WHEREAS, The City of Chicago (the "City"), a home rule unit of government under Section 6(a), Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, has heretofore found and does hereby find that there exists within the City a serious shortage of decent, safe and sanitary rental housing available to persons of low and moderate income; and

WHEREAS, The City has determined that the continuance of a shortage of rental housing affordable to persons of low and moderate income is harmful to the health, prosperity, economic stability and general welfare of the City; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois, acting through the Illinois Development Finance Authority (the "Authority"), pursuant to authority granted it in the Illinois Development Finance Authority Act, Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 48, Section 850.01 et seq., as amended, has created the Illinois Housing Participation Program (the "Illinois Housing Participation Program") in Section 850.07 (o) of the Act, which program among other things, provides for grants to local governments to help finance rehabilitation of privately owned residential structures devoted primarily to rental use and which units are eligible for rent subsidy programs so as to increase their accessibility to low and moderate income persons; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Development Finance Authority has agreed to loan the City of Chicago, Illinois (the "Borrower") a zero percent loan in the amount of \$5,000,000.00 to enable the Borrower to finance, or reimburse the primary developers and other project participants for a portion of the cost of the project, such loan being subject to the terms and conditions of, and for the purposes of making funds available to owners of rental properties containing five or more dwelling units in low and moderate income areas; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Housing has preliminarily reviewed and approved the making of one (1) low interest rehabilitation loan to be funded in part with Illinois Housing Participation Program funds and in part with private and/or MULTI-Program funds where said funds, when loaned, will leverage \$7.00 in private investment for every \$3.00 in Program funds. A total of 29 dwelling units will be rehabilitated, and wherein said loans are more particularly described in "Exhibit A" attached hereto and made a part hereof; and

WHEREAS, The Illinois Development Finance Authority Act requires that the Corporate authorities (the "City Council") approve the submission of projects for funding under the Illinois Housing Participation Program; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Commissioner of Housing is hereby authorized to submit a loan proposal to the Illinois Development Finance Authority under the Illinois Housing Participation Program. Upon approval by the Illinois Development Finance Authority, the Commissioner of Housing shall issue a final loan commitment and execute any and all documents necessary to secure said loan.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect by and from the date of its passage.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago (the "City") is a duly constituted and existing municipality within the meaning of Section 1, Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois (the "Constitution") having a population in excess of 25,000, and is a home rule unit under Section 6(a), Article VII of the Constitution; and

WHEREAS, The City currently owns and operates an airport known as Chicago O'Hare International Airport (the "Airport"); and

WHEREAS, The City, as a home rule unit and pursuant to the Constitution, is authorized and empowered to issue its revenue bonds to finance the costs of the design, construction, reconstruction, improvement, equipping and modernization of facilities at the Airport; and

WHEREAS, The City, through its Department of Aviation, has prepared a Master Plan Study of Chicago O'Hare International Airport which sets forth future development plans

for the Airport, analyzes the economic and environmental impact of such development, and analyzes the financing needs for such development; and

WHEREAS, As part of the development of the Airport, K.L.M. Royal Dutch Airlines, a corporation incorporated in the Netherlands (the "Company"), has planned and proposed the design, construction, acquiring and equipping of a new cargo facility at the Airport, the acquisition, construction and equipping of which is proposed to be financed, in whole or in part, by the issuance of not exceeding \$30,000,000 of the City's special facility revenue bonds, and a Memorandum of Intent has been presented under the terms of which the City agrees to issue such bonds for such improvements; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Mayor of the City is hereby authorized to execute a Memorandum of Intent with the Company in substantially the form attached hereto, and said Memorandum of Intent is hereby approved.

SECTION 2. The Mayor of the City is hereby authorized to take such further action as is necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this ordinance and such Memorandum of Intent as executed.

SECTION 3. In adopting this ordinance, the City Council intends to take "official action" within the meaning of Section 1.103-8(a)(5) of the Internal Revenue Service regulations pertaining to industrial development bonds, toward the issuance of the City's special facility revenue bonds referred to in this ordinance and the Memorandum of Intent.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall be effective upon its passage.

Memorandum of Intent attached to this ordinance reads as follows:

Memorandum Of Intent.

This Memorandum of Intent is between the City of Chicago, Illinois (the "Issuer") and K.L.M. Royal Dutch Airlines (the "Company").

1. Preliminary Statement. Among the matters of mutual inducement which have resulted in this Memorandum of Intent are the following:

(a) The Issuer may issue its special facility revenue bonds to finance the cost of design, construction and equipping of certain facilities at Chicago O'Hare International Airport (the "Airport").

(b) The Company has planned and proposed the design, construction, acquiring and equipping of a new cargo facility (the "Project"), the financing of which is expected to cost not exceeding \$30,000,000. The Company has requested the Issuer to assist the Company in financing the cost of the Project including reimbursement of costs incurred

prior to the issuance of the Issuer's special facility revenue bonds by issuing the special facility revenue bonds.

(c) The proposed financing will contribute to the public welfare and constitute a public purpose pursuant to Illinois Constitution Article VIII, Section 1(a).

(d) The special facility revenue bonds of the Issuer shall be limited obligations of the Issuer payable solely out of the revenues derived by the Issuer from the financing agreement referred to below. No holder of any such bonds shall have the right to compel any exercise of the taxing power of the Issuer or any political subdivision of the State of Illinois and such bonds shall not constitute an indebtedness or a loan of credit of the Issuer. It is the expectation of the Company that interest on the bonds will not be includable in gross income for federal income tax purposes under Section 103 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "1986 Code").

(e) Subject to due compliance with all requirements of law, by virtue of such authority as may now or hereafter be conferred on the Issuer, and subject to receipt of adequate assurance from the Company that there are one or more purchasers for the special facility bonds, the Issuer intends to issue and sell its special facility revenue bonds in an amount not to exceed \$30,000,000 to pay for or reimburse the Company for the costs of the Project.

2. Undertakings on the Part of the Issuer. Subject to the conditions above stated and the other conditions herein stated, the Issuer intends as follows:

(a) To authorize the issuance and sale of the bonds pursuant to its lawful and constitutional authority.

(b) To negotiate the terms of a financing agreement with the Company whereby the Company will, among other things, agree to pay to, or on behalf of, the Issuer such sums as shall be sufficient to pay the principal of, interest on and redemption premium, if any, on the Issuer's special facility revenue bonds as and when the same shall become due and payable.

3. Approvals. The intention of the Issuer to proceed is subject to approval by it and by its attorneys of all appropriate documents, and to the satisfaction of the requirements of Issuer, and to state and federal laws, regulations and executive orders including, but not limited to, Section 147(f) of the 1986 Code.

4. Undertakings on the Part of Company. Subject to the conditions above stated, the Company agrees as follows:

(a) That it will use all reasonable efforts to find one or more purchasers for the Issuer's special facility revenue bonds.

(b) That contemporaneously with the delivery of the special facility revenue bonds, it will enter into instruments with the Issuer, under the terms of which the Company will, among other things, obligate itself to pay to, or on behalf of, the Issuer sums sufficient in the aggregate to pay the principal of, interest on, and redemption premium, if any, on the special facility revenue bonds as and when the same shall become due and payable.

5. General Provisions. All commitments of the Issuer under paragraph 2 hereof and of the Company under paragraph 4 hereof are further subject to the condition that, on or before October 23, 1990, or such other date as is mutually acceptable to the Company and the Issuer, the Company and the Issuer have agreed to mutually acceptable terms and conditions of the instruments referred to in paragraphs 2 and 4, the special facility revenue bonds and all other instruments or proceedings relating to the special facility revenue bonds. In the event Issuer and the Company do not agree to such mutually acceptable terms and conditions, or in the event that the special facility revenue bonds are not issued hereunder, neither party shall be bound or obligated to perform any action under the terms of this Memorandum of Intent; provided, however, that the Company shall be obligated to pay all out-of-pocket costs reasonably incurred by the Issuer in connection with this Memorandum of Intent.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago wishes to assist in preventing the levels of measles morbidity and mortality currently experienced during the 1989 measles outbreak from recurring; and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago is aware that the United States Department of Health and Human Service's Centers for Disease Control, as part of its national effort, also seek this end; and

WHEREAS, The Centers for Disease Control, through a supplemental federal assistance grant to the Chicago Department of Health's Immunization Program, have provided the funding for such activity; and

WHEREAS, \$30,000 of this grant has been designated for a measles study at Children's Memorial Hospital; and

WHEREAS, The Acting Commissioner of the Department of Health requests that the designated amount of \$30,000 be awarded to Children's Memorial Hospital for a three-month measles study which will benefit not only the Chicago Department of Health measles immunization efforts, but may serve as a national reference and guide; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The sum of \$30,000 in federal assistance grant funds awarded to the Immunization Program of the Chicago Department of Health for the measles study at Children's Memorial Hospital shall be used as follows:

For direct financial assistance to Children's Memorial Hospital, in accordance with the Agreement described in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 2. Subject to approval by the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality, the Mayor, the City Comptroller and the Acting Commissioner of the Department of Health are hereby authorized to execute, on behalf of the City of Chicago, an agreement with Children's Memorial Hospital, said agreement to be substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A, and the City Comptroller is hereby authorized to disburse funds in accordance with the terms thereof.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and approval.

Exhibit "A" (Grant Agreement) attached to this ordinance reads as follows:

Exhibit "A".

Grant Agreement.

This Agreement is made as of the _____ day of _____, 1989 by and between the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation and a home rule government under Section 6(a) of Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois, acting by and through its Department of Health (the "City") and Children's Memorial Hospital, a not-for-profit corporation duly organized and existing under the laws of Illinois (the "Recipient").

Recitals.

Whereas, The City of Chicago is still experiencing its largest measles outbreak in more than a decade (1,686 cases to date); and

Whereas, The majority of these cases (77.5%) are in children greater than six months and less than five years of age ("Target Group"); and

Whereas, Five of the six measles deaths were in children in the Target Group; and

Whereas, The City finds barriers to immunizing children, such as the belief that a mildly sick child cannot be vaccinated, cost lost opportunities to administer such vaccinations while the child is in a physician's office for a mild illness; and

Whereas, The City desires to educate the general public about the falsity of such beliefs and to support other efforts with similar objectives; and

Whereas, The Recipient intends to implement a study to determine whether adverse effects could occur in mildly sick children immunized against measles, such study being more fully described in the document attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein as "(Sub)Exhibit A" (Program Proposal); and

Whereas, The City believes the benefits of the Program Proposal would augment the City's own efforts to increase the immunization levels of the Target Group.

Now, Therefore, In consideration of the mutual covenants and promises contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

Section 1.

The above recitals are expressly incorporated in and made a part of this Agreement as if fully set forth herein.

Section 2. Grant Activities.

2.01

The Grant Activities shall include only those activities enumerated by the Recipient's Program Proposal in "(Sub)Exhibit A" to this Agreement, and accepted by the City as allowable "Grant Activities" to be funded by this Agreement.

2.02

The Recipient shall perform all Grant Activities funded in whole or in part by this Agreement in a manner acceptable to the reasonable satisfaction of the Commissioner of the Department of Health (the "Commissioner") or such designee as may be appointed in writing.

2.03

The Recipient agrees that it shall not change, expand or otherwise revise its Grant Activities, as identified herein, without the prior written consent of the City.

Section 3. Time Is Of The Essence.

The current state of the measles outbreak is that it appears under control, as monthly case totals continue to decline. The window of opportunity to study important facets of outbreak control strategies and techniques is also quickly disappearing. It is the ability to study these measures that will help to prevent another such outbreak with the ensuing personal tragedy and other costs. Thus, the City and the Recipient understand that, in performing this Agreement, Time Is Of The Essence.

Section 4. Term.

The Recipient shall complete all Grant Activities in accordance with the schedule set forth in "(Sub)Exhibit A". In the event of a delay, the Recipient shall notify the City, in accordance with the terms of this Agreement, explaining the delay and requesting an extension which may be granted in the sole discretion of the City. The study will be completed no later than March 31, 1990.

Section 5. The Grant.

5.01

Upon the execution of this Agreement, the Grant Recipient shall submit an account, in such form and detail as may be requested by the City, requesting the funds necessary to perform its Grant Activities (the "Grant"). Upon verification therefore, the City shall review such account within thirty (30) days and cause a check to be issued by its Office of the Comptroller.

5.02

In no event shall the total amount of the Grant exceed \$30,000.00.

5.03

The Recipient shall maintain all books, records and other documents relating directly to the receipt and disbursement of the Grant, subject to the right of access by any duly authorized representative of the City of Chicago for the purpose of inspection, copy, audit and examination. The Recipient shall be obligated to maintain such books, records, and other documents and such right of inspection shall extend until completion of all close-out procedures respecting the Grant, and until the final settlement and conclusion of all issues arising out of the Grant Agreement.

Section 6. Special Conditions.

6.01

The Recipient shall, comply with all applicable federal, state and local statutes, laws, ordinances, rules, regulations, policies and executive orders, including specifically any regulations imposed by reason of the original grant to the City of Grant Funds from the Centers for Disease Control.

6.02

Nothing herein contained is intended or should be construed as in any way creating or establishing the relationship of partners or joint venturers between the City of Chicago and the Recipient, or as constituting the Recipient or any officer, owner, employee, or agent of the Recipient as agent, representative or employee of the City of Chicago for any purpose or in any manner whatsoever, and the Recipient shall not make any representations to the contrary. The City agrees not to exploit the name of "Children's Memorial Hospital" or the Program for any commercial or political purpose without the prior written approval of the Recipient. The Recipient, in turn, shall identify the City's contribution in any publication or distribution of the results of the Program.

6.03

No member, official, or employee of the City shall be personally liable to the Recipient or any successor in interest in the event of any default or breach by the City, or for any amount which may become due to the Recipient or its successor in interest, or for any obligation under the terms of the Agreement.

6.04

The Recipient shall not assign all or any part of its rights or obligations under the Agreement, or all or any part of the Grant, without the prior written consent of the City. The City reserves the right to assign, at any time, all or any part of its interest in the Agreement without reservation or restriction.

6.05

Notwithstanding any other provision in this Agreement, the Recipient shall protect, defend, indemnify, hold and save harmless the City of Chicago, its employees, agents and officials, from and against any and all liabilities, claims, suits, causes or action, demands, judgments, losses, expenses, attorneys' reasonable fees, and costs of every kind and nature incurred by or accrued, asserted, or imposed against the City of Chicago by reason of any accident, injury (including death) to any person, or damage to property resulting from, arising out of, or relating directly or indirectly to the Grant Activities or the Program.

6.06

The Recipient shall obtain and maintain general liability and property damage insurance coverage, on an occurrence basis, for the Term of the Agreement in commercially reasonable amounts and with companies licensed by the State of Illinois.

6.07

The Recipient agrees that in performing under this Agreement no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, or handicap be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be otherwise subject to discrimination under any program or activity, including employment, supported in whole or in part by the Grant.

6.08

If the Grant is used in whole or in part for the employment of any person, the Recipient further agrees that no person on the grounds of race, color, religion, national origin, age, sex, or handicap unrelated to ability, will be denied equal opportunity in the hiring process or be otherwise discriminated against with respect to compensation, terms, conditions, or benefits of employment.

6.09

The City reserves the right to terminate this Agreement at any time upon written notice when there are not sufficient funds available or when the Commissioner deems the Grant Activities are no longer in the best interests of the City.

Section 7. Events Of Default, Termination And Remedies.

7.01

Failure of the Recipient to satisfactorily complete the Grant Activities in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and of any exhibits hereto, shall constitute an Event of Default, provided that neither the Recipient, nor any successor in interest, shall be considered in breach or default of its obligations under this Agreement in the event of an enforced delay in the performance of its obligations due to causes reasonably beyond its control, and occurring without its fault or negligence. The City may extend the time for the performance of such obligations for a period equal to the period of the enforced delay, provided the Recipient has given written notice to the City of the circumstances of such enforced delay within five (5) days after the same arose.

7.02

An Event of Default which shall continue uncured for a period of thirty (30) days following receipt by the Recipient of written notice thereof from the City shall be deemed a Default of the Agreement, permitting the City to take any or all of the following actions:

- (a) the withholding of approval of further Grant payment(s);
- (b) the demand for repayment in part or in full of any sums received from the City under the Grant Agreement;
- (c) the termination of the Grant Agreement.

In the event of the City's demand for repayment under the above subsection (b), the Recipient herein expressly agrees to repay such sums promptly upon written demand by the City.

7.03

No remedy by the terms of this Agreement is intended to be exclusive of any other remedy, but each and every such remedy shall be cumulative and shall be in addition to any other remedies, at law, in equity or by statute, existing now or hereafter; no delay or omission to exercise any right or power accruing upon any Default or Event of Default shall impair any such right or power nor shall it be construed to be a waiver of any such Default or Event of Default or acquiescence therein, and every such right and power may be exercised from time to time and as often as may be deemed expedient.

Section 8. Notices.

Any and all notices given or required under this Agreement shall be in writing and may be delivered personally or by placing in the United States mail, certified with return receipt requested, postage prepaid and addressed:

Section 9. General Conditions.

9.01

This Agreement shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties, and no

warranties, inducements, considerations, promises, or other inferences shall be implied or impressed upon this Agreement that are not expressly addressed herein.

9.02

This Agreement is comprised of several identical counterparts, each to be fully executed by the parties and each to be deemed an original having identical legal effect.

9.03

No changes, amendments, modifications, cancellation or discharge of this Agreement, or any part hereof, shall be valid unless in writing and signed by the parties hereto, or their respective successors and assigns.

9.04

This Agreement shall be governed in all respects in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois.

9.05

Any headings of this Agreement are for convenience of reference only and do not define or limit the provision thereof. Words of any gender shall be deemed and construed to include correlative words of the other genders. Words importing the singular number shall include the plural number and vice versa, unless the context shall otherwise indicate. All references to any exhibit or document shall be deemed to include all supplements and/or amendments to any such exhibits or documents entered into in accordance with the terms hereof and thereof. All references to any person or entity shall be deemed to include any person or entity succeeding to the rights, duties, and obligations of such person or entity in accordance with the terms of this Agreement. In the event of any conflict between this Agreement and any exhibits hereto, the terms of the Agreement shall be deemed to control.

9.06

If any provision of this Agreement shall be held or deemed to be or shall in fact be inoperative or unenforceable as applied to any particular case in any jurisdiction or jurisdictions or in all cases because it conflicts with any other provision or provisions hereof or any constitution, status, municipal ordinance, rule of law or public policy, or for any

other reasons, such circumstances shall not have the effect of rendering the provision in question inoperative or unenforceable in any other case or circumstance, or of rendering any other provision or provisions herein contained invalid, inoperative or unenforceable to any extent whatever. The invalidity of any one or more phrases, sentences, clauses or sections contained in this Agreement shall not affect the remaining portions of this Agreement or any part thereto.

Section 10. Authority.

10.01

Execution of this Agreement by the City is authorized by ordinance passed by the City Council of the City of Chicago on _____.

10.02

2. To review, approve and submit to the Federal Highway Administration without delay, all submittals which require Federal Highway Administration review, approval or other action.

