WHEREAS, On February 6, 1991, the City Council of the City of Chicago (the "City") established by ordinance Special Service Area Number 12 (the "Area") in a portion of the central area of the City for the purpose of developing a public transportation system and facilities for the Area known as the Central Area Circulator (the "Circulator"); and

WHEREAS, On February 6, 1991, the City Council of the City established by ordinance a governing board (the "Circulator Board") to assist and advise the City in the development of the Circulator; and

WHEREAS, The powers and duties of the Circulator Board include the power to negotiate and recommend contracts for any goods or services as may be necessary in connection with the Circulator and to cooperate with public agencies charged with the responsibility for long-range or comprehensive planning for public transportation in the Area; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Area Transportation Study ("C.A.T.S.") is an intergovernmental agency formed by the State of Illinois, Cook County and the City to develop a comprehensive long-range transportation plan for the six-county northeastern Illinois region, including the City; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Transit Authority ("C.T.A.") is a municipal corporation created by Illinois law to own, operate, create, establish and maintain a comprehensive unified local transportation system; and

WHEREAS, The City desires to enter into cooperative agreements with C.A.T.S. and C.T.A. pursuant to which C.A.T.S. shall provide the City with data from travel demand simulations and other existing data for the Circulator and C.T.A. shall assist the City in the development of specific

designs and operating plans for the Circulator and coordinate the design and modification of C.T.A. facilities with Circulator designs; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The above recitals are hereby incorporated by reference as if fully set out herein.

- SECTION 2. The Executive Director of the Central Area Circulator Project is hereby authorized to enter into a cooperative agreement with C.A.T.S. for travel demand simulations and other data for an amount not to exceed \$25,000, substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit A.
- SECTION 3. The Executive Director of the Central Area Circulator Project is hereby authorized to enter into a cooperative agreement with C.T.A. pursuant to which the C.T.A. will agree to provide assistance in the development of specific designs and operating plans for the Circulator and coordinating the design and modification of C.T.A. facilities with Circulator designs, and the City will agree to reimburse the C.T.A. an amount not to exceed \$200,000 for costs of providing such assistance. The term of the Agreement will be for a period of not more than two (2) years and in a form satisfactory to the Corporation Counsel.

SECTION 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect by and from the date of its passage.

Whereas, On August 5, 1992, the Federal Transit Administration (hereinafter referred to as "F.T.A.") and on August 11, 1992, the State of Illinois Department of Transportation (hereinafter referred to as "I.D.O.T.") and the City entered into agreements for I.D.O.T. and F.T.A. to provide State and Federal Financial assistance to the City in the form of a capital grant; and

Whereas, This grant will be used for the Central Area Circulator Project; and

Whereas, These funds will be used for the alignment, refinement and preliminary design associated with the Circulator Project. Major tasks will include, but not be limited to, development of physical and operating design plans, development of cost estimates, and the preparation of the Final Environmental Impact Statement for the Circulator Project; and

Whereas, The F.T.A. and I.D.O.T. require a written agreement between the City as the grantee, and C.A.T.S. as pass-through recipient.

Now, Therefore, The parties hereto do mutually agree as follows:

1. Scope Of Services.

C.A.T.S. shall, in a satisfactory manner, provide the City and its consultants with data from travel demand simulations and other existing data based on the Central Area Circulator Project as approved by I.D.O.T.. Changes in the scope of services and component budgets are not to occur unless such revisions are approved by I.D.O.T..

#### 2. Compensation.

C.A.T.S. shall receive reimbursement for actual cost to the extent that they are eligible, subject to an upper limit of \$25,000 (two-thirds F.T.A. share, one-third I.D.O.T. share). C.A.T.S. will be paid based on prevailing rates of C.A.T.S. staff plus overhead plus direct costs. The present overhead rate is 1.2666. This rate is revised periodically in conjunction with audits by the State of Illinois. C.A.T.S. will notify the City in writing of any adjustments in the overhead rate.

#### 3. Unit Basis.

The professional job classifications and maximum monthly salaries of C.A.T.S. staff expected to work on the project are as follows:

#### 4. Method Of Payment.

The City shall make payments to C.A.T.S. pursuant to billing submitted and approved, setting forth the services performed during said billing period and attaching thereto copies of any expense incurred.

#### 5. Contract Period.

The activities described in the Central Area Circulator Project funded under F.T.A. Grant Number IL-03-0163 and I.D.O.T. Grant Number CAP-92-425-FED shall be carried out to completion with a scheduled completion date of December 31, 1993.

#### 6. Termination For Default.

If, through any cause, C.A.T.S. shall default in performance of this contract in accordance with its terms, and has failed to cure said default within thirty (30) days after receipt of notice specifying said default, the City may terminate this contract.

#### 7. Termination For Convenience.

Either party may terminate this contract or any portion of services to be performed herein provided that thirty (30) days notice in writing has been given to the other party. Payment for the work performed before the effective date of said termination shall be based upon an estimate of the services actually performed by C.A.T.S. to the date of termination. Said estimate shall be approved by I.D.O.T.. Payment made to C.A.T.S. shall be in full settlement for services rendered under this contract. If this contract is terminated due to the fault of C.A.T.S., the previous section hereto relative to termination shall apply.

#### 8. Financial Assistance.

This contract is subject to financial assistance contracts between the City and I.D.O.T. and between the City and F.T.A..

#### 9. Interest Of Members Of Congress.

No member of or delegate to the Illinois General Assembly (or the Congress of the United States) shall be admitted to any share or part of this contract or to any benefit arising therefrom.

#### 10. Prohibited Interest.

No member, or officer, or employee of the City of Chicago or local public body with financial interest or control in this contract during his tenure or for one year thereafter shall have any interest, direct or indirect, in this contract or the proceeds thereof.

#### 11. Contract Changes.

Any proposed change in this contract shall be submitted to the City of Chicago for its prior approval.

#### 12. Subcontract.

C.A.T.S. shall not enter into any subcontracts or agreements, or start any work by the work forces of a subcontractor or use any materials from the stores, of a subcontractor with respect to this contract, without the prior concurrence of the Illinois Department of Transportation. All such subcontracts,

agreements, and force work and materials shall be handled as prescribed for third-party contracts, agreements, and forcement Grants. All requests for concurrence shall be submitted to the City of Chicago for approval prior to submittal to I.D.O.T..

#### 13. Audit And Inspection Of Records.

C.A.T.S. shall permit the authorized representatives of the City of Chicago and the State of Illinois to inspect and audit all data and records of C.A.T.S. relating to its performance under the contract.

#### 14. Assignment.

Assignment of any portion of the work by subcontract must be approved in advance by the City of Chicago.

#### 15. Retention Of Records.

C.A.T.S. shall maintain records to show actual time devoted and cost incurred.

#### 16. Funds Chargeable.

Costs incurred by C.A.T.S. under this contract shall be chargeable to fund number 05-2005-0140-0140-7201-156 and any disbursements made up to a maximum of \$25,000, are subject to the availability of funds contained therein.

#### 17. Relationship With Others.

C.A.T.S. shall cooperate fully with the City, other governmental agencies and private consultants as directed by the City.

#### 18. Ownership Of Records.

The City of Chicago shall retain ownership of all plans, reports, estimates and related documents.

#### 19. Notice.

(the "Act") and pursuant to the Revenue Act of 1939, as amended from time to time; and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago enacted an ordinance on July 7, 1977 and published in the Journal of Council Proceedings of the City of Chicago of the same date at pages 5456 -- 5458 (the "Prior Ordinance") that established a special service area known and designated as "Special Service Area Number 1"; and

WHEREAS, According to Section 235/3.5 of the Act, the governing body of a special service area shall be the corporate authorities of the municipality for that area; and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago finds that it is in the public interest that the Prior Ordinance be amended to allow for a restructuring of the State Street Mall Commission established therein (the "Commission") to govern Special Service Area Number 1; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The preambles of this ordinance are hereby incorporated into this text as if set out herein in full.

