WHEREAS, The City of Chicago entered into a lease dated June 30, 1971, with the Public Building Commission of Chicago for the construction of two (2) Law Enforcement Facilities, 4th Area Police Headquarters and Courts Facility located at South Kedzie and West Harrison Streets, and 6th Area Police Headquarters and Courts Facility at West Belmont and North Western Avenues, together with twelve (12) other City Facilities under Public Building Commission of Chicago Building Revenue Bonds, Series "B" of 1971; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago did by ordinance provide for the levy and collection of a direct annual tax sufficient to pay the rentals due under said lease, as and when the same became due and payable, said lease and said tax levying ordinance having been filed with the County Clerks of Cook and Du Page Counties; and

Whereas, the State and the City, in the interest of the safe and efficient movement of vehicular and pedestrian traffic, find it necessary to improve 79th Street between Halsted Street and Stony Island Avenue, hereinafter referred to as the "Project" and described in Paragraph 11 of this Agreement; and

Whereas, the Department of Transportation of the State of Illinois, under Chapter 121, Article 4-409 of the Illinois Revised Statutes (1981), as amended, may enter into a written contract with any other highway authority for the jurisdiction, maintenance, administration, engineering or improvement of any highway or portion thereof; and

Whereas, the State and the City wish to avail themselves, where possible, of Federal-Aid Urban System funds authorized by the Surface Transportation Assistance Act of 1982 or subsequent Federal legislation for the contract construction, force account construction and the construction engineering/supervision of said Project; and

Whereas, the City is proceeding with studies and engineering required for the Project; and

Whereas, under the Federal regulations, certain written agreements for the Project may be required;

Now Be It Therefore Resolved, The State Agrees:

1. To reimburse the City for the Non-Federal (State) and Federal share of the costs incurred in connection with the right-of-way acquisition, contract construction, force account construction and construction engineering/supervision of the

- Project, as hereinafter provided, upon receipt of progressive billings supported by documentation as required by the State and Federal Highway Administration.
- 2. To review, approve and submit to the Federal Highway Administration without delay, all submittals which require Federal Highway Administration review, approval or other action.

Now Be It Therefore Resolved, The City Agrees:

- 3. To prepare, or cause to be prepared, studies, surveys, plans, specifications and estimates of cost for said Project.
- 4. Upon approval from the State and the Federal Highway Administration to let and award the contract for the Project, and/or to provide or cause to be provided, all force account construction and construction engineering/supervision, all in accordance with established procedures of the City, the State and Federal Highway Administration.
- 5. To finance the work pending progressive reimbursement by the State of the Federal and Non-Federal (State) shares of costs.
- 6. To comply with all applicable Executive Orders and Federal legislation pursuant to the Equal Employment Opportunity and Nondiscrimination regulations.
- 7. That failure on the part of the City to fulfill the responsibilities assigned in Paragraphs 6 and 10 of this Agreement may render the City ineligible for future Federal participation in projects for which the City has similar responsibilities, until such failures are corrected.
- 8. To retain all Project records and to make them available for audit by State and Federal auditors during the Project development and construction stages, and for a period of three (3) years after final acceptance.

Now Be It Therefore Resolved, The Parties Hereto Mutually Agree:

- 9. That prior to initiation of work to be performed hereunder, the disposition of encroachments will be cooperatively determined by representatives of the City and State.
- 10. That, upon completion of the improvement, the City and the State will maintain or cause to be maintained, in a satisfactory manner, their respective portions of the improvement in accordance with established jurisdictional authority.
- 11. That said Project generally consists of the resurfacing and partial reconstruction of 79th Street between Halsted Street and Stony Island Avenue. The existing driving surface will be removed. The pavement base will be repaired or reconstructed as necessary and a new driving surface will be applied.

The pavement will be entirely reconstructed and lowered under the Belt Railway viaduct (east of Wallace Street), in order to provide increased vertical clearance at this location. Streets, alleys and driveways adjacent to the lowered section of 79th Street will be reconstructed as necessary in order to meet the new grade of the roadway, and concrete barriers will be constructed at the center and curbline columns of the improved viaduct.

Raised concrete medians will be removed. The intersection of 79th Street with Cottage Grove Avenue will be realigned. Traffic signals will be modernized at the intersections of 79th Street with Lafayette Avenue, with State Street, with Indiana Avenue, with Martin Luther King Drive, with St. Lawrence Avenue, with Cottage Grove Avenue, with Ellis Avenue and with Kenwood Avenue.