The City Hereby Agrees:

3. To prepare, or cause to be prepared, studies, surveys, plans, specifications and estimates of cost for said Project.
4. Upon approval from the State and the Federal Highway Administration, to let and award the contract for the Project, and/or to provide or cause to be provided, all force account construction and construction engineering/supervision, all in accordance with established procedures of the City, the State and the Federal Highway Administration.
5. To finance the work pending progressive reimbursement by the State of the federal and non-federal (State) shares of costs, to appropriate such funds as are necessary therefore, and to prepare a complete and accurate breakdown of the costs of the Project.
6. To comply with all applicable Executive Orders and federal legislation pursuant to the Equal Employment Opportunity and Nondiscrimination Regulations as may be required by the State and under federal law.
7. That failure on the part of the City to fulfill the responsibilities assigned in numbered paragraphs 6 and 10 of this Agreement may render the City ineligible for future federal participation in projects for which the City has similar responsibilities, until such failures are corrected.
8. To retain all Project records and to make them available for audit by State and federal auditors during the Project development and construction stages, and for a period of three (3) years after final acceptance of the Projects.

The Parties Hereto Mutually Agree:

9. That prior to initiation of work to be performed hereunder, the disposition of encroachments will be cooperatively determined by representatives of the City and State.
10. That, upon completion of the improvement, the City and the State will maintain or cause to be maintained, in a satisfactory manner, their respective portions of the improvement in accordance with established jurisdictional authority.
11. That said Project generally consists of the improvement of 47th Street, from Racine Avenue to Lake Park Avenue.

The existing driving surface will be removed. A section of sewer between Morgan Street and Halsted Street will be replaced. The pavement base will be repaired and reconstructed as necessary and a new driving surface will be

applied. The Consolidated Rail Corporation viaduct between Morgan Street and Halsted Street will be removed and the profile of the roadway at that location will be raised.

The intersections of 47th Street with Halsted Street, with Woodlawn Avenue, with Lake Park Avenue and with Drexel Boulevard will be improved by channelization. Traffic signals at the intersections of 47th Street with Emerald Avenue and with Wallace Street will be removed. Traffic signals will be modernized at the intersections of 47th Street with Union Avenue, with State Street with Wabash Avenue, with Indiana Avenue with Vincennes Avenue, with St. Lawrence Avenue with Cottage Grove Avenue, with Drexel Boulevard with Ellis Avenue, with Woodlawn Avenue and with Lake Park Avenue. Deteriorated curbs, gutters, and sidewalks will be removed and replaced. Vaulted sidewalks will be filled and sidewalk ramps for the handicapped, pavement markings and utility adjustments will be provided. All other appurtenances necessary to complete the Project will also be provided.

12. That the estimated costs of the Project covered and described by this Agreement are:

and that based upon said ratios, State financial participation (referred to herein as the non-federal share (State) shall be limited to a maximum of \$1,293,597 with any non-federal share required in excess of that amount to be provided by the City or by amendment to this Agreement.

13. That the City shall be responsible for 100% of the cost of any work not eligible for federal participation.
14. That standard federal-aid procedures and requirements shall apply to all phases of this Project.
15. That the Commissioner of Public Works is authorized to execute revisions to this Agreement relative to budgetary items, upon approval by the Illinois Department of Transportation, as long as such revisions do not increase the total cost of the Project (\$5,341,000) as authorized by the City Council.
16. That this Agreement and the covenants contained herein shall be void ab initio in the event the contract covering the construction work contemplated herein is not awarded and/or the force account construction work is not authorized by January 1, 1992.

17. That all prior Agreements, or portions thereof, between the City and the State which refer to the construction of this Project are superseded by this Agreement.

This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, their successors and assigns.

In Witness Whereof, The City and State have caused this Agreement to be executed by their respective officials and attested to on the date hereinafter listed.

Minority Business Enterprises Provisions attached to this Agreement reads as follows:

Minority Business Enterprises Provisions.

"It is the Policy of the U. S. Department of Transportation that minority business enterprises, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 23, shall have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Federal funds under this agreement. Consequently, the M.B.E. requirements of 49 C.F.R. Part 23 apply to this agreement.

The State and City agree to ensure that minority business enterprises, as defined in 49 C.F.R. Part 23, have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of this agreement. In this regard the State and City shall take all necessary and reasonable steps, in accordance with 49 C.F.R. Part 23, to ensure that minority business enterprises have the maximum opportunity to compete for and perform portions of contracts and subcontracts financed in whole or in part with Federal funds provided under this agreement. The State and City shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the selection and retention of contractor or subcontractors, including procurement of materials and lease of equipment.

The City shall include the provisions of this "Policy" in every contract, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment.

Failure to carry out the requirements set forth above shall constitute a breach of this agreement and may result in termination of the agreement or such remedy as deemed appropriate."

This Agreement shall be administered under the provisions of the City of Chicago's federally approved Disadvantaged Business Enterprise Program.

SECTION 1. The Mayor is authorized to accept, the City Clerk to attest and the Commissioner of Public Works and the City Comptroller to approve, upon approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality, an Agreement between the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation of the State of Illinois and the Chicago and North Western Transportation Company for the improvement of the viaduct structure in Elston Avenue, said Agreement to be substantially in the following form:

SECTION 2. That the City Clerk is hereby directed to transmit two (2) certified copies of this ordinance to the Division of Highways, Department of Transportation of the State of Illinois through the District Engineer of District 1 of said Division of Highways.

SECTION 3. That this ordinance shall be in force and effect from and after its passage.

Agreement attached to this ordinance reads as follows:

Agreement.

This Agreement made and entered into this ____ day of _____, 19 ____, by and between the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation, hereinafter referred to as the "City", and the Chicago and North Western Transportation Company, hereinafter referred to as "Railroad".

Witnesseth:

Whereas, In the interest of public safety and convenience, the parties hereto propose to increase the vertical clearance under the North Elston Avenue viaduct by lowering the grade of existing roadway and sewer; and

Whereas, The Chicago and North Western Transportation Company tracks cross Elston Avenue on viaduct structure No. 1209, at approximately 2100 north; and

Whereas, Lowering the street pavement on North Elston Avenue will necessitate the construction of a new sewer at a lower elevation and relocation of railroad tracks in North Mendell Street.

Now, Therefore, In consideration of the premises and of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Section 1. The parties hereto shall construct or cause to be constructed, in substantial accordance with the approved plans, specifications and special provisions, the following items of work:

A. Work of Railroad: The Railroad shall furnish or cause to be furnished all the labor, materials and work equipment required to perform and complete the following:

1. Removal and reconstruction of 117 feet of Track No. 199 to accommodate the open cut installation of a 36-inch diameter sewer line.
2. Furnish employees in charge as required during the course of this contract.
3. Incidental work necessary to complete the items hereinabove specified.
4. Payment for this work will be made from State of Illinois funds.
5. City shall reimburse Railroad for the total cost of this work.

All work shall be performed in compliance with Federal-Aid Highway Program Manual, the Civil Rights Act of 1964, and the Illinois Fair Employment Practices Act.

B. Work by City: The City shall furnish or cause to be furnished at its expense, all the labor, materials and work equipment required to perform and complete the following:

1. Prepare engineering plans, specifications and special provisions.
2. Construction of a sewer from Elston Avenue at approximately 2100 north across the Elston Avenue -- Ashland Avenue intersection to McLean Place, east on McLean Place to Mendell Street and south on Mendell Street to an existing Metropolitan Sanitary District, Sanitary Interceptor Sewer as shown on Plan Nos. 9 through 12 attached hereto and made a part hereof.
3. Make all necessary sewer and utility adjustments as required to complete the above clearance improvement.
4. Installation of new curbs, gutters, sidewalks, handrails, drainage structures, column protections, pavement striping and other related items of work.
5. Provide construction engineering and supervision incidental to the work herein specified.
6. Incidental work necessary to complete the items herein specified.

The City's work shall be awarded to a competent and experienced contractor who has adequate equipment, organization and finances, and the Railroad shall be notified of the contractor receiving such award prior to the commencement of work.

Section 2. The City shall require its contractor (or contractors) to perform their work in accordance with all pertinent federal, state and local laws and regulations pertaining hereto.

Section 3. The City shall require its contractors to indemnify and save harmless the Railroad from and against any and all liability, damages, costs and expense for loss or damage to any property whatsoever and injury to or death of any persons whomsoever, arising or growing, in whole or in part, out of or in connection with the performances of any of the above mentioned work.

The foregoing provisions of this section shall not apply when such damages, costs and expense are caused by the negligence of the Railroad or its agents.

Section 4. The Railroad shall keep an accurate and detailed account of the actual cost and expense as incurred by it in the performance of the work as specified above.

The Railroad, for performance of its work as outlined in Section 1 (A) may bill the City monthly for costs and expenses it has incurred.

Section 5. The Agreement shall be subject to all the non-conflicting conditions set forth in the "Standard Provisions for Highway-Railroad Agreements".

WHEREAS, In 1979, the City previously entered into an agreement to supply water to the Village of Summit; and

WHEREAS, This agreement provided that the City would furnish water from the City's water mains at the City limits, South Harlem Avenue and West 59th Street, and for emergency use only at South Harlem Avenue and West 63rd Street and South Harlem Avenue and West Archer Avenue; and

WHEREAS, The water furnished was to be for consumers located within the corporate limits of the Village; and

WHEREAS, The City is willing to continue to supply water to the Village under substantially the same terms as in its previous agreement; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to execute, the City Clerk to attest, the Commissioner of Water to approve and the City Comptroller to accept the file for record, upon the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality, a water

supply contract between the City of Chicago and the Village of Summit. Such contract shall be substantially in the form as attached.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

Water Supply Contract attached to this ordinance reads as follows:

*Water Supply Contract Between The City
Of Chicago And The
Village Of Summit*

This Agreement made and entered into this _____ day of _____ A.D., 1989, and executed in sextuplicate originals (each executed copy constituting an original) by and between the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Illinois, hereinafter called the "City", and the Village of Summit, a municipal corporation, in Cook County, Illinois, located within the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

Witnesseth:

Whereas, The City and the Village of Summit, entered into a ten year agreement on the 5th day of November, 1979 for the furnishing from the City's water main at the City limits, South Harlem Avenue and West 59th Street and for emergency use only at South Harlem Avenue and West 63rd Street and South Harlem Avenue and West Archer Avenue, a supply of water for consumers supplied by the Village of Summit Water System not to exceed an annual average of 1,348,000 gallons per day in 1979; decreasing to 1,298,000 gallons per day in 1989, with the maximum rate of flow from the City's mains not to exceed twice the annual average daily withdrawal; and

Whereas, The City is willing to renew its water supply contract with the Village of Summit, and furnish water from existing connection to City's water mains at the City limits at North Cicero Avenue and West Devon Avenue and North Pulaski Road and West Devon Avenue.

Now, Therefore, In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, the parties agree with each other as follows:

A. Service To Be Furnished.

(1) The City agrees to furnish to the Village of Summit, and the Village of Summit agrees to purchase and take from the City under and in accordance with the terms hereof, a supply of water through metered connection authorized by the Commissioner of Water of the City ("Commissioner") from the City's water mains at the City limits at South Harlem Avenue and West 59th Street and for emergency use only at South Harlem Avenue and West 63rd Street and South Harlem Avenue and West Archer Avenue to be used by the Village of Summit in supplying water to consumers located within the corporate limits of the Village of Summit.

B. Quantity Of Water To Be Furnished.

(1) For consumers located within the corporate limits of the Village of Summit, the following are quantities of water for the years included:

The individual consumers' quantities of water are included in the allocations made to the Village of Summit. These quantities of water are in accordance with the allocations made to the Village of Summit by Opinion and Order LMO 80-4 of the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation. These quantities of water may be adjusted by the

Commissioner if there are any future revisions of the allocation order by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation for the Village of Summit.

(2) The water supplied and taken in accordance with this contract shall be withdrawn at a uniform rate during the 24 hours of each day. The maximum hourly rate of withdrawal of water from the City's mains shall not exceed twice the annual average daily contracted amount.

(3) The Village of Summit shall install a flow control system and a pressure recording system consisting of a manually operated flow control valve controlled by the City at a meter vault on existing water service connection to City's water main at the City limits at its connection at South Harlem Avenue and West 59th Street and for emergency use only at South Harlem Avenue and West 63rd Street and South Harlem Avenue and West Archer Avenue in order to regulate the flow of water as herein provided. When requested by the Commissioner, the Village of Summit shall provide the necessary equipment to transmit pressures and convert the manually operated flow control valves to remotely controlled flow control valves. All devices necessary for the control and transmission of pressures and rates of flow of water furnished shall be provided and maintained by the Village of Summit. The transmission of pressures and rates of flow readings shall be to a location designated by the City and the flow control valve shall be controlled by the City.

C. Standard Terms And Conditions.

I. General.

(1) This contract shall be in force and effect for a period ending ten years from the date hereof, subject, however, to the option of the Village of Summit to renew said contract for successive like terms, written notice thereof to be submitted to the City six months prior to the expiration of each said ten year term. Amounts of water for average daily use will be the amounts as allocated by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation.

(2) No officer, official or agent of the City has the power to amend, modify or alter this contract or waive any of its conditions as to bind the City by making any promise or representation not contained herein; provided that the Commissioner may make modifications pursuant to paragraphs B(4) and C(7) herein.

(3) This contract shall not be assigned or transferred by either party.

(4) This contract will be subject to cancellation in the event a court of competent jurisdiction restricts or limits, directly or indirectly, any of the City's rights to obtain, sell, contract for or distribute Lake Michigan water.

(5) The quantity of water supplied under this contract shall not exceed the amount of Lake Michigan water allocated by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation to the Village of Summit.

(6) The City will not be responsible in damages for any interruption or failure to supply water and shall be saved and held harmless from all damage of any kind, nature and description which may arise as a result of making this contract and furnishing water hereunder.

(7) The Village of Summit may, by permission of the Commissioner, in an emergency, supply water to other City water users who have been previously authorized an emergency connection.

II. Reporting Requirement.

(8) At the end of each calendar year during the term of this contract and not later than March 31st of each year, the Village of Summit agrees to submit to the Commissioner a written copy of the prevailing water rate schedule as applicable to its water customers. It shall include all rates and relevant information and the premise on which rates have been furnished.

(9) The Village of Summit shall submit to the City by the 10th day of each month, a report showing the amount of water received the previous month from the City and the amount furnished to customers.

III. Reservations.

(10) In the event of a default in payment of a water bill by the Village of Summit, the City reserves the right to require the Village of Summit to deposit, in advance, a sum equal to the estimated costs for water supply during a period of ninety days at the prevailing metered rate.

(11) The City reserves the right to inspect, test, repair and replace the water meters as required. Such replacements or repairs shall be charged to and paid by the Village of Summit.

IV. Water Quality.

(12) The City shall supply the Village of Summit with water of a quality commensurate with that furnished to its consumers within its City limits.

(13) The Village of Summit shall receive its supply of water from the City by a means or method approved by the Commissioner. The City water system must be safeguarded by means of an air gap at the receiving reservoir. When the requirement for a receiving reservoir is waived to permit a direct connection for emergency use, a backflow preventer, approved by the Commissioner, must be installed.

(14) The Village of Summit bears the responsibility for maintaining the water quality at any point beyond the meter vault and within its distribution system. The City bears no degree of responsibility for the water quality at any point beyond the meter vaults.

(15) The Village of Summit shall notify and keep the City informed of the responsible individual in charge of operations.

(16) The Village of Summit shall immediately notify the Commissioner of any emergency or condition which may affect the quality of water in either party's system.

(17) The City reserves the right to make inspections of those facilities which may affect the quality of the water supplied to the Village of Summit and to perform required tests.

V. Equipment Operation.

(18) The Village of Summit shall provide and maintain all service mains and valves and bear the costs for connecting said mains to and severing them from the City's water system. Each service main shall be equipped with a valve located within the City limits and said valve shall be under the sole and complete control of the City and will mark the limit of the City's responsibility for maintenance of the piping system.

(19) The Village of Summit shall provide and maintain any and all devices expressly requested by the Commissioner for the purpose of controlling, measuring, transmitting and recording of pressures, reservoir levels and other required operational information.

(20) The Village of Summit shall provide the meters, vaults with sump pumps and related devices, adhering to City standard practices, for measuring the supply of water furnished. Meters provided must be delivered to the City meter shop for testing and picked up promptly after testing, all at the expense of the Village of Summit prior to installation by them. Plans and specifications for the equipment and vault, or other protective structure, must be submitted to and be approved by the Commissioner before an authorization for installing the meters and related devices will be issued. The Village of Summit shall provide a tee and valve downstream of each meter installed in each meter vault. The tee and valve shall be a minimum of two inches pipe size. The Village of Summit shall provide one one-inch pipe size test tap in the inlet pipe ahead of the header pipe.

(21) The City's representative will regularly inspect the meters measuring the supply of water furnished and will repair or replace any meter or part of a meter which has been in service for a period longer than authorized or which is known or suspected to be registering incorrectly. All such repairs or replacements shall be made by the City's representatives and the Village of Summit shall pay for repairs and replacements made.

(22) When it is determined that a water meter registered incorrectly, an estimate of the amount of water furnished through the faulty meter shall be prepared by the Commissioner for the purpose of billing the Village of Summit. The estimate shall be based upon the average of twelve preceding readings of the meter, exclusive of incorrect readings.

When less than twelve correct readings are available, fewer readings, including some obtained after the period of incorrect registration, may be used.

(23) The Village of Summit shall assure that reservoirs of sufficient capacity are provided in its entire system including its own system and the entities served to store twice the annual daily average allocation of water to the Village of Summit and the entities furnished water by the Village of Summit Water System as authorized by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation Order Number LMO 80-4 and any revisions to the allocations. All reservoirs provided by the Village of Summit and the entities furnished water by the Village of Summit Water System shall be considered in meeting this requirement. The Village of Summit Water System is to be operated to utilize the reservoirs in a manner to assure that water is withdrawn from the City's water system as uniformly as possible.

VI. Rates And Discounts.

(24) Charges for water furnished to the Village of Summit shall be at a rate no greater than that for large quantities of water furnished through meters to customers inside the City, said rate being fixed by City Ordinance.

(25) The Village of Summit shall be entitled to the same discount for prompt payment of water bills as is allowed to metered customers inside the City.

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago ("City") possesses the power and authority to furnish water from the City's water mains to others; and

WHEREAS, In 1979, the City previously entered into an agreement to supply water to the Village of Schiller Park; and

WHEREAS, This agreement provided that the City would furnish water from the City's water mains at the City limits, North Pueblo Avenue and West Irving Park Road; and

WHEREAS, The water furnished was to be for consumers located within the corporate limits of the Village; and

WHEREAS, The City is willing to continue to supply water to the Village under substantially the same terms as in its previous agreement; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Mayor is hereby authorized and directed to execute, the City Clerk to attest, the Commissioner of Water to approve and the City Comptroller to accept the file for record, upon the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality, a water supply contract between the City of Chicago and the Village of Schiller Park. Such contract shall be substantially in the form as attached.

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval.

Water Supply Contract attached to this ordinance reads as follows:

*Water Supply Contract Between The City

This Agreement made and entered into this _____ day of _____ A.D., 1989, and executed in sextuplicate originals (each executed copy constituting an original) by and between the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation, organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Illinois, hereinafter called the "City", and the Village of Schiller Park, a municipal corporation, in Cook County, Illinois, located within the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

Witnesseth:

Whereas, The City and the Village of Schiller Park, entered into a ten year agreement on the 4th day of October, 1979 for the furnishing from the City's water main at the City limits, at North Pueblo Avenue and West Irving Park Road, a supply of water for consumers supplied by the Village of Schiller Park Water System not to exceed an annual average of 2,525,000 gallons per day in 1979, decreasing to 2,508,000 gallons per day in 1989, with the maximum rate of flow from the City's mains not to exceed twice the annual average daily withdrawal; and

Whereas, The City is willing to renew its water supply contract with the Village of Schiller Park, and furnish water from existing connection to City's water mains at the City limits at North Pueblo Avenue and West Irving Park Road.

