Since 1946, the men of the 761st and other veterans have been assembling at a convention site and this year, the convention will meet in New Orleans for the 39th Annual gathering of the 761st Tank Battalion and Allied Veterans Association; and

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE.

EXECUTION OF LOAN AND SECURITY AND REDEVELOPMENT AGREEMENTS WITH BREWER SEWING SUPPLIES.

The Committee on Finance submitted a report recommending that the City Council pass a proposed ordinance transmitted therewith, authorizing the execution of a loan and security agreement and a redevelopment agreement with Brewer Sewing Supplies, whereby Community Development Block Grant funds will be loaned and land write-down funds will be given to assist in the purchase of land and a building located at 3800 West 42nd Street.

On motion of Alderman Burke, the said proposed ordinance was *Passed* by yeas and nays as follows:

Alderman Krystyniak moved to reconsider the foregoing vote. The motion was lost.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, The Department of Economic Development of the City of Chicago has as its primary purpose the creation of additional employment opportunities in the City of Chicago through the attraction and expansion of economic development activity in the City, and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development has made available to the City of Chicago, through the federal Community Development Block Grant Program, a grant in the amount of \$1,500,000 to be used to make low interest loans to start up and expand businesses; and

WHEREAS, Brewer Sewing Supplies (the "Company") an Illinois corporation has made application to the Department of Economic Development for a loan of \$100,000 and a land

write-down of \$40,000 for purposes of acquiring land and a building located at 3800 West 42nd Street, (the "Property") which will result, among other things, in the creation of an estimated 18 new permanent full-time jobs and 7 new part-time job opportunity for low and moderate income persons residing in the City; and

WHEREAS, The Economic Development Commission has approved the Company's application; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Commissioner of Economic Development is authorized to enter into and execute, subject to review as to form and legality by the Corporation Counsel, a Loan and Security Agreement with the Company pursuant to which the City will loan the Company \$100,000, and a Redevelopment Agreement pursuant to which the City will give the Company a land write-down in the amount of \$40,000, in order to assist the Company in the acquisition of the Property consisting of approximately 80,492 square feet, said Loan and Security Agreement to be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A and said Redevelopment Agreement to be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.

SECTION 2. The Commissioner of Economic Development is further authorized to enter into and execute such other documents as may be necessary and proper to implement the terms of the Loan and Security Agreement, and the Redevelopment Agreement.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be effective by and from the date of its passage.

Exhibit "A".

Loan And Security Agreement.

This Agreement is entered into and executed as of day of
19, by and between the City of Chicago, Illinois, an Illinois municipal corporation
("Lender"), by and through its Department of Economic Development ("D.E.D."), having its
offices at 20 North Clark Street, Chicago, Illinois, 60602 and Brewer Sewing Supplies, ar
Illinois corporation, with principal offices at 847 West Jackson Street, Chicago, Illinois
60607 ("Borrower").

Recitals:

Whereas, D.E.D. was established on 10 February, 1982 by ordinance of the City Council of the City of Chicago; and

Whereas, D.E.D. has as its primary purpose the creation of additional employment opportunities in the City of Chicago through the attraction and expansion of industrial and commercial development in the City; and

Whereas, D.E.D. has funds available to it through the Community Development Block Grant Program of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in the amount of \$1,500,000; and

Whereas, Borrower desires to borrow and Lender desires to lend the sum of \$100,000 ("Loan") for the purpose of acquiring land and a building for business expansion; and

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1. The Above Recitals Are Incorporated Herein And Made A Part Hereof By Reference.

Section 2. Definitions.

- 2.01 "Borrower's Liabilities" shall mean all obligations and liabilities of Borrower to Lender (including without limitation all debts, claims and indebtedness) whether primary, secondary, direct, contingent, fixed or otherwise heretofore, now and/or from time to time hereafter owing, due or payable, however evidenced, created, incurred, acquired or owing and however arising whether under this Agreement or the "Other Agreements" (hereinafter defined).
- 2.02 "Charges" shall mean all national, federal, state, county, city, municipal and/or other governmental (or any instrumentality, division, agency, body or department thereof), taxes, levies, assessments, charges, liens, claims or encumbrances upon and/or relating to the "Collateral" (hereinafter defined), Borrower's Liabilities, Borrower's business, Borrower's ownership and/or use of any of its assets, and/or Borrower's income and/or gross receipts.
- 2.03 "Collateral" shall mean those assets of Borrower (individually or collectively), now owned or hereafter acquired in which Borrower has granted Lender a security interest as set forth in Section 4 of this Agreement as security for the Loan.
- 2.04 "Financials" shall mean those financial statements provided to D.E.D. at the time of application for the Loan and financial statements hereinafter provided to D.E.D. pursuant to the terms of this Agreement.
- 2.05 "Indebtedness" shall mean all obligations and liabilities of Borrower to any Person (other than Lender), heretofore, now and/or from time to time hereafter owed, whether under written or oral agreement, operation of law, or otherwise.
- 2.06 "Other Agreements" shall mean all agreements, instruments and documents heretofore, now, and/or from time to time hereafter executed by and/or on behalf of Borrower and delivered to Lender by Borrower.
- 2.07 "Property" shall mean the real estate located at 3800 West 42nd Street, Chicago, Illinois 60632, and all buildings, facilities and structures now existing or hereafter erected thereon.

- 2.08 "Project" shall mean all activities of Borrower on the Property using the proceeds of the Loan or other Indebtedness.
- 2.09 "Senior Lender" shall mean Harris Trust and Savings Bank, 111 West Monroe Street, Chicago, Illinois 60690.

Section 3. Loan.

The Loan shall be made upon the following terms and conditions:

- 3.01 The principal sum of the Loan shall be \$100,000.
- 3.02 The term of the Loan shall be 10 years.
- 3.03 The rate of interest charged on the Loan, per annum, shall be seventy-five percent (75%) of that rate of interest charged by First National Bank of Chicago as its base commercial loan rate publicly announced, from time to time, as its "prime rate" ("Prime Rate"), payable in equal monthly installments in the amount set forth on Lender's statement(s) provided Borrower on or before the 10th day of January, April, July and October of each year the Loan remains outstanding. The aforesaid interest rate shall be established as of the date this Agreement is executed and shall be adjusted as of the first day of January, April, July and October of each year the Loan remains outstanding. The first such interest adjustment shall be _______, 1987.
- 3.04 Repayment of the Loan shall be in 120 equal monthly installments of principal and interest pursuant to Paragraph 3.03 above. Payments shall be made on or before the 1st day of the month commencing on the 1st day of the first full month after disbursement of the Loan proceeds in the amount(s) set forth on Lender's statement to Borrower.
- 3.05 Borrower expressly agrees that Loan proceeds shall be used only in amounts and for purposes of acquiring land and a building located at 3800 West 42nd Street, Chicago, Illinois 60632.

Section 4. Grant Of Security Interest.

To secure the prompt payment of, and the prompt, full and faithful performance of Borrower's Liabilities to Lender, Borrower hereby grants to Lender a security interest in and to all Borrower's now owned or hereafter acquired:

- 4.01 The Property, as defined in paragraph 2.07, subordinated to the Senior Lender.
- 4.02 Goods, inventory, equipment, vehicles and fixtures, including all replacements, additions, accessions, and/or substitutions thereto and therefore; all products and proceeds of the foregoing, including without limitation proceeds of insurance policies insuring the Collateral.
- 4.03 Borrower at its sole cost and expense, shall keep and maintain the Collateral insured for its full replacement value against loss or damage by fire, theft, explosion, floods

and all other hazards and risks ordinarily insured against by other owners or users of such properties in similar businesses with insurers and in amounts as may be reasonably satisfactory to Lender, plus, in the case of the Property, an A.L.T.A. Lender's Title Policy in the amount of Lender's loan. Borrower shall deliver to Lender an original copy of each policy of insurance, and evidence of payment of all premiums therefor so long as the Loan is outstanding. Such policies of insurance shall contain an endorsement showing Lender as an additional insured as its interests may appear. In addition, such policies and/or endorsement shall provide that the insurers shall give Lender not less than 30 days written notice of any alteration or cancellation thereof. In the event Borrower at any time or times hereafter shall fail to obtain or maintain any of the policies of insurance required under this Agreement or to pay any premium in whole or in part when due, then Lender without waiving or releasing any obligation or default by Borrower hereunder, may at any time or times thereafter (but shall be under no obligation to do so) obtain and maintain such policies of insurance and pay such premium and take any other action with respect thereto which Lender deems advisable to protect its interest in the Loan. All sums so disbursed by Lender, including reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expenses and other charges relating thereto, shall be payable by Borrower to Lender.

- 4.04 Borrower shall execute such financing statements and security agreements as Lender may request to assure Lender's security interest in the Collateral is perfected, which statements and agreements shall be recorded with the Cook County Recorder of Deeds, the Secretary of State of Illinois, and such locations as Lender may demand to perfect its security interest in the Collateral.
- 4.05 All Borrower's Liabilities shall constitute one loan secured by Lender's security in the Collateral and by all other security interest, liens, claims and encumbrances now and/or from time to time hereafter granted by Borrower to Lender; provided however, that the Loan may be subordinated to the loan of the Senior Lender and only the Senior Lender in an amount not to exceed \$100,000.
- 4.06 Borrower agrees that O. Keith Smith and Ingeborg S. Smith shall personally guaranty the Loan.

Section 5. Conditions Precedent.

The following shall be required of Borrower as Conditions Precedent to disbursement of Loan proceeds:

- 5.01 Borrower shall certify to Lender that Borrower has sufficient funds on hand or irrevocably available to it to complete its obligations under the Agreement and has identified the sources of said funds.
- 5.02 Borrower shall have furnished to Lender, duly executed financing statements to be filed by the Lender, with the Secretary of State of Illinois and the Cook County Recorder of Deeds, respectively.
- 5.03 Borrower shall have furnished to Lender insurance policies indicating that Borrower, at its sole cost and expense, shall keep and maintain the Collateral insured for the full replacement value against loss or damage by fire, theft, explosion, sprinklers and

all other hazards and risks ordinarily insured against by other owners or users of such properties in similar businesses. Said policy or policies shall be duly endorsed identifying the Lender as a loss payee, as its interests appear.

- 5.04 Personal Guarantee of repayment of the Loan.
- 5.05 Consent of Senior Lender of D.E.D.'s Loan and Borrower's grant of security interest as security therefor.
- 5.06 Subordination Agreement of Borrower's officers subordinating their loans to the Loan.

Section 6. Warranties, Representations And Covenants.

Borrower warrants, represents and covenants to Lender as follows:

- 6.01 All representations and warranties of Borrower contained in this Agreement and the Other Agreements shall be true at the time of Borrower's execution of this Agreement, and shall survive the execution, delivery and acceptance hereof by the parties hereto.
- 6.02 Borrower shall be governed by, adhere to and obey any and all applicable federal, state and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules and regulations in effect during the term of the Loan.
- 6.03 Except as disclosed in the Financials, (a) Borrower is now and at all times hereafter, an Illinois corporation duly organized and existing and in good standing under the laws of the State of Illinois as represented at the beginning of this Agreement, and is qualified or licensed to do business in all other states in which the laws thereof require Borrower to be so qualified and/or licensed; (b) Borrower has the right and power and is duly authorized and empowered to enter into, execute, deliver and perform this Agreement; (c) the execution, delivery and performance by Borrower of this Agreement shall not, by the lapse of time, the giving of notice or otherwise, constitute a violation of any applicable law or breach of any provision contained in Borrower's Articles of Incorporation or By-laws, or contained in any agreement, instrument or document to which Borrower is now or hereafter a party or by which it is or may become bound; (d) Borrower has and at all times hereafter shall have good, indefeasible and merchantable title to and ownership of the Collateral (as hereinafter defined), free and clear of all liens, claims, security interests and encumbrances except those of Lender and as permitted pursuant to Section 4 of this Agreement; (e) Borrower is now and at all times hereafter shall be solvent and able to pay its debts as they mature; (f) there are no actions or proceedings which are pending or threatened against Borrower (except as may be set forth in Borrower's application for the Loan), which might result in any material and adverse change to Borrower's financial condition, or materially affect Borrower's assets or the Collateral as of the date of this Agreement; (g) Borrower has and is in good standing with respect to all government permits, certificates, consents (including without limitation appropriate environmental clearances and approvals) and franchises necessary to continue to conduct its business as previously conducted by it and to own or lease and operate its properties (including but not limited to the Property) as now owned or leased by it; (h) Borrower is not in default with respect to any indenture, loan agreement, mortgage, deed or other similar agreement

relating to the borrowing of monies to which it is a party or by which it is bound; (i) the Financials fairly and accurately present the assets, liabilities and financial conditions and results of operations of Borrower as of the date of application for the Loan and for the fiscal year immediately preceding the date of Financials submitted thereafter; and (j) there has been no material and adverse change in the assets, liabilities or financial condition of Borrower since the dates of the aforesaid Financials.

6.04 Borrower shall cause all current outstanding loans and/or liens to be subordinated to this Loan if such subordination is necessary to assure that Lender occupies no less than a second secured lien position on all of the Collateral. Borrower shall furnish Lender documents satisfactory to Lender which evidence Borrower's compliance with this Paragraph 6.04.

6.05 Except as permitted under Section 4 hereof, Borrower shall not, without Lender's prior written consent thereto, which Lender may or may not give in its sole discretion, concurrently or hereafter (a) grant a security interest in, assign, sell or transfer any of the Collateral to any person, or permit, grant, or suffer or permit a lien, claim or encumbrance upon any of the Collateral; (b) permit or suffer any levy, attachment or restraint to be made affecting any of the Collateral; (c) enter into any transaction not in the ordinary course of its business which materially and adversely affects Borrower's ability to repay Borrower's Liabilities or Indebtedness; or (d) permit the Tangible Net Worth, as measured in the annual financial statements of Borrower to decrease more than 15% in any calendar year subsequent to the date of this Agreement from the Tangible Net Worth of Borrower for the immediately prior financial year (as shown in the financial statements).

6.06 Borrower shall pay promptly when due, all Charges. In the event Borrower, at any time or times hereafter, shall fail to pay the Charges or to obtain discharges of the same, Borrower shall so advise Lender thereof in writing at which time Lender may, without waiving or releasing any obligation or liability of Borrower under this Agreement, in its sole discretion, make such payment, or any part thereof, or obtain such discharge and take any other action with respect thereto which Lender deems advisable. All sums so paid by Lender and any expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expenses and other charges relating thereto, shall be payable by Borrower to Lender. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, Borrower may permit or suffer Charges to attach to its assets and may dispute the same without prior payment thereof, provided that Borrower, in good faith shall be contesting said Charges in an appropriate proceeding and the same are not in excess of \$5,000, and Borrower has given such additional collateral and/or assurances as Lender in its sole discretion, deems necessary under the circumstances.