Curbs, gutters and sidewalks within the limits of the Project will be repaired or reconstructed as necessary and sidewalk ramps for the handicapped, pavement markings and street signs will be provided. Street lighting under the viaduct structures will be upgraded. Utilities will be adjusted and all other appurtenances necessary to complete the Project will be provided.

- 12. That all prior Agreements, or portions thereof, between the City and the State which refer to the construction of this Project are superseded by this Agreement.
- 13. That the estimated costs of the Project covered and described by this Agreement are:

and that based upon said ratio, State financial participation (referred to herein as the Non-Federal Share) shall be limited to a maximum of \$1,548,768, with any Non-Federal share required in excess of that amount to be provided by the City, or by Amendment to this Agreement.

- 14. That the City shall be responsible for 100% of the cost of any work not eligible for Federal participation.
- 15. That standard Federal-Aid procedures and requirements shall apply to all phases of this Project.
- 16. That the Commissioner of Public Works is authorized to execute revisions to this Agreement relative to budgetary items, upon approval by the Illinois Department of Transportation, as long as the revisions do not increase the total cost of the Project (\$6,240,000) as authorized by the City Council.
- 17. That this Agreement and the covenants contained herein shall be void ab initio in the event the contract covering the construction work contemplated herein is not awarded and/or the force account construction work is not authorized by July 1, 1990.

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto, their successors and assigns.

Whereas, on June 13, 1984, the State and the City executed a Memorandum of Understanding regarding the funding of a Five-Year Road Program in Chicago, concluding with the end of State Fiscal Year 1988, and that Memorandum provides the basis for the State funds provided under this Agreement; and

Whereas, under the Federal regulation, certain written agreements for the Projects may be required;

Now Be It Therefore Resolved, The State Agrees:

- 1. To reimburse the City for the Non-Federal (State) and Federal share of the costs incurred in connection with the Preliminary Engineering of the Projects, as hereinafter provided, upon receipt of progressive billings supported by documentation as required by the State and Federal Highway Administration.
- To give administrative assistance and guidance to the City during the performance of Preliminary Engineering and to review, approve and submit to the Federal Highway Administration without delay, all submittals which require Federal Highway Administration review, approval or other action.

Now Be It Therefore Resolved, The City Agrees:

- 3. Either with its own forces or in conjunction with consulting engineering firms approved by the State, to make all surveys, compile the data and prepare the design and location studies, hold the required public hearings, prepare the required environmental studies and prepare the final design reports, perform the engineering for the necessary right of way acquisition and the relocations and/or adjustment of City-owned electrical and water utilities, and prepare the preliminary and final plans, specifications, estimates and all other documents or agreements required in order to let and award contracts or otherwise construct the projects, all of which is considered to be Preliminary Engineering.
- 4. To finance the work pending progressive reimbursement by the State of the Federal and Non-Federal (State) shares of costs.
- 5. To comply with all applicable Executive Orders and Federal legislation pursuant to the Equal Employment Opportunity and Nondiscrimination Regulations.
- 6. That failure on the part of the City to fulfill the responsibilities assigned in Paragraph 5 of this Agreement may render the City ineligible for future Federal participation in projects for which the City has similar responsibilities, until such failures are corrected.
- 7. To retain all Project records and to make them available for audit by State and Federal auditors during the Project development and construction stages, and for a period of three (3) years after final acceptance of the Projects.

Now Be It Therefore Resolved, The Parties Hereto Mutually Agree:

- 8. That all prior Agreements, or portions thereof, between the City and the State which refer to the Preliminary Engineering of these Projects are superseded by this Agreement.
- 9. That the estimated costs of the Projects covered and described by this Agreement are:

The Southwest Transit Line, Park And Ride Facilities Federal Project No.

Preliminary Engineering.....\$300,000

The Rock Island Railroad Park And Ride Facility Federal Project No.

Preliminary Engineering......\$160,000

Western Boulevard At 3300 South Federal Project No.

Preliminary Engineering.....\$215,000

62nd Street, Nagle Avenue To Oak Park Avenue Federal Project No.