Now, Therefore, In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, the parties agree with each other as follows:

A. Service To Be Furnished.

(1) The City agrees to furnish to the Village of Schiller Park, and the Village of Schiller Park agrees to purchase and take from the City under and in accordance with the terms hereof, a supply of water through metered connection authorized by the Commissioner of Water of the City ("Commissioner") from the City's water mains at the City limits at North Pueblo Avenue and West Irving Park Road to be used by the Village of Schiller Park in supplying water to consumers located within the corporate limits of the Village of Schiller Park.

B. Quantity Of Water To Be Furnished.

(1) For consumers located within the corporate limits of the Village of Schiller Park, the following are quantities of water for the years included:

The individual consumers' quantities of water are included in the allocations made to the Village of Schiller Park. These quantities of water are in accordance with the allocations made to the Village of Schiller Park by Opinion and Order LMO 80-4 of the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation. These quantities of water may be adjusted by the Commissioner if there are any future revisions of the allocation order by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation for the Village of Schiller Park.

(2) The water supplied and taken in accordance with this contract shall be withdrawn at a uniform rate during the 24 hours of each day. The maximum hourly rate of withdrawal of water from the City's mains shall not exceed twice the annual average daily contracted amount.

(3) The Village of Schiller Park shall install a flow control system and a pressure recording system consisting of a manually operated flow control valve controlled by the City at a meter vault on existing water service connection to City's water main at the City limits at its connection at South Harlem Avenue and West 59th Street and for emergency use only at North Pueblo Avenue and West Irving Park Road in order to regulate the flow of water as herein provided. When requested by the Commissioner, the Village of Schiller Park shall provide the necessary equipment to transmit pressures and convert the manually operated flow control valves to remotely controlled flow control valves. All devices necessary for the control and transmission of pressures and rates of flow of water furnished shall be provided and maintained by the Village of Schiller Park. The transmission of pressures and rates of flow readings shall be to a location designated by the City and the flow control valve shall be controlled by the City.

C. Standard Terms And Conditions.

I. General.

(1) This contract shall be in force and effect for a period ending ten years from the date hereof, subject, however, to the option of the Village of Schiller Park to renew said contract for successive like terms, written notice thereof to be submitted to the City six months prior to the expiration of each said ten year term. Amounts of water for average daily use will be the amounts as allocated by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation.

(2) No officer, official or agent of the City has the power to amend, modify or alter this contract or waive any of its conditions as to bind the City by making any promise or representation not contained herein; provided that the Commissioner may make modifications pursuant to paragraphs B(4) and C(7) herein.

(3) This contract shall not be assigned or transferred by either party.

(4) This contract will be subject to cancellation in the event a court of competent jurisdiction restricts or limits, directly or indirectly, any of the City's rights to obtain, sell, contract for or distribute Lake Michigan water.

(5) The quantity of water supplied under this contract shall not exceed the amount of Lake Michigan water allocated by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation to the Village of Schiller Park.

(6) The City will not be responsible in damages for any interruption or failure to supply water and shall be saved and held harmless from all damage of any kind, nature and description which may arise as a result of making this contract and furnishing water hereunder.

(7) The Village of Schiller Park may, by permission of the Commissioner, in an emergency, supply water to other City water users who have been previously authorized an emergency connection.

II. Reporting Requirement.

(8) At the end of each calendar year during the term of this contract and not later than March 31st of each year, the Village of Schiller Park agrees to submit to the Commissioner a written copy of the prevailing water rate schedule as applicable to its water customers. It shall include all rates and relevant information and the premise on which rates have been furnished.

(9) The Village of Schiller Park shall submit to the City by the 10th day of each month, a report showing the amount of water received the previous month from the City and the amount furnished to customers.

III. Reservations.

(10) In the event of a default in payment of a water bill by the Village of Schiller Park the City reserves the right to require the Village of Schiller Park to deposit, in advance, a sum equal to the estimated costs for water supply during a period of ninety days at the prevailing metered rate.

(11) The City reserves the right to inspect, test, repair and replace the water meters as required. Such replacements or repairs shall be charged to and paid by the Village of Schiller Park.

IV. Water Quality.

(12) The City shall supply the Village of Schiller Park with water of a quality commensurate with that furnished to its consumers within its City limits.

(13) The Village of Schiller Park shall receive its supply of water from the City by a means or method approved by the Commissioner. The City water system must be safeguarded by means of an air gap at the receiving reservoir. When the requirement for a receiving reservoir is waived to permit a direct connection for emergency use, a backflow preventer, approved by the Commissioner, must be installed.

(14) The Village of Schiller Park bears the responsibility for maintaining the water quality at any point beyond the meter vault and within its distribution system. The City bears no degree of responsibility for the water quality at any point beyond the meter vaults.

(15) The Village of Schiller Park shall notify and keep the City informed of the responsible individual in charge of operations.

(16) The Village of Schiller Park shall immediately notify the Commissioner of any emergency or condition which may affect the quality of water in either party's system.

(17) The City reserves the right to make inspections of those facilities which may affect the quality of the water supplied to the Village of Schiller Park and to perform required tests.

V. Equipment Operation.

(18) The Village of Schiller Park shall provide and maintain all service mains and valves and bear the costs for connecting said mains to and severing them from the City's water system. Each service main shall be equipped with a valve located within the City limits and said valve shall be under the sole and complete control of the City and will mark the limit of the City's responsibility for maintenance of the piping system.

(19) The Village of Schiller Park shall provide and maintain any and all devices expressly requested by the Commissioner for the purpose of controlling, measuring, transmitting and recording of pressures, reservoir levels and other required operational information.

(20) The Village of Schiller Park shall provide the meters, vaults with sump pumps and related devices, adhering to City standard practices, for measuring the supply of water furnished. Meters provided must be delivered to the City meter shop for testing and picked up promptly after testing, all at the expense of the Village of Schiller Park prior to installation by them. Plans and specifications for the equipment and vault, or other protective structure, must be submitted to and be approved by the Commissioner before an authorization for installing the meters and related devices will be issued. The Village of Schiller Park shall provide a tee and valve downstream of each meter installed in each meter vault. The tee and valve shall be a minimum of two inches pipe size. The Village of Schiller Park shall provide one one-inch pipe size test tap in the inlet pipe ahead of the header pipe.

(21) The City's representative will regularly inspect the meters measuring the supply of water furnished and will repair or replace any meter or part of a meter which has been in service for a period longer than authorized or which is known or suspected to be registering incorrectly. All such repairs or replacements shall be made by the City's representatives and the Village of Schiller Park shall pay for repairs and replacement made.

(22) When it is determined that a water meter registered incorrectly, an estimate of the amount of water furnished through the faulty meter shall be prepared by the Commissioner for the purpose of billing the Village of Schiller Park. The estimate shall be based upon the average of twelve preceding readings of the meter, exclusive of incorrect readings. When less than twelve correct readings are available, fewer readings, including some obtained after the period of incorrect registration, may be used.

(23) The Village of Schiller Park shall assure that reservoirs of sufficient capacity are provided in its entire system including its own system and the entities served to store twice the annual daily average allocation of water to the Village of Schiller Park and the entities furnished water by the Village of Schiller Park Water System as authorized by the State of Illinois, Department of Transportation Order Number LMO 80-4 and any revisions to the allocations. All reservoirs provided by the Village of Schiller Park and the entities furnished water by the Village of Schiller Park Water System shall be considered in meeting this requirement. The Village of Schiller Park Water System is to be operated to utilize the reservoirs in a manner to assure that water is withdrawn from the City's water system as uniformly as possible.

VI. Rates And Discounts.

(24) Charges for water furnished to the Village of Schiller Park shall be at a rate no greater than that for large quantities of water furnished through meters to customers inside the City, said rate being fixed by City ordinance.

(25) The Village of Schiller Park shall be entitled to the same discount for prompt payment of water bills as is allowed to metered customers inside the City.

(3) The City of Blue Island shall install a flow control system and a pressure recording system consisting of a manually operated flow control valve controlled by the City at a meter vault on existing water service connection to City's water main at the City limits at its connection at West 119th Street and South Western Avenue and West 119th Street and South Vincennes Avenue in order to regulate the flow of water as herein provided. When requested by the Commissioner, the City of Blue Island shall provide the necessary equipment to transmit pressures and convert the manually operated flow control valves to remotely controlled flow control valves. All devices necessary for the control and transmission of pressures and rates of flow of water furnished shall be provided and maintained by the City of Blue Island. The transmission of pressures and rates of flow readings shall be to a location designated by the City and the flow control valve shall be controlled by the City.

C. Standard Terms And Conditions.

(7) The City of Blue Island may, by permission of the Commissioner, in an emergency, supply water to other City water users who have been previously authorized an emergency connection.

II. Reporting Requirement.

(8) At the end of each calendar year during the term of this contract and not later than March 31st of each year, the City of Blue Island agrees to submit to the Commissioner a written copy of the prevailing water rate schedule as applicable to its water customers. It shall include all rates and relevant information and the premise on which rates have been furnished.

(14) The City of Blue Island bears the responsibility for maintaining the water quality at any point beyond the meter vault and within its distribution system. The City bears no degree of responsibility for the water quality at any point beyond the meter vaults.

(15) The City of Blue Island shall notify and keep the City informed of the responsible individual in charge of operations.

(16) The City of Blue Island shall immediately notify the Commissioner of any emergency or condition which may affect the quality of water in either party's system.

(17) The City reserves the right to make inspections of those facilities which may affect the quality of the water supplied to the City of Blue Island and to perform required tests.

V. Equipment Operation.

(18) The City of Blue Island shall provide and maintain all service mains and valves and bear the costs for connecting said mains to and severing them from the City's water system. Each service main shall be equipped with a valve located within the City limits and said valve shall be under the sole and complete control of the City and will mark the limit of the City's responsibility for maintenance of the piping system.

Plans and specifications for the equipment and vault, or other protective structure, must be submitted to and be approved by the Commissioner before an authorization for installing the meters and related devices will be issued. The City of Blue Island shall provide a tee and valve downstream of each meter installed in each meter vault. The tee and valve shall be a minimum of two inches pipe size. The City of Blue Island shall provide one one-inch pipe size test tap in the inlet pipe ahead of the header pipe.

(21) The City's representative will regularly inspect the meters measuring the supply of water furnished and will repair or replace any meter or part of a meter which has been in service for a period longer than authorized or which is known or suspected to be registering incorrectly. All such repairs or replacements shall be made by the City's representatives and the City of Blue Island shall pay for repairs and replacements made.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Chapter 26 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended in Section 26-27.2, subsections (e) and (f) by adding the language in italics and deleting the language in brackets, as follows:

26-27.2.

* * *

(e) Notwithstanding the provisions of subsections (c) and (d) herein, [every person or business entity shall have a twelve (12) month period to satisfy any debt which is outstanding, and] the city may enter into a contract or subcontract with such person or business entity if the Purchasing Agent and the head of the requisitioning department, if applicable, or other appropriate department head, certify in writing to the Mayor that:

- (1) it is in the interest of the public health, safety or welfare of the city to enter into such contract and the city is unable to secure a contract that is comparable in terms of price, quality or quantity; or
- (2) the person or business entity has entered into an agreement with the Department of Revenue, or other appropriate city department, for the payment of all debts owed to the city and such person or business entity is in compliance with the agreement, *provided that such agreement shall allow the person or business entity a minimum of twelve (12) months to satisfy any debt which is outstanding except that, in instances where semi-annual renewals of licenses, permits or contracts are required, every person or business entity shall have six (6) months to satisfy any outstanding debt;* or
- (3) the person or business entity is contesting liability for or the amount of the debt in a pending administrative or judicial proceeding; or
- (4) the person or business entity has filed a petition in bankruptcy and the debts owed the city are dischargeable in bankruptcy.

(f) All city contracts shall include [in] a provision requiring compliance with this section. Any contract negotiated, entered into, or performed in violation of any of the provisions of this section shall be voidable at the option of the city. *Any contract entered into with a person or business entity furnishing false, misleading or incomplete information on the affidavit required herein with the intent to mislead, shall be voidable at the option of the City.*

SECTION 2. Chapter 101 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended in Section 101-14, by adding a new subsection 101-14(e), to read as follows:

101-14.

* * *

(e) A license or permit issued to any applicant who violates the provisions of this section or who furnishes false, misleading or incomplete information on the affidavit required herein with the intent to mislead, shall be subject to suspension or revocation.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon passage.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Section 200.6-2 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

200.6-2. For the purposes of this Chapter, when any of the following words or terms are used herein, they shall have the meaning or construction ascribed to them in this section:

"Tangible personal property" has the same meaning as that set forth by Illinois law in the Illinois "Use Tax Act", approved July 14, 1955, as *now or hereafter* amended, and in that respect includes but is not limited to photographs, negatives and positives which are the product of photo [processing.] *processing, and computer software*. This definition shall not be construed to incorporate into this Chapter any exemptions from tax authorized by the Illinois "Use Tax Act", as *now or hereafter* amended.

SECTION 2. This ordinance is intended to clarify existing law.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall become effective October 1, 1989.

Your Committee on Finance, having had under consideration an ordinance amending the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago by adding a new Chapter 189.1 to be known as the Emergency Telephone System Ordinance, having had the same under advisement, begs leave to report and recommend that Your Honorable Body pass the proposed ordinance transmitted herewith.

The following is said proposed ordinance transmitted with the foregoing committee report:

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding a new Chapter 189.1 as follows:

189.1-1. This Chapter shall be known and cited as the "Emergency Telephone System Ordinance" and the surcharge herein imposed shall be known and cited as the "Emergency Telephone System Surcharge".

189.1-2. For the purposes of this Chapter, when any of the following words or terms are used herein they shall have the meaning or construction ascribed to them in this section:

Department: The term "Department" or "Department of Revenue" shall mean the Department of Revenue of the City of Chicago.

Board: The term "Board" shall mean the Chicago Emergency Telephone System Board created by this Chapter.

Director: The term "Director" or "Director of Revenue" shall mean the Director of Revenue of the City of Chicago.

Any other word or term not defined herein but defined in the "Emergency Telephone System Act" of the State of Illinois shall have the meaning ascribed to the word or term in that Act.

In this Chapter, unless the context otherwise requires, words in the singular number include the plural, and in the plural include the singular; words of the masculine gender include the feminine and the neuter; and when the sense so indicates, words of the neuter gender may refer to any gender.

189.1-3. Beginning January 1, 1990, a surcharge shall be imposed upon all billed subscribers of network connections within the City provided by telecommunications carriers engaged in the business of transmitting messages by means of electricity originating within the corporate limits of the City, at a monthly rate of 95¢ per network connection. This surcharge shall be collected from the subscriber by the telecommunications carrier providing the network connection and shall be set forth as a

separately stated item on the subscriber's bill. The telecommunications carrier collecting the surcharge may deduct 3% of the gross amount of the surcharges collected to reimburse the telecommunications carrier for the expense of accounting and collecting the surcharge, and may deduct network or other 9-1-1 system charges then due the carrier, as shown on an itemized bill.

The surcharge imposed by this section shall apply to all in-service network connections, other than those network connections assigned to the City, where the subscriber service address for each such network connection or connections are located within the corporate limits of the City. The "service address" shall mean the location of the subscriber's primary use of the network connection or connections.

189.1-4. The surcharge herein imposed is in addition to any other surcharges, taxes or fees authorized by law.

189.1-5. The telecommunications carrier shall collect this surcharge and remit it to the Department on a monthly basis, not later than 30 days after it is collected by the carrier, or the last day of the month following the month it was collected by the carrier, whichever occurs later. The remittance return shall be in a form prescribed by the Director of Revenue and shall include the total amount of surcharges collected for the month in question, the number of billed subscribers paying the surcharge, the number of network connections, any network or other 9-1-1 system charges due the carrier and deductible from the surcharge, the 3% deduction for the expense of accounting and collecting the surcharge, the net amount being remitted, and any other information the Director deems necessary. The remittance return shall be filed and signed by an officer or authorized representative of the carrier.

189.1-6. The Department shall transmit receipts of the surcharge to the Board for deposit into the Emergency Telephone System Fund.

189.1-7. Every telecommunications carrier required to collect the surcharge imposed herein shall keep accurate and complete books and records of the collection of the surcharge and how it was calculated, including any source documents and other pertinent papers and documents. All such books and records which are required to be kept by this Chapter shall, at all times during business hours of the day, be subject to inspection by the Department or its authorized agents and employees.

189.1-8. The Director is hereby empowered to adopt, promulgate and enforce rules and regulations relating in any way to the administration and enforcement of this Chapter, including provisions for the re-examination, correction and amendment of all returns. The Director or any agent or employee designated in writing by him, is hereby authorized to examine the books and records of any taxpayer during regular business hours, in order to verify the accuracy of any return made, or if no return was made to ascertain the surcharge imposed by this Chapter, and also may conduct investigations and issue subpoenas to any person in order to accomplish these tasks.

189.1-9. The provisions of the Uniform Revenue Procedures Ordinance shall apply to and supplement this Chapter to the extent they are not clearly inconsistent herewith and

the surcharge shall be deemed a revenue measure for purposes of the application of that ordinance.

189.1-10. There is hereby created the Chicago Emergency Telephone System Board, to be composed of 5 members appointed by the Mayor of Chicago subject to approval of the City Council. All members shall be representative of the public safety agency 9-1-1 emergency telephone system users and shall be appointed on the basis of their ability and experience.

Members of the Board shall serve without compensation but shall be reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses.

The Mayor shall designate one member of the Board to serve as chairman, one to serve as vice-chairman, and one to serve as secretary.

189.1-11. The Mayor shall initially appoint members to serve terms expiring July 1, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994 and 1995, respectively. Successors shall be appointed for five year terms. Members shall serve until their successors are appointed and qualified.

189.1-12. Three members of the Board shall constitute a quorum. All action taken by the Board shall be pursuant to the affirmative vote of at least three members.

189.1-13. The Board shall meet at least quarterly. Notice and conduct of such meetings shall be in accordance with the Illinois Open Meetings Act.

189.1-14. The Board shall have the following powers and duties:

- (1) Planning a 9-1-1 system.*
- (2) Coordinating and supervising the implementation, upgrading or maintenance of the system, including the establishment of equipment specifications and coding systems.*
- (3) Receiving monies from the surcharge imposed under this Chapter and from any other source, for deposit into the Emergency Telephone System Fund.*
- (4) Authorizing all disbursements from the Fund.*
- (5) Hiring, on a temporary basis, any staff necessary for the implementation or upgrade of the system.*
- (6) Any other power consistent with and in furtherance of the purposes of this Chapter.*

189.1-15. Members and employees of the Board shall be subject to the applicable provisions of the Governmental Ethics Ordinance, Chapter 26.2 of this Code.