6.07 Borrower shall maintain financial records prepared by a certified public accountant in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles consistently applied not less frequently than annually, and certified to by the chief executive officer of Borrower. Within 90 days following the close of each fiscal year of Borrower, Borrower shall provide a copy of the aforesaid annual financial statement(s) to Lender. In addition, upon Lender's request, Borrower shall submit to Lender no more frequently than once per calender quarter, statements of Borrower's employment profile and financial condition prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles consistently applied.

6.08 Borrower shall immediately notify Lender of any and all events or actions which may materially affect Borrower's abilities to carry on its operations or perform all its obligations under this Agreement or any other agreements whether senior or junior to the Loan, and whether now existing or hereafter entered into by Borrower so long as any of Borrower's Liabilities remain unsatisfied.

Section 7. Maintaining Records/Right To Inspect.

- 7.01 Borrower shall keep and maintain such books, records and other documents as shall be required by Lender and/or H.U.D. necessary to reflect and disclose fully the amount and disposition of the Loan proceeds, the total cost of the activities paid for, in whole or in part, with Loan proceeds, and the nature of all activities which are supplied or to be supplied by other sources. All such books, records and other documents shall be available at the offices of Borrower for inspection, copying, audit and examination at all reasonable times by any duly authorized representative of the Lender and H.U.D.
- 7.02 Any duly authorized representative of the Lender or H.U.D. shall, at all reasonable times, have access to all portions of the Project.
- 7.03 The rights of access and inspection provided in this Section 7 shall continue until the completion of all close-out procedures respecting the Loan and until the final settlement and conclusion of all issues arising out of the Loan.

Section 8. Jobs.

- 8.01 Borrower shall use its best efforts to create approximately 18 new full-time permanent jobs and 7 new part-time jobs within 36 months after execution of this Agreement.
- 8.02 Borrower shall report in writing to D.E.D. as D.E.D. may from time to time request, the numbers and kinds of jobs maintained, created and filled.

Section 9. Events Of Default.

Borrower shall be in Default under this Agreement upon the occurrence of any of the following Event(s) of Default or conditions, namely: (a) failure to make when due and owing, any payment under the Note which failure shall continue for a period of 10 days following notice thereof to Borrower; (b) failure to perform any obligations of or any covenants or liabilities contained or referred to herein other than payment due hereunder; (c) any warranty, representation or statement made or furnished to Lender by or on behalf of Borrower proving to have been false in any material respect when made or furnished; (d) loss, theft, substantial damage, destruction, sale or encumbrance to or of any of the Collateral, or the making of any levy, seizure or attachment thereof or thereon except as expressly otherwise permitted under this Agreement; (e) Borrower's sale, partial sale, transfer or voluntary disposition of its business (f) involuntary, dissolution, termination of existence, insolvency, business failure, appointment of a receiver of any part of the assets of, assignment for the benefit of creditors by, or the commencement of any proceeding under any bankruptcy or insolvency laws by or against the Borrower or any guarantor or surety of Borrower and for (b) through (f) of this Section 10, continuing for a period of 60

days after notice thereof to Borrower; or (h) any default of Other Agreements with the Lender or the Senior Lender which would permit the Lender or the Senior Lender, as the case may be, after the expiration of any applicable cure period thereunder, to accelerate its loan

Section 10. Remedies

Upon such default (regardless of whether the Uniform Commercial Code as applicable has been enacted in the jurisdiction where rights or remedies are asserted), and at any time thereafter (such default not having previously been cured as set forth in Section 9 above), Lender, at its option, may declare all Borrower's Liabilities secured hereby immediately due and payable and shall have the remedies of a secured party under the Uniform Commercial Code as adopted in Illinois ("Code") (and the foreclosure provisions of Ill. Rev. Stat., Chapter 110, Section 15-101 et seq.), including without limitation, the right to take immediate and exclusive possession of Collateral, or any part thereof, and for that purpose may, so far as Borrower can give authority therefor, with or without judicial process, enter (if this can be done without breach of the peace), upon any premises on which the Collateral or any part thereof may be situated and remove the same therefrom (provided that if the Collateral is affixed to real estate, such removal shall be subject to the conditions of the Code) and Lender shall be entitled to hold, maintain, preserve and prepare the Collateral for sale, subject to Borrower's right to redemption, in satisfaction of Borrower's Liabilities as provided in the Code. To this end, Lender may require Borrower to assemble the Collateral and make it available to Lender for possession at a place to be designated by Lender which is reasonably convenient to both parties. Unless the Collateral is perishable or threatens to decline rapidly in value or is of a type customarily sold on a recognized market, Lender will give Borrower at least five (5) days notice of the time and place of any public sale thereof or of the time after which any private sale or any other intended disposition thereof is to be made. The requirements of reasonable notice shall be met if such notice is mailed, postage prepaid, to the address of Borrower shown in the beginning of this Agreement at least five (5) days before the time of the sale or disposition. Lender may buy at any public sale, and if the Collateral is of a type customarily sold on a recognized market or is of a type which is the subject of a widely distributed standard price quotations, it may buy at private sale. The net proceeds realized upon any such disposition, after deduction for the expenses or retaking, holding, preparing for sale, selling or the like, and reasonable attorney's fees and legal expenses incurred by Lender in connection therewith, shall be applied in satisfaction of Borrower's Liabilities secured hereby. Lender will account to Borrower for any surplus realized on such disposition and Borrower shall remain liable for any deficiency.

The remedies of Lender hereunder are cumulative and the exercise of any one or more of the remedies provided for herein or under the Code shall not be construed as a waiver of any of the other remedies of Lender so long as any part of Borrower's Liabilities remain unsatisfied.

Section 11. No Waiver By Lender.

Lender's failure at any time or times hereafter to require strict performance by Borrower of any provision of this Agreement shall not waive, affect or diminish any right of Lender thereafter to demand strict compliance and performance therewith, nor shall any waiver

by Lender of a Borrower's Event of Default waive, suspend or affect any other Event of Default under this Agreement, whether the same is prior or subsequent thereto, and whether of the same or of a different type.

Lender's delay in instituting or prosecuting any action or proceeding or otherwise asserting its rights hereunder, shall not operate as a waiver of such rights or limit them in any way so long as an Event of Default shall be continuing.

Section 12. Prepayment.

This Loan may be prepaid at anytime without premium or penalty.

Section 13. Equal Employment.

Borrower and its successors and assigns, agree that during the term of the Loan:

13.01 Borrower will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment on account of race, religion, color, sex or national origin. Borrower will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to, the following: (a) employment upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay, or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship. Borrower agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment notices setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.

13.02 Borrower will in all solicitations of, or advertisements for, employees placed by or on its behalf, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, color, sex or national origin.

13.03 Discrimination as used herein shall be interpreted in accordance with the Constitution and applicable federal laws. This covenant may be enforced solely by the Lender and solely against the party who breaches this covenant.

Section 14. Disclaimer Of Relationship.

Nothing contained in this Agreement, nor any act of the Lender, shall be deemed or construed by any of the parties, or by third persons, to create any relationship of third-party beneficiary, or of principal or agent, or of limited or general partnership, or of joint venture, or any association or relationship involving Lender.

Section 15. Conflict Of Interest.

No member, official or employee of Lender shall have any personal interest, direct or indirect, in the Borrower's business; nor shall any such member, official or employee participate in any decision relating to Borrower's business which affects his personal interests or the interests of any corporation, partnership or association in which he is directly interested.

Section 16. Limitation Of Liability.

Borrower expressly agrees that no member, official, employee or agent of Lender shall be individually or personally liable to Borrower, its successors or assigns for any actions under this Agreement.

Section 17. Assignment.

17.01 Borrower may not sell, assign or transfer this Agreement without the prior written consent of Lender.

17.02 Borrower consents to Lender's sale, assignment, transfer or other disposition, at any time and from time to time hereafter, of this Agreement, in whole or in part.

Section 18. Additional Provisions.

18.01 This Agreement may not be altered or amended except by written instrument signed by all parties hereto.

18.02 All notices, certificates or other communications required or given hereunder shall be in writing and placed in the United States mails, registered or certified, return receipt requested, first class postage, prepaid and addressed as follows:

Recitals:

Whereas, D.E.D. was established February 10, 1982 by ordinance of the City Council of the City of Chicago as the successor agency to the Economic Development Commission; and

Whereas, D.E.D. has as its primary purpose the creation of additional employment opportunities in the City of Chicago through the attraction and expansion of industrial development in the City of Chicago; and

Whereas, D.E.D. has received a federal grant from the United States Department of Commerce in the amount of \$7,700,000 for the funding of the Chicago Plan for Economic Development ("Plan"), which among other things provides for the City to contribute funds to reduce the acquisition costs of the real estate component of development projects to make that element of such projects competitive with alternative sites outside the City; and

Whereas, Seller and Purchaser executed a Real Estate Sale Contract ("Sale Contract"), relating to that certain realty commonly known as 3800 West 42nd Street, Chicago, Illinois and consisting of a 50,500 square foot building located on approximately 80,492 square feet of land ("Property"); and

Whereas, Purchaser intends to rehabilitate said buildings and equip the total project as part of the expansion of its operations ("Project"); and

Whereas, Purchaser has requested City assistance in acquiring the Property, by providing funds from the Plan to write-down the cost of the Property \$.50 per square foot; and

Whereas, the Economic Development Commission, pursuant to the Chicago Plan for Economic Development, by resolution dated September 9, 1986, approved Purchaser's request; and

Whereas, Purchaser has represented that the Project will result in the retention of 20 permanent full-time jobs and 3 part-time jobs, and create an estimated 18 new permanent full-time jobs and 7 new part-time jobs;

Now, Therefore, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Section I. Incorporation Of Recitals.

The above Recitals are hereby expressly incorporated herein and made a part hereof.

Section II. Payment For The Property.

The City hereby agrees to pay, pursuant to written direction of Purchaser, the sum of \$1.50 times the total square footage of the Property as determined by a plat of survey completed prior to the closing of the transaction described in the Sale Contract, as part of the purchase price for the Property as set forth in the Sale Contract.

Section III. Redevelopment Plan.

Purchaser agrees to acquire and improve the Property by rehabilitating the existing building and equipping the facility at a total cost of approximately \$750,000 ("Redevelopment Plan"). All plans and specifications for the Redevelopment Plan shall be in conformity with all applicable state and local laws and regulations. Further, with all

applicable state and local laws and regulations. Further, the Property shall be used in accordance with applicable zoning laws.

Section IV. Employment.

Purchaser shall use its best efforts to increase its total employment to approximately 38 permanent full-time employees and 10 part-time employees at the Property within 36 months of execution of this Agreement.

Section V. Conveyance Of Property.

- (a) Immediately upon completion of the purchase of the Property pursuant to the Sale Contract, Purchaser shall cause the deed for the Property to be recorded in the Office of the Recorder of Deeds of Cook County, Illinois.
 - (b) The sale and conveyance shall, in any event, be closed no later than
- (c) In the event that Purchaser (i) prior to the conveyance of the property, assigns or attempts to assign this Agreement or any rights hereunder or (ii) fails to pay the purchase price and take title to the property under tender of conveyance by Seller in conformance with the Sale Contract and this Agreement, the City may in its sole discretion declare this Agreement terminated and of no further force or effect on the parties hereto.
- (d) Upon conveyance of the Property by Seller to Purchaser, Seller shall have no further obligations under this Agreement to Purchaser or to City, except as to matters arising in connection with said conveyance.
- (e) Nothing contained in this Agreement shall in any way affect the obligations of Seller and Purchaser to each other pursuant to the Sale Contract.

Section VI. Evidence Of Financing.

Purchaser shall submit evidence as to the commitment for necessary financing in an amount sufficient to accomplish the purchase of the Property and completion of the Redevelopment Plan not later than 10 days after execution of this agreement.

Section VII. Completion Of Improvements.

Purchaser shall complete or cause to be completed the Redevelopment Plan described in Section III no later than ______.

Section VIII. Time Of The Essence.

Time is of the essence of this Agreement.

Section IX. Certificate Of Completion.

Promptly after completion of the improvements in accordance with this Agreement, the City will, upon written request therefor, furnish Purchaser with an appropriate instrument so certifying. The certification by the City shall be a conclusive determination of satisfaction of Purchaser's agreement to construct the improvements and shall be in a form suitable for recording with the Cook County Recorder of Deeds. If the City shall refuse or fail to provide the certification, the City shall, within 30 days after written statement indicating in adequate detail how Purchaser has failed to complete the construction or rehabilitation of the improvements in conformity with this Agreement, or is otherwise in default, and what measures or acts will be necessary in the opinion of the City to take or perform in order to obtain the certification.

Section X. Transfer Or Abandonment Of Property.

- (a) Purchaser shall not sell, assign, convey or transfer, in whole or in part, the Property or any interest therein until five years after disbursement of funds under this Agreement without prior written approval of the City, except Purchaser may mortgage the Property pursuant to Section XI, and may transfer the Property as part of a sale of all or substantially all of its assets to a party who intends to continue Purchaser's business at the Property, and who expressly agrees to be bound by this Agreement prior to completing such purchase.

Section XI. Limitation Upon Encumbrance Of Property.

Prior to the completion of the improvements as set forth in Section III as certified by the City, neither Purchaser nor any successor in interest to the Property shall engage in any financing or any other transaction creating any mortgage or other encumbrance or lien upon the Property, or suffer any encumbrance or lien to be made on or attached to the Property, except for the purposes only of obtaining funds to the extent necessary for constructing and equipping the improvements as set forth in Section III, including funds necessary for architects, engineers, surveyors, legal, title and financing fees, costs and charges.

Section XII. Mortgagees Not Obligated To Construct.

Notwithstanding any of the provisions of this Agreement, the holder of any mortgage authorized by this Agreement shall not be obligated by the provisions of this Agreement to construct or complete the construction of the improvements set forth in Section III or to guarantee such construction or completion; nor shall any covenant or other provision be construed to so obligate such holder.

Section XIII. Enforced Delay In Performance.

Neither the City nor Purchaser nor any successor in interest shall be considered in breach or default of its obligations with respect to the preparation of the Property for redevelopment, or the event of enforced delay in the performance of such obligations due to causes beyond its control or without its fault or negligence. The time for the performance of the obligations shall be extended for the period of the enforced delay, as determined by the City, if the party seeking the extension shall request it in writing of the other party.

Section XIV. Maintaining Records And Right To Inspect/Access To Project.

- (a) All books, records and other documents relating to this Agreement shall be subject to the right of access by any duly authorized representatives of the City for purposes of inspection, copy, audit or examination.
- (b) Any duly authorized representative of the City shall, at all reasonable times after the Property has been conveyed by Seller to the Purchaser, have access to any portion of the Property.
- (c) The rights to inspect and access shall extend until the completion of Purchaser's obligations under this Agreement, and until final settlement and conclusion of all issues arising hereunder.

No member, official or employee of the City shall be personally liable to Purchaser or any successor in interest in the event of any default or breach by the City or for any amount which may become due to Purchaser or its successors or on any obligations under the terms of this Agreement.

This Agreement shall survive any transfer of title to the Property to the Purchaser or any successor in interest to the Purchaser, and shall not be merged with any deed or other instrument given pursuant to such a transfer.