TOTAL:.....\$725,000

and that based upon the agreed ratio of Federal to Non-Federal (State) funds for said Preliminary Engineering the proportional participation for the Projects will be:

Federal Aid Share (Demonstration Funds)
(80% of \$725,000)......\$580,000

Non-Federal Share (State)
(20% of \$725,000).....\$145,000

TOTAL:....\$725,000

and that based upon said ratio, State financial participation (referred to herein as the Non-Federal Share) shall be limited to a maximum of \$145,000 with any Non-Federal share required in excess of that amount to be provided by the City, or by amendment to this Agreement.

- 10. That the City shall be responsible for 100% of the cost of any work not eligible for Federal participation.
- 11. That standard Federal-Aid procedures and requirements shall apply to all phases of the Projects.
- 12. That the Commissioner of Public Works is authorized to execute subsequent revisions to this Agreement relative to budgetary items, upon approval by the Illinois Department of Transportation, as long as such revisions do not increase the total cost of the Projects (\$725,000) as authorized by the City Council.
- 13. That this Agreement and the covenants contained herein shall be void ab initio in the event the preliminary engineering work contemplated herein is not underway by December 1, 1989.

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the Parties hereto, their successors and assigns.

In Witness Whereof, the "City" and the "State" have caused this Agreement to be executed by their respective officials and attested to on the date hereinafter listed.

Minority Business Enterprises Provisions attached to this agreement reads as follows:

Minority Business Enterprises Provisions.

"It is the Policy of the U. S. Department of Transportation that minority business enterprises, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 23, shall have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Federal funds under this agreement. Consequently, the M.B.E. requirements of 49 C.F.R. Part 23 apply to this agreement.

The State and City agree to ensure that minority business enterprises, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 23, have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of this agreement. In this regard the State and City shall take all necessary and reasonable steps, in accordance with 49 C.F.R. Part 23, to ensure that minority business enterprises have the maximum opportunity to compete for and perform portions of contracts and subcontracts financed in whole or in part with Federal funds provided under this agreement. The State and City shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the selection and retention of contractor or subcontractors, including procurement of materials and lease of equipment.

The City shall include the provisions of this "Policy" in every contract, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment.

Failure to carry out the requirements set forth above shall constitute a breach of this agreement and may result in termination of the agreement or such remedy as deemed appropriate."

This Agreement shall be administered under the provisions of the City of Chicago's federally approved Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, Chronic violations of ordinances governing nuisances and the removal of refuse are detrimental to city neighborhoods and pose a threat to public health; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

- SECTION 1. Chapter 167-7.1 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is amended by deleting the language in brackets and inserting the language in italics as follows:
 - 167-7.1. Each person licensed as a private scavenger shall carry in his vehicle a rake, broom, shovel or some means for the removal of scattered or spilled refuse. [It is hereby declared a misdemeanor for a] Every private scavenger [to fail to] shall completely remove scattered refuse lying within six (6) feet of the container or container area which [said] the private scavenger is servicing.

Any person found in violation of this section shall be subject to a fine of not less than one hundred dollars (\$100.00) nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense. In addition, a violation of this section shall constitute grounds for revocation or suspension of a private scavenger license pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 101-27 of this Code.

- SECTION 2. Chapter 167-38 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is amended by deleting the language in brackets and inserting the language in italics as follows:
 - 167-38. Any person [that] who violates any of the provisions of this chapter or the rules of the Commissioner of [buildings] Inspectional Services or the department of [water and sewers] Streets and Sanitation concerning the business of scavengers shall, where not otherwise provided, be fined not less than [ten] fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than [one] three hundred dollars (\$300.00) for each offense, and a separate and distinct offense shall be regarded as committed each day on which such person shall continue any such violation. In addition, a violation of any of the provisions of this chapter shall constitute grounds for revocation or suspension of a private scavenger license pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 101-27 of this Code.
- SECTION 3. Chapter 99-36.1 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is amended by deleting the language in brackets and inserting the language in italics as follows:
 - 99-36.1. a. The owner, occupant, agent or person in possession or control of any lot or unimproved parcel of real estate ("owner") shall remove or cause to be removed therefrom any abandoned or derelict motor vehicle, garbage, debris, refuse, litter and miscellaneous waste. Unremoved material of such a nature is hereby declared to be a public nuisance. Any owner or other person founded in violation of this section shall be fined not less than \$25 and not more than \$500 for each offense, and each day on which such an offense shall continue shall constitute a separate and distinct offense; however, this section shall not apply to any governmental entity nor to any owner upon whose lot or parcel such material is permitted to accumulate pursuant to a properly issued license or permit in accordance with zoning provisions of this code governing special uses in General and Heavy Manufacturing Districts.