SECTION 2. The Prior Ordinance is hereby amended by deleting paragraphs one, two and three of Section 3 in their entirety and replacing them with the following paragraph:

There is hereby established the State Street Mall Commission, consisting of eleven members, seven of whom are selected from the private sector and four of whom shall be representatives from the public sector. The seven private sector members shall serve for terms as follows: three members serving three-year terms; two members serving two year terms; and two members serving one-year terms. The seven private sector members shall be appointed by the Mayor, with the approval of the City Council, from a list of nominees submitted to the Mayor by the Joint Committee of the Greater State Street Council, and the Chicago Central Area Committee. One of the private sector members of the Commission shall be designated by the Mayor as the chairman of the Commission. At least two-thirds of the private sector members of the Commission shall either be tenants of or owners of record of property within Special Service Area Number 1. The four public sector members of the Commission shall be appointed by the Mayor, in his sole discretion, and shall serve until removed or replaced by the Mayor. In the event of a vacancy on the Commission of a private sector member due to resignation, death, removal by the Mayor for cause, legal disability, inability to serve, or other reason, the Mayor shall make an appointment to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term from a list of nominees submitted to the Mayor by the Joint Committee of the Greater State Street Council and the Chicago Central Area Committee after the position becomes vacant. All members of the Commission shall serve without compensation.

The Commission shall recommend to the Mayor and City Council a yearly budget based upon the Special Service Area's requirements, and shall advise the Mayor and the City Council regarding special maintenance taxes to be levied in Special Service Area Number 1 and the expenditure of budgeted funds."

- SECTION 3. The terms of all prior members of the Commission are hereby terminated.
- SECTION 4. All other terms and conditions of the Prior Ordinance shall remain in effect.
- SECTION 5. This ordinance shall become effective from and after its passage.

SECTION 2. The Commissioner of D.P.D. (the "Commissioner") or a designee of the Commissioner are each hereby authorized, subject to approval of the Corporation Counsel, to enter into and execute such agreements and instruments, and perform any and all acts on behalf of the City as shall be necessary or advisable in connection with the implementation of the Loan. The Commissioner is hereby authorized, subject to approval of the Corporation Counsel, to negotiate any and all

terms and provisions in connection with the Loan which do not substantially modify the terms described in Exhibit A hereto.

SECTION 3. WHEREAS, Special service areas may be established pursuant to Article VII, Sections 6(1) and 7(6) of the Constitution of the State of Illinois, and pursuant to the provisions of the Illinois Special Service Area Act, 35 ILCS 235/0.01, et seq. (the "Act") and pursuant to the Revenue Act of 1939, as amended from time to time; and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago adopted an ordinance on September 14, 1988 establishing the creation of an area within the City of Chicago known as "Special Service Area Number 8" and authorizing the levy of a special annual services tax (the "Services Tax") for a period of 5 years from the date thereof within said Area for the purposes set forth therein; and

WHEREAS, On August 4, 1993, the City Council of the City of Chicago adopted an ordinance authorizing a public hearing to consider the continuation of Special Service Area Number 8, and the authorization of the Services Tax for an additional period of 10 years; and

WHEREAS, Section 5 of the Act requires that notice of a public hearing to consider the establishment of a Special Service Area be published in a newspaper not less than 15 days prior to the public hearing, and that notice of the public hearing be mailed to the person or persons in whose name the taxes were paid on each lot, block, tract or parcel of taxable property located in the Area not less than 10 days prior to the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, Notice regarding the public hearing to consider the continuation of Special Service Area Number 8 was published in the Chicago Sun-Times on September 20, 1993 within the lawful and proper time; and

WHEREAS, Notice was deposited in the United States mail addressed to the taxpayer of record on each lot, block, tract or parcel of taxable property located within the Area not less than 10 days prior to the public hearing, within the lawful and proper time; and WHEREAS, The public hearing was held on October 5, 1993 at 9:00 A.M. in Room 201A, City Hall, at which time the public was given an opportunity to be heard concerning the continuation of Special Service Area Number 8; and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago finds that it is in the public interest that Special Service Area Number 8 be established; that said area, hereafter described, is contiguous and constitutes the principal commercial district for the surrounding neighborhood; that local commercial development programming is critical to maintaining and creating jobs and promoting neighborhood revitalization and stability; that the area is zoned to permit commercial uses and that the area will benefit from the special services to be provided, including recruitment of new businesses to the area, private security services, rehabilitation activities, maintenance and beautification of commercial streets, promotional and advertising activities and other technical assistance programs for area business persons to promote commercial and economic development (the "Special Services"); and that said Special Services are unique and in addition to municipal services provided by and to the City of Chicago generally, and it is, therefore, in the best interests of the City of Chicago that Special Service Area Number 8 be continued and the levy of the Services Tax therein be authorized for an additional 10 years; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The preambles of this ordinance are hereby incorporated into this text as if set out herein in full.

SECTION 2. Special Service Area Number 8 is hereby established and the Services Tax is hereby authorized for an additional period of 10 years from the date hereof. The Services Tax shall not exceed the sum of forty-one hundredths of one percent (.41%) of the equalized assessed value of the taxable property within Special Service Area Number 8. The Services Tax shall be in addition to all other taxes provided by law and shall be levied pursuant to the provisions of the Revenue Act of 1939, as amended from time to time. The authorized Special Services are: 1) recruitment of new businesses to the area; 2) private security services; 3) rehabilitation activities; 4) maintenance and beautification activities; 5) coordinated promotional and advertising activities for the area; and 6) other technical assistance activities to promote commercial and economic development. The Special Services shall be in addition to services provided by and to the City of Chicago generally.

SECTION 3. Special Service Area Number 8 shall consist of the territory described herein and incorporated hereto as Exhibit 1. An accurate map of said area is attached hereto and made a part hereof as Exhibit 2. The approximate street location of said territory consists of the area wholly or partially fronting on Diversey Parkway, from Halsted Street to Sheridan Road; on Broadway, from Diversey Parkway to Cornelia Avenue; on Halsted

Street, from Belmont Avenue to Diversey Parkway; on Clark Street, from Belmont Avenue to Diversey Parkway; and on Belmont Avenue, from Halsted Street to Broadway.

SECTION 4. There is hereby established the Lake View East Special Service Area Commission consisting of 13 members. Seven members of the Commission shall be appointed to serve one year terms and six members shall be appointed to serve two year terms. The Mayor, with the approval of the City Council, shall appoint the thirteen initial Commission members from lists of nominees submitted by the Lake View East Chamber of Commerce. Upon the expiration of the term(s) of any Commission member(s), the Mayor, with the approval of the City Council, shall appoint successor Commission members from lists of nominees submitted by the Lake View East Chamber of Commerce. Each Commission member, after the expiration of the terms of the initial Commission members, shall be appointed to serve for a term of two years and until a successor shall be appointed. All Commission members shall serve at the discretion of the Mayor. In the event of a vacancy on the Commission due to resignation, death, removal by the Mayor, legal disability, inability to serve or other reason, the Mayor shall make an appointment from a list of nominees submitted by the Lake View East Chamber of Commerce to fill the vacancy for the unexpired term after the position becomes vacant. All members of the Commission shall serve without compensation.

The Commission shall annually recommend to the City Council the amount of the Services Tax to be levied, and an agreement to be entered into between the City and a service provider which shall include a line item budget for the Special Services to be provided.

SECTION 5. If a petition signed by at least 51% of the electors residing within the boundaries of Special Service Area Number 8 and by at least 51% of the owners of record of the land included within the boundaries of said area, objecting to the establishment of Special Service Area Number 8 and the levy of the Services Tax therein, is filed with the City Clerk within 60 days following the final adjournment of the public hearing, this ordinance shall be null and void, the area shall not be established and no such tax shall be levied.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk is hereby ordered and directed to file certified copies of this ordinance in the Cook County Clerk's Office in Cook County, Illinois.

SECTION 7. This ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage.