EXECUTION OF LOAN AND SECURITY AGREEMENT WITH MAYA ROMANOFF CORPORATION.

The Committee on Finance submitted a report recommending that the City Council pass a proposed ordinance transmitted therewith, authorizing the execution of a loan and security agreement with Maya Romanoff Corporation, whereby Business Development Loan Funds in the amount of \$150,000.00 will be loaned to assist in the relocation and expansion of its business at 1730 West Greenleaf Avenue.

WHEREAS, The Department of Economic Development of the City of Chicago has as its primary purpose the creation of additional employment opportunities in the City of Chicago through the attraction and expansion of economic development activity in the City; and

WHEREAS, The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development has made available to the City of Chicago through the federal Community Development Block Grant Program, a grant in the amount of \$1,500,000.00 to be used to make low interest loans to start up and expand businesses; and

WHEREAS, The Maya Romanoff Corporation has made application to the Department of Economic Development to borrow \$150,000.00 for the purpose of purchasing real estate and machinery and equipment which will result, among other things, in the creation of an estimated 15 new permanent job opportunities over three years for low and moderate income persons residing in the City; and

WHEREAS, The Economic Development Commission has approved the application of the Maya Romanoff Corporation for such loan; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Commissioner of Economic Development is authorized to enter into and execute, subject to review as to form and legality by the Corporation Counsel, a Loan and Security Agreement with the Maya Romanoff Corporation, pursuant to which the City will loan \$150,000.00 to the Maya Romanoff Corporation to assist in the expansion of operations, said Loan and Security Agreements to be substanially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.

SECTION 2. The Commissioner of Economic Development is further authorized to enter into and execute such other documents as may be necessary and proper to implement the terms of the Loan and Security Agreement.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be effective by and from the date of its passage.

Whereas, D.E.D. has funds available to it through its Business Development Loan Program through the Community Development Block Grant Program of the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development ("H.U.D.") in the amount of \$1,500,000.00; and

Whereas, Borrower desires to borrow and Lender desires to lend the sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$150,000.00) to provide working capital to be used for the relocation and expansion of an ongoing business;

Now, Therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein and for other good and valuable consideration, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1. The Above Recitals Are Incorporated Herein And Made A Part Hereof By Reference.

Section 2. Definitions.

- 2.08 "Project" shall mean the relocation and expansion by Borrower of its ongoing business and all activities of Borrower on the Property using the proceeds of the Loan or other Indebtedness.
 - 2.09 "Senior Lender" shall mean Harris Trust and Savings Bank, Chicago, Illinois.

Section 3. Loan.

The Loan shall be made upon the following terms and conditions:

- 3.01 The principal sum of the Loan shall be \$150,000.00.
- 3.02 The term of the Loan shall be 15 years.
- 3.03 The rate of interest charged on the Loan, per annum, shall be 75% of that rate of interest charged by First National Bank of Chicago to its most credit-worth customers upon ninety (90) day unsecured loans, in effect from time to time "Prime Rate", payable in equal monthly installments in the amount set forth on Lender statement(s) provided Borrower on

or before the 10th day of January, April, July and October of each year the Loan remains outstanding. The aforesaid interest rate shall be established as of the date this Agreement is executed and shall be adjusted as of the first day of January, April, July and October of each year the Loan remains outstanding. The first such interest adjustment shall be April 1, 1987. In accordance with the above, the initial interest rate shall be 5.625%.

- 3.04 Repayment of the Loan shall be in 180 equal monthly installments of principal together with interest thereon at the rate set forth and as adjusted from time to time, pursuant to Paragraph 3.03 above. Payments shall be made on or before the first day of the month commencing on the 1st day of July, 1987.
- 3.05 Borrower expressly agrees that Loan proceeds shall be used only for purposes of relocation and expansion of its business to 1730 West Greenleaf Avenue, Chicago, Illinois 60626

Section 4. Grant Of Security Interest.

To secure the prompt payment to Lender of and the prompt, full and faithful performance of Borrower's Liabilities, Borrower hereby grants, or causes to be granted, to Lender a security interest in and to all of the following:

- 4.01 The "Property".
- 4.02 Inventory, equipment, machinery, vehicles and fixtures, and other tangible business assets located at the Property, or otherwise owned by Borrower including all replacements, additions, accessions, and/or substitutions thereto and therefore; all products and proceeds of the foregoing, including without limitation proceeds of insurance policies insuring the Collateral.
- 4.03 Borrower at its sole cost and expense, shall keep and maintain the Collateral insured for its full replacement value against loss or damage by fire, theft, explosion, floods, collision, and all other hazards and risks ordinarily insured against by other owners or users of such properties in similar businesses with insurers and in amounts as may be reasonably satisfactory to Lender. Borrower shall deliver to Lender an original copy of each policy of insurance, and evidence of payment of all premiums therefor so long as the Loan is outstanding. Such policies of insurance shall contain an endorsement showing Lender as an additional insured as its interests may appear. In addition, such policies and/or endorsement shall provide that the insurers shall give Lender not less than 30 days written notice of any alteration or cancellation thereof. In the event Borrower at any time or times hereafter shall fail to obtain or maintain any of the policies of insurance required under this Agreement or to pay any premium in whole or in part when due, then Lender without waiving or releasing any obligation or default by Borrower hereunder, may at any time or times thereafter (but shall be under no obligation to do so) obtain and maintain such policies of insurance and pay such premium and take any other action with respect thereto which Lender deems advisable to protect its interest in the Loan. All sums so disbursed by Lender, including reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expenses and other charges relating thereto, shall be payable by Borrower to Lender.

- 4.04 Borrower shall execute or cause to be executed such financing statements and mortgages or security agreements as Lender may request, which statements and agreements shall be recorded at such locations at Borrower's expense as the Lender designates to perfect its security interest in the Collateral.
- 4.05 All Borrower's Liabilities shall constitute one loan secured by Lender's security in the Collateral and by all other security interests, liens, claims and encumbrances now and/or from time to time hereafter granted by Borrower to Lender; provided however, that notwithstanding the fact that the City may, from time to time, agree to a parity security position with another lender(s), and except as to the "Realty", the liens and/or security of the Loan may be subordinated to the loan of the Senior Lender and only the Senior Lender in an amount not to exceed \$150,000.00, plus additional amounts actually advanced by the Senior Lender upon Borrower's failure to perform its obligations to the Senior Lender.
- 4.07 Borrower agrees that Maya Romanoff shall individually and personally guaranty the Loan and Maya Romanoff Corporation shall provide unconditional corporate guarantees of repayment of the Loan.

Section 5. Conditions Precedent.

The following, some of which may already have been accomplished, shall be required of Borrower as Conditions Precedent to disbursement of Loan proceeds:

- 5.01 Borrower shall certify to Lender that Borrower has sufficient funds on hand or irrevocably available to it to complete its obligations under the Agreement and has identified the sources of said funds.
- 5.02 Borrower shall have furnished to Lender duly executed financing statements to be filed at Borrower's expense, by the Lender at such locations as the Lender designates.
- 5.03 Borrower shall have furnished to Lender insurance policies indicating that Borrower, at its sole cost and expense, shall keep and maintain the Collateral insured for the full replacement value against loss or damage by fire, theft, explosion, sprinklers, collision and all other hazards and risks ordinarily insured against by other owners or users of such business assets in similar businesses. Said policy or policies shall be duly endorsed identifying the Lender as a loss payee, as its interest shall appear.
- 5.04 Personal Guarantee of Maya Romanoff and corporate guarantee of Maya Romanoff Corporation for repayment of the Loan.
- 5.05 Consent of Senior Lender to D.E.D.'s Loan and Borrower's grant of security interest as security therefor.

Section 6. Warranties, Representations And Covenants.

Borrower warrants and represents and covenants to Lender as follows:

- 6.01 All representations and warranties of Borrower contained in this Agreement and the Other Agreements shall be true at the time of Borrower's execution of this Agreement, and shall survive the execution, delivery and acceptance hereof by the parties hereto.
- 6.02 Borrower shall be subject to, obey and adhere to any and all federal, state, and local laws, statutes, ordinances, rules and regulations, and executive orders as are now or may be in effect during the term of the Loan, including without limitation those rules and regulations promulgated by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and set forth in Title 24 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 570, Subpart K.
- Except as disclosed in the Financials, (a) Borrower is now and at all times hereafter, an Illinois corporation duly organized and existing and in good standing under the laws of the Illinois as represented at the beginning of this Agreement, and qualified or licensed to do business in all other states in which the laws thereof require Borrower to be so qualified and/or licensed; (b) Borrower has the right and power and is duly authorized and empowered to enter into, execute, deliver and perform this Agreement; (c) the execution, delivery and performance by Borrower of this Agreement shall not, by the lapse of time, the giving of notice or otherwise, constitute a violation of any applicable law or breach of any provision contained in Borrower's Articles of Incorporation or By-laws, or contained in any agreement, instrument or document to which Borrower is now or hereafter a party or by which it is or may become bound; (d) Borrower has and at all times hereafter shall have either control of or good, indefeasible and merchantable title to and ownership of the Collateral, free and clear of all liens, claims, security interests and encumbrances except those of Lender and as otherwise permitted under Section 4 of this Agreement; (e) Borrower is now and at all times hereafter shall be solvent and able to pay its debts as they mature; (f) there are no actions or proceedings which are pending or threatened against Borrower (except as may be set forth in Borrower's application for the Loan), which might result in any material and adverse change to Borrower's financial condition, or materially affect Borrower's assets or the Collateral as of the date of this Agreement; (g) Borrower has and is in good standing with respect to all government permits, certificates, consents (including without limitation appropriate environmental clearances and approvals) and franchises necessary to continue to conduct its business as previously conducted by it and to own or lease and operate its properties (including but not limited to the Property) as now owned or leased by it; (h) Borrower is not in default with respect to any indenture, loan agreement, mortgage, deed or other similar agreement relating to the borrowing of monies to which it is a party or by which it is bound; (i) the Financials fairly and accurately present the assets, liabilities and financial conditions and results of operations of Borrower as of the date of application for the Loan and for the fiscal year immediately preceding the date of Financials submitted thereafter; and (j) there has been no material and adverse change in the assets, liabilities or financial condition of Borrower since the dates of the aforesaid Financials.
- 6.04 Borrower shall cause all current outstanding loans and/or liens to be subordinated to this Loan if such subordination is necessary to assure that Lender occupies no less than a second secured lien position on all of the Collateral. Borrower shall furnish Lender documents satisfactory to Lender which evidence its compliance with this Paragraph 6.04.

- 6.05 Except as permitted under Section 4 hereof, Borrower shall not, without Lender's prior written consent thereto, which Lender may or may not give in its sole discretion, concurrently or hereafter (a) grant a security interest in, assign, sell or transfer any of the Collateral to any person, or permit, grant, or suffer or permit a lien, claim or encumbrance upon any of the Collateral; (b) permit or suffer any levy, attachment or restraint to be made affecting any of the Collateral; (c) enter into any transaction not in the ordinary course of its business which materially and adversely affects Borrower's ability to repay Borrower's Liabilities or Indebtedness; or (d) permit the Tangible Net Worth, as measured in the annual financial statements of Borrower to decrease more than 15% in any calendar year subsequent to the date of this Agreement from the Tangible Net Worth of Borrower for the immediately prior financial year (as shown in the Financials).
- 6.06 Borrower shall pay promptly when due, all of the Charges. In the event Borrower, at any time or times hereafter, shall fail to pay the Charges or to obtain discharges of the same, Borrower shall so advise Lender thereof in writing at which time Lender may, without waiving or releasing any obligation or liability of Borrower under this Agreement, in its sole discretion, make such payment, or any part thereof, or obtain such discharge and take any other action with respect thereto which Lender deems advisable. All sums so paid by Lender and any expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees, court costs, expenses and other charges relating thereto, shall be payable by Borrower to Lender. Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, Borrower may permit or suffer Charges to attach to its assets and may dispute the same without prior payment thereof, provided that Borrower, in good faith shall be contesting said Charges in an appropriate proceeding, and Borrower has given such additional collateral and/or assurances as Lender in its sole discretion, deems necessary under the circumstances.
- 6.07 Borrower shall maintain financial records prepared by a certified public accountant in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles consistently applied not less frequently than annually, and certified to by the chief executive officer of Borrower. Within 90 days following the close of each fiscal year of Borrower, Borrower shall provide a copy of the aforesaid annual financial statement(s) to Lender. In addition, upon Lender's request, Borrower shall submit to Lender no less frequently than once per calendar quarter, statement of Borrower's employment profile and Borrower's financial condition prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles consistently applied.
- 6.08 Borrower shall immediately notify Lender of any and all events or actions which may materially affect Borrower's abilities to carry on its operations or perform all its obligations under this Agreement or any other agreements whether senior or junior to the Loan, and whether now existing or hereafter entered into by Borrower so long as any of Borrower's Liabilities remain unsatisfied.

Section 7. Jobs.

7.01 Borrower shall use its best efforts to maintain approximately 14 present full-time jobs; and shall use its best efforts to create and maintain approximately 15 new, permanent jobs within 36 months after execution of this Agreement.

- 7.02 Borrower shall report in writing to D.E.D. as D.E.D. may from time to time request, the numbers and kinds of jobs maintained, created and filled.
- 7.03 Borrower shall keep and maintain such books, records and other documents as shall be required by Lender and necessary to reflect and disclose fully the amount and disposition of the Loan proceeds, the total cost of the activities paid for, in whole or in part, with Loan proceeds, and the nature of all activities which are supplied or to be supplied by other sources. All such books, records and other documents shall be available at the offices of Borrower for inspection, copying, audit and examination at all reasonable times by any duly authorized representative of the Lender.
- 7.04 Any duly authorized representative of the Lender shall, at all reasonable times, have access to all portions of the Project.
- 7.05 The rights of access and inspection provided in this Section 7 shall continue until the completion of all close-out procedures respecting the Loan and until the final settlement and conclusion of all issues arising out of the Loan.

Section 8. Events Of Default.

Borrower shall be in Default under this Agreement upon the occurrence of any of the following Event(s) of Default or conditions, namely:

- (i) default in the payment of interest on the Note when the same is due in accordance with the terms hereof; or
- (ii) default in the payment of the principal of the Note when due in accordance with the terms hereof; or
- (iii) default in the performance or observance of any other covenant or agreement of the Borrower contained herein, which default shall remain unremedied for thirty (30) days after written notice thereof shall have been given by the City to the Borrower; provided, however, if such correction, by its nature, cannot be performed within said 30-day period, then, if the Borrower commences such correction within said 30-day period and diligently pursues such correction, the time period within which such correction must be performed shall end ninety (90) days following the written notice from the Lender; or
- (iv) the occurrence of an Event of Default under any of the Security Documents or under any agreement or document relating to the loan of the Senior Lender, which default is not timely cured pursuant, to any applicable cure period as set forth in the Security Documents or the Senior Lender Loan, as the case may be;
- (v) any warranty, representation or statement made or furnished to Lender by or on behalf of Borrower proving to have been false in any material respect when made or furnished;
- (vi) loss, theft, substantial damage, destruction, sale or encumbrance to or of any of the Collateral, or the making of any levy, seizure or attachment thereof or thereon except as expressly otherwise permitted under this Agreement;

(vii) Borrower's sale, partial sale, transfer or voluntary disposition of its business;

(viii) dissolution, termination of existence, insolvency, business failure, appointment of a receiver of any part of the assets of, assignment for the benefit of creditors by, or the commencement of any proceeding under any bankruptcy or insolvency laws by or against the Borrower or any guarantor or surety of Borrower.