189.1-16. *There is hereby established the Emergency Telephone System Fund. The City Treasurer, ex officio, shall be custodian and treasurer of the Fund. The City Treasurer shall maintain books and accounts concerning the Fund in the manner prescribed by the Board. The City Treasurer shall be liable on his official bond for the proper performance of his duties relating to the fund.*

All interest accruing on the Fund shall remain in the Fund. No expenditures may be made from the Fund except upon the direction of the Board by resolution passed by three members of the Board. Expenditures from the Fund shall be made only to pay for the costs associated with the following:

- (1) *The design of the Emergency Telephone System.*
- (2) *The coding of an initial Master Street Address Guide data base, and update and maintenance thereof.*
- (3) *The repayment of the monies advanced for the implementation of the system.*
- (4) *The charges for Automatic Number Identification and Automatic Location Identification equipment, and maintenance, replacement and update thereof.*
- (5) *The non-recurring charges related to installation of the Emergency Telephone System and the ongoing network charges.*
- (6) *Other products and services necessary for the implementation, upgrade and maintenance of the system and any other purpose related to the operation of the system, including costs attributable directly to the construction, leasing, or maintenance of any buildings or facilities or costs of personnel attributable directly to the operation of the system. Costs attributable directly to the operation of an emergency telephone system do not include the costs of public safety agency personnel who are, and equipment that is, dispatched in response to an emergency call.*

189.1-17. *If any provision of this Chapter or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other provisions or applications of this Chapter which can be given effect without the invalid application or provision, and to this end each such invalid provision or invalid application of this Chapter is severable, unless otherwise provided by this Chapter. In particular, but without limitation, each provision creating an exception to or an exemption or exclusion from the imposition of the surcharge is severable. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent of the City Council that this Chapter would have been adopted had any such unconstitutional or otherwise invalid provision or application not been included.*

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be effective upon its passage.

SUBMISSION OF APPLICATION TO ILLINOIS DEPARTMENT
OF COMMERCE AND COMMUNITY AFFAIRS FOR
ILLINOIS CLEAN AND BEAUTIFUL
PROGRAM FUNDS.

Your Committee on Beautification and Recreation, having had under consideration a resolution (which was referred on October 25, 1989) authorizing the submission of an application to the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs (D.C.C.A.) for grant funding available through the Illinois Clean and Beautiful Program, begs leave to recommend that Your Honorable Body adopt said proposed resolution which is transmitted herewith.

Alderman Schulter presented the following proposed substitute ordinance:

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs, through its Clean and Beautiful Program (hereinafter the "Illinois Clean and Beautiful Program") provides grants to local governments who promote environment awareness through local programs; and

WHEREAS, Chicago Clean Streak is a local not-for-profit organization that assists the City of Chicago with administrative services on various environment- related projects; and

WHEREAS, The City, through its Department of Streets and Sanitation, seeks to apply to the State of Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs for grant funding for its local environmental program with Chicago Clean Streak; and

WHEREAS, It is necessary that an application be submitted by the City of Chicago and certain agreements, such as are attached hereto as exhibits, be entered into with the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, The City will commit local matching funds toward the implementation of its local program; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The City of Chicago shall apply for a Twenty Thousand Dollar (\$20,000.00) grant through the State of Illinois Clean and Beautiful Program and shall enter into and agree regarding the understandings and assurances governing the receipt and utilization of the aforesaid grant funds.

SECTION 2. That there is hereby appropriated the amount of Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) or such amount as may actually be received from the State of Illinois for the City program and that the Comptroller is hereby authorized to accept the grant from the State of Illinois and to disburse said funds as is required to carry out the program.

SECTION 3. The Mayor and the Department of Streets and Sanitation are authorized to provide such additional information as may be required to accomplish the obtaining of a grant offer.

SECTION 4. Subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality, the Mayor and the Department of Streets and Sanitation on behalf of the City, shall be empowered to execute, and the City Clerk to attest to, such documents and all other agreements as may be considered necessary for carrying out the stated activities outlined within said application.

WHEREAS, The Commission on Chicago Landmarks has found that the Arlington and Roslyn Place District meets certain criteria for designation as set forth in Chapter 21, Sections 21-66 (1), (4), (6) and (7) of the Municipal Code of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, The Arlington and Roslyn Place District has value as an example of architectural, economic and social heritage of Chicago, typifying the high quality of development that occurred around the city's larger parks; and

WHEREAS, Most of the houses within the Arlington and Roslyn Place District are rowhouses, largely built in pairs or triplets which, although very similar in outline and mass, are distinguished by variety in materials, details and decorative features, establishing a character of diversity within uniformity for these streets; and

WHEREAS, The builders of these houses were largely professional people or owners of manufacturing concerns, and they commissioned these residences from prominent architects of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Arlington Place and Roslyn Place are very narrow streets that run between the busy commercial thoroughfare of Clark Street and Lakeview Avenue that bounds Lincoln Park between Fullerton Avenue and Diversey Parkway and is largely lined with highrise apartment buildings except in this block between Arlington and Roslyn; and

WHEREAS, This densely developed district forms a unique enclave within the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, The Commission on Chicago Landmarks has concluded that the Arlington and Roslyn Place District is truly important to Chicago and deserves to be preserved, protected, enhanced, rehabilitated and perpetuated, and the Commissioner of Planning of the City of Chicago and the City Council Committee on Historical Landmark Preservation have concurred in the Commission's recommendation that the Arlington and Roslyn Place District be designated as a Chicago Landmark; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Arlington and Roslyn Place District is hereby designated a Chicago Landmark. In the district, the critical features that make an essential contribution to the qualities and characteristics by which the district meets four of the criteria for landmark designation, are all structures, streetscapes and landscapes within the boundaries below. Building interiors are not considered critical features of this district.

The Arlington and Roslyn Place District consists of the properties, both publicly and privately owned, within the following boundaries:

South along this east property line to its intersection with the north property line of 2466 North Lakeview Avenue;

East along this north property line to its coincident intersection with the east line of North Lakeview Avenue;

South along the east line of North Lakeview Avenue to its intersection with a line coincident with the south line of West Arlington Place;

On The South:

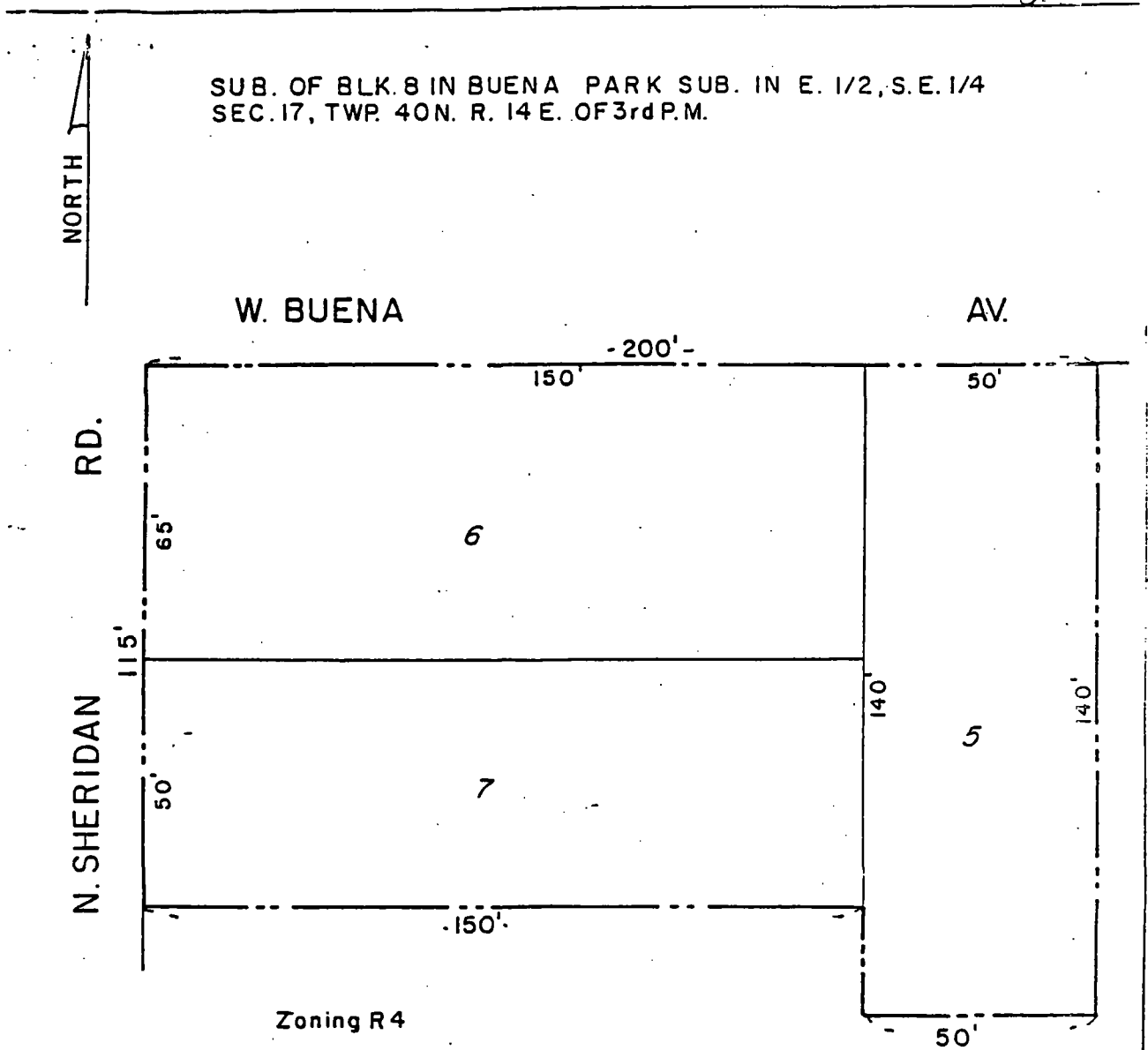

Whereas, The City desires to grant an easement to the M.W.R.D. so that the M.W.R.D. can construct, reconstruct, repair, maintain and operate a 24-inch diameter sewer, together with appurtenances thereto ("Sewer") upon, under, and through all the streets, highways, public alleys, public lands, public rights-of-way and public easements of the City of Chicago within the territorial limits of said City traversed by the right-of-way of said sewer within South Cottage Grove Avenue.

Now, Therefore, In consideration of Ten and no/100 Dollars (\$10.00) and the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereto covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. Recitals.

The foregoing recitals are incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.

Section 2. Grant of Easement.

Subject to the terms, covenants, conditions and reservations of rights herein contained, the City does hereby grant and convey unto the M.W.R.D. an easement for the construction, maintenance and operation of the Sewer for as long as the M.W.R.D. operates Sewer, upon, across, under and through the real property legally described as follows:

the 200-foot strip of the right-of-way of South Cottage Grove Avenue lying 100 feet on either side of a line which is more particularly described as follows:

commencing at the southeast corner of Section 27, Township 37 North, Range 14, East of the Third Principal Meridian; thence northerly along the east line of Section 27 a distance of 1,198.48 feet; thence northwesterly forming an angle of 147 degrees 30 minutes 20 seconds to the right of the last described line a distance of 60.65 feet; thence northeasterly on a line perpendicular to the last described line a distance of 160 feet to the point of beginning on the westerly right-of-way line of South Cottage Grove Avenue; thence northeasterly along the last described line a distance of 40 feet to a point on the easterly right-of-way line of South Cottage Grove Avenue, County of Cook, State of Illinois,

all as shown on a plat marked Exhibit "1A" attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Section 3. Cost.

A. The M.W.R.D. shall pay the cost of changing the location of the police and fire alarm electrical wires of the City and other municipal electrical systems as may be rendered necessary due to the construction of the Sewer. Such changes shall be made by the City in a manner designated by and subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation of the City of Chicago.

B. The Sewer shall be constructed, reconstructed, repaired and efficiently maintained and operated solely by the M.W.R.D. at its sole expense and cost. The City shall not be responsible in any manner for the location or manner of construction, reconstruction, repair or operation of the same.

Section 4. City Approval Of Plans And Specifications.

The City shall have the right to review and approve plans and specifications pertaining to the Sewer prior to the construction or repair of Sewer. All reviews shall be performed in a timely and expeditious manner and approval thereof shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Section 5. Indemnification.

The M.W.R.D. shall indemnify, save and keep harmless the City from any and all claims for damage to real and personal property and injuries to or death suffered by persons by reason of the construction, reconstruction, repair, maintenance, or operation by the M.W.R.D. of the Sewer within the corporate limits of the City of Chicago.

Section 6. Restoration Of Public Way.

A. The M.W.R.D. shall, at its sole cost and expense, restore to their former condition all public ways and elements thereof, as well as drainage structures, within the right-of-way of the Sewer or peripheral thereto which may be disturbed or interfered with by the construction, reconstruction, maintenance, repair or operation of the Sewer. All surplus excavation and other spoil shall be removed from the public way by the M.W.R.D. within a reasonable time.

B. Insofar as is practicable, the M.W.R.D. shall construct and maintain, subject to the approval of the Commissioner of Public Works, temporary bridges for both street and foot traffic until the pavements, walks, and crosswalks removed or disturbed by reason of said construction shall be restored to their former conditions or usefulness.

Section 7. Change In Location Of Utilities.

The City will order and direct all persons, partnerships or corporations who shall at the time of the construction of the Sewer, own, operate, or maintain any conduits, wires, poles, pipes, gas mains, cables, electric, steam, street railway tracks, equipment or other structures within any portion of the streets, public alleys and highways to be excavated in the construction of the Sewer at his, its or their own expense, to make such change in the location of such conduits, wires, poles, pipes, gas mains and cables, electric, steam, and street railway tracks, equipment or other structures as may be rendered necessary by the construction of the Sewer. In the event any expense is charged to or incurred by the City for which the City became legally liable as a result of said relocations, the M.W.R.D. shall repay the City for such expenses. All such work in the public way shall be performed under permits and inspection of the Bureau of Traffic Engineering and Operations. The M.W.R.D. hereby agrees that sufficient notice and information will be provided to all parties so that such changes can be made in an orderly manner.

Section 8. Equipment.

The M.W.R.D. and its contractors are hereby given and granted the right to use such motors, trucks, excavators, hoisting engines and other plant and equipment as may be necessary for the construction of the Sewer.

Section 9. Interruption Of Water Service.

A. In all cases where it shall be necessary to maintain water service or remove, alter, repair, maintain or restore water mains, appurtenances and water pipes in the streets, public alleys and highways of the City of Chicago on account of the construction, repair, maintenance, operation and existence of the Sewer, the City shall maintain such water

service, and shall remove, alter, repair, maintain or restore such water main at the sole cost and expense of the M.W.R.D. The M.W.R.D. shall pay to the City the actual cost of labor, material, and of machinery, trucks and other equipment required and used in the restoration of such water mains, plus an additional charge based upon current prevailing rates for labor, material and equipment, as well as the current approved overhead rates.

B. In any open-cut work done under this Agreement, wherever water pipes or their appurtenances cross through the trench of the Sewer without cutting through its or their cross sections, the M.W.R.D. shall support said water pipes and appurtenances and shall maintain service thereof without interruption until the work is completed. Where, in the opinion of the Engineer of the Department of Water of the City of Chicago, the support of said water pipes, appurtenances and/or water pipes is inadvisable, then said water pipes, appurtenances and/or water pipes shall be cut, removed and restored by the City at the sole expense of the M.W.R.D. Payment of said work shall be in the manner described in the preceding paragraph.

Section 10. Permits.

The City shall issue all required permits without fees or cost therefor to the M.W.R.D. or to any licensed sewer or drain contractor to whom the work or any part thereof specified in this Agreement shall be awarded. The City shall not require payment by the M.W.R.D. of any fees or salaries for inspectors employed by the City on said work. All necessary permits for work in the public way shall be obtained from the Department of Public Works, Bureau of Traffic Engineering and Operations, by the contractor to whom the contract is awarded.

Section 11. Compliance With Other Laws.

The M.W.R.D. agrees that it shall strictly comply with any and all applicable statutes, laws, ordinances, rules and regulations of the City of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois, which in any manner affect this Agreement, any work done hereunder or control or limit in any way the actions of the M.W.R.D., its agents, servants and employees, or of any contractor or subcontractor of the M.W.R.D. or their employees. The M.W.R.D. also agrees that it will coordinate with the Department of Public Works, Bureau of Traffic Engineering and Operations, for traffic maintenance.

Section 12. Termination.

The City reserves the right to terminate this Agreement and cause the M.W.R.D. to

release its rights in the Easement herein granted in the event that the M.W.R.D. ceases to operate the Sewer.

Section 13. Conflict Of Interest.

A. No member of the governing body of the City or the M.W.R.D. who exercises any decision-making authority with regard to this Agreement or any governmental functions or responsibilities in relation to the Sewer and appurtenances thereto to which this Agreement pertains, shall have any personal financial interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement.

B. No member of, or delegate to, the Congress of the United States, and no resident Commissioner, shall be admitted to any share or part of the Agreement, or to any benefit to arise herefrom, if said Agreement and the Sewer to which the Agreement pertains, is funded, in whole or in part, directly or indirectly, by the federal government.

C. The conflict of interest provisions of Executive Order No. 86-1 of the City are hereby incorporated by reference. The City shall provide M.W.R.D. with a copy of the Executive Order upon request.

Section 14. Miscellaneous.

A. Sectional headings in this Agreement are solely for convenience of reference and shall not in any way limit or amplify the terms and provisions thereof.

B. No modification, waiver or amendment of this Agreement shall be binding upon the parties hereto unless such modification, waiver or amendment is in writing and signed by both parties.

C. The parties agree that this Agreement is one of intergovernmental cooperation only and that nothing herein contained is intended or should be construed as in anyway creating or establishing the relationship of partners or joint venturers between the City and the M.W.R.D., or as constituting either party as an agent, representative or employee for the other for the purpose or in any manner whatsoever.

D. This Agreement and any exhibits hereto shall constitute the entire agreement between the parties, and no warranties, inducements, considerations, promises or other inferences shall be implied or impressed upon this Agreement that are not expressly addressed herein.

In Witness Whereof, The City has caused this Agreement to be duly executed in its name and behalf by its Mayor and its seal to be hereunto affixed and attested by its City Clerk, and the M.W.R.D. has signed and sealed this Agreement by its chairman of the Committee on Finance of the Board of Commissioners and attested by its clerk on or as of the day and year first written above.

This recommendation was concurred in by unanimous vote of the members of the committee with no dissenting vote.