- b. The owner, occupant, agent or person in possession or control of any residence or business ("owner") shall remove or cause to be removed any garbage, debris, refuse, litter and miscellaneous waste located upon his property or place of business. Unremoved material of such nature is hereby declared to be a public nuisance. Any owner or other person found in violation of this section shall be fined \$100 for a first offense and for each subsequent offense, not less than \$200 and not more than \$500. Each day on which a violation continues shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.
- [b.] c. Where the owner of any lot, [or] parcel of real estate, residence, or place of business upon which a nuisance exists is known and can be found, the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation or his designee shall serve notice in writing by certified mail, return receipt requested, upon the owner requiring him to abate the nuisance within [seven] three days from the date of receipt of notice in the manner the Commissioner may prescribe. If the owner fails within [seven] three days to abate the nuisance or if the owner is unknown or cannot with due diligence be found, the Commissioner may proceed summarily to abate the nuisance or to seek to enjoin the nuisance. [Any] In addition to any penalty or fine, the cost or expense incurred by the City in abating a nuisance may be recovered in an appropriate action against an owner instituted by the Corporation Counsel. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the City of Chicago from acting without notice to abate a nuisance in an emergency where the nuisance poses an immediate threat to public health or safety, nor shall this section be construed to deny any common law right to anyone to abate a nuisance.
- SECTION 4. Chapter 99-74 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is amended by deleting the language in brackets and inserting the language in italics as follows:
 - 99-74. Any person violating any of the provisions of this chapter shall be fined not less than [five] one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and not more than [two] five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each offense, except where otherwise specifically provided. A separate and distinct offense shall be held to have been committed each day any person continues to violate any of the provisions hereof.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication.

Action Deferred -- AMENDMENT OF MUNICIPAL CODE CHAPTER
192 BY ADDITION OF NEW SECTIONS 192-20
THROUGH 192-20.6 ENTITLED "CLEAN
INDOOR AIR ORDINANCE".

The Committee on Health submitted the following report:

CHICAGO, March 9, 1988.

To the President and Members of the City Council:

Your Committee on Health, Alcoholism and Substance Abuse, having had under consideration an ordinance to prohibit smoking in public places except in designated areas and to regulate smoking in places of employment begs leave to recommend that Your Honorable Body pass the said proposed ordinance, which is transmitted herewith.

Alderman Figueroa moved to substitute the following proposed ordinance:

WHEREAS, Reliable studies have found that tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution and that breathing second-hand smoke can cause lung cancer and other diseases in healthy nonsmokers; and

WHEREAS, Nonsmokers can suffer allergies, respiratory disease and other illness due to breathing second-hand smoke and may experience a loss of job productivity or may be forced to take periodic sick leave because of such adverse reactions; and

WHEREAS, Numerous polls have shown that a majority of both nonsmokers and smokers desire to have restrictions on smoking in enclosed public areas and in places of employment; and

WHEREAS, By enacting this ordinance, the City Council has sought to balance the needs of persons who smoke and the needs of nonsmokers to breathe smoke-free air, and the legislature recognizes that where these needs conflict, the need to breathe smoke-free air should take priority; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Chapter 192 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding thereto new Sections 192-20 through 192-20.6 to read as follows:

192-20. Title and Purpose. This section shall be known and may be cited as the "Clean Indoor Air Ordinance," and shall be liberally construed and applied to promote its purpose and policies. It is the purpose of this section and the policy of the City to provide smoke-free areas in enclosed public places and to regulate smoking in places of employment.

192-20.1. Definitions. Whenever used in Sections 192-20 through 192-20.6, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings:

"Bar" means an enclosed area which is devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises and in which the serving of food is only incidental to the consumption of such beverages. Although a restaurant may contain a bar, the term "bar" shall not include the restaurant dining area.

"Dining Area" means any enclosed area containing a counter or tables upon which meals are served.

"Employee" means any person who is employed by any employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and any person who volunteers his or her services for a not-for-profit entity.

"Employer" means any person, partnership, corporation, including a municipal corporation, or non-profit entity who employs the services of one or more persons.

"Enclosed Area" means all space between a floor and ceiling which is surrounded on all sides by walls or windows with appropriate openings for ingress and egress and is not intended to mean areas commonly described as public lobbies.