Section 9. Remedies

Upon such default, and at any time thereafter (such default not having previously been cured as set forth in Section 8 above), Lender, at its option, may declare all Borrower's Liabilities secured hereby immediately due and payable and shall have the remedies of a secured party under the Uniform Commercial Code as adopted in Illinois ("Code") (and the foreclosure provisions of Ill. Rev. Stat., Chapter 110, Section 15-101 et seq.), including without limitation, the right to take immediate and exclusive possession of Collateral, or any part thereof, and for that purpose may, so far as Borrower can give authority therefor, with or without judicial process, enter (if this can be done without breach of the peace), upon any premises on which the Collateral or any part thereof may be situated and remove the same therefrom (provided that if the Collateral is affixed to real estate, such removal shall be subject to the conditions of the Code) and Lender shall be entitled to hold, maintain, preserve and prepare the Collateral for sale, subject to Borrower's right to redemption, in satisfaction of Borrower's Liabilities as provided in the Code. To this end, Lender may require Borrower to assemble the Collateral and make it available to Lender for possession at a place to be designated by Lender which is reasonably convenient to both parties. Unless the Collateral is perishable or threatens to decline rapidly in value or is of a type customarily sold on a recognized market, Lender will give Borrower at least ten (10) days notice of the time and place of any public sale thereof or of the time after which any private sale or any other intended disposition thereof is to be made. The requirements of reasonable notice shall be met if such notice is mailed, postage prepaid, to the address of Borrower shown in the beginning of this Agreement at least ten (10) days before the time of the sale or disposition. Lender may buy at any public sale, and if the Collateral is of a type customarily sold on a recognized market or is of a type which is the subject of a widely distributed standard price quotations, it may buy at private sale. The net proceeds realized upon any such disposition, after deduction for the expenses or retaking, holding, preparing for sale, selling or the like, and reasonable attorney's fees and legal expenses incurred by Lender in connection therewith, shall be applied in satisfaction of Borrower's Liabilities secured hereby. Lender will account to Borrower for any surplus realized on such disposition and Borrower shall remain liable for any deficiency.

The remedies of Lender hereunder are cumulative and the exercise of any one or more of the remedies provided for herein or under the Code shall not be construed as a waiver of any of the other remedies of Lender so long as any part of Borrower's Liabilities remain unsatisfied.

Section 10. No Waiver By Lender.

Lender's failure at any time or times hereafter to require strict performance by Borrower of any provision of this Agreement shall not waive, affect or diminish any right of Lender thereafter to demand strict compliance and performance therewith, nor shall any waiver by Lender of a Borrower's Event of Default waive, suspend or affect any other Event of Default under this Agreement, whether the same is prior or subsequent thereto, and whether of the same or of a different type.

Lender's delay in instituting or prosecuting any action or proceeding or otherwise asserting its rights hereunder, shall not operate as a waiver of such rights or limit them in any way so long as an Event of Default shall be continuing.

Section 11. Prepayment.

This Loan may be prepaid at anytime without premium or penalty.

Section 12. Equal Employment.

Borrower and its successors and assigns, agree that during the term of the Loan:

12.01 Borrower will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment on account of race, religion, color, age, sex, handicap or national origin. Borrower will take affirmative action to ensure that applicants are employed and that employees are treated during employment, without regard to race, color, age, religion, sex, handicap or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: (a) employment upgrading, demotion, transfer, recruitment or recruitment advertising, layoff or termination, rates of pay, or other forms of compensation, and selection for training, including apprenticeship. Borrower agrees to post in conspicuous places, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause.

12.02 Borrower will in all solicitations of, or advertisements for, employees placed by or on its behalf, state that all qualified applicants will receive consideration for employment without regard to race, religion, color, age, sex, handicap or national origin.

12.03 Discrimination as used herein shall be interpreted in accordance with the Constitution and applicable federal laws. This covenant may be enforced solely by the City and solely against the party who breaches this covenant.

Section 13. Disclaimer Of Relationship.

Nothing contained in this Agreement, nor any act of the Lender, shall be deemed or construed by any of the parties, or by third persons, to create any relationship of third-party beneficiary, or of principal or agent, or of limited or general partnership, or of joint venture, or any association or relationship involving Lender.

Section 14. Conflict Of Interest.

No member, official or employee of Lender shall have any personal interest, direct or indirect, in the Borrower's business; nor shall any such member, official or employee participate in any decision relating to Borrower's business which affects his/her personal interests or the interests of any corporation, partnership or association in which he/she is directly interested.

Section 15. Limitation Of Liability.

Borrower expressly agrees that no member, official, employee or agent of Lender shall be individually or personally liable to Borrower, its successors or assigns in the event of any default or breach by Lender under this Agreement.

Section 16. Assignment.

16.01 Borrower may not sell, assign or transfer this Agreement without the prior written consent of D.E.D.

16.02 Borrower consents to Lender's sale, assignment, transfer or other disposition, at any time and from time to time hereafter, of this Agreement, in whole or in part.

Section 17. Additional Provisions.

17.01 This Agreement may not be altered or amended except by written instrument signed by all parties hereto.

17.02 All notices, certificates or other communications required or given hereunder shall be in writing and placed in the United States mails, registered or certified, return receipt requested, first class postage, prepaid and addressed as follows:

17.03 If any provision hereof is held invalid or unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such provision shall be deemed severed from this Agreement to the extent of such invalidity or unenforceability, and the remainder hereof will not be affected thereby, each of the provisions hereof being severable in any such instance.

17.04 This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois.

17.05 In all instances where the Lender's consent or approval is required, Lender agrees not to unreasonably, arbitrarily or capriciously withhold such consent or approval.

SUPPLEMENTAL BOND INDENTURE SUBSTITUTING LA SALLE NATIONAL BANK FOR COSMOPOLITÉN BANK AS TRUSTEE FOR 811 WEST EVERGREEN PARTNERSHIP PROJECT INDUSTRIAL REVENUE BONDS.

The Committee on Finance submitted a report recommending that the City Council pass a proposed ordinance transmitted therewith, concerning an amended ordinance adopted December 23, 1985, and amended December 10, 1986, authorizing a Supplemental Bond Indenture which substitutes LaSalle National Bank for the Cosmospolitan National Bank of Chicago as trustee of the Industrial Revenue Bonds relating to the 811 West Evergreen Partnership Project.

On motion of Alderman Burke, the said proposed ordinance was *Passed* by yeas and nays as follows:

Nays -- None.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago, Illinois, pursuant to its home rule powers and pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 15.2 of Municipal Code of the City of Chicago, as amended, adopted an ordinance on December 23, 1985 as amended December 10, 1986 (together such ordinances are referred to herein as the "Bond Ordinance") authorizing and providing for the issuance by the City of Chicago, Illinois (the "Issuer") of \$1,650,000 aggregate principal amount of industrial revenue bonds (811 West Evergreen Partnership Project) (the "Bonds"), payable from the receipts from a loan agreement and a collateralized credit agreement; authorizing the execution and delivery of a loan agreement between the City of Chicago, the 811 West Evergreen Partnership (the "Partnership"), and LaSalle National Bank, not personally, but solely as trustee under a trust agreement dated December 11, 1984 and known as Trust No. 109228 (the "Land Trustee") (the Partnership and Land Trustee are sometime referred to hereinafter as the "Owner"), a bond purchase agreement, an indenture of trust, and other documents providing for the acquisition, rehabilitation, and financing of said project; confirming the sale of said bonds to the purchaser thereof; and related matters; and

WHEREAS, In connection with the issuance of the Bonds, the Issuer has heretofore executed and delivered an Indenture of Trust (the "Indenture") dated as of December 1, 1986 by and between the Issuer and The Cosmopolitan National Bank of Chicago, Chicago, Illinois, as trustee (the "Trustee"); and

WHEREAS, The Trustee has given to the Issuer, among others, notice of its resignation as Trustee under the Indenture; and

WHEREAS, Section 909 of the Indenture provides that in the event the Trustee shall resign, a successor Trustee shall be appointed by the Issuer at the direction of the Owner and with the prior written consent of the credit instrument obligor (the "Credit Instrument Obligor"), if any; and

WHEREAS, The Owner has directed and the Credit Instrument Obligor has consented to the appointment of LaSalle National Bank as successor trustee (the "Successor Trustee") under the Indenture; and

WHEREAS, The Issuer wishes to amend the Indenture to provide for the appointment of the Successor Trustee; and

WHEREAS, The Issuer has authority to so amend the Indenture pursuant to Section 1001(D) thereof; and

WHEREAS, A copy of a First Supplemental Indenture of Trust (the "First Supplemental Indenture") has been prepared and presented to this meeting; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. (a) That the form, terms and provisions of the proposed First Supplemental Indenture be, and they hereby are, in all respects approved, and that the Mayor or City Comptroller be, and they are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver the First Supplemental Indenture in the name and on behalf of the Issuer, and thereupon to cause the First Supplemental Indenture to be executed, acknowledged and delivered to the Successor Trustee; that the First Supplemental Indenture is to be in substantially the form before this meeting and hereby approved, or with such changes therein as shall be approved by the officials of the Issuer executing the same, their execution thereof to constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of any and all changes or revisions therein from the form of the First Supplemental Indenture before this meeting; and from and after the execution and delivery of the First Supplemental Indenture, the officials, agents and employees of the Issuer are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to do all such acts and things and to execute all such documents as may be necessary to carry out and comply with the provisions of the First Supplemental Indenture as executed.

- (b) That the form of the Bond contained in the First Supplemental Indenture, be, and is hereby approved, and when the same shall be executed on behalf of the Issuer in the manner contemplated by the Indenture and by this Ordinance, it shall represent the approved form of the Bond of the Issuer.
- (c) That the actions of the Mayor and City Comptroller of the Issuer heretofore taken in connection with the Bonds are hereby ratified and confirmed.
- (d) That from and after the execution and delivery of the documents referred to above, the proper officials, agents and employees of the Issuer are hereby authorized, empowered and directed to do all such acts and things and to execute all such documents as may be necessary to carry out and comply with the provisions of said documents as executed (including any documents relating to the assignment to the Successor Trustee of any rights of the Issuer, or of the Trustee on behalf of the Issuer, under any mortgage on, or a security interest in any property comprising the Project or securing the Bonds), and to further the purposes and intent of this ordinance including the preambles hereto.

- (e) That all acts and doings of the officials of the Issuer which are in conformity with the purposes and intent of this ordinance, be, and that the same are hereby in all respects approved and confirmed.

The provisions of this ordinance are hereby declared to be separable and if any section, phrase or provision shall for any reason be declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid or unenforceable, such declaration shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remainder of the sections, phrases and provisions hereof.
- SECTION 3. All ordinances, orders and resolutions and parts thereof in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby repealed, and this Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force immediately upon its adoption.
- SECTION 4. That The Edgewater Hospital, Inc. as an Illinois not-for-profit corporation engaged in medical, educational and related activities, shall be mempt from the payment of all City fees including, but not limited to, fees associated with building permits, inspections, permits, licenses, warrants for collection, and water rates as well as other fees for which it is entitled to an exemption pursuant to previously adopted City Council orders and ordinances, executive orders and provisions of the Municipal Code of Chicago, which

exempt charities, religious and/or educational institutions not conducted for private gain or profit. Said exemption shall be effective both prospectively and retroactively without the necessity of any further application or governmental action.

SECTION 2. That The Edgewater Hospital, Inc. shall be entitled to refunds for any City imposed fees which it has paid prior to the effective date of this ordinance, and to which it is exempt pursuant to Section 1 of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. That the Commissioner of Inspectional Services, the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation, the Commissioner of Public Works, the Commissioner of Sewers, the Commissioner of Water, the Commissioner of Health and the Commissioner of Consumer Services and the Commissioners of all other City Departments are hereby directed to issue all necessary permits and licenses and provide other City services as described in Section 1 of this ordinance, free of charge, to The Edgewater Hospital, Inc.; provided, however, that The Edgewater Hospital, Inc. shall remain an Illinois not-for-profit corporation engaged in medical, educational and related activities.

WHEREAS, These hospitals are being forced from granting waivers for seniors by a seriously flawed Justice Department decision; and

WHEREAS, The waiver program, according to the Inspector General of the United States Health and Human Services Department, would be acceptable for private hospital care patients but is now being denied lower income senior citizens; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That the Mayor and members of the City Council of Chicago memorialize and petition the United States Department of Justice and, indeed, the Congress and President of the United States to restore the Medicare waiver program and the benefit it offers our senior citizens in need of adequate health care.

Your Committee on Community Maintenance and Development, to which was referred a communication from the Office of the Mayor, concerning an ordinance authorizing the Year XIII Community Block Grant Fund and amendments. This communication is dated 2/10/87.

Having had the same under advisement, begs leave to report and recommend that Your Honorable Body pass as amended the proposed ordinance transmitted herewith.

This recommendation was concurred in by roll call vote with a report of (4) four yeas (1) nays by the members of the committee.

The following is said proposed ordinance transmitted with the foregoing committee report:

WHEREAS, Pursuant to the enactment of the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, the City of Chicago proposes to submit the Final Statement for the entitlement of Eighty-four Million, Seventy-one Thousand, Five Hundred Eighty Dollars; and

WHEREAS, It is provided in the act and in the regulations promulgated thereunder that the City provide certain assurances to the Federal government, and

WHEREAS, The Mayor and the City Council of the City of Chicago are cognizant of the conditions of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, and are desirous of complying therewith; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor and the City Council are desirous of establishing procedures which insure the fair, open and equitable administration of federal grant funds; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Mayor of the City of Chicago is authorized to make Year XIII submission for federal funds, including the Final Statement of Community Development Objectives and Projected Use of Funds, as set forth in this ordinance and all understandings and assurances contained therein, pursuant to the provisions of the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, and the regulations promulgated in connection with the Act in the sum of Eighty-four Million,

Seventy-one Thousand, Five Hundred Eighty Dollars in entitlement funds, and federal non-expended prior year funds in the amount of One Million, Three Hundred Fourteen Thousand, One Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars.

SECTION 2. The Mayor of the City of Chicago is further authorized to act in connection with the submission, to give what assurances are necessary and to provide such additional information as is required.

SECTION 3. The criteria for Community Development Block Grant funded programs previously approved by the City Council shall remain in effect.