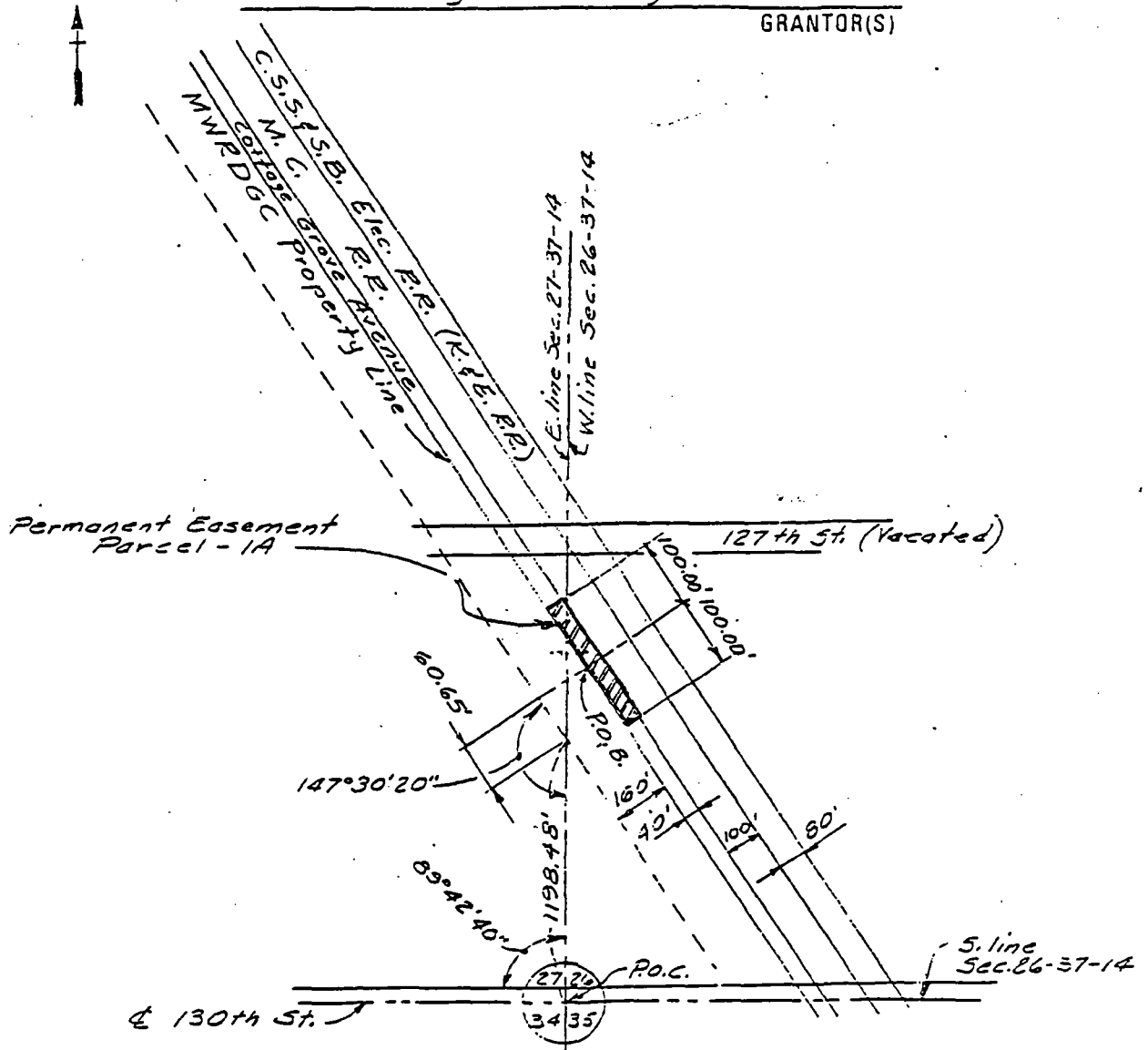

Alderman Beavers moved to reconsider the foregoing vote. The motion was lost.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, SDK Industrial Parks ("SDK") desires a 25-year easement from the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago ("District") to construct, maintain and operate a storm sewer and outfall which discharges into the North Branch of the Chicago River; and

WHEREAS, It is the policy of the District to grant such easements to municipalities and not to private entities; and

WHEREAS, The City is willing to accept the easement provided that all the conditions and obligations required by the District are satisfied by SDK; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Mayor is authorized to execute, and the City Clerk to attest, an Easement Agreement between the City and the District substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit "A", subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality.

SECTION 2. The Mayor is authorized to execute, and the City Clerk to attest, an Agreement between the City, LaSalle National Bank as Trustee, under Trust Number 114228 and SDK substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit "B", subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage.

Exhibits "A" and "B" attached to this ordinance read as follows:

Exhibit "A".

Easement Agreement.

This Agreement, made and entered into this 8th day of September, 1988, by and between the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, (formerly the Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago), a municipal corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois, hereinafter called the "District", and the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation, organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois, hereinafter called the "Grantee".

Whereas, The Grantee desires a 25-year easement, 20-foot by 35-foot, to reconstruct, maintain, operate, repair and remove an 18-inch storm sewer and outfall which discharges into the North Branch of the Chicago River north of Bradley Place and west of Rockwell Avenue in Chicago, Illinois, as legally described and depicted in (Sub)Exhibit "A" which is attached hereto and made a part hereof; which storm sewer and outfall was constructed pursuant to a Right- of-Entry Permit dated May 4, 1989, by and between District and LaSalle National Bank as Trustee, under Trust Agreement dated March 13, 1989 and known as Trust No. 114228 (hereinafter called "LaSalle"); and

Whereas, It is the policy of the District to grant such easements to municipalities and not to private entities; and

Whereas, The District is willing to grant to the Grantee the easement aforesaid, upon the conditions hereinafter set forth.

Now, Therefore, For and in consideration of the representations, covenants, conditions, undertakings and agreements herein made, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Article One.

1.01

The District hereby grants unto the Grantee a non-exclusive easement right, privilege and authority, upon, over, across and through a tract of real estate 20 feet wide and 35 feet long, for a term of 25 years commencing on _____, 1989, and terminating on September 7, 2013, to reconstruct, maintain, operate, repair and remove an 18-inch storm sewer and outfall which discharges into the North Branch of the Chicago River north of Bradley Place and west of Rockwell Avenue in Chicago, Illinois, as legally described and depicted in (Sub)Exhibit "A" which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

1.02

The Grantee covenants and agrees in consideration of the grant of said easement to pay to the District an annual easement fee of \$475.00, which is due and payable on September 8, 1988, receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, and every September 8th, thereafter during the term of this Easement.

Article Two.

2.01

Grantee shall operate, maintain and remove the storm sewer and outfall in a good and workmanlike manner at its sole cost, risk and expense, except as otherwise expressly provided herein.

Article Three.

3.01

The construction and installation of storm sewer and outfall of the Grantee on the subject premises has been completed in accordance with plans and specifications prepared at Grantee's expense and supplied to the District by the Grantee. However, the District will not issue Sewer Connection Authorization Number 88-9902 to Grantee until execution of this Document.

3.02

The construction and installation of the storm sewer and outfall by the Grantee on the subject premises had been done to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of the District.

3.03

The Grantee shall compensate the District for any additional costs that the District may sustain in any future construction of sewers, reservoirs or any other surface or underground structures directly and solely caused by the storm sewer and outfall of the Grantee on the subject premises.

3.04

The Grantee shall relocate or remove the improvements existing or constructed upon the subject premises at no cost to the District:

- a. In the event that the subject premises are adjacent to any channel, waterway or reservoir, and said channel, waterway or reservoir is to be widened by the District or any other governmental agency; or
- b. In the event that any agency of government, having jurisdiction over said channel, waterway or reservoir requires the relocation or removal of said improvements; or
- c. In the event that said relocation or removal is required for cleaning and removal of debris, or for the corporate purposes of the District as set forth in Chapter 42, Ill. Rev. Stat., Section 320 et. seq.

Such relocation or removal shall be done within 60 days after notice thereof is served in writing by the District upon the Grantee. The District shall not be liable for any loss, cost, or damage to the Grantee by reason of such relocation or removal except to the extent caused by the willful or negligent act or omission of the District its agents, employees or contractors.

Article Four.

4.01

The District expressly retains its interest in and rights to the use and occupation of the easement premises subject to the easement rights herein granted, and the District may grant further easements, assign, sell or lease the same to other parties subject to the Grantee's right of use and a reasonable means of access to said storm sewer and outfall for its operation, relocation, maintenance or removal.

4.02

The Grantee shall be solely responsible for and shall defend, indemnify, keep and save harmless the District, its agents, officials and employees against all losses, damages, claims, patent claims, liens, suits, liabilities, judgments, costs or expenses which may in anywise accrue, directly or indirectly, against the District, its Commissioners, agents,

officials or employees in consequence of the granting of this Easement, or which may in anywise result therefrom or from any work done thereunder except to the extent occasioned by the willful or negligent act or omission of the District, its agents, employees or contractors. The Grantee shall, at Grantee's sole expense, appear, defend and pay all reasonable charges of attorneys and all costs and other reasonable expenses arising from the foregoing acts or omissions or incurred in connection therewith, and if any judgment shall be rendered against the District, its Commissioners, agents, officials or employees in any such action, the Grantee shall, at Grantee's sole expense, satisfy and discharge the same, provided that Grantee shall first have been given prior notice of the suit in which judgment has been or shall be rendered, Grantee shall have been given an opportunity to defend the same and the District shall have given Grantee its full cooperation. Grantee expressly understands and agrees that any performance bond or insurance protection required by this Easement, or otherwise provided by Grantee, shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify, keep and save harmless and defend the District as herein provided.

4.03

The Grantee, prior to entering upon said premises and using the same for purposes for which this Easement is granted shall procure, maintain and keep in force, at Grantee's expense, public liability and property damage insurance in which the District, its Commissioners, officers, agents and employees, are a named insured from a company to be approved by the District, said policy with limits of not less than:

Bodily Injury Liability

Property Damage Liability

\$3,000,000.00

\$1,000,000.00

Grantee shall furnish to the District certificates of such insurance or other suitable evidence that such insurance coverage has been procured and is maintained in full force and effect. Such insurance shall provide that no change, modification in or cancellation of any insurance shall become effective until the expiration of ten (10) days after written notice thereof shall have been given by the insurance company to the District. The provisions of this paragraph shall in no wise limit the liability of the Grantee as set forth under the provisions of paragraph 4.02, above.

Article Five.

5.01

In the event of any default on the part of the Grantee to faithfully keep and perform all and singular the covenants, agreements and undertakings herein agreed by it to be kept and performed, or if said storm sewer and outfall are abandoned, the District shall give the Grantee notice in writing of such default or abandonment, and if such default or abandonment shall not have been rectified within sixty (60) days after receipt of such notice by the Grantee, all rights and privileges granted herein by the District to the Grantee may be terminated by the District, and upon such termination the Grantee shall immediately vacate the easement premises and remove its storm sewer and outfall from said real estate and restore the land to its original condition, reasonable wear and tear and damage by fire or other casualty excepted, all at the sole cost of the Grantee; provided, however, in the event such default cannot be cured within said sixty (60) day period and Grantee has commenced cure efforts, the time period to cure shall be extended for the period reasonably necessary to cure the same.

5.02

The Grantee shall have the right to give the District written notice to cease and terminate all rights and privileges under this agreement which termination shall be effective upon giving of said notice. In the event of such termination, the Grantee shall have a period of 120 days from and after such termination date to remove the _____ and to restore the land to its original condition, reasonable wear and tear and damage by fire or other casualty excepted, at no cost to the District. The expiration of said removal period shall in no event extend beyond the expiration date of this Easement.

5.03

Grantee understands and agrees that upon the expiration of the 25-year term of this Easement, Grantee shall remove or cause to be removed its storm sewer and outfall and any other things which Grantee has erected or placed upon said easement premises. Grantee further agrees to yield up said easement premises in as good condition as when the same was entered upon by Grantee, reasonable wear and tear and damage by fire or other casualty excepted. Upon Grantee's failure so to do, the District may do so at the sole expense and cost of Grantee provided such costs are reasonable.

Article Six.

6.01

Except to the extent caused by the willful or negligent act or omission of the District or its respective agents, employees or contractors, the Grantee also agrees that if the District incurs any additional expense for additional work which the District would not have had to incur if this easement had not been executed, then, in that event, the Grantee agrees to pay to the District such additional expense as determined by the Chief Engineer of the District, promptly upon rendition of bills therefor to the Grantee.

6.02

The Grantee covenants and agrees that it will reimburse the District, make all necessary repairs at its sole cost and expense and otherwise keep and save harmless the District from any loss, cost or expense arising out of the granting of this easement suffered to property of the District by way of damage to or destruction thereof, caused by any act or omission of the Grantee, Grantee's agents, employees, contractors, subcontractors.

6.03

Except to the extent occasioned by the willful or negligent acts or omissions of the District, its agents, employees or contractors, during the term of this easement, the District shall not be liable to the Grantee for any loss, cost or expense which the Grantee shall sustain by reason of any damage to its property or business caused by or growing out of the construction, repair, reconstruction, maintenance, existence, operation or failure of any of the sewers, structures, channels or other works or equipment of the District now located or to be constructed on said premises, or on the land of the District adjacent to the east of said premises.

Article Seven.

7.01

Grantee shall obtain such permits as may be necessary from the Illinois Department of Transportation, the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, and any other governmental or regulatory body having jurisdiction over Grantee or its activities hereunder.

7.02

Any notice herein provided to be given shall be deemed properly served if delivered in writing personally or mailed by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, to the District in care of the General Superintendent, 100 East Erie Street, Chicago, Illinois 60611, or to the Grantee, City of Chicago, 121 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois 60602, with a copy to Mr. Gary Rito, Draper and Kramer, Incorporated, 33 West Monroe Street, Suite 1900, Chicago, Illinois 60603, with a copy to Slough Parks, Incorporated, One First National Plaza, Suite 3900, Chicago, Illinois 60603, Attention: Mr. Mark Lindsay, or to such other persons or addresses as either party may from time to time designate in writing.

Article Eight.

8.01

Grantee covenants and agrees that it shall strictly comply with any and all statutes, laws, ordinances and regulations of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, the United States of America, the State of Illinois, the county, and the city, village, town, or municipality in which the premises is located, which in any manner affect the easement, the easement premises or Grantee's activities on or with respect to the easement premises pursuant to the rights conferred herein.

8.04

The Grantee will preserve and protect bank, vegetation, etc., and shall restore all disturbed areas to the original condition, reasonable wear and tear and damage by fire or other casualty excepted. The bank shall have original slope with appropriate vegetation to provide original hydraulic capacity and stability during high river water levels.

8.05

The Grantee will keep the premises neat and clean.

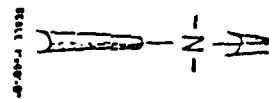
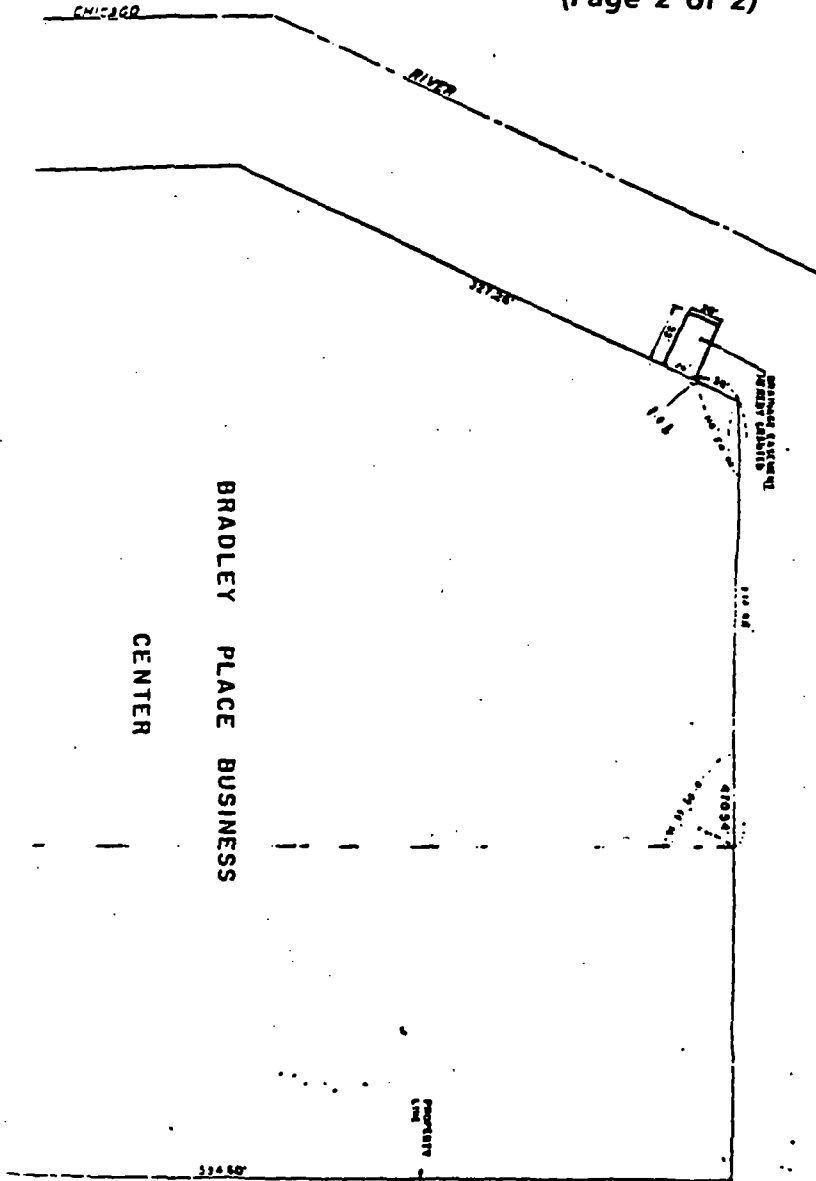

Agreement.

This Agreement is entered into on or as of the _____ day of _____, 1989, by and between the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation ("City") and LaSalle National Bank, not individually but as Trustee, under Trust Agreement dated March 18, 1989, and known as Trust No. 114228 (the "Trust") and SDK Industrial Parks, an Illinois joint venture ("SDK"), the beneficiary of the Trust (the Trust and SDK being hereinafter collectively referred to as "LaSalle").

Recitals.

Whereas, LaSalle has heretofore constructed and installed pursuant to that certain Right of Entry Permit dated May 4, 1989, by and between LaSalle, the City and the District (as hereinafter defined), an 18-inch storm sewer and outfall line in the area legally described as (Sub)Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part hereof ("Premises") which storm sewer and outfall line discharges into the North Branch of the Chicago River, north of Bradley Place and west of Rockwell Avenue in Chicago, Illinois; and

Whereas, LaSalle desires a 25-year easement from the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago ("District") to reconstruct, maintain, operate, repair and remove said storm sewer and outfall line; and

Whereas, It is the policy of the District to grant such easements to municipalities and not to private entities; and

Whereas, The District is willing to grant the aforesaid easement to the City upon the conditions set forth in that certain Easement Agreement entered into between the City and the District contemporaneously herewith; and

Whereas, The City is willing to accept the aforesaid easement upon the conditions set forth herein.

Now, Therefore, In consideration of the representations, covenants, conditions, undertakings and agreements herein made, the parties hereto agree as follows:

Article One.

1.01

LaSalle covenants and agrees to pay to the District an annual fee of \$475.00, which is due and payable on September 8, 1988 (receipt of which has been acknowledged by the District under the Easement Agreement) and every September 8th thereafter during the term of this Agreement.

Article Two.

2.01

LaSalle shall operate, maintain and remove the storm sewer and outfall line in a good and workmanlike manner at its sole cost, risk and expense except as otherwise expressly provided herein.

Article Three.

3.01

The parties agree and acknowledge that the construction and installation of the storm sewer and outfall line has been completed in accordance with plans and specifications prepared at LaSalle's expense and supplied by LaSalle to the City; provided, however, it is understood that the District will not issue Sewer Connection Authorization Number 88-9902 until execution of the Easement Agreement by the City and the District.

3.02

The parties agree and acknowledge that construction of the storm sewer and outfall line by LaSalle on the Premises has been done to the satisfaction of the Chief Engineer of the District.

3.03

LaSalle shall compensate the City or the District for any additional costs that the City or the District may sustain in any future construction of sewers, reservoirs or any other

surface or underground structures directly and solely caused by LaSalle's storm sewer and outfall line on the Premises.

3.04

LaSalle shall relocate or remove the improvements existing or constructed on the Premises at no cost to the City or the District:

- a. In the event that the Premises are adjacent to any channel, waterway or reservoir, and said channel, waterway or reservoir is to be widened by the District or any other governmental agency; or
- b. In the event that any agency of government, having jurisdiction over said channel, waterway or reservoir requires the relocation or removal of said improvements; or
- c. In the event that said relocation or removal is required for cleaning and removal of debris or for the corporate purposes of the District as set forth in Chapter 42, Ill. Rev. Stat., Section 320 et. seq.