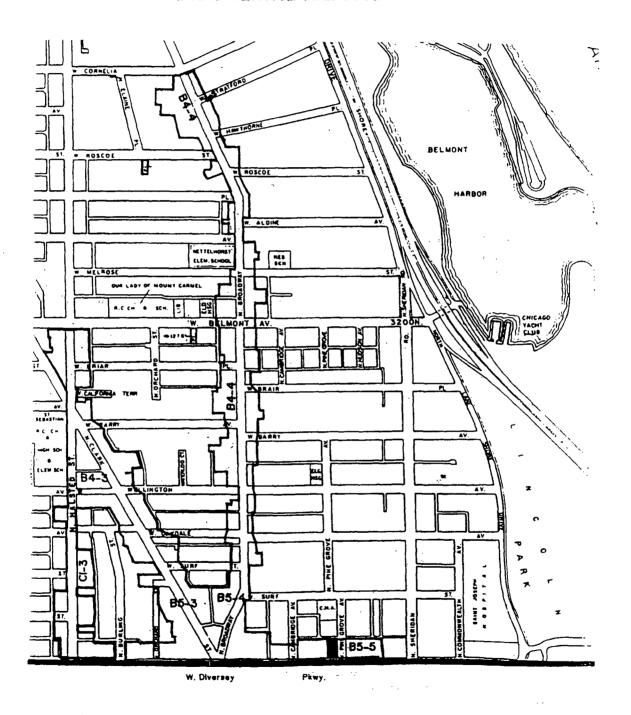

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, It is desirable and for the best interests of the citizens of the City of Chicago, Illinois (the "Municipality"), for the Municipality to implement tax increment allocation financing pursuant to the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act, 65 ILCS 5/11-74.4-1, et seq. (1992) as amended (the "Act"), for the proposed redevelopment plan and redevelopment project (the "Plan" and "Project") within the boundaries of the Municipality and within a proposed redevelopment project area to be known as the "73rd and Kedzie Redevelopment Project Area" (the "Area") described in Section 1(a) of this ordinance, which area is contiguous and constitutes in the aggregate more than 1½ acres; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to Section 11-74.4-5 of the Act, the Community Development Commission (the "Commission") of the Municipality, by authority of the City Council of the Municipality (the "Corporate Authorities"), called a public hearing (the "Hearing") relative to the Plan and the Project and the designation of the Area as a redevelopment project area under the Act on September 30, 1993; and

WHEREAS, Due notice of such hearing was given pursuant to Section 11-74.4-6 of the Act, said notice being given to taxing districts and to the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs of the State of Illinois by certified mail on August 13, 1993, by publication in the Chicago Sun-Times on September 6, 1993 and September 13, 1993, and by certified mail to taxpayers within the Area on September 9, 1993; and

WHEREAS, A meeting of the Joint Review Board on the Plan and Project and on the designation of the Area was convened on August 25, 1993 at 10:00 A.M., concerning the approval of the Plan and Project and designation of the Area; and

WHEREAS, The Plan and Project set forth the factors which caused the Area to be blighted, and the Corporate Authorities have reviewed the information concerning such factors presented at the public hearing and have reviewed other studies and are generally informed of the conditions in the Area which cause such area to be a "blighted area" as said term is used in the Act; and

WHEREAS, The Corporate Authorities have reviewed the conditions pertaining to lack of private investment in the Area to determine whether private development would take place in the Area as a whole without the adoption of the Plan; and

WHEREAS, The Corporate Authorities have reviewed the conditions pertaining to real property in the Area to determine whether contiguous parcels of real property and improvements thereon in the Area would be substantially benefited by the Project improvements; and

WHEREAS, The Corporate Authorities have reviewed the Plan and the Project and also the existing comprehensive plans for development of the Municipality as a whole to determine whether the Plan and the Project conform to such comprehensive plans of the Municipality; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

- SECTION 1. Findings. The Corporate Authorities hereby make the following findings:
  - (a) The Area is described in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference. The street location (as near as practicable) for the Area is described in Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference. The map of the Area is depicted on Exhibit C attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference.
  - (b) Conditions exist which cause the Area to be subject to designation as a redevelopment project area under the Act and to be classified as a blighted area as defined in Section 11-74.4-3(a) of the Act.
  - (c) The Area on the whole has not been subject to growth and development through investment by private enterprise and would not reasonably be anticipated to be developed without adoption of the Plan.
  - (d) The Plan and Project conforms to the comprehensive plans for the development of the Municipality as a whole, or i) conforms to the strategic economic development or redevelopment plan issued by the designated planning authorities of the Municipality, or ii) includes land uses that have been approved by the planning commission of the Municipality.
  - (e) As set forth in the Plan the estimated date of completion of the Project is December 1, 2003 and the estimated date of the retirement of all obligations incurred to finance redevelopment project costs as defined in the Plan is November 1, 2016.
  - (f) The Area would not reasonably be developed without the use of incremental revenues pursuant to Section 11.74.4-8 of the Act, and such incremental revenues will be used exclusively for the development of the Area.
  - (g) The parcels of real property in the Area are contiguous, and only those contiguous parcels of real property and improvements thereon will be substantially benefited by the Project improvements area included in the Area.
- SECTION 2. Exhibits Incorporated by Reference. A certified copy of the resolution of the Commission and the Plan and Project which were the

subject matter of the Hearing held September 29, 1993, are hereby adopted and approved. Copies of the resolution and of the Plan and Project are set forth in Exhibit D and Exhibit E, respectively, and are attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference.

SECTION 3. Invalidity of Any Section. If any section, paragraph or provision of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. Superseder and Effective Date. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval as provided by law.

SECTION 5. Powers of Eminent Domain. In compliance with Chapter 24, Section 11-74.4-4(c) of the Act and with the Plan, the Corporation Counsel is authorized to negotiate for the acquisition of Parcels contained within the Redevelopment Project Area. In the event the Corporation Counsel is unable to acquire any of said parcels through negotiation, the Corporation Counsel is authorized to institute eminent domain proceedings to acquire said property; nothing herein shall be in derogation of any proper authority.

Whereas, A meeting of the Joint Review Board (the "Board") on the proposed redevelopment plan and redevelopment project for the Area and on the designation of the project area was convened by the City on August 25, 1993 at 10:00 A.M., Central Standard Time, in Room 1003A, City Hall, 121 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois 60602, concerning eligibility for the designation of the Area and recommendation of the use of tax increment financing monies within the Area; and

Whereas, Notice of the Hearing was given by publication and mailing, said notice by publication was given at least twice, the first publication appearing not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days prior to the Hearing in the Chicago Sun-Times, being a local metropolitan newspaper of general circulation within the taxing districts having property in the Area; and said notice by mailing was given by depositing such notice in the United States mail by certified mail addressed to the person or persons in whose name the general taxes for the last preceding year were paid on each lot, block, tract, or parcel of land lying within the Area, not less than 10 days prior to the date set for the Hearing; provided, however, that in the event taxes for the last preceding year were not paid, notice was also sent to the persons last listed on the tax rolls within the preceding 3 years as the owners of such property; and

Be It Resolved by the Community Development Commission of the City of Chicago that:

- Section 7. All resolutions or orders in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, repealed.
- Section 8. If any section, paragraph, clause, or provision of this resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution.
- Section 9. This resolution shall bear the date of its adoption, and shall be effective upon its passage.
- Section 10. A certified copy of this resolution shall be transmitted to the City Council of the City of Chicago.

#### Introduction.

Manufacturing has played a pivotal role in the nation's economy and in the emergence of the United States as a world power. In 1920, manufacturing surpassed agriculture as the major employer in the country, and it held that position until the mid-1980s when it was passed by the service sector. Today, there is a restructuring of America's industrial sector, largely due to technological changes and competitive global markets. Underlying this restructuring are a number of significant trends. Dr. David Birch, identifies these trends in the book America's Future Industrial Space Needs, Preparing for the Year 2000. Among these are:

- 1. Shift in the mix of industries and types of goods being manufactured -- Emphasis has gone from basic industries, such as steel, food, cars and clothing to plastics, electronics, computers, pharmaceuticals, etc..
- 2. Shift in the size of manufacturers Most of the nation's recent industrial growth comes from small to mid-size companies which are innovative and grow rapidly.
- 3. Shifts in geographical location -- Manufacturers are no longer dependent upon the location of raw materials and traditional distribution methods. As a result, there is movement from the older rustbelt states of Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Illinois, to the sunbelt and western states.
- 4. Changing role for exporters -- Increasing levels of foreign trade have resulted in expansion of the nation's wholesale trade sector at the expense of manufacturing.
- 5. Available labor pool -- In the 1970s and 1980s, large numbers of new workers were available and absorbed into the work force.

Future economic growth may be constrained by the availability of a labor force which is appropriately trained and skilled.

Dr. Birch states that continued industrial growth in the U.S. will result from high technology manufacturing and from traditional industries in which innovation comes from doing things in new, more competitive ways. A few examples of this innovation are the use of lasers to cut blouses, robots to assemble machines, computers to operate equipment and cryogenic technology to store frozen foods.