SECTION 4. Except for those funds specifically appropriated for contractor-delegate agencies, the City may reprogram up to \$10,000 appropriated for any object or purpose set forth in the Year XIII Community Development Block Grant Appropriation Ordinance (the "C.D.B.G. Appropriation Ordinance") or allocations from prior block grant years provided that no appropriation for any object or purpose shall by virtue of any reprogramming authorized herein, be reduced below an amount sufficient to cover all obligations incurred or to be incurred by that appropriation.

All proposed reprogramming of funds as outlined in the Final Statement of Projected Use of Funds by program for the Year XIII and in the allocations for the prior years shall be made by providing citizens with reasonable notice of the opportunity to comment on any proposed reprogramming of 10% or more of the funds from one activity to another, which includes the deletion of an activity or the addition of any activity.

SECTION 5. The Office of Budget and Management shall notify Aldermen of projects in the respective wards contemplated under this program.

SECTION 6. The award of any contract or grant over \$50,000 in any program category, project or activity which is not included by specific designation in the C.D.B.G. Ordinance shall be subject to review and approval by the City Council provided that the City Council shall complete its review within 21 days after submission to the City Council; and that the City of Chicago shall not engage in discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, national origin, handicap, sexual orientation, geographic location or political affiliation or belief. Any loans in the amount of \$75,000 or more funded, in whole, or by 25% or more with Year XIII Community Development Block Grant funds or funds from prior block grant years shall be approved by the City Council under the same procedures as required for approval of contracts or grants as set forth in this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. The following sums of money set apart according to the departments of city government and contractor-delegate agencies are allocated from the Community Development Block Grant to the City of Chicago for the Year XIII and are to be expended during the fiscal year beginning April 1, 1987, and extended to and including December 31, 1987 for the objects and purposes as set forth in Section 12 hereof. No expenditures or encumbrance of Year XIII Community Development Block Grant funds shall be made until such time as the C.D.B.G. Appropriation Ordinance is approved by the City Council. Section 8 through 11 hereof set forth the provisions which shall be included in the C.D.B.G. Appropriation Ordinance.

SECTION 8. Included in the appropriation for Personal Services in applicable departments shall be an account appearing as Code No. ".0015 Schedule Salary Adjustments."

Also to be included in the allocation for Personal Services shall be an account appearing as Code No. ".0044 Fringe Benefits" for the purpose of providing City employees with health insurance, dental insurance, optical insurance, life insurance, pension (employer's share), unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, tuition reimbursement, paid vacation, in-house training programs, sick leave, deferred compensation, holidays, time off with pay for family death, paid salary while on jury duty, and disability payments.

SECTION 9. The appropriations set forth in the C.D.B.G. Appropriation Ordinance for personal services shall be regarded as maximum amounts to be expended from such appropriations. Such expenditures shall be further limited to employment of personnel only as needed, or as may be required by law, not to exceed the specified maximum number designated in the ordinance for any office or position or title. When there is no limitation as to the maximum number that may be employed for any office or position or title, one person may be employed or more than one person may be employed with the approval of the Budget Director and Comptroller regardless of whether such title is printed in the singular or plural. The salary of wage rate fixed shall be regarded as the maximum salary or rate rates for the respective offices or positions; provided that wage rates fixed on a daily or monthly basis are subject to change by the City Council during the fiscal year beginning April 1, 1987, in accordance with the prevailing wage rates in private employment for such employees; and provided further that salaries or wage rates are subject to change by the City Council during the fiscal year in accordance with contracts approved by the City Council between the City of Chicago and recognized collective bargaining agents. The salary or wage rates fixed are on a yearly basis unless otherwise indicated.

Initial appointments to any positions shall be made at the entrance rate of the salary range prescribed for the applicable class grade. In exceptional cases, upon recommendation by the Department Head and approval of the Commissioner of Personnel, the Budget Director and the Chairman of the Committee on Finance of the City Council, initial appointment may be made at a rate above the normal entrance rate. Entrance above the normal entrance rate shall be based on the outstanding and unusual character of the applicant's education, experience and training over and above the minimum qualifications specified for the class. In no event shall the authority conferred herein be exercised in violation of the Shakman Judgment.

No officer or employee shall have the right to demand continuous employment, or compensation by reason of any appropriation if upon the determination of the department head, his services are not needed and it becomes necessary to lay him off on account of lack of work or lack of funds. In case of a vacancy in any office or position, the head of a department in which the vacancy occurs shall not be required to fill such office or position if, in his judgment and discretion, there is no necessity therefor.

All City of Chicago employees compensated by Community Development Block Grant Funds shall receive the same benefits and conditions of employment as employees performing similar work and compensated by other funds.

SECTION 10. Any employee who is required and is authorized to use his personally owned automobile in the regular conduct of official City business shall be allowed and paid eighteen (\$.18) cents per mile allowance for the number of miles per month use of such privately owned automobile, to a maximum amount of One Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$150.00) per month; and provided further that this allowance is subject to change by the City Council during the fiscal year beginning April 1, 1987 and ending December 31, 1987, in accordance with contracts approved by the City Council between the City of Chicago and recognized collective bargaining agents. City-owned or leased automobiles shall be used only for city business.

SECTION 11. The objects and purposes for which allocations are made in this ordinance are classified and standardized by the following items:

- 1) Personal Services
- 2) Contractual Services
- 3) Travel
- 4) Commodities
- 5) Equipment
- 6) Permanent Improvements
- 7) Land

An appropriation in one or more of the items above specified shall be construed in accordance with the definitions and limitations specified in Illinois Revised Statutes, Ch. 24 Section 8-2-5 (1985), unless this ordinance otherwise provides. An allocation for a purpose other than one specified and defined in this section may be made only as an additional, separate and distinct item, specifically stating the project and purpose thereof.

SECTION 12. All work to be performed by the City of Chicago pursuant to the C.D.B.G. Appropriation Ordinance shall be done using the current work force of the City of Chicago and the persons on the following lists shall have preference over any new employees to be hired for positions for which such lists exist in accordance with City of Chicago personnel rules:

- (a) Persons on City of Chicago layoff lists;
- (b) Persons on City of Chicago reinstatement lists;
- (c) Persons on City of Chicago reemployment lists;
- (d) Persons on City of Chicago promotion lists;
- (e) Persons on City of Chicago general employment lists.

Provided, however, that the preferences hereinabove specified shall not apply where other methods of hiring must be utilized in order to comply with the terms of any order or decree of a Court or administrative agency, collective bargaining agreement or title VII, 42 U.S.C. Section 2000e, et seq.

SECTION 13. For all funds expended under the Community Development Block Grant programs for the Year XIII the Office of Budget and Management shall submit to the City Council a report on the obligations of funds within 45 days of the end of the first half of the program year and within 60-90 days of the end of the program year. The report shall include an accounting for all funds expended during the preceding first half for all block grant years, all income generated from the current block grant year and all prior block grant years and a projection of income for the remaining half of the fiscal year. The reports shall also include a statement of the reasons for all unencumbered and unexpended allocations in all block grant years, as reported in the Department of Finance's monthly "Community Development Block Grant Fund, Schedule of H.U.D. Approved Allocations, Current Committee Approved Allocations, Expenditures, Accruals, Encumbrances and Available Balances.

SECTION 14. Except as provided in Section 4 hereof, all unencumbered and unexpended Community Development Block Grant funds from this fiscal year and all prior block grant years shall be jointly reviewed by the Budget Director and the Comptroller for the purpose of preparing for the Year XIV Community Development Block Grant Proposed Statement. This joint review committee shall prepare a report of funds available for reprogramming and proposed use of such funds in Community Development Block Grant Year XIV.

This report shall be submitted to the City Council and shall be subject to public comment and hearings along with the Year XIV Community Development Block Grant Proposed Statement. Action on the use of these funds will take place concurrently with action on the Year XIV Community Development Block Grant Final Statement.

SECTION 15. Pursuant to Section 104(a)(2)(D) and Section 104(b)(5) of the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, the City shall provide citizens with reasonable access to the past use of all Community Development Block Grant funds. Such information shall be available, on request, through the Office of Budget and Management and the Department of Finance.

SECTION 16. This ordinance shall be effective upon due passage and publication.

COMMITTEE ON HISTORICAL LANDMARK PRESERVATION.

Action Deferred -- MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER 21 AMENDED CONCERNING CHICAGO HISTORICAL AND ARCHITECTURAL LANDMARKS.

The Committee on Historical Landmark Preservation submitted the following report:

CHICAGO, February 27, 1987.

To the President and Members of the City Council:

Your Committee on Historical Landmark Preservation having under consideration proposed amendments to the Chicago Landmarks Ordinance submitted by Alderman Gerald McLaughlin (referred May 29, 1985) begs leave to recommend that Your Honorable Body pass said proposed amendments, as further amended in committee by repealing Chapter 21, Sections 21-62 through 21-64.3 of the Municipal Code of Chicago in their entirety and enacting new Sections 21-62 through 21-95.

This recommendation was concurred in by all members of the committee present, with no dissenting vote.

Alderman Natarus introduced the following amendment to the said proposed ordinance:

WHEREAS, The institution of the Church devotes substantial resources to programs which provide food, counselling and tutoring to the needy and is a leader in providing such charitable goods and services; and

WHEREAS, Such charitable works should be preeminent among the Church's missions and should be encouraged and supported by the City; and

WHEREAS, Society as a whole is the benefactor of the Church's charitable works and deeds; and

WHEREAS, The Church must be free to set religious goals, purposes and priorities; and have the freedom to express religious vision; and

WHEREAS, Church maintenance of Church facilities and the allocation of Church resources must be undertaken and allotted at the discretion of the Church and solely in the exercise of its judgment; and

WHEREAS, The First Amendment of the United States Constitution guarantees the free exercise of religion and the Church is constitutionally protected against nonessential interference from the State; and

WHEREAS, Historical landmark designation of Church facilities would violate the First Amendment of the United States Constitution's prohibition against the establishment of religion by entangling the State in Church affairs; and

WHEREAS, Any incursion by the City under the landmarks laws into the Church's decision making process results in precisely the type of state interference and entanglement prohibited by the Constitution; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That Chapter 21 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting therein, in its proper numerical sequence, a new section in italics, to read as follows:

No Church or religious building shall be designated as a historical landmark absent the consent of the owner thereof.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

Alderman Schulter moved to refer the foregoing amendment to the Committee on Historical Landmark Preservation.

Alderman Natarus and Alderman Kelley then *Deferred* and ordered published the foregoing proposed amendment and the said proposed ordinance.

The following is the said proposed ordinance transmitted with the foregoing committee report and the proposed amendment:

WHEREAS, The Illinois General Assembly has recognized the importance of the preservation and continued utilization of historic sites, buildings, and areas to sound community planning and to the welfare of the residents of Illinois and has empowered all municipalities in the state to preserve and protect such historic sites, buildings, and areas, in the Illinois Cities and Villages Act, Chapter 24 of the Illinois Revised Statutes; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago is a home rule municipality under Article VII, Section 6, of the Illinois Constitution, and the protection of historic sites, buildings, and areas is clearly within the government and affairs of the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Since 1957 the City of Chicago has had a Commission on Chicago Architectural Landmarks, renamed in 1968 the Commission on Chicago Historical and Architectural Landmarks, that has consistently extended and improved the protection of historic sites, buildings, and areas within the City of Chicago while recognizing the need to provide incentives for the continued utilization of such sites, buildings, and areas; and

WHEREAS, Chapter 21 of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago implementing the protection of historic sites, buildings, and areas has not been comprehensively reviewed and revised since 1968, and since that time the legal authority for the protection of such sites, buildings, and areas has been clarified by the courts and by amendments to the Illinois Cities and Villages Act; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 21, Sections 21-62 through 21-64.3 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by repealing the Sections in their entirety and enacting new Sections 21-62 through 21-95 to read in italics as follows:
 - 21-62. Purpose. It is hereby declared necessary for the general welfare of the citizens of the City of Chicago as an exercise of the home rule authority of the City of Chicago under Article VII, Section 6, of the Illinois Constitution, to protect and encourage the continued utilization of areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other similar objects within the City of Chicago eligible for designation by ordinance as "Chicago Landmarks." The purpose of these sections is the following:
 - 1. To identify, preserve, protect, enhance, and encourage the continued utilization and the rehabilitation of such areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects having a special historical, community, architectural, or aesthetic interest or value to the City of Chicago and its citizens;
 - 2. To safeguard the City of Chicago's historic and cultural heritage, as embodied and reflected in such areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects determined eligible for designation by ordinance as "Chicago Landmarks";
 - 3. To preserve the character and vitality of the neighborhoods and central area, to promote economic development through rehabilitation and to conserve and improve the property tax base of the City of Chicago;
 - 4. To foster civic pride in the beauty and noble accomplishments of the past as represented in such "Chicago Landmarks";
 - 5. To protect and enhance the attractiveness of the City of Chicago to homeowners, home buyers, tourists, visitors, businesses, and shoppers, and thereby to support and promote business, commerce, industry, and tourism and to provide economic benefit to the City of Chicago,
 - 6. To foster and encourage preservation, restoration, and rehabilitation of areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects, including entire districts and neighborhoods, and thereby prevent future urban blight and in some cases reverse current urban deterioration;
 - 7. To foster the education, pleasure, and welfare of the people of the City of Chicago through the designation of "Chicago Landmarks";

- 8. To encourage orderly and efficient development that recognizes the special value to the City of Chicago of the protection of areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects designated as "Chicago Landmarks";
- 9. To encourage the continuation of surveys and studies of Chicago's historical and architectural resources and the maintenance and updating of a register of areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects which may be worthy of landmark designation; and
- 10. To encourage public participation in identifying and preserving historical and architectural resources through public hearings on proposed designations, building permits, and economic hardship variations.
- 21-63. The Commission. There is hereby created a Commission on Chicago Landmarks. The Commission shall consist of nine members, eight of whom shall be appointed by the Mayor. The ninth member shall be the Commissioner of Planning or his designee. The members shall serve without compensation. One of the members shall be designated by the Mayor as chairman, another as vice-chairman, and another as secretary. For the purposes of sections 21-62 through 21-95, the "Commission" means the Commission on Chicago Landmarks.
- 21-64. Commission Members. A majority of the members of the Commission shall constitute a quorum. The Commission shall meet on the call of the chairman or of four of its members. The term of each member shall be for four years and until a successor is appointed. No more than four members shall be replaced in a one year period. Commission members shall be selected from professionals in the disciplines of history, architecture, historic architecture, planning, archaeology, real estate, historic preservation, or related fields, or shall be persons who have demonstrated special interest, knowledge, or experience in architecture, history, neighborhood preservation, or related disciplines.
- 21-65. Powers and Duties. The Commission shall have and may exercise the following duties, powers, and responsibilities:
- 1. To conduct an ongoing survey of the City of Chicago for the purpose of identifying those areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects of historic or architectural significance;
- 2. To hold hearings and to recommend that the City Council designate by ordinance areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects as official "Chicago Landmarks," if they qualify as defined hereunder, and to recommend that such designation include all or some portion of the property or any improvements thereon;
- 3. To cause plaques to be manufactured and installed that identify the significance of designated landmarks and landmark districts;
- 4. To prepare and publish maps, brochures, and other descriptive and educational materials about Chicago's landmarks and landmark districts and their designation and protection;