Such relocation or removal shall be done within 60 days after notice thereof is served in writing by the City or the District upon LaSalle. The City or the District shall not be liable for any loss, cost or damage to LaSalle by reason of such relocation or removal except to the extent caused by the willful or negligent act or omission of the City, the District or their respective agents, employees or contractors.

3.05

Detailed plans of subsequent construction or material alteration of the storm sewer and outfall line shall first be submitted to the Chief Engineer of the District for approval, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld or unduly delayed. Work on such construction shall not begin until such reasonable approval is given to LaSalle in writing.

Article Four.

4.01

The City and the District expressly retain their interest in and rights to the use and occupation of the Premises subject to the rights herein granted, and the City or the District may grant further easements, assign, sell or lease the same to other parties subject to

LaSalle's right of use and a reasonable means of access to said storm sewer and outfall line for its operation, relocation, maintenance or removal.

4.02

Except to the extent caused by the willful or negligent act or omission of the City, the District or their respective agents, employees, or contractors, LaSalle shall be solely responsible for and shall defend, indemnify, keep and save harmless the City and the District, its agents, officials and employees against all losses, damages, patent claims, liens, suits, liabilities, judgments, reasonable costs or expenses which may in any way accrue, directly or indirectly against the City or the District, its Commissioners, agents, officials or employees in consequence of the granting of the rights herein granted, or which result therefrom or from any work done thereunder. Except to the extent caused by the willful or negligent act or omission of the City, the District or their respective agents, employees and contractors, LaSalle shall, at its sole expense, appear, defend and pay all reasonable charges of attorneys and all reasonable costs and expenses arising therefrom or incurred in connection therewith, and if any judgment shall be rendered against the City or the District, its Commissioners, agents, officials or employees in any such action, LaSalle shall, at its sole expense, satisfy and discharge the same, provided that it shall first have been given prior notice of the suit in which judgment has been or shall be rendered, and shall have been first given an opportunity to defend the same. LaSalle expressly understands and agrees that any performance bond or insurance protection required by this Agreement, or otherwise provided by LaSalle, shall in no way limit the responsibility to indemnify, keep and save harmless and defend the City and the District as herein provided.

4.03

LaSalle, prior to entering on the Premises and using the same for the purposes for which this Agreement is granted, shall procure, maintain and keep in force, at LaSalle's expense, public liability and property damage insurance in which the City and the District, its Commissioner, officers and agents are named as additional insureds from a company to be reasonably approved by the City and the District, said policy with limits not less than:

Bodily Injury Liability

Property Damage Liability

\$3,000,000.00

\$1,000,000.00

LaSalle shall furnish to the City and the District certificates of such insurance or other suitable evidence that such insurance coverage has been procured and is maintained in full force and effect. Such insurance shall provide that no change, modification in or cancellation of any insurance shall become effective until the expiration of ten (10) days

after written notice thereof shall have been given by the insurance company to the City and the District. The provisions of this paragraph shall in no way limit the liability of LaSalle as set forth under the provisions of paragraph 4.02, above.

Article Five.

5.01

In the event of any default on the part of LaSalle to faithfully keep and perform the covenant, agreements and undertakings herein agreed by it to be kept and performed, or if the storm sewer and outfall line are abandoned, the City or the District shall give LaSalle notice in writing of such default or abandonment, and if such default or abandonment shall not have been rectified within sixty (60) days after receipt of such notice by LaSalle, all rights and privileges granted herein by the City to LaSalle may be terminated by the City and upon such termination LaSalle shall immediately vacate the Premises and remove its storm sewer and outfall line from the real estate and restore the Premises to its original condition, reasonable wear and tear, and damage by fire or other casualty excepted, all at the sole cost of LaSalle; provided, however, in the event such default cannot be cured within said sixty (60) day period and LaSalle has commenced cure efforts, the time period for LaSalle to cure shall be extended for the period necessary to cure the same with due diligence.

5.02

LaSalle shall have the right to give the City and the District written notice to cease and terminate all rights and privileges under this Agreement which termination shall be effective upon the giving of said notice. In the event of such termination, LaSalle shall have a period of one hundred twenty (120) days from and after such termination date to remove the storm sewer and outfall line and to restore the land to its original condition, reasonable wear and tear, and damage by fire or other casualty excepted, at no cost to the City or the District. The expiration of said removal period shall in no event extend beyond the expiration date of this Agreement.

5.03

LaSalle understands and agrees that upon the expiration of this Agreement, LaSalle shall remove or cause to be removed its storm sewer and outfall line and any other things which LaSalle has erected or placed upon the Premises. LaSalle further agrees to yield up the Premises in as good a condition as when the same was entered upon by LaSalle, reasonable wear and tear, and damage by fire and other casualty excepted. Upon LaSalle's

failure so to do, the City or the District may do so, at the sole cost and expense of LaSalle provided such costs are reasonable.

Article Six.

6.01

Except to the extent caused by the willful or negligent act or omission of the City, the District or their respective agents, employees or contractors, LaSalle agrees that if the City or the District incurs any additional expense for additional work which the City or the District would not have had to incur if this Agreement had not been executed, then, in that event LaSalle agrees to pay to the City or the District such additional expense as reasonably determined by the City or the Chief Engineer of the District, promptly upon rendition of bills therefor to LaSalle.

6.02

LaSalle covenants and agrees that it will reimburse the City and the District, make all necessary repairs at its sole cost and expense and otherwise keep and save harmless the City and the District from any loss, cost or expense arising out of the execution of this Agreement suffered to any property of the City or the District caused by any act or omission of LaSalle, its agents, employees or contractors.

6.03

Except to the extent caused by the willful or negligent act or omission of the City, the District or their respective agents, employees or contractors during the term of this Agreement, the City or the District shall not be liable to LaSalle for any loss, cost or expense which LaSalle may sustain by reason of any damage to its property or business caused by or growing out of the construction, repair, reconstruction, maintenance, existence, operation or failure of any of the sewers, structures, channels or other works or equipment of the City or the District now located or to be constructed on the Premises or on the land of the District adjacent and to the east of the Premises.

Article Seven.

7.01

Any notice herein provided to be given shall be deemed properly served if delivered in writing personally or mailed by registered or certified mail, postage prepaid, to the District in care of the General Superintendent, 100 East Erie Street, Chicago, Illinois 60611; to the City in care of the Commissioner of Economic Development, 24 East Congress Parkway, Chicago, Illinois 60605; and to LaSalle in care of Mr. Gary Rito, Draper and Kramer, Incorporated, 33 West Monroe Street, Suite 2600, Chicago, Illinois 60603 with a copy to: Slough Parks, Incorporated, One First National Plaza, Suite 3900, Chicago, Illinois 60603, Attention: Mr. Mark Lindsay. Notices shall be effective two (2) business days following the posting thereof, or if delivered personally then upon such delivery.

Article Eight.

8.01

LaSalle shall obtain such permits as may be necessary for its operations at the Premises from the Illinois Department of Transportation, the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers, and any other governmental or regulatory body having jurisdiction over the City or the Premises.

8.02

LaSalle covenants and agrees that it shall comply with any and all statutes, laws, ordinances and regulations of the District, the United States of America, the State of Illinois, the County of Cook and the City which in any manner affect this Agreement.

8.03

LaSalle agrees to preserve and protect the bank, vegetation, et cetera, and shall restore all disturbed areas to the original condition, reasonable wear and tear, and damage by fire or other casualty excepted. The bank shall have original slope with appropriate vegetation to provide original hydraulic capacity and stability during high levels.

8.04

LaSalle will keep the Premises neat and clean.

Article Nine.

9.01

This Agreement shall terminate upon the termination of the easement granted by the District to the City.

Article Ten.

10.1

This Agreement is executed by LaSalle National Bank, not personally but as Trustee aforesaid, in the exercise of the power and authority conferred upon and vested in it as such Trustee, and under the express direction of the beneficiary of a certain Trust Agreement dated March 13, 1989, and known as Trust Number 114228 at LaSalle National Bank, to all provisions of which Trust Agreement this Agreement is expressly made subject. It is expressly understood and agreed that nothing in this Agreement contained shall be construed as creating any liability whatsoever against said Trustee personally, or said beneficiary and in particular without limiting the generality of the foregoing, there shall be no personal liability to perform any covenant, either express or implied, or warranty herein contained, or to keep, preserve or sequester any property of said Trust, and that all personal liability of said Trustee (and said beneficiary to the extent permitted by law) of every sort, if any, is hereby expressly waived by the City and the District, and by every person now or hereafter claiming any right hereunder.

EXECUTION OF LEASE AGREEMENT WITH CHICAGO MILWAUKEE

The following is said ordinance as passed:

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That the Commissioner of General Services is authorized to execute on behalf of the City of Chicago, a lease from Chicago Milwaukee Corporation, a Delaware corporation, as Lessor, for approximately 130,500 square feet of vacant land located at West Evergreen and North Hickory Avenues, for use as a salt station by the Department of Streets and Sanitation, as Lessee, such lease to be approved by the Commissioner of the Department of Streets and Sanitation and to be approved as to form and legality by the Corporation Counsel in substantially the following form:

[Lease Agreement immediately follows Section 2 of this ordinance.]

SECTION 2. This ordinance shall be effective from and after the date of its passage.

Lease Agreement attached to this ordinance reads as follows:

Lease No. _____

This Lease is made this ____ day of _____, 1989, by and between Chicago Milwaukee Corporation, a Delaware corporation, having an office at 547 West Jackson Boulevard, Suite 1510, Chicago, Illinois 60606 (hereinafter referred to as "C.M.C.") and City of Chicago, Department of Streets and Sanitation, with an address of 121 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois 60602 (hereinafter referred to as "Tenant"), who hereby mutually covenant and agree as follows:

- 1) Grant. C.M.C., for and in consideration of the rents herein reserved and of the covenants and agreements herein contained on the part of Tenant to be performed, hereby leases to Tenant, and Tenant hereby leases from C.M.C. the property, together with improvements thereon, if any, situated in the municipality of Chicago, in the County of Cook, and State of Illinois, as represented in gray shading on the print marked Exhibit A which is attached hereto and made a part hereof (said property, together with improvements thereon or to be placed thereon, if any, hereinafter called "Premises").
- 2) Term. This lease shall be effective from the 15th day of October, 1988, to the 1st day of April, 1990, unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided.
- 3) Termination. Irrespective of the terms of this lease, either C.M.C. or the Tenant may terminate this lease at any time by giving to the other party fifteen (15) days notice in writing, or as otherwise provided herein.

- 4) Violation. In case of violation of any provision of this lease or default by either party hereto, the non-violating party may, after five (5) days notice in writing and if the violation or default is not remedied within the five (5) day period, terminate this lease, and this means of termination shall be binding upon the parties hereto in lieu of any notice that may be required by statute.
- 5) Use. The Premises are to be occupied by the Tenant and used exclusively for the following purposes:

Salt Storage.

- 6) Rental. As rent for the Premises, Tenant shall pay C.M.C. for the term annually, in advance, the sum of One Dollar-Receipt Acknowledged Dollars (\$1.00 R/A). Payment must be made promptly on or before the date due. Tenant shall pay to C.M.C., simultaneously with its execution hereof, the rent due for the term hereby created.
- 7) Security Deposit. Pay no security deposit.
- 8) Utilities. Tenant agrees to pay or cause to be paid as additional rental hereunder all charges for gas, water, electricity, light, air-conditioning, heat or power, telephone or other communication service used, rendered or supplied upon or in connection with the Premises throughout the term of this lease, and to defend and indemnify C.M.C. and save it harmless against any liability or damage on such account. Tenant shall also, at its sole cost and expense, procure any and all necessary permits, licenses, or other authorizations required for the lawful and proper installation and maintenance upon the Premises of wires, pipes, conduits, meters, tubes and other equipment and appliances for use in supplying any such services to and upon the Premises, which may be required.
- 9) Payments. All payments due C.M.C. under this agreement, shall be made to Treasurer, Chicago Milwaukee Corporation, 547 West Jackson Boulevard, Suite 1510, Chicago, Illinois 60606, or as C.M.C. may otherwise direct by written notice to Tenant.
- 10) Regulatory Compliance. The Tenant agrees that all provisions of law or ordinances applicable to its use of the Premises shall be fully observed at Tenant's sole cost and expense, and the Tenant will not do, nor permit to be done, upon or about the Premises anything forbidden by law or ordinances or the rules and regulations of C.M.C. now in force or which may hereafter be adopted.
- 11) Maintenance and Repairs. Tenant covenants throughout the term of this lease, at Tenant's sole cost and expense, (i) to take good care of the Premises, which shall include, but not be limited to, the mowing of grass, control of weeds and care of shrubbery and (ii) to keep said Premises, including

buildings and improvements now or at any time erected thereon, in good condition and repair. All work done in connection with any repairs or alterations shall be done in good workmanlike manner and in compliance with building and zoning ordinances, and with all other applicable laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and requirements of all federal, state and municipal governments or appropriate departments, commissions, boards and officers thereof, and in accordance with the rules, orders and regulations of the fire underwriters. In making any repairs, Tenant covenants and agrees that it will not permit any mechanic's lien or liens to be placed upon the Premises or any building or improvements thereon, and in the case of filing of any such lien Tenant shall promptly discharge the same. If any such liens are so filed, C.M.C. at its election, may pay and satisfy same and in such event the sums so paid by C.M.C. with interest thereon at the rate set forth in paragraph 30 hereof from the date of payment shall be deemed to be additional rent due and payable by Tenant at once without notice or demand.

- 12) Easements. C.M.C. reserves the right to grant such easements and to cause such improvements to be placed upon the Premises as C.M.C. may deem necessary or desirable, including but not restricted to power, gas, telephone, water, storm and sanitary sewers and railroad tracks; provided, however, that no easements shall be granted which will unreasonably interfere with the use by Tenant of the Premises herein demised. C.M.C. shall not in any event be liable for inconvenience, annoyance, disturbance, loss of business or other damage to Tenant by reason of making such improvements, and the obligations of Tenant under this lease shall not thereby be affected in any manner whatsoever.
- 13) Constructions and Additions. Tenant shall not construct any building or other structure, nor make any material alterations, improvements or additions to the Premises without prior written approval by C.M.C.
- 14) Interruption of Use. C.M.C. shall not be liable for any damage compensation or claim by reason of inconvenience, annoyance or interruption in the use of said Premises, whether caused by fire or any other cause, or from the termination of this lease pursuant to any of the provisions hereof.
- 15) Fire and Other Casualties. The Tenant releases C.M.C., its agents and employees, from all liability for loss or damage caused by fire or other casualty by reason of any injury to or destruction of any real or personal property of any kind, owned by the Tenant, or in which the Tenant is interested, which now is or may hereafter be placed on any part of the Premises.

Tenant further agrees to indemnify and hold harmless C.M.C., its agents and employees, from and against all loss or damage to person or property, including the person or property of the parties hereto, arising from fire or other casualty originating on the leased Premises.

- 16) **Abandonment.** An abandonment of the Premises by the Tenant shall operate as an absolute and immediate termination of this lease at the sole option of C.M.C. Failure of the Tenant to occupy or use the Premises for the purposes hereinbefore mentioned for ninety (90) days at any one time shall be deemed an abandonment thereof.
- 17) **Display of Signs.** The Tenant agrees that no part of the Premises shall be used for display of signs or advertisements other than those that may be connected with the business of the Tenant, and such signs or advertisements relating to Tenant's business shall be subject to the approval of C.M.C. It is agreed that the Tenant shall not allow others to post bills or signs thereon. However, C.M.C. reserves unto itself, its designees, grantees, heirs, successors and assigns, the right to enter onto and erect upon the Premises any signs, billboards, displays, advertisements, or similar structures, so long as Tenant's use of the Premises is not unreasonably interfered with. Any rents, revenues, commissions, or other monies earned by C.M.C. shall accrue solely to C.M.C., the Tenant not being entitled to all or any part of such earnings.
- 18) **Liability.** The Tenant agrees to defend, indemnify and hold harmless C.M.C., its agents, employees, contractors, invitees and licensees, from and against any and all claims, demands, expenses, liabilities, or causes of action arising out of injury to or death of any of the parties hereto and their agents, employees, contractors, invitees and licensees, or injury to or death of any other person or persons, or loss of or damage to property of any of the parties hereto and their agents, employees, contractors, invitees and licensees, or loss of or damage to the property of any other person or persons while on or about the said Premises, when such injury, death, loss or damage arises from or is connected with (1) any act or omission to act on the part of the Tenant, its agents, employees, contractors, invitees, licensees, designees, heirs and successors; (2) any condition whatsoever on the Premises no matter how such condition was or may be caused; or (3) any injury or death to any person or persons or loss of or damage to any property caused by locomotives, if any, operated upon or in the vicinity of the Premises. The words "person or persons" as used herein, shall include individuals, partnerships, firms, trusts, associations and corporations or any form of business entity.
- 19) **Failure of Title.** In consideration of the privilege hereby given the Tenant to occupy and use the Premises hereunder leased, and the benefits and privileges to be derived therefrom, the Tenant, in addition to payment of rental as hereinbefore provided, hereby releases C.M.C. from all liability for damage by reason of want or failure at any time of title or possession on the part of C.M.C. to any part of the Premises.
- 20) **Rights and Duties Upon Termination.** Upon the termination of this lease, all rights of the Tenant hereunder shall absolutely cease, and upon or prior to such termination the Tenant shall surrender the Premises to the possession of C.M.C. in substantially the same condition as the Premises were in on the commencement of the term hereof (or, with respect to buildings or structures

placed on the Premises during the term hereof by Tenant and subject to the provisions of the next succeeding two paragraphs, in substantially the same condition as such buildings or structures were in on the date such buildings or structures were so placed and completed), reasonable wear and tear and loss by casualty excepted. No termination of this lease shall affect the liabilities or obligations of either party (whether of payment of rent, indemnification or other) which may have accrued prior to such termination. Acceptance of rental in advance by C.M.C. shall not operate as a waiver of C.M.C.'s right to terminate this lease as herein provided, whether such acceptance is made before or after notice of termination has been given as herein provided.

Should this lease be terminated by either party by written notice as hereinbefore provided and prior to the time of which said rental has been paid, C.M.C. hereby agrees to refund on demand to the Tenant any unearned rental heretofore paid unless such termination is caused by a violation of or default by Tenant under any of the terms and conditions contained herein.

In case the Tenant, within ten (10) days from the expiration of this agreement, either by lapse of time, by abandonment or any other means provided for herein, shall fail to remove from the Premises herein leased any and all property, real, personal or mixed, owned or controlled by Tenant, Tenant hereby agrees that C.M.C., at its sole option, may upon written notice to Tenant, use, dispose of, wreck, sell, lease, remove, or otherwise deal with said property entirely as C.M.C. wishes, free and clear of all liens, encumbrances or claim of ownership of Tenant or others or C.M.C., at its sole option, may require Tenant to remove all or any part of said property, including but not limited to buildings, foundations, fixtures or personalty. Without limiting the provisions of the preceding sentence, upon the request of C.M.C., Tenant also shall remove, within the said ten (10) day period, any building or structure Tenant has placed on the Premises.

If C.M.C. elects to have any property referred to in the preceding paragraph removed, disposed of or wrecked, and Tenant shall fail to do so within ten (10) days from the expiration of this agreement, whether by lapse of time, by abandonment or by notice of termination as provided for herein, C.M.C. may, at its option, effect such removal, disposal or wreckage. Tenant hereby agrees to pay the cost thereof, net of the salvage value of said property, if any.