The restructuring of the country's industrial sector has greatly impacted major cities throughout the Northeast and Midwest, and many have seen the industrial bases in their cities change significantly.

Major employers have downsized, relocated and/or gone out of business, and jobs for residents have disappeared. As a result, buildings and parts of buildings stand vacant, many of them made obsolete by contemporary industrial standards; tax bases erode; property values decline; personal income falls; and the impact ripples throughout the economy. Thus, in today's competitive national and international markets, it is extremely important that cities retain and invigorate their manufacturing base.

As in other cities, manufacturing has been the backbone of the economy in Chicago. The Illinois Bureau of Employment Security (I.B.E.S.) reports that, in 1970, manufacturing totaled 41.5 percent of "covered" employment in the City of Chicago.¹ However, within the past two decades, manufacturing has declined, bringing about losses in the number of industrial firms located in the City as well as declines in employment. According to I.B.E.S., in 1984, there were 1,125,827 "covered" employees in the City of Chicago. Of this total, 263,873 (or 23.4 percent) were employed in manufacturing and 339,139 (30.1 percent) were employed in the service sector. In 1990, "covered" employment in the City rose to 1,201,136, a gain of seven percent. During the same six year period, however, manufacturing employment declined by 18 percent to 216,190 while service employment rose by 20 percent to 408,020. In 1990, manufacturing only composed 18.0 percent of "covered" employment while service sector employment increased to 34.0 percent.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> "Covered" employment is defined as all employees covered by the Illinois Unemployment Insurance Act. The employment figures do not include State of Illinois workers because that data is not available by place of work.

Despite these declines, manufacturing still plays an extremely important role in the City's economy. The Economic Development Commission (E.D.C.) of the City of Chicago published a report in August, 1991 which addresses the future development of industrial parks within the City. According to data from the Federal Reserve Bank which appeared in this report, 4,500 manufacturing firms are located in the City. They provide over one-quarter of a million jobs and generate millions of dollars in City property tax, head tax and utility tax revenues.

In Chicago, manufacturing remains an important economic engine which sustains neighborhoods, providing well-paying jobs and enhancing the quality of life for residents. Moreover, industrial activity is important because it supports a number of other sectors of the local economy, bringing increases in employment and revenue to the City. The University of Illinois' Bureau of Business Research concludes that because of income paid to workers which is then spent elsewhere in the community and the connection between manufacturing and other economic areas, each manufacturing job supports approximately 3.2 other jobs. This compares to lower paying service sector jobs which support 1.7 additional jobs.

The previously cited E.D.C. report includes the findings of a survey conducted among local manufacturers. It indicates that Chicago has many important advantages for industrial companies. These include access to suppliers and markets, an excellent transportation network, large labor force, and an abundant, high quality water supply and treatment service. Various factors contribute to a firm's decision to relocate from, or not locate within the City, but the one cited most often is the lack of modern industrial space for expanding businesses.

Currently, the City has expressed a policy to maintain and enhance its existing industrial base, and has undertaken actions and adopted ordinances to improve and build upon it. Although the City has suffered from some significant losses, such as the departure of Spiegel, Inc. to Ohio, it is committed to preserving and improving its economic stature. The creation and preservation of jobs is a major economic development goal of the City. The City encourages ecomonic diversity to enable it to reach this goal, adapt to changes in the regional and international market, and absorb the impact of these changes.

Industrial activity plays a significant role in a diversified economy. It provides highly paid employment for residents, supports important secondary jobs, and is an incubator for innovation from which new technologies and industries are created. To support the job creation goal, the City has adopted an industrial land use policy which seeks to:

1. Provide opportunities for synergy between related industrial activities;

- 2. Minimize the conflicts between industrial and other land uses;
- 3. Maximize the benefits of public investment in capital programming related to industrial investment.

The 73rd and Kedzie Area encompasses approximately 105.3 acres and is composed of the 46-acre Nabisco Facility and the 38.5-acre Rheem Property, separated by the Norfolk and Southern rail lines which run through the center of the two sites in an east/west direction. Both of the properties front Kedzie Avenue, from 73rd Street to 77th Street. The northern portion of the area contains the Nabisco Biscuit Company plant which is approximately 1.6 million square feet. The facility is the largest bakery in the world, with approximately 2,500 employees. Most of the complex consists of two-story buildings except for the seven-story high-rise silo/storage building. The Rheem Property contains a vacant industrial complex of approximately 700,000 square feet, which was occupied by the Rheem Manufacturing Company. The Rheem Property has been vacant for the past three years.

The 73rd and Kedzie Area is a large industrial area adjacent to and just west of two large rail yards, surrounded mainly by residential areas with some commercial uses along the Kedzie Avenue frontage. Both industrial sites and the buildings on them are impacted by functional and economic obsolescence due to the single purpose design of the buildings, operational problems, inadequate parking, loading and service restraints, and limited access into each property with only a single entry and exit point. These problems have resulted in the total vacancy of the Rheem Property and the need for major capital improvements to the buildings and related operational functions within the Nabisco Facility.

Access to the Area is provided only by Kedzie Avenue which borders both sites on the eastern boundary. Kedzie Avenue connects to nearby major streets, including 79th Street, Columbus Drive and 71st Street.

Existing site and development constraints must be overcome before achievement of the City's objectives for the maintenance and enhancement of its industrial base through private investment in new construction, modernization and expansion. Although City initiatives and expenditures have stimulated private investment in other industrial areas, the 73rd and Kedzie Redevelopment Area as a whole (the "Redevelopment Project Area") has not been subject to growth and development through investment by private enterprise, and is not reasonably expected to be developed without the efforts and leadership of the City, including the adoption of the Tax Increment Financing Redevelopment Project and Plan and the substantial investment of public funds.

Tax Increment Financing.

In January, 1977, tax increment financing ("T.I.F.") was made possible by the Illinois General Assembly through passage of the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act (hereinafter referred to as the "Act"). The Act is found in Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 24, Section 11-74.4-1, et seq., as amended. The Act provides a means for municipalities after the approval of a "redevelopment plan and project" to redevelop "blighted", "conservation" or "industrial park conservation" areas and to finance public redevelopment costs with incremental real estate tax revenues. Incremental real estate tax revenues ("tax increment revenue") is derived from the increase in the equalized assessed valuation ("E.A.V.") of real property within the T.I.F. redevelopment area over and above the certified initial E.A.V. of the real property. Any increase in E.A.V. is then multiplied by the current tax rate which results in tax increment revenue. A decline in current E.A.V. does not result in a negative real estate tax increment.

To finance redevelopment costs a municipality may issue obligations secured by the anticipated tax increment revenue generated within the redevelopment project area. In addition, a municipality may pledge towards payment of such obligations any part or any combination of the following:

(a) net revenues of all or part of any redevelopment project; (b) taxes levied and collected on any or all property in the municipality; (c) the full faith and credit of the municipality; (d) a mortgage on part or all of the redevelopment project; or (e) any other taxes or anticipated receipts that the municipality may lawfully pledge.

Tax increment financing does not generate revenues by increasing tax rates. It generates revenues by allowing the municipality to temporarily capture new tax revenues resulting from redevelopment. Under tax increment financing, all taxing districts continue to receive the tax revenue they received prior to redevelopment from property in the area. Taxing districts can receive distributions of excess increment when more tax increment revenue is received than is necessary to pay for expected redevelopment project costs and principal and interest obligations issued to pay such costs. Taxing districts also benefit from the increased property tax base after redevelopment project costs and obligations are paid.

The 73rd And Kedzie Tax Increment Redevelopment Plan And Project.

This 73rd and Kedzie Tax Increment Redevelopment Plan and Project (the "Redevelopment Plan") has been formulated in accordance with the provisions of the Act. It is a guide to all proposed public and private actions in the Redevelopment Project Area.

This Redevelopment Plan also specifically describes the Redevelopment Project Area and sets forth the conservation factors which qualify the

Redevelopment Project Area for designation as a conservation area as defined in the Act.

In addition to describing the objectives of redevelopment, the Redevelopment Plan sets forth the overall program to be undertaken to accomplish these objectives. The "Redevelopment Project" as used herein means any development project which may, from time to time, be undertaken to accomplish the objectives of the Redevelopment Plan.