- 5. To review permit applications for alteration, construction, reconstruction, erection, demolition, relocation, or work of any kind affecting landmarks and structures or unimproved sites in landmark districts and to require the presentation of such plans, drawings, elevations, and other information as may be necessary to review those applications;
- 6. To advise and assist owners or prospective owners of designated or potential landmarks or structures in landmark districts on technical and financial aspects of preservation, renovation, rehabilitation, and reuse, and to establish standards and guidelines therefor;
- 7. To apply for and accept any gift, grant, or bequest from any private or public source, including agencies of the federal or state government, upon approval by the City Council, for any purpose authorized by these provisions;
- 8. To make recommendations to the City Council concerning means to preserve, protect, enhance, rehabilitate, and perpetuate landmarks and structures in landmark districts;
- 9. To adopt, publish, and make available rules of procedure and other regulations for the conduct of Commission meetings, hearings, and other business;
- 10. To prepare and present nominations of landmarks and historic districts to any state or federal registers of historic places;
- 11. To assume whatever responsibility and duties may be assigned to it by the State under Certified Local Government provisions of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended;
- 12. To cooperate with and enlist the aid of persons, organizations, corporations, foundations, and public agencies in matters involving historic preservation, renovation, rehabilitation, and reuse;
- 13. To advise any city department or agency concerning the effect of its actions, programs, capital improvements, or activities on designated or potential landmarks;
- 14. To consider whether denial of permits affecting landmarks and structures or unimproved sites in landmark districts results in economic hardship to property owners:
- 15. To exercise any other power or authority necessary or appropriate to carry out the purpose of these provisions.
- 21-66. Criteria. The Commission shall familiarize itself with areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects within the City of Chicago which may be considered for designation by ordinance as "Chicago Landmarks," and maintain a register thereof. In making its recommendation to the City Council for designation, the Commission shall limit its consideration solely to the following criteria concerning such area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, and other objects:

- 1. Its value as an example of the architectural, cultural, economic, historic, social, or other aspect of the heritage of the City of Chicago, State of Illinois, or the United States.
- 2. Its location as a site of a significant historic event which may or may not have taken place within or involved the use of any existing improvements.
- 3. Its identification with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the architectural, cultural, economic, historic, social, or other aspect of the development of the City of Chicago, State of Illinois, or the United States.
- 4. Its exemplification of an architectural type or style distinguished by innovation, rarity, uniqueness, or overall quality of design, detail, materials, or craftsmanship.
- 5. Its identification as the work of an architect, designer, engineer, or builder whose individual work is significant in the history or development of the City of Chicago, the State of Illinois, or the United States.
- 6. Its representation of an architectural, cultural, economic, historic, social, or other theme expressed through distinctive areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, or other objects that may or may not be contiguous.
- 7. Its unique location or distinctive physical appearance or presence representing an established and familiar visual feature of a neighborhood, community, or the City of Chicago.
- 21-67. Preliminary Determination. The Commission may, by resolution, make a preliminary determination that an area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object meets one or more of the criteria for landmark designation. The Commission shall send, by certified mail return receipt requested, written notice of such determination to the owner of the property. The Commission shall also notify in writing the alderman of each ward in which the property is located and all relevant City departments.
- Request of Planning Report. Upon adoption of a resolution making a preliminary determination, the Commission shall request a report from the Commissioner of Planning which evaluates the relationship of the proposed designation to the Comprehensive Plan of the City of Chicago and the effect of the proposed designation on the surrounding neighborhood. The report shall also include the Commissioner's opinion and recommendations regarding any other planning considerations relevant to the proposed designation and the Commissioner's recommendation of approval, rejection, or modification of the proposed designation. The report shall be submitted to the Commission within sixty (60) days of the request, if the proposed designation is of an area, place, building, structure, work of art or other object, or within ninety (90) days, if the proposed designation is a district, and shall become part of the official record concerning the proposed designation. The Commission may make such modifications, changes, and alterations concerning the proposed designation as it deems necessary in consideration of any recommendation of the Commissioner of Planning. Commissioner declines or fails to submit a report within the time provided herein, the Commission may proceed with designation.

- 21-69. Request for Owner Consent. The Commission shall thereafter, by certified mail return receipt requested, notify the owner of the property of the reasons for and effects of the proposed designation and request that the owner consent in writing to the proposed designation. The owner shall respond within forty-five (45) days from the date of mailing of the request. In the case of the proposed designation of an area, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object, an owner may, within the forty-five (45) day period, request an extension of time, not to exceed one hundred and twenty (120) days, to submit a response. In the case of the proposed designation of a district, the alderman of a ward in which the district is wholly or partly located may, within the forty-five (45) day period, request an extension of time, not to exceed one hundred twenty (120) days, for owners to submit responses. If the owner consents to designation, the Commission shall notify the owner of its determination with respect to the proposed designation within forty-five (45) days after receipt of the owner's consent and shall forward its recommendation to the City Council as provided in Section 21-72. If the owner declines or fails to give written consent to the proposed designation within the time specified in this Section, the Commission shall schedule a public hearing on the proposed designation.
- 21-70. Notices of Public Hearing. Prior to conducting a public hearing under this Chapter 21, the Commission shall give written notice of the date, time, and place of the hearing to any owner of the subject property. The Commission shall also cause to be posted, for a period of not less than fifteen (15) days immediately preceding the hearing, a notice stating the time, date, place, and matter to be considered at the hearing. The notice shall be prominently displayed on the place, building, object, or structure or on the public ways abutting the property, and, in the case of designation of areas or districts, the notices shall be placed on the principal boundaries thereof. In addition, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the hearing, the Commission shall cause a legal notice to be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Chicago setting forth the nature of the hearing, the property, area, or district involved, and the date, time, and place of the scheduled public hearing.
- 21-71. Public Hearing on Designation. The Commission shall provide a reasonable opportunity for all interested persons to present testimony or evidence under such rules as the Commission may adopt governing the proceedings of a hearing. At the hearing, each speaker shall state his name, address, and the interest which he represents. The hearing may be continued to a date certain, and a transcript and record shall be kept of all proceedings. A person, organization, or other legal entity whose use or whose members' use or enjoyment of the area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object proposed for designation may be injured by the designation or the failure of the Commission to recommend designation may become a party to a designation proceeding. Any person, organization, or other legal entity whose use or enjoyment of the area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object designated as a landmark may be injured by the approval or disapproval of a proposed alteration, construction, reconstruction, erection, demolition, or relocation of a proposed or designated landmark may become a party to a permit application proceedings. The foregoing, shall include without limitation, persons, organizations, or other legal entities residing in, leasing or having an ownership interest in real property located within 500 feet of the property line of the proposed or designated landmark or within the proposed or designated landmark district.

- 21-72. Commission Recommendation. Within thirty (30) days after the conclusion of the public hearing, the Commission shall determine whether to recommend the proposed landmark designation to the City Council. If the Commission makes a determination to recommend a designation to the City Council, it shall set forth its recommendation in writing including findings of fact relating to the criteria for designation in Section 21-66 that constitute the basis for its decision and shall transmit its recommendation to the City Council, to the owner of the property and to the parties appearing at the public hearing. If fifty-one (51) percent of the owners of the property in a district responding to the request for consent file written objections to designation, a recommendation of landmark designation of that district must be approved by the affirmative vote of six members of the Commission. The Commission shall also transmit to the City Council the official record of its proceedings concerning the recommended designation. If the proposed designation is of an area, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object, the Commission shall transmit its recommendation to the City Council within 180 days from the date of receipt of the report of the Commissioner of Planning, or if no report has been received, within 240 days from the date of the Commission's request for the report. If the proposed designation is of a district, the Commission shall transmit its recommendation to the City Council within 240 days from the date of receipt of the report of the Commissioner of Planning, or, if no report has been received, within 330 days from the date of the Commission's request for the report. If, however, an extension of time has been granted under Section 21.69, the time allowed for submission under this section shall be extended by the same number of days.
- 21-73. City Council Consideration of Designation. The City Council shall give due consideration to the findings, recommendations, and record of the Commission in making its determination with respect to the proposed designation of any area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object having a special historical, community, architectural, or aesthetic interest or value. The City Council may, in its discretion, hold public hearings on any such recommended designation. The City Council may by ordinance designate an area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object meeting one or more of the criteria stated in Section 21-66 hereof as a "Chicago Landmark." The City Council may direct that a suitable plaque or plaques be created by the Commission appropriately identifying said landmark. The plaque may be affixed to private property only if the owner or owners consent in writing.
- 21-74. Preservation Easements. The Commission may consider and recommend to the City Council the adoption of a preservation easement for any designated landmark or for any building, area, district or place which meets the criteria for landmark designation. If an owner of any property proposes to the Commission a preservation easement, the Commission shall hold a public hearing on the proposal in accordance with Sections 21-70 and 21-71 prior to recommending that the City Council accept the proposed easement.
- 21-75. Notice of Designation. Immediately following official designation by the City Council, the Commission shall notify the Department of Inspectional Services of the City of Chicago of the designation. The Commission shall also, within ten (10) days of the official designation, send a certified copy of the ordinance designating the property and a summary of the effects of designation to the owner of the property by certified mail return receipt requested. The Commission shall also file with the Recorder of Deeds of Cook County, the Assessor of Cook County, the Bureau of Maps and Plats of the Department of

Public Works of the City of Chicago, and all other relevant City departments, a certified copy of the designation ordinance.

- 21-76. Amendment, Recision, and Reconsideration. Any designation of an area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other similar object as a "Chicago Landmark" shall only be amended or rescinded in the same manner and procedure as the original designation was made. If the Commission votes not to recommend a proposed designation to the City Council, or if the Commission has failed to issue its recommendation on a proposed designation within the time provided or if the City Council has refused to designate a proposed "Chicago Landmark," then the Commission may not reconsider the proposed designation for a period of one year from the date of the negative Commission vote, or from the date of expiration of the time limitation for Commission action, or from the date of the City Council's refusal to designate, whichever is applicable.
- 21-77. Permit Review Requirement. No permit for alteration, construction, reconstruction, erection, demolition, relocation, or other work shall be issued to any applicant by any department of the City of Chicago without the written approval of the Commission for any area, district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object for which the Commission has made a preliminary determination of landmark status or which has been designated as a "Chicago Landmark" in the following instances: 1) where such permit would allow the alteration or reconstruction of or addition to any improvement which constitutes all or a part of a landmark or proposed landmark; or 2) where such permit would allow the demolition of any improvement which constitutes all or a part of a landmark or proposed landmark; or 3) where a permit would allow the construction or erection of any addition to any improvement or the erection of any new structure or improvement on any land within a landmark district; or 4) where a permit would allow the construction or erection of any sign or billboard within the public view which may be placed on, in, or immediately adjacent to any improvement which constitutes all or part of any landmark or proposed landmark. Any City department which receives an application for a permit as defined in this section shall forward the application, including copies of all detailed plans, designs, elevations, specifications, and documents relating thereto, to the Commission within seven days of receipt thereof. It shall be a violation of this Ordinance for an owner to perform, authorize or allow work or other acts requiring review without a permit.
- 21-78. Permit Review for Pre-Existing Work. Erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, or demolition work begun pursuant to a properly issued permit prior to a preliminary determination of landmark status shall not be subject to review by the Commission unless such permit has expired, been cancelled or revoked, or the work is not diligently proceeding to completion in accordance with the Chicago Building Code.
- 21-79. Preliminary Decision by Commission. Within fifteen (15) days of its receipt of an application for a permit, as defined in Section 21-77, the Commission shall issue in writing a preliminary decision approving or disapproving the application and shall notify the applicant and the appropriate City departments of its preliminary decision.

- 21-80. Preliminary Approval of Permit by Commission. If the Commission finds that the proposed work will not adversely affect any significant historical or architectural feature of the improvement or of the district, and is in accord with the Standards for Rehabilitation set forth by the United States Secretary of the Interior at 36 C.F.R. 67, as amended from time to time, as well as the Commission's published procedures, the Commission shall issue a preliminary approval of the application. Upon receipt of the Commission's preliminary approval, the appropriate City department shall proceed in its usual manner with its own review of the application. No substantial change shall be made to the work proposed in the application for the permit after approval by the Commission without resubmittal to the Commission and approval thereof in the same manner as for the original application.
- 21-81. Preliminary Disapproval of Permit by Commission. If the Commission finds that the proposed work will adversely affect or destroy any significant historical or architectural feature of the improvement or the district or is inappropriate or inconsistent with the designation of the structure, area, or district or is not in accordance with the spirit and purposes of this ordinance or does not comply with the Standards for Rehabilitation established by the Secretary of the Interior, the Commission shall issue a preliminary decision disapproving the application for permit; provided, however, that if the construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, or demolition of any improvement would remedy conditions imminently dangerous to life, health, or property, as determined in writing by the Department of Inspectional Services, or the Board of Health, or the Fire Department, the Commission shall approve the work notwithstanding other considerations relating to its designation as a "Chicago Landmark" or to the fact that the Commission has made a preliminary determination of landmark status.
- 21-82. Informal Conference. Within ten (10) days after receiving the Commission's notice of preliminary disapproval, the applicant for permit may request in writing an informal conference before the Commission for the purpose of securing compromise regarding the proposed work so that the work will not in the opinion of the Commission adversely affect any significant historical or architectural feature of the improvement or district and will be appropriate and consistent with the spirit and purposes of this ordinance. The commission shall hold such conference within fifteen (15) days after receipt of the request. The Commission shall consider with the applicant every means for substantially preserving, protecting, enhancing, and perpetuating the special historical or architectural feature of the improvement or district, including investigating the possibility of modifying the proposed work, the possibility of any alternative private use of the structure or structures that would substantially preserve its special features, and the possibility of public incentives for enhancing the use of the structure or structures or district involved. If the Commission and the applicant for permit reach accord through the informal conference, the Commission shall issue its approval of the application for permit as modified and so notify the applicant and the appropriate City departments in accordance with Sections 21-79 and 21-80.
- 21-83. Public Hearing on Permit Application. If within thirty (30) days after the conclusion of an informal conference under Section 21-82, the Commission and applicant for permit have failed to reach accord or if the applicant fails to request an informal conference within ten days of receiving notice as provided in Section 21-82, the

Commission shall hold a public hearing on the permit application in accordance with Sections 21-70 and 21-71. The public hearing shall be constructed within ninety (90) days after the Commission has disapproved the permit unless the applicant requests or agrees in writing to an extension of time. The Commission shall, within thirty (30) days after the conclusion of the hearing, issue a written decision approving or disapproving the permit application. The decision shall contain the findings of fact that constitute the basis for the decision consistent with the criteria in Section 21-77. The Commission shall send written notice of its decision to the applicant by certified mail return receipt requested, to the appropriate City departments, to all parties registered at the public hearing and to the City Council.