Upon the termination of this lease in any manner, the Tenant will surrender possession to the said C.M.C. or its authorized agents, peaceably and without delay, and in case of any failure to do so, the Tenant shall be guilty of forcible entry and detainer of said Premises, and no notice to quit or demand of possession shall be necessary to sustain such action, but all such notices are hereby waived by Tenant or by anyone in privity with Tenant.

If Tenant shall fail to deliver possession of the Premises in accordance with the provisions of this lease upon or prior to the termination of this lease,

Tenant shall pay, as liquidated damages for each day such possession is withheld, twice the rent payable for the last day of the term hereof. The provisions of the preceding sentence shall not operate as a waiver by C.M.C. of any right of re- entry provided for herein nor shall the receipt of said rent or any part hereof or any other act in apparent affirmance of tenancy operate as a waiver of the right to terminate this lease or as a recognition of a new or extended tenancy of Tenant.

- 21) Assignment. This lease shall not be assigned, nor shall said Premises, nor any part thereof, be sublet, nor shall the Tenant consent that the same be used or occupied by any party other than the Tenant without the written consent of C.M.C. Tenant shall not be released from any obligations hereunder due to such assignment or subletting.
- 22) Notices. Any notice from C.M.C. to Tenant, or Tenant to C.M.C., shall be deemed duly served if mailed by certified mail, return receipt requested, to Tenant at the Premises and, in addition, to the Supervisor of Leasing, Bureau of Asset Management, Department of General Services, 320 North Clark Street, Suite 505, Chicago, Illinois 60610 or at such other place as the Lessee from time to time may appoint in writing in which event the notice or demand shall be deemed to have been served at the time copies are received at said locations hereof, or if to C.M.C., c/o Sales and Property Management, Chicago Milwaukee Corporation, 547 West Jackson Boulevard, Suite 1510, Chicago, Illinois 60606, and the customary certified mail receipt shall be evidence of such service. Either party hereto may change the address to which said notices shall be sent by giving written notice of such change to the other party hereto, as provided, but unless such notice of change is given to the other party, notices will be deemed served upon proof of proper mailing to the above address, or personal service of any such written notice may be made in lieu of service by mail, provided that such personal notice is made upon an officer or designated agent of either party hereto.
- 23) Hazardous Commodities. The Tenant further agrees that it shall not store or keep or allow any other person to store or keep, in any quantity or amount whatsoever, on or within the Premises during the term of this lease, any article of any kind which is of an extra hazardous or of an explosive, combustible or flammable nature, or is deemed a hazardous waste or hazardous chemical under applicable environmental protection laws, without the express written consent of C.M.C. Without limiting the provisions of the previous sentence, unless authorized under paragraph 5 of this lease, the loading, storage, and/or unloading of flammable liquids, chlorine, liquified petroleum gas, flammable compressed gases, and/or anhydrous ammonia is hereby expressly prohibited.
- 24) Environmental. Tenant agrees that in the use and occupancy of the Premises, Tenant will comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws, ordinances, standards, regulations or permit requirements relating to environmental pollution or contamination, and Tenant agrees to protect, defend, indemnify and hold harmless C.M.C., its officers, directors,

employees, agents, designees, successors, heirs and assigns from any and all claims, demands, lawsuits, or liability or loss, fines, damage, injury and death, and all expenses and costs, including reasonable attorneys' fees, resulting from the violation of any law, ordinance, standard, regulation or permit requirement relating to environmental pollution or contamination. It is expressly understood and agreed that this indemnity, as the same relates to environmental pollution or contamination, shall survive the expiration, termination, and any and all extensions and assignments of this lease.

- 25) **Insolvency and Damages.** In the event the Tenant shall be adjudged bankrupt, or file a petition for an arrangement with his creditors under the bankruptcy act, or shall voluntarily offer to creditors terms of composition, or in case a receiver shall be appointed to take charge of and conduct the affairs of the Tenant, then and upon the happening of any such events, and unless the trustee in bankruptcy or receiver or such creditors shall immediately thereafter assume and shall fulfill the Tenant's obligations hereunder, C.M.C. may, without notice to Tenant or anyone else, terminate this lease, and, in the event of such termination, C.M.C. shall have and shall be allowed, as a provable claim in such bankruptcy, or creditors, or receivership proceeding, damages for Tenant's breach of this lease, in an amount equal to the rent reserved in this lease for the residue of the term hereof.
- 26) **Eminent Domain.** In the event of a taking by right of eminent domain of all or any part of the Premises during the existence of this lease, or of the occurrence of any acts of a public authority giving rise to an action for damages to the Premises or any improvements hereafter placed on the Premises by Tenant, the Tenant shall have the right to the compensation awarded or paid for such taking or damage to the extent only of the value of, or damages to, the buildings, machinery, structures, fixtures and other improvements placed or erected thereon by the Tenant valued as then affixed to or used in connection with the Premises, and Tenant shall have no right to the compensation awarded or paid for such taking or damage to the land itself, or other improvements, if any, all compensation awarded or paid for such taking or damage to the land or other improvements, as distinguished from the improvements placed or erected thereon by the Tenant, shall inure to C.M.C. only. The phrase "taking by right of eminent domain" as used herein shall include a statutory proceeding to effect condemnation, a sale to an authority which would commence condemnation proceedings but for such sale, and where the Premises has been effectively taken, substantially interfered with, or taken without just compensation, such that C.M.C. has the right to file an inverse condemnation action. The term of this lease shall cease from the date possession is delivered to such condemning authority and Tenant shall have no claim for the value of any unexpired term of the lease. In no event shall the Tenant have any rights or interest in any value attributed to the land or leasehold.
- 27) **Insurance.** Tenant acknowledges that it is self-insured.

- 28) Clarification of Indemnity. It is agreed between the parties hereto that all references to indemnification in this agreement include but are not limited to attorney's fees and court costs.
- 29) No Offsets. Any claims or obligations whatsoever which may be owed Tenant by C.M.C. shall not be offset against any of Tenant's obligations under the terms of this lease.
- 30) Interest on Overdue Payments. Anything to the contrary herein contained notwithstanding, nonpayment of rentals and other obligations on the due date hereunder shall result in the charge to an obligation on the part of Tenant to pay interest at the highest rate which is legally enforceable on the overdue rentals and other obligations, for the period of time during which they remain unpaid; and, in addition, Tenant shall be liable for attorneys' fees and costs incurred by C.M.C. in connection therewith. C.M.C.'s right to interest and its charge therefor shall not constitute a waiver of any other right or remedy which C.M.C. has hereunder or pursuant to law.
- 31) Execution of Lease by C.M.C. The submission of this document for examination and negotiation does not constitute an offer to lease, or a reservation of, or option for the Premises, and this document shall become effective and binding only upon the execution and delivery hereof by C.M.C. to Tenant. All negotiations, considerations, representations and understandings between C.M.C. and Tenant are incorporated herein.
- 32) All the covenants, terms, conditions, rights and obligations herein shall inure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto and their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns.
- 33) In the event of Lessee's breach of this lease, or a violation of any of Lessee's covenants, obligations and restrictions under this lease, Lessor has the right, but not the obligation, to file an action or actions against the Lessee for said breach or violation. All of Lessor's reasonable attorneys' fees which arise as a result of Lessee's breach or violation, shall be paid by Lessee to Lessor within 30 days of Lessee's receipt of a bill therefor.
- 34) Surrender of Demised Premises. Upon termination of this lease, whether by lapse of time or otherwise, or upon any termination of this lease, Tenant shall surrender and vacate the demised Premises to C.M.C. in a clean, good and tenantable condition with all salt and residue removed at Tenant's sole cost or expense.

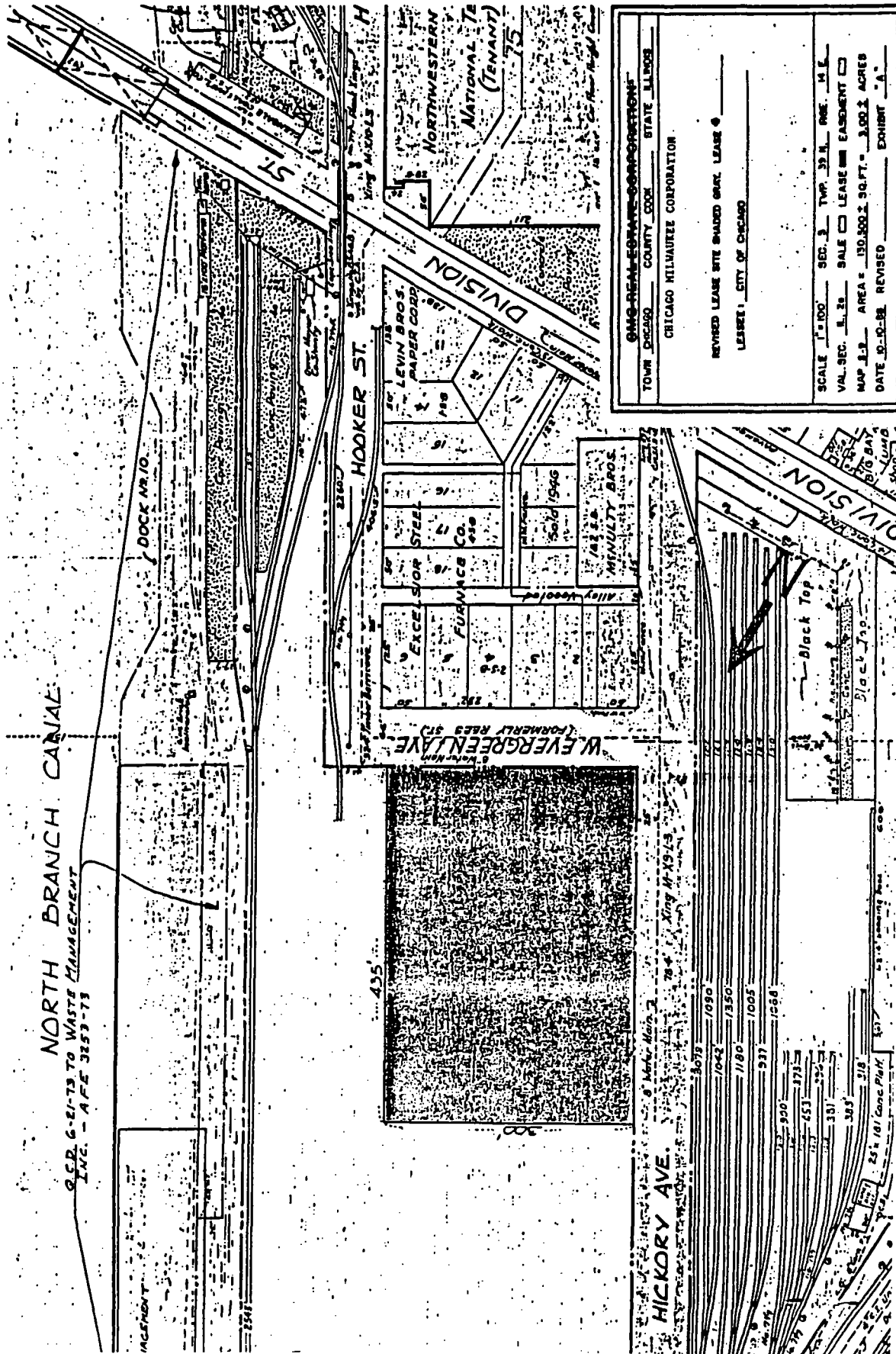

WHEREAS, In November, 1986, the Immigration Reform and Control Act (I.R.C.A.) came into effect. The "heart" of this law was a provision popularly known as "employer sanctions" with the intention to stop the flow of undocumented immigrants into the country and to pressure those already here to go back to their countries of origin; and

WHEREAS, The enforcement of employer sanctions has aggravated the exploitation and abuse of undocumented workers and has fueled workplace discrimination, undermined labor rights and organizing efforts, threatened basic civil liberties, and jeopardized the social and economic well-being of immigrant and minority communities; and

WHEREAS, Because of employer sanctions, some minority workers have been denied employment, or have been threatened with firings because they were unable to produce birth certificates; and in addition, some employers have simply decided only to hire United States citizens; and

WHEREAS, Employers' sanctions have helped to preserve low paying jobs under poor working conditions by maintaining a work force of undocumented workers, with no labor rights, who must work for the lowest wages since they do not have the option of seeking other employment; and

WHEREAS, The negative and widespread consequences of employer sanctions are not considered by the General Accounting Office, which utilizes an extremely narrow definition of discrimination; and

WHEREAS, Even within the narrow definition of discrimination, the 1988 G.A.O. report stated that same 16% or over a half million employers, whom it has surveyed, were engaging in unlawful, discriminatory employment practices due to employer sanctions. Despite these findings, the G.A.O. report still did not conclude that widespread discrimination was occurring; now, therefore;

Be It Resolved, That as the third and final year of review approaches, the Chicago City Council urges Congress to carefully examine the full range of evidence that exists and utilize the review process provided by the law to end employer sanctions.

WHEREAS, The City of Warsaw, Poland ("Warsaw") desires to acquire from Chicago eight ambulances for use in Warsaw; and

WHEREAS, The transfer of ownership of the ambulances from Chicago to Warsaw will enhance the goodwill and friendship between the two cities and their people; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The City of Chicago hereby offers to transfer to the City of Warsaw, Poland, all of Chicago's right, title and interest in and to eight ambulances from Chicago's existing inventory, subject to the following terms and conditions:

- (a) Chicago gives no warranty in relation to the ambulances other than a warranty of title.
- (b) Warsaw accepts the ambulances in their current condition.
- (c) Warsaw will be responsible for transportation of the ambulances from their current location to Warsaw, including any and all expenses for transportation, insurance, duties and tariffs.
- (d) Warsaw agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the City of Chicago, its officers, departments, employees and agents from any and all claims, liabilities, actions and expenses arising from Warsaw's ownership, possession, transportation or use of the ambulances.

SECTION 2. Upon receipt of documents indicating Warsaw's acceptance of the conditions described in Section 1 and identifying the time and manner of removal of the ambulances from their current location, and upon approval of the documents by the Corporation Counsel, the Commissioner of General Services is authorized and directed to execute all documents necessary to transfer to Warsaw all of Chicago's right, title and interest in and to the ambulances.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and approval.

Alderman Laurino moved to *Correct* the printed Official Journal of the Proceedings of the regular meeting held on Wednesday, October 4, 1989, as follows:

Page 5519 -- by deleting the first through twenty-sixth lines from the top of the page and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

"Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That Section 27-319 of the Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding the certain italicized language below:

27-319. No person shall stand or park any truck, tractor, semi-trailer recreational vehicle more than twenty-two (22) feet in length, self-contained motor home, or bus on any residential street for a longer period than necessary for the reasonably expeditious loading or unloading of such vehicle, except that the driver of a bus may park such bus in designated bus stand as is provided otherwise in this council order *authorizing the issuance of the permit. A permit issued under this section shall be valid until the thirtieth of June following its issuance, and there shall be a proration of the permit fee. However, permits issued prior to June 30, 1987, shall expire on that date and none shall be renewed or issued thereafter. The permit shall be affixed without the use of supplemental adhesives, to the inside of the windshield of the vehicle, directly above the City vehicle tax sticker. If a residential parking zone restriction is in effect at*

the owner's place of residence, a "Residential Parking Permit" will also be required in accordance with Section 27-317.

SECTION 2. This amendment for special permits shall apply only within the boundaries of the 12th, 14th and 23rd Wards of the City of Chicago and the passage of this amendment shall supersede all previously passed amendments to this section.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage."

The motion to correct *Prevailed*.

CHICAGO ZONING ORDINANCE AMENDED TO RECLASSIFY PARTICULAR AREAS.

Statements.

1. The property which is to be developed and which is affected by the "Institutional Planned Development" delineated herein is presently owned or controlled by applicant DePaul University.
2. This Plan of Development, consisting of eleven (11) statements, an "Existing Zoning and Street System Map", a "Property Line Map and Right-of-Way Adjustment Map", a "Generalized Land Use Plan", an "Existing Land Use Area Map", and a "Plan of Development Use and Bulk Regulations Data Sheet", stipulates the controls applicable to the area delineated in this Plan as the "Institutional Planned Development", and no others shall apply. This Plan demonstrates that the proposed use and development of the delineated area is in accordance with the intent and purpose of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance and satisfies the criteria for approval as a Planned Development.
3. The applicant or its successors, assignees or grantees, or such other person or party as may then own or control the area delineated herein, shall obtain all official reviews, approvals, licenses and permits required in connection with this Plan of Development. The following uses shall be permitted within "Subarea II" of the area delineated herein as "Institutional Planned Development" -- university, educational, residential, library and religious uses, including, without limitation, the following uses: classroom; residential (including, without limitation, dormitories and residential housing for students, faculty, members of a religious community and clergy); office; student union; student infirmary; bookstore; retail sales and services; faculty club, dining hall, hospitality room and restaurant (which may sell liquor for consumption on the premises both in conjunction with meals and not in conjunction with meals); research and laboratory; theatre and concert hall; athletic structure and arena (but only at the general locations shown on the Generalized Land Use Plan); earth station antennae in excess of eight feet in diameter; off-street parking lot; maintenance building; and related uses.

The following uses shall be permitted within Subarea III of the area delineated herein as "Institutional Planned Development" -- 54 attached and 2 detached single-family residences; university and university-related uses are prohibited.

5. Off-street parking and off-street loading facilities shall be provided in compliance with this Plan of Development.
6. Any dedication or vacation of streets and alleys or easements or grants of privilege or any adjustment of rights-of-way shall require a separate submittal and approval by the City Council.
7. Any service drive or other ingress or egress shall be adequately designed and paved in accordance with the regulations of the Fire Department and the Departments of Public Works and Planning to provide ingress and egress for motor vehicles, including emergency vehicles. There shall be no parking within paved areas required for such emergency vehicle access.
8. Identification signs and other necessary signs, including, but not limited to, construction signs, may be permitted within the area delineated herein as "Institutional Planned Development" subject to the review and approval of the Departments of Planning and Inspectional Services.
9. For purposes of maximum Floor Area Ratio calculations, parking area floor space in parking garage structures and H.V.A.C. floor space shall not be counted as floor area.
10. Subarea III, as shown on the Generalized Land Use Plan, has been previously designated as a Chicago landmark; said designation as to Subarea III remains in effect notwithstanding the adoption of this Plan of Development.
11. The Plan of Development shall be subject to the "Rules, Regulations and Procedures in Relation to Planned Developments" as heretofore promulgated by the Commissioner of the Department of Planning.

Minimum Required Number Of
Off-Street Parking Spaces And Loading Berths

The following provisions shall determine the minimum number of off-street parking spaces required within Subareas I and II of the Planned Development:^{1/}

Six hundred seventy-nine (679) off-street parking spaces shall be supplied to meet existing (1988 -- 1989) parking demands based on existing personnel, ^{2/} as set forth below. Any upward or downward change in such existing personnel shall result in a corresponding adjustment upward or downward from such requirement for 679 spaces in accordance with the following incremental ratios; provided, however, that applicant shall only be required to increase such parking as and when the deficit in parking supply exceeds 100 spaces:

^{1/} Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, up to 300 off-street parking spaces located on the lot described as the "Option Parcel" on the Generalized Land Use Plan may be utilized in satisfying the minimum off-street parking requirements for Subareas I and II of this Planned Development, provided the Option Parcel is within the possession of the applicant by deed or by lease at such time, and provided that the spaces in question are not required to serve as minimum required off-street parking for other property.