"Place of Employment" means any enclosed area under the control of a public or private employer which employees normally frequent during the course of employment including, but not limited to work areas, employee lounges, cafeterias, restrooms and conference rooms. A private residence is not a "place of employment" unless it is used as a child care or health care facility.

"Public Place" means any enclosed area to which the public is invited. For the purpose of this section, a hospital is a public place.

"Restaurant" means any coffee shop, cafeteria, luncheonette, sandwich shop, private or public school cafeteria or eating establishment, and any other eating establishment, organization or club which gives or offers for sale food to the public, guests, patrons or employees.

"Service Line" means any indoor line at which one or more persons are waiting for or receiving services of any kind, whether or not such service involves the exchange of money.

"Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted cigar, pipe or cigarette.

192-20.2. Smoking in Public Places. Smoking shall be prohibited in all public places except in designated smoking areas.

When establishing a designated smoking area, the person establishing such area shall utilize existing physical barriers, ventilation systems, and other physical elements of the premises to minimize the intrusion of smoke into areas where smoking is not permitted.

(a) In all waiting areas of airport terminals, train stations and bus depots, the area where smoking is prohibited must include either (i) a contiguous area of at least 50% of the total seating capacity of the facility or (ii) a separate waiting room for nonsmokers, so

long as the room designated for nonsmokers contains at least 50% of the total seating capacity of the waiting area.

- (b) Any owner, operator, manager or other person in control of an enclosed public place may declare that entire facility as a nonsmoking area.
 - (c) Smoking is prohibited in all areas of the following public places:
 - 1) Public Restrooms;
 - Polling Places;
 - 3) Service Lines;
 - 4) Public Meeting and Public Assembly Rooms;
 - 5) Taxicabs.
- (d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the following areas shall not be subject to the smoking restrictions of this section:
 - 1) Bars;
 - 2) Private residences;
 - 3) Restaurants, hotel and motel conference or meeting rooms and public and private banquet or assembly rooms while these places are being used for private functions.

However, any owner, operator, manager or other person who controls any establishment described in this subsection may designate the entire establishment, or any portion thereof, as a nonsmoking area.

192-20.3. Regulation of Smoking in Places of Employment. Employers shall provide smoke-free areas for nonsmoking employees within existing facilities to the maximum extent practicable, but employers are not required to make physical modifications in providing these areas.

192-20.3(a). Each employee shall be able to designate his or her own work area as a nonsmoking area and to post the same with an appropriate sign to be provided by the employer. If, due to the proximity of smokers, size of the work area, poor ventilation or other factors, such designation does not reduce the effects of smoke to the satisfaction of the employee, the employer shall make additional accommodation by assigning the employee to a different but comparable work area, expanding the size of the work area subject to the

prohibition against smoking or implementing other measures reasonably calculated to minimize or eliminate the effects of smoke on the employee.

- 192-20.3(b). Every employer shall adopt a smoking policy which shall be communicated to all employees. All employers shall supply a written copy of the smoking policy upon request to any existing or prospective employee. In any dispute arising under the smoking policy, the health concerns of the nonsmoker shall be given priority.
- 192-20.3(c). Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, every employer shall have the right to designate any place of employment, or any portion thereof, as a nonsmoking area.
- 192-20.3(d). No employer shall discharge, refuse to hire, or in any manner retaliate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant exercises any rights afforded by this section.
- 192-20.4. Signs. Signs indicating "Smoking Permitted" shall be posted in all designated smoking areas located in places of employment and enclosed public places.
 - 192-20.5. Violation and Penalties.
- 192-20.5(a). It shall be unlawful for any person who owns, operates, or otherwise controls any premises or facility subject to regulation under this ordinance to fail to comply with any of the requirements of Sections 192-20 through 192-20.4.
- 192-20.5(b). It shall be unlawful for any person to smoke in any area designated pursuant to Sections 192-20 through 192-20.4 as a nonsmoking area.
- 192-20.5(c). Any person who violates any provision of Sections 192-20 through 192-20.4 shall be subject to a fine not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25) and not more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00).
- 192-20.5(d). This section shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted or prohibited by any other applicable ordinance or statute.
- 192-20.6. Severability. If any provision, clause, sentence or paragraph of Sections 192-20 through 192-20.5 or the application thereof shall be held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect the other provisions of this section which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions of this section are declared to be severable.
- SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after 60 days of its passage.

The motion to substitute Prevailed by a viva voce vote.