- 21-84. Final Commission Decision. The written decision of the Commission approving or disapproving an application for a permit under Section 21-83 shall be on the date it issues a final administrative decision appealable to the Circuit Court of Cook County under the provisions of the Illinois Administrative Review Act, Ill. Rev. Stat. Chapter 110, Sec. 3-101 et seq. (1985).
- 21-85. Expedited Consideration of Designation and Permit. Notwithstanding any other provision in this ordinance, if an owner of an area, parcel within a district, place, building, structure, work of art, or other object for which the Commission has made a preliminary determination pursuant to Section 21-67 applies for a permit, and if the Commission issues a preliminary disapproval of the application, pursuant to Sections 21-79 and 21-81, the Commission shall schedule and conduct a public hearing on both the proposed designation and the application for permit and shall notify the City Council of its recommendations thereon within ninety (90) days of the date the application for permit is received by the Commission. If the Commission fails to make its recommendation on designation to the City Council within ninety (90) days, then the application for the permit shall be deemed approved by the Commission. If the Commission submits its recommendation within ninety (90) days and the City Council does not pass an ordinance granting the proposed designation within ninety (90) days after the recommendation of the Commission, then the application for permit shall be deemed approved by the Commission.
- 21-86. Application for Economic Hardship Exception. Upon final notification from the Commission of its decision to deny an application for a permit to construct, reconstruct, alter, add to, demolish, or relocate property given a preliminary determination of landmark status or designated a "Chicago Landmark," the applicant may within thirty (30) days apply to the Commission for an economic hardship exception on the basis that the denial of permit will result in the loss of all reasonable and beneficial use of or return from the property. The Commission shall develop regulations that describe factors, evidence, and testimony that will be considered by the Commission in making its determination.
- 21-87. Public Hearing on Economic Hardship Exception. The Commission shall schedule and hold a public hearing on the application for an economic hardship exception within thirty (30) days from receipt of the application. Notice of the date, time, place, and subject matter of the hearing shall be provided in accordance with Section 21-70 and, in addition, shall be provided in writing to all persons who presented testimony at the public hearing on the permit application under Section 21-83. The hearing shall be concluded

within ninety (90) days after the application for exception has been received by the Commission. All interested persons shall be allowed to participate in the hearing as provided in Section 21-71. The Commission or the hearing officer may solicit expert testimony or relevant information from the applicant. A record of the proceedings shall be kept by the Commission.

- 21-88. Commission Decision on Economic Hardship Exception. Within sixty (60) days following conclusion of the hearing under Section 21-87, the Commission shall determine whether denial of the permit denies the applicant all reasonable and beneficial use of or return from the property. The determination shall be accompanied by a report stating the reasons for the decision. In the case of a finding of economic hardship, the decision shall also be accompanied by a recommended plan to relieve any economic hardship. This plan may include, but is not limited to, property tax relief, loans or grants from the City of Chicago or other public or private sources, acquisition by purchase or eminent domain, building code modifications, changes in applicable zoning regulations including a transfer of development rights, or relaxation of the provisions of this ordinance sufficient to allow reasonable beneficial use of or return from the property.
- 21-89. Appeal from Commission Decision. The determination by the Commission pursuant to Section 21-88 approving or disapproving an application for an economic hardship exception shall, on the date it issues, be a final administrative decision appealable to the Circuit Court of Cook County under the provisions of the Illinois Administrative Review Act, Ill. Rev. Stat. Sec. 3-101, et seq. (1985).
- 21-90. Report to City Council. Upon a determination by the Commission pursuant to Section 21-88 finding an economic hardship, the Commission shall forward its decision, report, and proposal to the Finance Committee of the City Council.
- 21-91. City Council Consideration of Economic Hardship Exception. The Finance Committee of the City Council shall give prompt consideration to the decision, report, and recommended plan to relieve economic hardship filed by the Commission hereinabove provided, and shall recommend to the City Council within sixty (60) days after the receipt of said report whether or not said owner relief plan, as modified or not by the Finance Committee, shall be approved or disapproved.
- 21-92. City Council Decision on the Exception. The City Council, within thirty (30) days following said Finance Committee recommendation, shall approve or disapprove by ordinance a plan to relieve economic hardship to the owner. If the City Council does not approve a plan to relieve economic hardship within the time specified, the plan to relieve economic hardship shall be deemed to be denied and the permit shall issue. If the City Council approves a plan to relieve economic hardship that requires that any action be taken by City departments or agencies, the action shall be initiated within thirty (30) days following passage of the ordinance.
- 21-93. Hearing and Hearing Officer. In any hearing conducted by the Commission pursuant to Section 21-71, 21-83, or 21-87 hereof, the Commission may designate any Commission member or members or any other person as hearing officer to hold such hearing and take evidence. No member of the Commission absent from the entire hearing shall be eligible to vote on any matter which is the subject of the hearing until such

member is provided with transcripts or tapes of the testimony heard and evidence presented at such hearing. The Commission, in making its determination, shall take into account any written opinion of the appointed hearing officer, if any, on the evidence presented.

- 21-94. Penalties and Remedies. The following penalties and remedies shall be applicable to violations of this ordinance:
- 1. Penalties: Failure to perform any act required by this ordinance or performance of any action which is prohibited by said sections shall constitute a violation thereof. Every day on which a violation exists shall constitute a separate violation and a separate offense. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of not less than five hundred dollars (\$500) nor more than one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each offense. In addition, if the owner of property designated a "Chicago Landmark" willfully or through gross negligence causes all or any part of the property to be demolished or substantially destroyed or altered without the approval of the City Council or the Commission, as the case may be, then no permit to construct a new structure or improve said structure shall be issued for said property or for the land upon which the landmark stood within five years of the date of the demolition or alteration. Thereafter for a period of twenty (20) years, commencing at the end of the five year period herein before stated, any application for a building permit on the subject premises shall follow the procedure heretofore set out in Sections 21-77 through 21-83.
- 2. Remedies: Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (1) hereof, in the event any building or structure is erected, constructed, reconstructed, altered, added to, or demolished in violation of this ordinance, the City of Chicago may institute appropriate proceedings to prevent or remedy such unlawful erection, construction, reconstruction, alteration, addition, or demolition.
- 21-95. Severability. If any provision of this ordinance or application thereof to any person or circumstance is invalid, such invalidation shall not affect other provisions or applications of the Act which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this ordinance are declared to be severable.
- SECTION 2. The protection which this ordinance provides to landmarks shall extend to areas, districts, places, buildings, structures, works of art, and other objects designated as "Chicago Landmarks" prior to passage of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its date of passage.

COMMITTEE ON STREETS AND ALLEYS.

APPROVAL GIVEN FOR GRANTS OF PRIVILEGE IN PUBLIC WAYS.

The Committee on Streets and Alleys to which had been referred February 3, 1987, two proposed ordinances for grants of privilege in public ways, submitted separate reports recommending that the City Council pass said proposed ordinances which were transmitted therewith.

On separate motions made by Alderman Cullerton, each of the said proposed ordinances was *Passed* by yeas and nays as follows:

Nays -- None.

Alderman Natarus moved to reconsider the foregoing vote. The motion was lost.

Said ordinances as passed read respectively as follows (the italic heading in each case not being a part of the ordinance):

Chicago Transit Authority
(Bus Shelter--West 63rd Street And South Latrobe Avenue).

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Permission and authority are hereby given and granted to the Chicago Transit Authority, upon the terms and subject to the conditions of this ordinance, to construct, maintain, and use a bus shelter in the public way and described as follows. Said bus shelter shall be located on the north side of West 63rd Street, at Latrobe Avenue and shall be nine (9) feet six (6) inches in width, five (5) feet six (6) inches in depth and shall be seven (7) feet six (6) inches in height. Authority for the above named privilege is herein given and granted for a period of five (5) years from and after date of passage of this ordinance.

The location of said privilege shall be as shown on prints hereto attached, which by reference is made a part of this ordinance. Said privilege shall be maintained and used in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Chicago and the directions of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation, the Commissioner of Inspectional Services and the Commissioner of Public Works. The grantee shall keep that portion of the public way over or under said privileges in good condition and repair, safe for public travel, free from snow, ice and debris to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation.

SECTION 2. The City of Chicago agrees to waive the compensation fee for the privilege herein granted until expiration of this ordinance. Further, renewal authority for the continued maintenance and use of the public ways as herein described shall be obtained prior to the date of expiration of this ordinance.

SECTION 3. This ordinance is subject to amendment, modification or repeal, and permission and authority herein granted may be revoked by the Mayor and the City

Comptroller in their discretion, at any time without the consent of said grantee. Upon termination of the privilege herein granted, by lapse of time or otherwise, the grantee, without cost or expense to the City of Chicago, shall remove the structures and appliances herein authorized and restore the public way where disturbed by said structures or appliances or by the removal thereof, to a proper condition under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation and in accordance to the City Municipal Code. In the event of the failure, neglect or refusal of said grantee so to do, the City of Chicago will have the choice of either performing said work and charging the cost thereof to said grantee or determining what the cost of said work shall be and billing the grantee for said cost.

SECTION 4. The insurance company and the grantee, as provided in Section 5, will hold and save the City of Chicago harmless from any and all liability and expense, including judgments, costs and damages, for removal, relocation, alteration, repair, maintenance and restoration of the structures or appliances herein authorized and from any and all damages thereto on account of the location, construction, alteration, repair or maintenance of any public ways, bridges, subways, tunnels, vaults, sewers, water mains, conduits, pipes, poles and other utilities. For the City of Chicago to recover from the insurance company and grantee under this section, it is not necessary that the City of Chicago first make said removal, relocation, alteration, repair, maintenance or restoration. The Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation is hereby authorized to determine what cost would be involved to perform said removal, relocation, alteration, repair, maintenance or restoration. The grantee and the insurance company, upon receiving written notification from the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation of the cost shall pay said amount. The decision of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation shall be final and binding. It shall be the responsibility of the grantee to furnish the City of Chicago, prior to issuance of permit for this privilege, a copy of proof of insurance (certificate of insurance) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit with said insurance covering all liability, both public liability and property damage, that may result from the granting of said privilege. The grantee must furnish the City of Chicago a certificate of insurance which names the City of Chicago as additional insured and also clearly indicates that the privilege being granted by this ordinance is covered by the insurance policy. Certificates renewing insurance must be furnished to the Department of Finance, Real Estate Division, no later than 30 days prior to expiration of policy. The aforementioned insurance coverage shall be maintained at all times by the grantee until the structures or appliances described in this ordinance are removed and the public way is restored as herein required.

SECTION 5. The permittee(s) shall also indemnify and hold harmless the City of Chicago for any personal injuries or deaths occurring out of the reconstruction, maintenance and operation of the (vaults, fire escapes, canopies, etc.) and arising out of and including the passive negligence of the City of Chicago.

SECTION 6. The permission and authority herein granted shall not be exercised until a permit authorizing same shall have been issued by the City Comptroller and upon the faithful observance and performance of all and singular the conditions and provisions of this ordinance, and conditioned further to indemnify, keep and save harmless the City of Chicago against all liabilities, judgments, costs, damages and other expenses which may in any way come against said City in consequence of the permission given by this ordinance, or which may accrue against, be charged to, or recovered from said City from, or by reason,

or on account of, any act or thing done, or omitted, or neglected to be done by the grantee in and about the construction, reconstruction, maintenance, use and removal of said structures or appliances and the restoration of the public way as herein required. Said insurance coverage shall be continuing in effect until the structures or appliances herein authorized are removed and the public way is restored as herein required.

SECTION 7. The grantee will further be liable to the City of Chicago for the annual compensation for the use of the public way.

SECTION 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage; provided said grantee file a written acceptance of this ordinance with the City Clerk, provided further, that proof of indemnification on behalf of the City of Chicago, as herein requested, and payment of the first year's compensation to be paid to the City Comptroller.

Chicago Transit Authority
(Bus Shelter--West Belmont Avenue And North
Campbell Avenue).

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Permission and authority are hereby given and granted to the Chicago Transit Authority, upon the terms and subject to the conditions of this ordinance, to construct, maintain, and use a bus shelter in the public way and described as follows. Said bus shelter shall be located on the northeast corner of West Belmont Avenue and North Campbell Avenue and shall be twelve (12) feet six (6) inches in width, five (5) feet six (6) inches in depth and shall be seven (7) feet six (6) inches in height. Authority for the above named privilege is herein given and granted for a period of five (5) years from and after date of passage of this ordinance.

The location of said privilege shall be as shown on prints hereto attached, which by reference is made a part of this ordinance. Said privilege shall be maintained and used in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Chicago and the directions of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation, the Commissioner of Inspectional Services and the Commissioner of Public Works. The grantee shall keep that portion of the public way over or under said privileges in good condition and repair, safe for public travel, free from snow, ice and debris to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation.

SECTION 2. The City of Chicago agrees to waive the compensation fee for the privilege herein granted until expiration of this ordinance. Said

insurance coverage shall be continuing in effect until the structures or appliances herein authorized are removed and the public way is restored as herein required.

SECTION 7. The grantee will further be liable to the City of Chicago for the annual compensation for the use of the public way.

SECTION 8. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage; provided said grantee file a written acceptance of this ordinance with the City Clerk, provided further, that proof of indemnification on behalf of the City of Chicago, as herein requested, and payment of the first year's compensation to be paid to the City Comptroller.

AMENDMENT OF VACATION OF AIR RIGHTS OVER PORTION OF WEST VAN BUREN STREET.

The Committee on Streets and Alleys submitted a report recommending that the City Council pass the following proposed ordinance:

WHEREAS, The ordinances passed by the City Council July 29, 1986 (C. J. p. 32473-32477) for "Authority Granted To Amend Vacation Air Rights Over Specified Portion Of West Van Buren Street" and recorded in the Office of the Recorder of Deeds in Cook County, Illinois, on October 28, 1986 as Document No. 86503476 was not recorded within the 90 day time period; and

WHEREAS, The Grantees of the ordinance, the Board of Trade of the City of Chicago and the American National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago, Trust No. 54793, paid the required Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$18,500.00) compensation to the City of Chicago on January 30, 1986; and

WHEREAS, Except for the recording of the ordinance within 90 days of its passage, all other terms and conditions of the ordinance have been fulfilled; and

WHEREAS, It is necessary to amend said ordinance as passed July 29, 1986 to extend the recordation time period from 90 days to 270 days; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That the ordinance passed on July 29, 1986 as printed in the Journal of the Proceedings of the City Council of the City of Chicago of said date pages 32473--32477 to amend vacation of air rights over specified portion of West Van Buren Street, be and the same is further amended by striking all of the ordinance as passed and substituting in lieu thereof the following ordinance:

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago, after due investigation and consideration, has determined that the nature and extent of the public use and the public interest to be subserved is such as to warrant the vacation of part of public street described in the following ordinance; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That all that part of West Van Buren Street described as follows:

A part of the space in W. Van Buren Street lying south of and adjoining the south line of Lot 2 or Block 2, and said south line extended west, in the Board of Trade Addition to Chicago, being a Subdivision of parts of Blocks 98 and 115 in School Section Addition to Chicago, in Section 16, Township 39 North, Range 14 East of the Third Principal Meridian, which part lies within the vertical extension of the boundaries described as follows:

Beginning on the south line of Lot 2 or Block 2, aforesaid, (being also the north line of W. Van Buren Street) at a point which is 9.25 feet east from the southwest corner of said Lot 2 or Block 2, and running thence west along said south line and along said south line extended, a distance of 21.12 feet; thence south perpendicular to said last described line, a distance of 66.00 feet to a point on the south line of said W. Buren Street, being also the north line of Lot 1 in Peter Temple's Subdivision of block 99, and that part of the Subdivision of Block 114 (taken as a tract, including vacated alleys) all in the aforementioned School Section Addition to Chicago; thence east along the south line of W. Van Buren Street a distance of 21.12 feet, and thence north, a distance of 66.00 feet, to the point of beginning, and which part of said space lies above a horizontal plane 68.15 feet above Chicago City Datum and below a horizontal plane 95.05 feet above Chicago City Datum in Cook County, Illinois;

said part of public street herein vacated is colored in red and indicated by the words "To Be Vacated" on the drawing thereto attached, which for greater certainty, is hereby made a part of this ordinance, be and the same is hereby vacated and closed, inasmuch as the same is no longer required for public use and the public interest will be subserved by such vacation.