The Redevelopment Project represents an important economic opportunity for the City of Chicago. It will greatly improve the environment for private development, enabling a major manufacturing entity to expand and upgrade its facility. It also will enable the City to achieve three important goals:

1) job retention and creation; 2) improvement of its tax base; and 3) retention of a major industrial employer that might otherwise move to the suburbs or out of state.

The goal of the City of Chicago, however, is to ensure that the entire Redevelopment Project Area be redeveloped on a comprehensive and planned development basis in order to ensure that new development occurs:

- 1. On a coordinated rather than a piecemeal basis to ensure that the land-use, pedestrian access, vehicular circulation, parking, service and urban design systems will functionally come together, meeting contemporary principles and standards.
- 2. On a reasonable, comprehensive and integrated basis to ensure that conservation area factors are eliminated.
- 3. Within a reasonable and defined time period so that the area may contribute productively to the economic vitality of the City.

Redevelopment of the Redevelopment Project Area is a complex undertaking, and it presents challenges and opportunities commensurate with its scale. To a large extent, the success of this effort will depend on the cooperation between the private sector and agencies of local government. The adoption of this Redevelopment Plan will make possible the implementation of a comprehensive program for the redevelopment of the Redevelopment Project Area. By means of public investment, the area will become a stable environment that will again attract private investment. Public investment will set the stage for improving the area with private capital.

Public and private investment is possible only if T.I.F. is used pursuant to the terms of the Act. The revenue generated by the development will play a

decisive role in encouraging private development. Conditions that have precluded intensive private investment in the past will be eliminated. Through this Redevelopment Plan, the City will serve as the central force for marshaling the assets and energies of the private sector for a unified cooperative public-private redevelopment effort. Implementation of this Redevelopment Plan will benefit the City, its neighborhoods and all the taxing districts which are included in the 73rd and Kedzie Project Area in the form of an expanded tax base, employment opportunities and a wide range of other benefits.

# Redevelopment Project Area Description.

The boundaries of Redevelopment Project Area have been carefully drawn to include only the real property and improvements thereon substantially benefited by the proposed redevelopment project improvements to be undertaken as part of this Redevelopment Plan. The boundaries are more specifically shown in Figure 1, Boundary Map, and more particularly described as follows:

Lot A of National Biscuit Company's consolidation of parts of the south half of the northeast quarter of Section 26, Township 38 North, Range 13 East of the Third Principal Meridian recorded October 2, 1941, in Book 341 of Plats, page 13, as Document Number 12767855, in Cook County, Illinois.

Rheem Property: The northeast quarter of the southeast quarter of Section 26, Township 38 North, Range 13, East of the Third Principal Meridian, in Cook County, Illinois (except that part taken for Kedzie Avenue) and all public roads and rights-of-way adjacent to the above-described properties.

# Redevelopment Project Area Goals And Policies.

Managed growth in the form of investment in new development and facilities is essential in the Redevelopment Project Area. Redevelopment efforts in the Redevelopment Project Area will strengthen the entire City through additional employment opportunities, increased tax base and infrastructure and environmental improvements.

The Act encourages the public and private sectors to work together to address and solve the problems of urban growth and development. The joint effort between the City and the private sector to redevelop parts of the Redevelopment Project Area will receive significant support from the financing methods made available by the Act.

This section of the Redevelopment Plan identifies the goals and policies of the City for the Redevelopment Project Area. A later section of this Redevelopment Plan identifies the more specific program which the City plans to undertake in achieving the redevelopment goals and policies which have been identified.

#### General Goals.

- -- Provide infrastructure improvements within the Redevelopment Project Area.
- -- Encourage industrial development by eliminating the influences and the manifestations of physical and economic deterioration and obsolescence within the Redevelopment Project Area.
- -- Provide sound economic development in the Redevelopment Project Area.
- -- Revitalize the Redevelopment Project Area to maintain it as an important activity center contributing to the regional and national focus of the City.
- -- Create an environment within the Redevelopment Project Area which will contribute to the health, safety and general welfare of the City, and preserve or enhance the value of properties adjacent to the Redevelopment Project Area.
- -- Provide an increased real estate tax base for the City and other taxing districts extending into the Redevelopment Project Area.

#### Policies.

It is the policy of the City of Chicago to:

- -- Foster the City's industrial base and to maintain the City's diversified economy for the general welfare of its citizens.
- -- Encourage industrial investment, modernization, and expansion by providing for stable and predictable industrial environments.

# Conservation Area Conditions Existing In The Redevelopment Project Area.

The findings presented in this section are based on surveys and analysis conducted for the Redevelopment Project Area. As set forth in the "Act", "conservation area" means any improved area within the boundaries of a redevelopment project area located within the territorial limits of the municipality in which 50 percent or more of the structures in the area have an age of 35 years or more. Such an area is not yet a blighted area, but because of a combination of three or more of the following factors: dilapidation; obsolescence; deterioration; illegal use of individual structures; presence of structures below minimum code standards; abandonment; excessive vacancies; overcrowding of structures and community facilities; lack of ventilation, light or sanitary facilities; inadequate utilities; excessive land coverage; deleterious land use or layout; depreciation of physical maintenance; or lack of community planning, is detrimental to the public safety, health, morals or welfare and such an area may become a blighted area.

While it may be concluded that the mere presence of three or more of the stated factors may be sufficient to make a finding as a conservation area, the evaluation of this report identifies all existing conservation factors so that reasonable persons can conclude not only that statutory compliance exists, but that public intervention is appropriate and necessary.

On the basis of this approach, the Redevelopment Project Area is eligible as a "conservation area" within the requirements of the Act. The Redevelopment Project Area contains five buildings. Four buildings are located on the Nabisco Facility, and one building is located on the Rheem Property. Of the five buildings, three, or 60 percent, are 35 years or older. In addition to age, eight of the fourteen qualifying factors required under the Act are present in the Redevelopment Project Area. These factors are reasonably distributed throughout the entire Redevelopment Project Area. The entire Redevelopment Project Area is impacted by and shows the presence of these conservation factors. Finally, the Redevelopment Project Area includes only real property and improvements substantially benefited by the proposed redevelopment project improvements.

The factors described below and shown in Figure 2, Summary of Conservation Area Factors, are present in the area.

#### 1. Obsolescence.

Obsolescence is present to a major extent. Conditions contributing to this factor include the functional and economic

obsolescence of existing single-purpose buildings in the Nabisco Facility and the Rheem Property and the inadequate provision for access, off-street parking and loading.

### 2. Deterioration.

Deterioration is present to a major extent and includes deterioration of building components, parking areas, site surface areas, and perimeter fencing.

## 3. Excessive Vacancies.

Excessive vacancies are present to a major extent. The entire Rheem Property is vacant.

4. Overcrowding Of Structures And Community Facilities.

Overcrowding of structures is present to a major extent within the Nabisco Facility.

5. Structures Below Minimum Code.

The structures on the Rheem Property and their building components are below the minimum legal requirements established by the laws, ordinances and regulations of the City.

6. Excessive Land Coverage.

Excessive land coverage is present to a major extent. The Nabisco Facility occupies over 75 percent of the land site, resulting in limited and confined off-street parking, inadequate service and loading facilities, a single point access and egress from the site, and excessive travel distances from remote parking areas to building entrance areas.

7. Depreciation Of Physical Maintenance.

Depreciation of physical maintenance is present to a major extent and includes substantial deferred maintenance on the entire building on the Rheem Property. A limited condition of deferred maintenance exists in parking and related storage and loading surface areas, perimeter fencing, and site improvements on the Nabisco Facility.

8. Lack Of Community Planning.

Lack of community planning is present to a limited extent. The Redevelopment Project Area was developed without the benefit or guidance of a community plan with reasonable policies and standards for building setbacks, the location and arrangement of off-street parking, and for buffering/screening of industrial uses from adjacent residential areas.

The analysis above is based upon surveys and analyses conducted by Trkla, Pettigrew, Allen & Payne, Inc.. The surveys and analyses conducted include:

- 1. Exterior survey of the condition and use of both industrial complexes;
- 2. Field survey of environmental conditions covering streets, sidewalks, curbs and gutters, lighting, traffic, parking facilities, landscaping, fences and walls, and general property maintenance;
- 3. Analysis of existing use of the Redevelopment Project Area and its relationships to its surroundings;
- 4. Comparison of current land use to current zoning ordinance and the current zoning map;
- 5. Analysis of original and current platting and building size and layout;
- 6. Analysis of vacant portions of the site and building;
- 7. Analysis of building floor area and site coverage; and
- 8. Review of previously prepared plans, studies and data.