^{2/} The number of resident students, commuter students, and faculty/staff utilized in applying the incremental ratios set forth below shall equal the average of (a) the estimates available to the best of applicant's knowledge for the two preceding academic years and the present academic year; and (b) applicant's estimates for the next two academic years. Such estimates shall be conclusively determined on the basis of sworn affidavits of the Vice President of Business and Finance of DePaul University. "Resident students" are students residing within Subareas I and II of the Planned Development. "Day commuter students" are students who are not residents of applicant's residential facilities majoring in disciplines of departments located within Subareas I and II of the Planned Development, and "faculty" is the faculty of such departments who perform the majority of their teaching duties within Subareas I and II of the Planned Development. "Staff" are personnel whose principal office is located within Subareas I and II of the Planned Development. At all times, Subareas I and II shall contain no fewer off-site parking spaces than are required by the Chicago Zoning Ordinance as of January 1, 1989.

The aforesaid minimum number of required off-street parking spaces may be temporarily suspended for a period of 18 months until completion of construction of off-street parking facilities on a site containing existing off-street parking facilities. Subject to the preceding sentence, in order to provide adequate off-street parking: (a) in conjunction with the construction of the applicant's new main campus library, either the parking garage at Racine and Belden Avenues or the parking garage on Sheffield Avenue south of Fullerton Avenue (as the aforesaid are shown on the Generalized Land Use Plan) will be constructed; (b) in conjunction with the construction of the athletic structure on the east side of Sheffield Avenue south of Belden Avenue (as shown on the Generalized Land Use Plan), the aforesaid parking garage on Sheffield Avenue south of Fullerton Avenue will be constructed, and; (c) in conjunction with the construction of both the main campus library and the aforesaid athletic structure on the east side of Sheffield Avenue south of Belden Avenue, both the aforesaid parking garage at Racine and Belden Avenues and the parking garage on Sheffield Avenue south of Fullerton Avenue will be constructed.

Loading berths within Subareas I and II shall be provided in conformance with the R4 General Residence District classification of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance.

General Provisions Regarding Subareas I And II.

The above noted regulations relate to the ultimate development within Subareas I and II of this Planned Development. Interim stages of development may exceed permitted standards, subject to the approval of the Department of Planning.

Notwithstanding the identification of proposed uses at specified locations on the Generalized Land Use Plan, other uses permitted within the applicable subarea may be located at such specified locations unless the location of the proposed alternative or simultaneous use is otherwise restricted to a specific location or specific locations on the Generalized Land Use Plan.

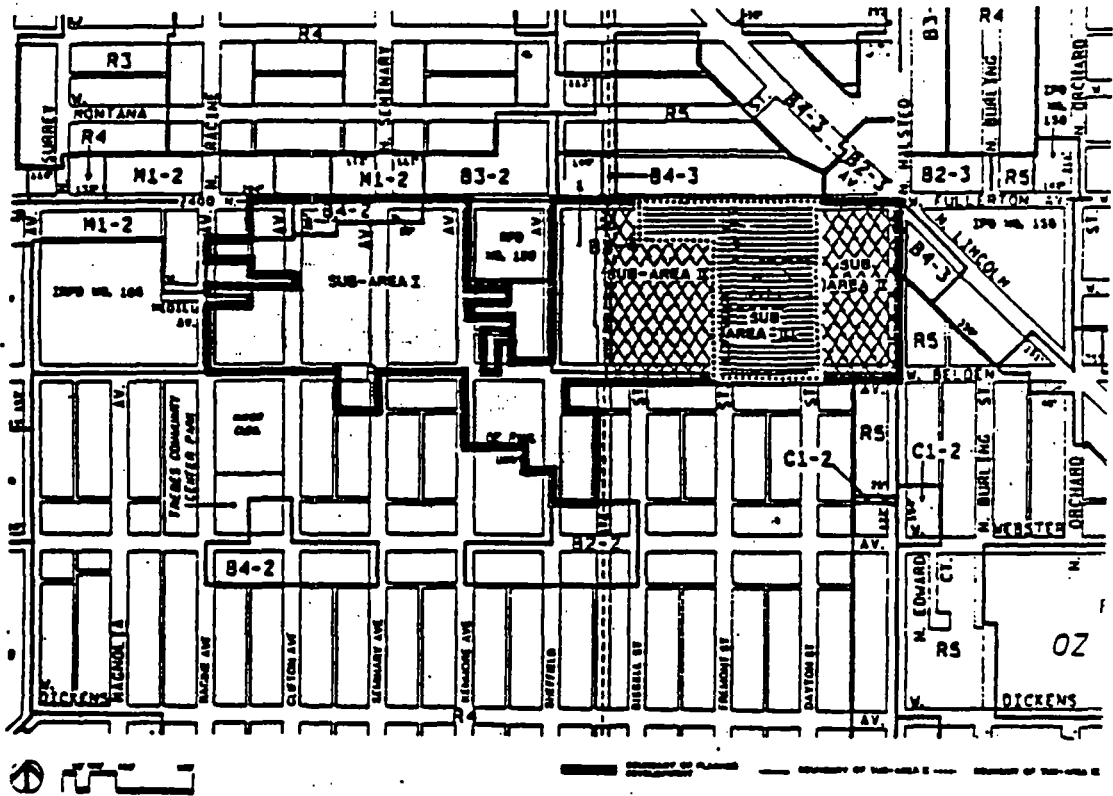

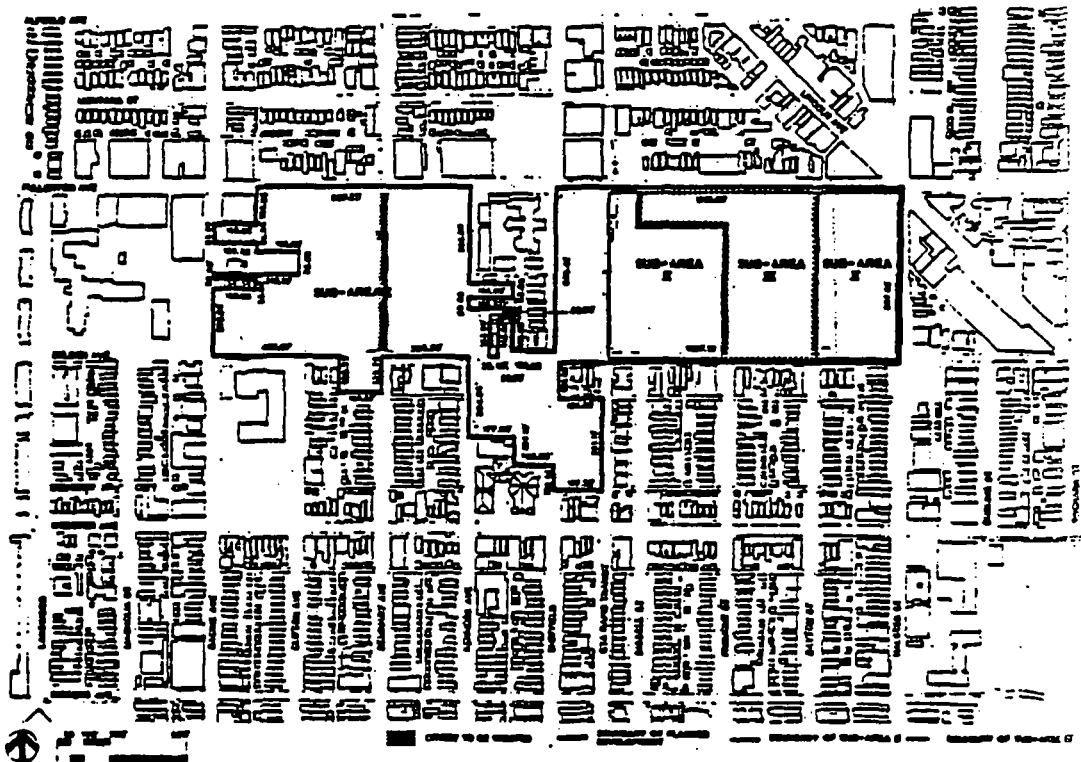

PROPERTY LINE MAP AND RIGHT OF WAY ADJUSTMENT MAP



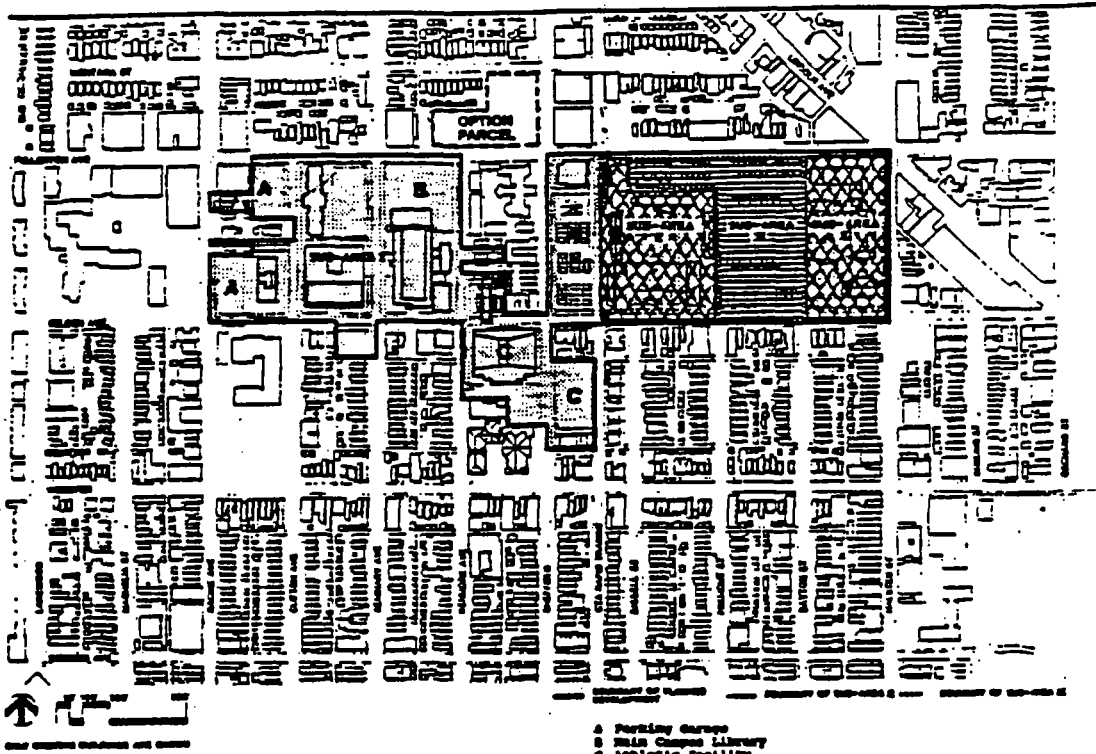

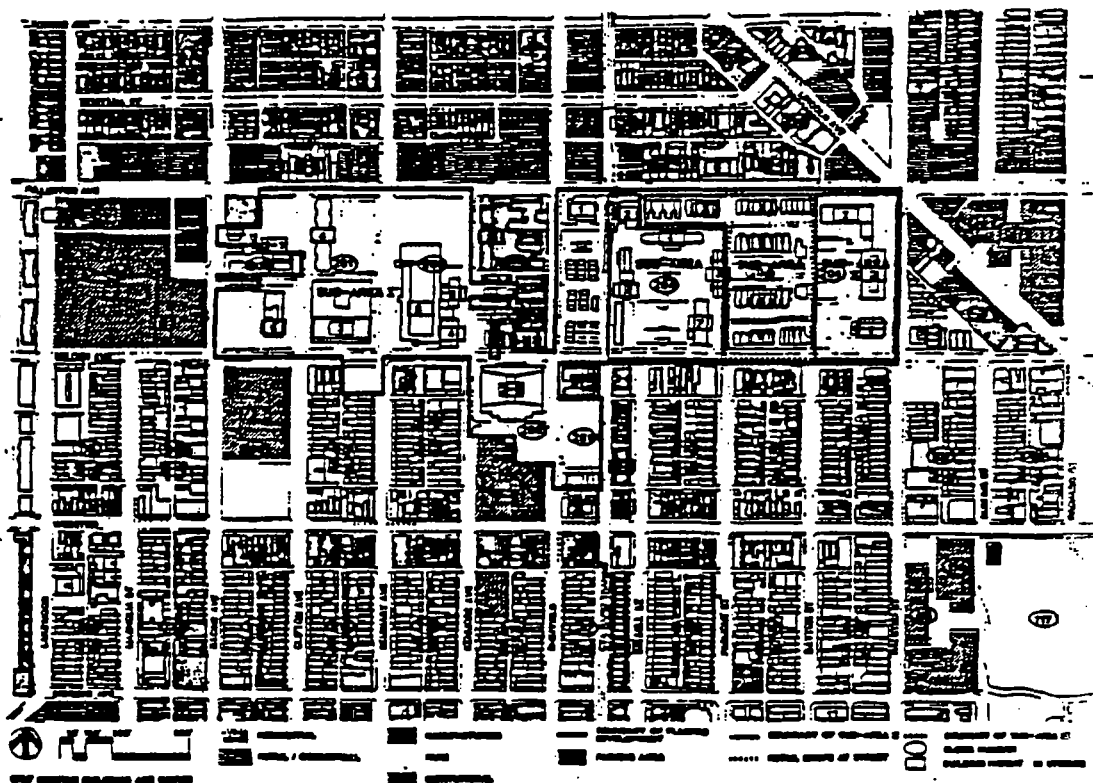

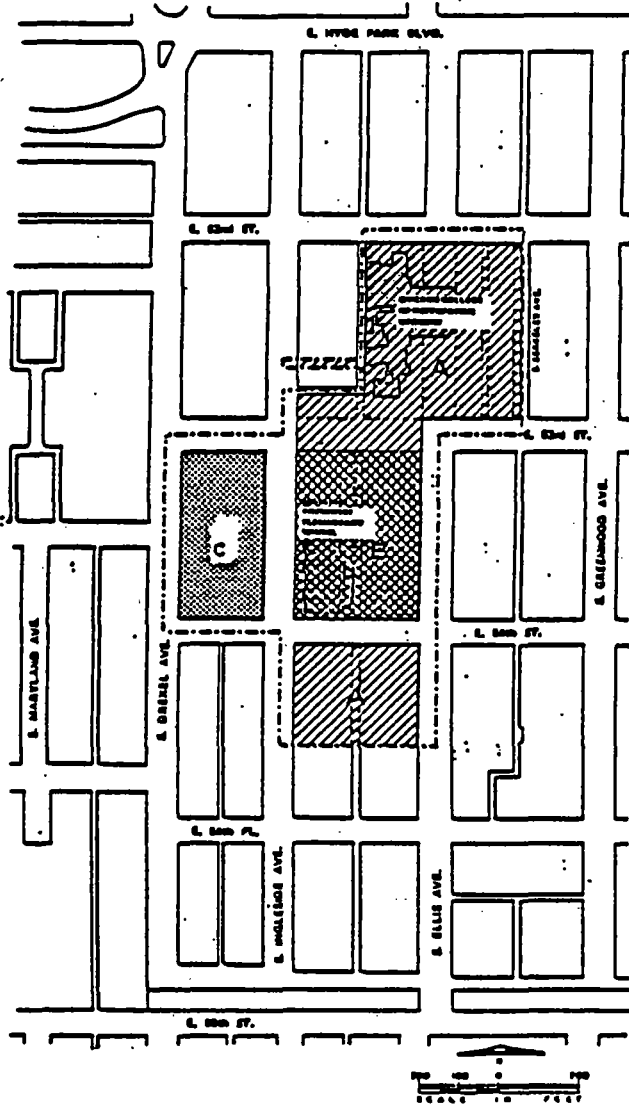

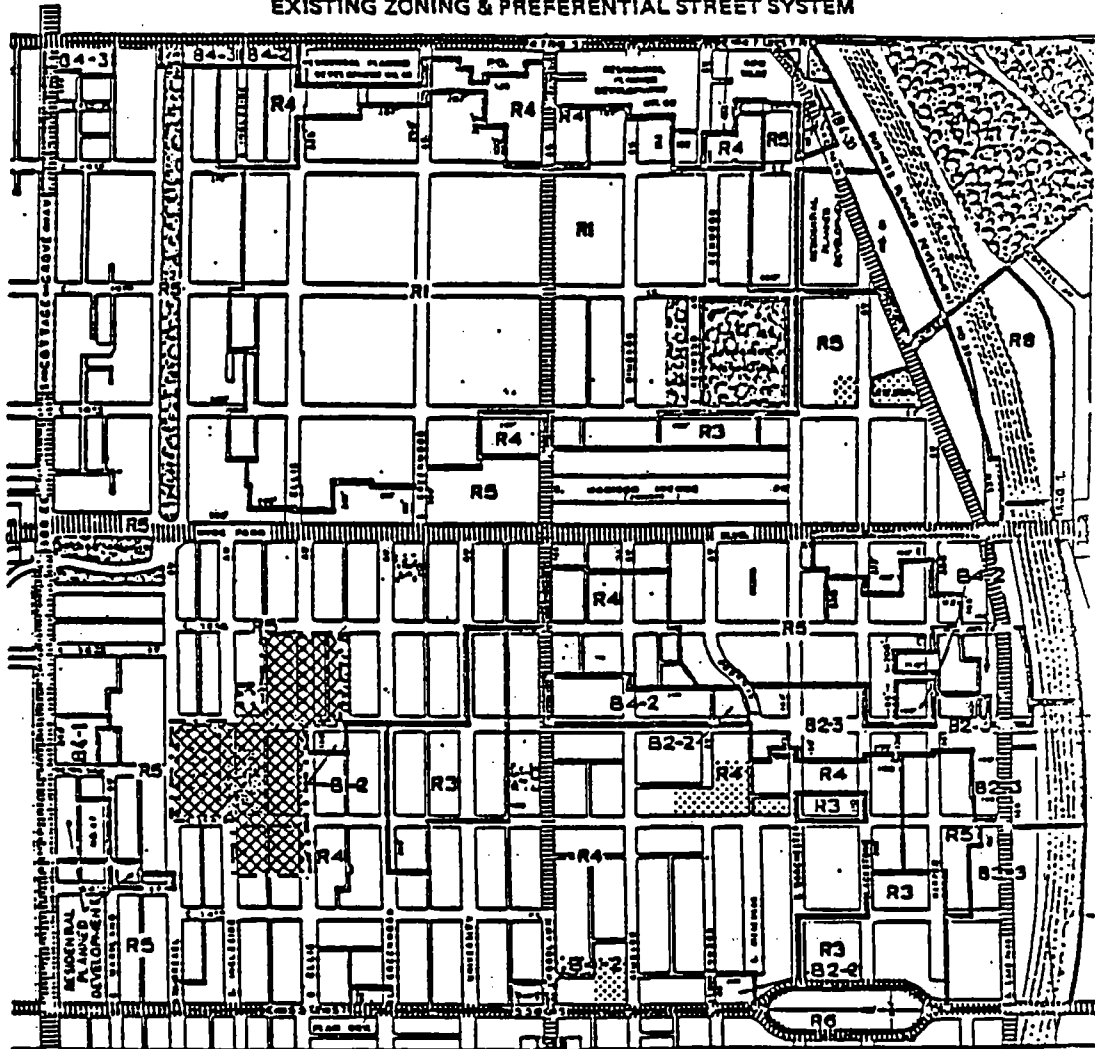