WHEREAS, The General Assembly in (Ill. Rev. Stat., Sec. 7-103), Chapter 110, has authorized the use of quick take eminent domain proceedings by the City of Chicago for the purpose set forth in Divisions 74.2 and 74.3 of Article 11 of the Illinois Municipal Code, as now or hereafter amended, said purposes being the redevelopment of commercially blighted areas, and for the same purposes when established pursuant to home rule powers; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to its home rule powers the City Council of the City of Chicago ("City Council") enacted Chapter 15.1 of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago and created a Commercial District Development Commission for the stated purpose of undertaking the redevelopment of designated commercially blighted areas; and

WHEREAS, The City Council, designated the area generally bounded by Jackson Boulevard on the north, Polk Street on the south, State Street on the east and Plymouth Court and Clark Street on the west as the "South Loop Blighted Commercial Area" pursuant to Chapter 15.1 of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago by ordinances passed July 7, 1978 and December 12, 1980, and the designation having been reaffirmed by ordinance passed January 18, 1983; and

WHEREAS, The City Council by ordinance passed January 16, 1987 authorized that certain parcels within the South Loop Blighted Commercial Area, which are legally described in Exhibit A attached hereto, be acquired by the City of Chicago through negotiation and purchase or eminent domain proceedings for the construction of a new central library and for related library uses; and

WHEREAS, The City Council by ordinance passed July 29, 1987 authorized the use of a design-build competition to select a proposal for the construction of a new central library

and related library uses upon certain parcels within the South Loop Blighted Commercial Area; and

WHEREAS, The design-build competition schedule requires the successful designbuilder to execute an agreement with the City no later than July 15, 1988 and requires the City to deliver a cleared site ready for construction one hundred and twenty days thereafter; and

WHEREAS, It is necessary and essential to the public interest that the construction of a new central library and related uses proceed in an expeditious manner and that the designbuild competition schedule be implemented; and

WHEREAS, The use of quick take eminent domain proceedings is necessary in order to acquire all of the required parcels in accordance with said schedule; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. A schedule for the development of a new central library and related library uses in accordance with the design-build competition schedule is hereby adopted as follows:

- (a) The City shall enter into an agreement with the successful design-builder no later than July 15, 1988;
- (b) The City shall deliver a site ready for construction no later than one hundred and twenty days after the execution of an agreement with the successful design-builder. All occupants shall have been relocated from the site and all buildings demolished.

SECTION 2. It is hereby determined that it is necessary to acquire the following parcels within the South Loop Blighted Commercial Area in order to comply with the schedule of development adopted by the City Council herein, for the construction of a new central library and related uses, and the use of quick take eminent domain power is necessary to implement such schedule; said parcels being legally described in Appendix A attached hereto and incorporated herein:

Block 1

Parcels 1-5; 1-6; 1-7; 1-8; 1-9; 1-10; 1-11; 1-12; 1-13; 1-14; 1-15.

SECTION 3. The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed, pursuant to the provisions of Ill. Rev. Stat. Chapter 110, Sec. 7-103 through Sec. 7-112, to immediately acquire fee simple title to parcels listed in Section 2 above.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

DESIGNATION OF APRIL, 1988 AS "NATIONAL AMNESTY AWARENESS MONTH IN CHICAGO".

In general, they must have lived here continuously with only brief absences since prior to 1982, and they must have been contributing members of our society and free from serious criminal violations of our laws; and

WHEREAS, More than one and one-quarter million persons have already come forward to accept this one-time amnesty provision in the immigration laws. They are made up of nearly every nationality, from Hispanic and Asian to Polish and English. By their actions in this country over the past six years they have demonstrated that they deserve the privilege of remaining here in a fully legal status . . without having to live in an underground society fearing discovery of their unlawful existence in this great nation; and

WHEREAS, Like other immigrants who have come through normal, lawful channels, they have shown a great willingness to work and contribute to our nation, while sharing in our economic well-being; and

WHEREAS, The time to make such application will end for most people on May 4, 1988. There may still be those who for one reason or another have not taken advantage of this one time opportunity and if they do not do so soon will be left behind while their brother and sister immigrants enjoy living in the daylight of liberty; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That all Americans do whatever is in their power to remind their neighbors, friends, co-workers and others who may be living outside our immigration laws but are eligible for legal residence that the time is growing short for them to come forward and join us as recognized members of our nation and our society; and