# 73rd And Kedzie Tax Increment Financing Redevelopment Project.

This section presents the overall program to be undertaken by the City of Chicago or by private parties acting under redevelopment agreements with

the City. It includes a description of redevelopment plan and project objectives, a description of redevelopment activities, a general land-use plan, estimated redevelopment project costs, a description of sources of funds to pay redevelopment project costs, a description of obligations that may be issued, identification of the most recent equalized assessed valuation of properties in the Redevelopment Project Area, and an estimate of anticipated equalized assessed valuation.

In the event the City determines that implementation of certain activities or improvements is not feasible, the City may reduce the scope of the overall program and Redevelopment Project.

# Redevelopment Objectives.

- Reduce or eliminate those conditions which qualify the Redevelopment Project Area as a conservation area. Section 4 of this Redevelopment Plan, Conservation Area Conditions Existing in the Redevelopment Project Area, describes existing conservation conditions.
- Strengthen the economic well-being of the Redevelopment Project Area and the City by increasing business activity, taxable values, and job opportunities.
- -- Assemble land into parcels functionally adaptable with respect to shape and size for disposition and redevelopment in accordance with contemporary development needs and standards.
- -- Create an environment which stimulates private investment in new construction, expansion and rehabilitation.
- -- Achieve development which is integrated both functionally and aesthetically with nearby existing development, and which contains a complementary mix of uses.
- -- Encourage a high quality appearance of buildings, rights-of-way and open spaces as well as high standards of design.
- -- Provide sites for needed public improvements or facilities in proper relationship to the projected demand for and in accordance with accepted design criteria for such facilities.
- -- Provide needed incentives to encourage a broad range of improvements in both rehabilitation and new development efforts.

- Encourage the participation of minorities and women in professional and investment opportunities involved in the development of the Redevelopment Project Area.
- Implement and achieve the Redevelopment Project Area Goals and Policies as set forth in Section 3 of this Redevelopment Plan.

# Redevelopment Plan And Project Activities.

The City proposes to achieve its redevelopment goals, policies and objectives for the Redevelopment Project through public financing techniques, including tax increment financing, and by undertaking some or all of the following actions:

1. Property Acquisition, Site Preparation, Demolition And Redevelopment.

Property acquisition and land assembly by the private sector for redevelopment in accordance with this Redevelopment Plan will be encouraged. To achieve the renewal of the Redevelopment Project Area, property identified in Development Program, Figure 3, attached hereto and made a part hereof, may be acquired by purchase, exchange or long-term lease by the City of Chicago and cleared of all improvements and either (a) sold or leased for private redevelopment, or (b) sold, leased or dedicated for construction of public improvements or recreational facilities.

The City may determine that to meet the goals, policies or objectives of this Redevelopment Plan property may be acquired where: a) the current use of the property is not permitted under this Redevelopment Plan; b) the exclusion of the property from acquisition would have a detrimental effect on the disposition and development of adjacent and nearby property; or c) the owner or owners are unwilling or unable to conform the property to the land-use and development objectives of this Redevelopment Plan. Further, the City may require written redevelopment agreements with developers before acquiring any properties.

Clearance and demolition activities will, to the greatest extent possible, be timed to coincide with redevelopment activities so that tracts of land do not remain vacant for extended periods and so that the adverse effects of clearance activities may be minimized. Clearance and demolition activities will include demolition of buildings, environmental remediation, removal of old foundations, excavation and removal of soil and other

materials to create suitable sites for new development, and provision of storm drainage.

As an incidental but necessary part of the redevelopment process, the City may devote property which it has acquired to temporary uses until such property is scheduled for disposition and redevelopment.

2. Rehabilitation Of Existing Buildings And Fixtures.

The existing Nabisco Facility is in need of rehabilitation, modernization and expansion in order to overcome existing obsolescence and to maintain its competitive position in the food industry. Rehabilitation includes upgrading all building systems, including electrical, plumbing, utility, mechanical, ventilation and HVAC; and repair of all building components, including roof, walls, windows, floors, etc..

3. Provision Of Public Improvements.

Adequate public improvements and facilities will be provided to service the entire Redevelopment Project Area. Public improvements and facilities may include, but are not limited to, the following:

A. Utilities.

Adjustments and modifications to utility lines as may be necessary to facilitate and serve redevelopment in accordance with the objectives and provisions of this Redevelopment Plan.

B. Streets And Public Rights-Of-Way.

The resurfacing, widening, reconstruction, closing, removal and other improvements of streets and other public rights-of-way.

C. Landscape.

Landscape/buffer improvements, street lighting and general beautification improvements.

#### 4. Environmental Remediation.

Redevelopment of the Redevelopment Project Area necessitates several actions which pertain to environmental remediation on the Rheem property. These include, but are not limited to, the removal of asbestos from the Rheem facility, clean-up of the Rheem site, and removal and off-site disposal of special wastes and other pit contents.

5. Job Training And Related Educational Programs.

A range of programs designed to increase the skills of existing employees will be implemented. Other programs will be created for future employees so that they can take advantage of the employment opportunities within the Redevelopment Project Area.

6. Analysis, Administration, Studies, Surveys, Legal, Et Al..

Activities include the long-term management of the T.I.F. Program as well as the costs of establishing the program and designing its components.

7. Redevelopment Agreements.

Land assemblage which may be by purchase, exchange, donation, lease, or eminent domain shall be conducted for (a) sale, lease or conveyance to private developers, or (b) sale, lease, conveyance or dedication for the construction of public improvements or facilities. Terms of conveyance shall be incorporated in appropriate disposition agreements which may contain more specific controls than those stated in this Redevelopment Plan.

#### General Land-Use Plan.

Figure 4, Land-Use Plan, attached hereto and made a part hereof, identifies land-uses and public rights-of-way to be in effect upon adoption of this Redevelopment Plan. The major land-use category included within the Redevelopment Project Area is industrial.

The Redevelopment Plan and the Redevelopment Project conform to the 1966 comprehensive plan for development of the City of Chicago. Further, the Redevelopment Plan and Redevelopment Project are consistent with, and are established pursuant to implementation of, general municipal

development objectives and policies contained in development plans previously adopted by the City of Chicago and the Chicago Zoning Ordinance. The Nabisco and Rheem properties are zoned as General Manufacturing Districts (M2-3 and M2-2, respectively), except for the Rheem property immediately north of 77th Street which is zoned M1-1 Restricted Manufacturing District.

All major thoroughfares and street rights-of-way are shown on the Land-Use Plan map. Their locations are subject to modification.

The Land-Use Plan as designated in Figure 4 provides a guide for future land-use improvements and developments within the Redevelopment Project Area. It conforms to the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, which is cited below.

The following uses are permitted, inclusive, provided that within 300 feet of a Residence District all business, servicing, or processing shall take place within completely enclosed buildings, unless otherwise indicated and except for automated teller machines and off-street parking and loading. Within 300 feet of a Residence District, all storage, except of motor vehicles, shall be within completely enclosed buildings, or may be located out-of-doors if it is effectively screened by a solid wall or fence (including solid entrance and exit gates) at least eight feet in height:

- 1. Any production, processing, cleaning, servicing, testing, repair or storage of materials, goods or products which shall not be injurious or offensive to the occupants of adjacent premises by reason of the emission or creation of noise, vibration, smoke, dust or other particulate matter, toxic and noxious materials, odors, fire or explosive hazards, or glare or heat.
- 2. Other compatible uses as defined in the Chicago Zoning Ordinance and approved by the City.

Special uses, performance standards, and use and bulk regulations as set forth in the Chicago Zoning Ordinance are applicable to development within the Redevelopment Project Area.

Estimated Redevelopment Project Costs.