SECTION 2. The vacation herein provided for is made upon the express condition that within 270 days after the passage of this ordinance, the Board of Trade of the City of Chicago and the American National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago, as Trustee, Trust No. 54793, shall pay or cause to be paid to the City of Chicago as compensation for the benefits which will accrue to the owners of the property abutting said part of public street hereby vacated, the sum of Eighteen Thousand Five Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$18,500.00), which sum in the judgment of this body will be equal to such benefits.

SECTION 3. The vacation herein provided for is made upon the express condition that within 270 days after the passage of this ordinance, the Board of Trade of the City of Chicago and the American National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago, as Trustee, Trust No. 54793, shall file or cause to be filed for record in the Office of the Recorder of Deeds of Cook County, Illinois, a certified copy of this ordinance, together with an attached drawing approved by the Superintendent of Maps.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

SECTION 2. This amending ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage.

VACATION OF PUBLIC ALLEY IN AREA BOUNDED BY WEST JACKSON BOULEVARD, WEST VAN BUREN STREET, SOUTH ASHLAND AVENUE AND SOUTH LAFLIN STREET.

The Committee on Streets and Alleys submitted a report recommending that the City Council pass the following proposed ordinance:

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago, after due investigation and consideration, has determined that the nature and extent of the public use and the public interest to be subserved is such as to warrant the vacation of public alley and part of public alley described in the following ordinance; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That all that part of the east-west 12-foot public alley together with all of the north-south 25-foot public alley lying south of the south line of Lots 1 to 6, both inclusive; lying north of the eastwardly extension of the south line of Lot 7; lying north of the north line of Lot 58; lying east of the east line of Lot 7; lying west of the west line of Lots 56, 57 and 58; lying west of a line drawn from the southeast corner of Lot 1 to the northeast corner of Lot 58 all in Block 20 in

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Permission herein granted to American National Bank and Trust Company of Chicago, as Trustee under Trust Number 65812, upon the terms and subject to the conditions of this ordinance. The location of said privilege shall be as shown on prints hereto attached, which by reference are made a part of this ordinance. Said privilege shall be maintained and used in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Chicago and the directions of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation, the Commissioner of Inspectional Services and the Commissioner of Public Works. The grantee shall keep that portion of the public way over or under said privilege in good condition and repair, safe for public travel, free from snow, ice and debris to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation.

SECTION 2. The purpose of this privilege is to permit construction of concrete planters which are to be used for beautification of the street and sidewalk. There is no commercial purpose involved in the privilege. For this reason, no compensation is to be charged for this privilege.

SECTION 3. This ordinance is subject to amendment, modification or repeal, and permission and authority herein granted may be revoked by the Mayor and the City Comptroller in their discretion, at any time without the consent of said grantee. Upon termination of the privilege herein granted, by lapse of time or otherwise, the grantee, without cost or expense to the City of Chicago, shall remove the structures and appliances herein authorized and restore the public way where disturbed by said structures or appliances or by the removal thereof, to a proper condition under the supervision and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation and in accordance to the City Municipal Code. In the event of the failure, neglect or refusal of said grantee so to do, the City of Chicago will have the choice of either performing said work and charging the cost thereof to said grantee or determining what the cost of said work shall be and billing the grantee for said cost.

SECTION 4. The insurance company and the grantee, as provided in Section 5, will hold and save the City of Chicago harmless from any and all liability and expense, including judgments, costs and damages, for removal, relocation, alteration, repair, maintenance and restoration of the structures or appliances herein authorized and from any and all damages thereto on account of the location, construction, alteration, repair or maintenance of any public ways, bridges, subways, tunnels, vaults, sewers, water mains, conduits, pipes, poles and other utilities. For the City of Chicago to recover from the insurance company and grantee under this section, it is not necessary that the City of Chicago first make said removal, relocation, alteration, repair, maintenance or restoration. The Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation is hereby authorized to determine what cost would be involved to perform said removal, relocation, alteration, repair, maintenance or restoration. The grantee and the insurance company, upon receiving written notification from the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation of the cost shall pay said amount. The decision of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation shall be final and binding. It shall be the responsibility of the grantee to furnish the City of Chicago, prior to issuance of permit for this privilege, a copy of proof of insurance (certificate of insurance) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit with said insurance covering all liability, both public liability and property damage, that may result from the granting of said privilege. The grantee must furnish the City of Chicago a certificate of insurance which names the City of Chicago as additional insured and also clearly indicates that the privilege being granted by this ordinance is covered by the insurance policy. Certificates renewing insurance must be furnished to the Department of Finance, Real Estate Division, no later than 30 days prior to expiration of policy. The aforementioned insurance coverage shall be maintained at all times by the grantee until the structures or appliances described in this ordinance are removed and the public way is restored as herein required.

SECTION 5. The permittee(s) shall also indemnify and hold harmless the City of Chicago for any personal injuries or deaths occurring out of the reconstruction, maintenance and operation of the (vaults, fire escapes, canopies, etc.) and arising out of and including the passive negligence of the City of Chicago.

SECTION 6. The permission and authority herein granted shall not be exercised until a permit authorizing same shall have been issued by the City Comptroller and upon the faithful observance and performance of all and singular the conditions and provisions of

this ordinance, and conditioned further to indemnify, keep and save harmless the City of Chicago against all liabilities, judgments, costs, damages and other expenses which may in any way come against said City in consequence of the permission given by this ordinance, or which may accrue against, be charged to, or recovered from said City from, or by reason, or on account of any act or thing done, or omitted, or neglected to be done by the grantee in and about the construction, reconstruction, maintenance, use and removal of said structures or appliances and the restoration of the public way as herein required. Said insurance coverage shall be continuing in effect until the structures or appliances herein authorized are removed and the public way is restored as herein required.

That the Mayor be and he is hereby authorized to execute, the City Clerk to attest, the Commissioners of Streets and Sanitation, Water, Sewers, and Public Works to approve the Comptroller to accept and file for record, upon approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality, a certain Grant of Easement to The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago, granting to it a perpetual easement and right-of-way, upon, under, and through all the streets, highways, public alleys, public lands, public right-of-way and public easements of the City of Chicago to construct, reconstruct, repair, maintain and operate a connecting manhole and a 42-inch diameter sewer, together with appurtenances thereto within South Doty Avenue (East) at 111th Street (as extended easterly), within the City Limits of the City of Chicago, which Grant of Easement is in form and substance as follows:

Grant Of Easement.

That subject always to the conditions herein stated, and in consideration of the sum of One Dollar, and the mutual promises of the parties herein, the City of Chicago (Grantor) hereby conveys and grants to The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago (Grantee) a perpetual easement, right, and authority to construct, reconstruct, repair, maintain, and operate a connecting manhole and a 42-inch diameter sewer, 111th Street Sewer, Calumet 5A, Contract 85-277-2S, together with appurtenances thereto, hereinafter designated as "Sewer", upon, under, and through all the streets, highways, public alleys, public lands, public rights-of-way and public easements to the City of Chicago within the territorial limits of said City traversed by the right-of-way of said Sewer within South Doty Avenue (East) at 111th Street (as extended easterly) in Section 14, Township 37 North, Range 14, East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois.

- Section 2. That subject to the conditions of this Grant, The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago is hereby given and granted:
 - (a) The right at its sole cost and expense to construct the installation in the area shown in Exhibit 1A and 1A-1, which is described as follows:
 - To install a connecting manhole and a 42-inch diameter sewer by open-cut method of construction, within South Doty Avenue (East) at 111th Street (as extended easterly), all within the City Limits of the City of Chicago.
 - (b) The right at its sole cost and expense to connect said Sewer to an existing 5' 6" diameter City of Chicago sewer, hereinafter designated as "City Sewer", said City Sewer being located along the centerline of 111th Street between Martin Luther King Drive on the west and South Doty Avenue (East) on the east and such connection located as shown on Exhibit 1A-1 attached hereto. The right of connecting to, and the subsequent use of the City Sewer, is hereby granted to

The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago, its successors and assigns, including, but not limited to the Chicago Regional Port Authority, free of any and all charges, fees, assessments, taxes or user fees from City of Chicago.

Section 3. That subject to the conditions of this grant, the City of Chicago does hereby assume the following:

(a) To repair certain structural deficiencies of the City Sewer, such deficiencies having been determined by the Department of Sewers of the City of Chicago, more specifically described as consisting of arch cracks, said arch cracks located within the City Sewer from 850 feet to 1150 feet east of Ellis Avenue. The City of Chicago further assumes upon itself to have the above repair work completed no later than September 30, 1987. The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago, as a consideration for the aforementioned repairs, shall reimburse the City of Chicago in the amount not to exceed Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) said amount to include all of the costs of labor, material, machinery as well as the current approved overhead rates; the consideration to be payable upon inspection and approval of the work by The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago.

Section 4. That the rights hereby granted to the said Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago are so granted upon the following additional conditions:

- (a) That The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago shall pay the cost of changes in the location of the police and fire alarm electrical wires of the City of Chicago and other municipal electrical systems as may be rendered necessary by the construction of the said Sewer of The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago. Such changes shall be made by the City forces in a manner designated by and subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation of the City of Chicago.
- (b) That the Sewer of The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago shall be constructed, re-constructed, repaired, and efficiently maintained and operated solely by The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago at its sole expense and cost; and the City of Chicago shall not be held responsible in any manner for the location or manner of construction, re-construction, repair or operation of the same.
- (c) That The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago shall indemnify, save, and keep harmless the City of Chicago from any and all claims for damage to real and personal property and injuries to or death suffered by persons by reason of the construction, re-construction, repair, maintenance, or operation by The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago of the Sewer within the corporate limits of the City of Chicago.
- (d) That The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago shall, at its sole cost and expense, restore to their former condition all public ways and elements

thereof, as well as drainage structures, within the right-of-way of the Sewer or peripheral thereto which may be disturbed or interfered with by the construction, re-construction, maintenance, repair or operation of the Sewer. All surplus excavation and other spoil shall be removed from the public way by The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago within a reasonable time.

- (e) Insofar as it is practicable, The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago shall construct and maintain, subject to approval of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation, temporary bridges for both street and foot traffic until the pavements, walks, and cross- walks removed or disturbed by reason of said work of construction shall be restored to their former conditions or usefulness.
- **(f)** That the City of Chicago will order and direct all persons, partnerships, or corporation who shall at the time of construction of the Sewer, own, operate, or maintain any conduits, wires, poles, pipes, gas mains, cables, electric, steam, and street railway tracks, and equipment or other structures within any portion of the street, public alleys, and highways to be excavated in the construction of the Sewer at his, its or their own expense, to make such change in the location of such conduits, wires, poles, pipes, gas mains and cables. electric, steam, and street railway tracks, and equipment or other structures as may be rendered necessary by the construction of the Sewer. In the event any expense is charged to or incurred by the City for which the City became legally liable as a result of said relocations, the Grantee shall repay the City for such expenses. All such work in the public way shall be performed under permits and inspection of the Bureau of Streets. The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago hereby agrees that sufficient notice and information will be provided to all parties so that such changes can be made in an orderly manner.
- (g) That The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago and its contractors are hereby given and granted the right to use in the construction of the Sewer such motors, trucks, excavators, hoisting engines, and other plant and equipment as may be necessary for the complete construction of said work.
- (h) That in all cases where it shall become and be necessary to maintain water service, remove, alter, repair, maintain or restore water mains, appurtenances and water pipes in the streets, public alleys, and highways of the City of Chicago on account of the construction, repair, maintenance, operation and existence of the aforesaid Sewer, the Commissioner of Water is hereby authorized and directed to maintain water service, remove, alter, repair, maintain or restore such water main at the cost and expense of The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago and the said Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago shall pay to the City of Chicago the actual cost of labor, material, and of machinery, trucks and other equipment required and used in the restoration of such water mains plus an additional charge based upon current prevailing rates for labor, material and equipment, as well as the current approved overhead rates.

In any open-cut work done under this grant, wherever water pipes or their appurtenances cross the trench of Sewer without cutting through its or their cross sections, The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago shall support said water pipes and appurtenances and maintain service thereof without interruption until the work thereabouts is completed. Where, in the opinion of the Engineer of the Department of Water of the City of Chicago, the support of said water pipes, appurtenances and/or water service pipes is inadvisable, then said water pipes, appurtenances and/or water pipes shall be cut, removed and restored by the Department of Water of the City of Chicago, and at the expense of The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago. Payment of said work shall be in the manner described in the preceding paragraph.

- (i) That the Commissioner of Sewers is hereby authorized and directed to issue, without fees or cost therefor to The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago or to any licensed sewer or drain contractor to whom the work or any part thereof specified in the Grant shall be awarded, all permits required for doing said work, and further, shall not require the payment by The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago of any fees or salaries for inspectors employed by the City of Chicago on said work. All necessary permits for work in the public way shall be obtained from the Department of Streets and Sanitation, Bureau of Streets, by the contractor to whom the contract is awarded.
- strictly comply with any and all applicable statutes, laws, ordinances, rules and regulations of the City of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois, which in any manner affect this Grant, any work done hereunder or control or limit in any way the actions of The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago, its agents, servants and employees, or of any contractor or subcontractor of The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago or their employees. The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago also agrees it will coordinate with the Department of Streets and Sanitation, Bureau of Street Traffic, for traffic maintenance.

In Witness Whereof, The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago has caused this Grant to be executed in its behalf by the Chairman of its Committee on Finance of the Board of Commissioners and attested to by its Clerk, and City has caused this Grant to be executed in its behalf by its proper officials pursuant to an ordinance passed by its City Council on the ______ day of ______, 1986, a certified copy of which ordinance is attached hereto and made a part hereof, the Grant becoming effective on the date of the acceptance by The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago.