Redevelopment project costs mean and include the sum total of all reasonable or necessary costs incurred or estimated to be incurred, and any such costs incidental to this Redevelopment Plan pursuant to the Act. Such costs include the following:

- 1. Costs of studies, surveys, development of plans and specifications, implementation and administration of the redevelopment plan including but not limited to staff and professional service costs for architectural, engineering, legal, marketing, financial, planning or other services (provided, however, that no charges for professional services may be based on a percentage of the tax increment collected).
- 2. Property assembly costs, including but not limited to, acquisition of real or personal property, or rights or interests therein, demolition of buildings, and the clearing and grading of land.
- 3. Costs of rehabilitation, reconstruction, repair or remodeling of existing public and private buildings and fixtures.
- 4. Costs of the construction of public works or improvements.
- 5. Costs of job training and retraining projects.
- 6. Financing costs, including but not limited to, all necessary and incidental expenses related to the issuance of obligations and which may include payment of interest on any obligations accruing during the estimated period of construction of any redevelopment project for which such obligations are issued and for a period not exceeding 36 months thereafter, including reasonable related reserves.
- 7. All or a portion of a taxing district's capital costs resulting from the redevelopment project and incurred in furtherance of the redevelopment plan and project, to the extent a municipality by written agreement accepts and approves such costs.
- 8. Relocation costs to the extent that a municipality determines that relocation costs shall be paid or is required to make payment of relocation costs by federal or state law.
- 9. Payment in lieu of taxes.
- 10. Costs of job training, vocational education or career education, provided that such costs (i) are related to the establishment and maintenance of additional job training, advanced vocational education or career education programs for persons employed or to be employed by employers located in a redevelopment project area; and (ii) when incurred by a taxing authority or taxing districts other than the municipality, are set forth in a written agreement among the municipality and the taxing authority or taxing districts, which agreement describes the program to be undertaken, including but not limited to the number of

employees to be trained, a description of the training and services to be provided, the number and type of positions available or to be available, itemized costs of the program and sources of funds to pay for the same, and the term of the agreement.

- 11. Interest cost incurred by a developer related to the construction, renovation or rehabilitation of a redevelopment project provided that:
  - a. Such costs are to be paid directly from the special tax allocation fund (the fund into which the incremental tax proceeds are deposited as pursuant to the Act);
  - b. Such payments in any one year may not exceed 30 percent of the annual interest costs incurred by the developer with regard to the redevelopment project during that year;
  - c. If there are not sufficient funds available in the special tax allocation fund to make such payments, then the amounts so due shall accrue and be payable when sufficient funds are available in the special tax allocation fund; and
  - d. The total of such interest payments paid pursuant to this Act may not exceed 30 percent of the total (A) costs paid or incurred by the developer for such redevelopment project plus (B) redevelopment project costs, including any property assembly costs and any relocation costs, incurred by a municipality pursuant to this Act.

A range of activities and improvements will be required to implement the tax increment redevelopment project. The necessary improvements and their costs are shown in Table 1, Estimated Redevelopment Project Costs. To the extent that the City has incurred costs or municipal obligations have been issued to pay for such Redevelopment Project costs in anticipation of the adoption of tax increment financing, the City shall be reimbused from real estate tax increment revenues for such redevelopment costs. The total redevelopment project costs are intended to provide an upper limit on expenditures. Within this limit, adjustments may be made in line items without amendment of this Redevelopment Plan. Additional funding in the form of state and federal grants, and private developer contributions will be pursued by the City as means of financing improvements and facilities which are of a general community benefit.

Sources Of Funds To Pay Redevelopment Project Costs.

Funds necessary to pay for redevelopment project costs and municipal obligations which have been issued to pay for such costs are to be derived principally from tax increment revenues and proceeds from municipal obligations which have as their revenue source tax increment revenue. To secure the issuance of these obligations, the City may permit the utilization of guarantees, deposits and other forms of security made available by private sector developers.

<sup>\*</sup> Exclusive of capitalized interest, issuance cost, administrative cost, interest and other financing cost.

The tax increment revenue which will be used to fund tax increment obligations and redevelopment project costs shall be the incremental real property tax revenue. Incremental real property tax revenue is attributable to the increase in the current E.A.V. of each taxable lot, block, tract or parcel of real property in the Redevelopment Project Area over and above the initial E.A.V. of each such property in the Redevelopment Project Area. Other sources of funds which may be used to pay for redevelopment costs and obligations issued, the proceeds of which are used to pay for such costs, are land disposition proceeds, state and federal grants, investment income, and such other sources of funds and revenues as the municipality may from time to time deem appropriate.

Issuance Of Obligations.

The City may issue obligations secured by the tax increment special tax allocation fund pursuant to Section 11-74.4-7 of the Act.

All obligations issued by the City pursuant to this Redevelopment Plan and the Act shall be retired within twenty-three (23) years from the adoption of the ordinance approving the Redevelopment Project Area, such ultimate retirement date occurring in the year 2016. Also, the final maturity date of any such obligations which are issued may not be later than twenty (20) years from their respective dates of issue. One or more series of obligations may be sold at one or more times in order to implement this Redevelopment Plan. The amounts payable in any year as principal of and interest on all obligations issued by the City pursuant to the Redevelopment Plan and the Act shall not exceed the amounts available, or projected to be available, from tax increment revenues and from such bond sinking funds or other sources of funds as may be provided by ordinance. Obligations may be of a parity or senior/junior lien natures. Obligations issued may be serial or term maturities, and may or may not be subject to mandatory sinking fund redemptions.

Revenues shall be used for the scheduled and/or early retirement of obligations, and for reserves, bond sinking funds and redevelopment project costs, and, to the extent that real property tax increment is not used for such purposes, may be declared surplus and shall then become available for distribution annually to taxing districts in the Redevelopment Project Area in the manner provided by the Act.

Most Recent Equalized Assessed Valuation Of Properties In The Redevelopment Project Area.

Table 2 lists the most recent proposed 1992 equalized assessed valuation of property in the Redevelopment Project Area. The total estimated equalized assessed valuation for the Redevelopment Project Area is \$13,760,845.

Anticipated Equalized Assessed Valuation.

In year 1999 (collection year 2000) when all improvements are completed, the estimated equalized assessed valuation of real property in the Redevelopment Project Area is estimated at \$39,860,915. This estimate is based on several key assumptions, including: 1) redevelopment for the uses specified in this Redevelopment Plan will occur in a timely manner; 2) the market value of the recommended industrial development will increase following completion of the redevelopment activities described in the Redevelopment Plan; and 3) the ten year average of the State Multiplier of 1.9717 as applied to 1992 assessed values will remain unchanged.

Phasing And Scheduling Of Redevelopment Project.

A phased implementation strategy will be utilized to achieve a timely and orderly redevelopment of the project area.

It is anticipated that City expenditures for redevelopment project cost will be carefully staged on a reasonable and proportional basis to coincide with expenditures in redevelopment by private developers.

Provisions For Amending This Redevelopment.

This 73rd and Kedzie Tax Increment Redevelopment Project and Plan may be amended pursuant to the provisions of the Act.

#### Affirmative Action Plan.

The City is committed to and will affirmatively implement the following principles with respect to the 73rd and Kedzie Tax Increment Redevelopment Plan and Project:

- A. The assurance of equal opportunity in all personnel and employment actions with respect to the Plan and Project, including, but not limited to: hiring, training, transfer, promotion, discipline, fringe benefits, salary, employment, working conditions, termination, etc., without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, handicapped status, national origin, creed or ancestry.

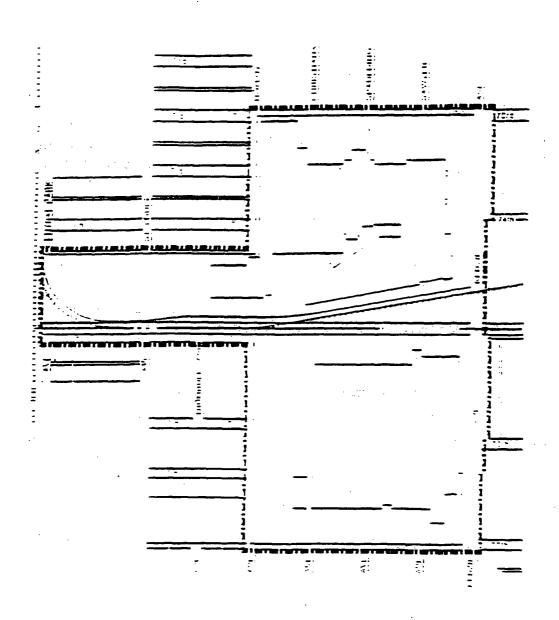

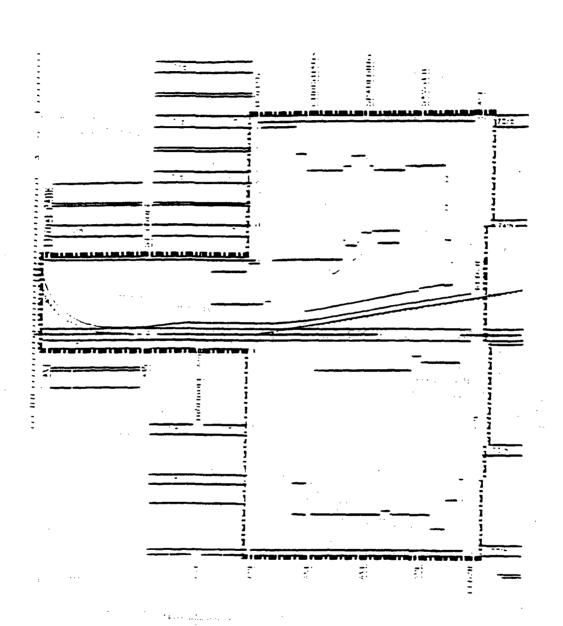


Figure : PECLECT ECUNICARY CORD CTREET AND RECIDELAYENUE :

- SECTION 1. Findings. The Corporate Authorities hereby make the following findings:
  - (a) The Area is described in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference. The map of the Area is depicted on Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference. The street location (as near as practicable) for the Area is described in Exhibit C attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference.
  - (b) Conditions exist which cause the Area to be subject to designation as a redevelopment project area under the Act and to be classified as a blighted area as defined in Section 5/11-74.4-3(a) of the Act.
  - (c) The Area on the whole has not been subject to growth and development through investment by private enterprise and would not reasonably be anticipated to be developed without adoption of the Plan.
  - (d) The Plan and Project conform to the comprehensive plans for the development of the Municipality as a whole, or (i) conform to the strategic economic development or redevelopment plan issued by the designated planning authorities of the Municipality, or (ii) include land uses that have been approved by the planning commission of the Municipality.
  - (e) As set forth in the Plan, the estimated date of completion of the Project is December 1, 2008 and the estimated date of the retirement of all obligations incurred to finance redevelopment project costs as defined in the Plan is November 1, 2016.
  - (f) The Area would not reasonably be developed without the use of incremental revenues pursuant to Section 5/11-74.4-8 of the Act, and such incremental revenues will be used exclusively for the development of the Area.
  - (g) The parcels of real property in the Area are contiguous, and only those contiguous parcels of real property and improvements thereon will be substantially benefited by the Project improvements included in the Area.
- SECTION 2. Approval of the Resolution and Adoption of the Plan and Project. The resolution of the Commission, a certified copy of which is

attached hereto as Exhibit D and incorporated herein by reference, is hereby approved. The Plan and Project, copies of which are attached hereto as Exhibit E and incorporated herein by reference, are hereby adopted.

SECTION 3. Invalidity of Any Section. If any section, paragraph or provision of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

SECTION 4. Superseder and Effective Date. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval as provided by law.

SECTION 5. Powers of Eminent Domain. In the event the Corporation Counsel is unable to acquire any of said parcels through negotiation, the Corporation Counsel is authorized to institute eminent domain proceedings to acquire said parcels. Nothing herein shall be in derogation of any proper authority.

Whereas, Chapter 2-124 of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago, Cook County, Illinois (the "City"), has heretofore established the Community Development Commission (the "Commission"); and

Whereas, The Commission is empowered by the corporate authorities of the City under Chapter 2-124 of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago to exercise certain powers enumerated in 65 ILCS, Section 11-74.4-4(k) and Section 11-74.4-1, et seq. of the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act, as amended (the "Act"), including holding public hearings required by the Act; and

Whereas, The staff of the Department of Planning and Development of the City ("Department of Planning and Development") has conducted investigations, studies and surveys in order to determine the eligibility of a study area as a blighted area or conservation area as defined by the Act; and

Whereas, The Eligibility Study and Report ("Report") and proposed Redevelopment Plan and Project ("Plan"), conducted by the Department of Planning and Development staff, have been completed; and

Whereas, The Department of Planning and Development staff has conducted an investigation of the 72nd and Cicero Redevelopment Project Area ("Area") for eligibility for tax increment allocation financing; and

Whereas, The City has incurred, or will incur, certain expenses pursuant to the Plan and intends that those costs be reimbursed upon the City's adoption of tax allocation financing pursuant to the Act; and

Whereas, A public hearing (the "Hearing") on the Plan for the Area and on the designation of the Area was held by the Commission on September 29, 1993, at 2:00 P.M., Central Standard Time in Room 1003A, City Hall, 121 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois 60602 as the official public hearing, to hear testimony from all interested parties concerning the designation of the Area, approval of the Redevelopment Plan and Project, and use of tax increment financing monies within the Area; and

Whereas, A meeting of the joint review board (the "Board") on the proposed Redevelopment Plan and Redevelopment Project for the Area and on the designation of the project area was convened by the City on August 25, 1993 at 10:00 A.M. Central Standard Time in Room 1003A, City Hall, 121 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois 60602 concerning eligibility for

the designation of the Area and recommendation of the use of tax increment financing monies within the Area; and

Whereas, Notice of the Hearing was given by publication and mailing, said notice by publication was given at least twice, the first publication appearing not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days prior to the Hearing in the Chicago Sun-Times, being a local metropolitan newspaper of general circulation within the taxing districts having property in the Area; and said notice by mailing was given by depositing such notice in the United States mail by certified mail addressed to the person or persons in whose name the general taxes for the last preceding year were paid on each lot, block, tract, or parcel of land lying within the Area, not less than 10 days prior to the date set for the Hearing; provided, however, that in the event taxes for the last preceding year were not paid, notice was also sent to the persons last listed on the tax rolls within the preceding 3 years as the owners of such property; and

Whereas, Notice of the Hearing was given by mailing as hereinabove provided to all taxing districts of which taxable property is included within the Area, project, or plan and to the Illinois Department of Commerce and Community Affairs, not less than 45 days prior to the date set for the Hearing, and such notice also included an invitation to each taxing district and the Department of Commerce and Community Affairs to submit written comments to the City of Chicago, Valerie B. Jarrett, Commissioner, Department of Planning and Development, City of Chicago, Room 1000, City Hall, 121 North LaSalle Street, Chicago, Illinois 60602, concerning the subject of the matter of the Hearing, prior to the date of the Hearing; now, therefore.

Be It Resolved by the Community Development Commission of the City of Chicago that:

- Section 1. The preambles hereto are incorporated by this reference as though set out herein in full.
  - Section 2. The Commission approves the Report.
  - Section 3. The Commission approves the Plan.
- Section 4. The Commission recommends the designation by Ordinance of the proposed 72nd and Cicero Redevelopment Project Area as a "Redevelopment Project Area" pursuant to the Act.
- Section 5. The Commission recommends designation of Tax Increment Allocation Financing within the aforementioned 72nd and Cicero Redevelopment Project Area.
- Section 6. The Commission further finds that 1) the proposed Redevelopment Project Area on the whole has not been subject to growth

and development through investment by private enterprise and would not reasonably be anticipated to be developed without the adoption of the Plan; 2) the Plan conforms to the comprehensive plan for the development of the City as a whole or either i) conforms to the strategic economic development or redevelopment plan issued by the designated planning authorities of the City, or ii) includes land uses that have been approved by the Plan Commission of the City; 3) as set forth in the Plan and at the Hearing, the estimated date of completion of the Project is December, 2008, and the estimated date of the retirement of all obligations incurred to finance redevelopment project costs as detailed in the Plan is November, 2016; 4) the Area would not reasonably be developed without the use of incremental revenues and that such revenues will be exclusively used for the development of the Area; 5) there exist conditions which cause the Area to be described as a blighted area; and 6) the parcels of real property in the Area are contiguous, and only those contiguous parcels of real property and improvements thereon, which will be substantially benefitted by the Project improvements, are included in the Area.

Section 7. All resolutions or orders in conflict herewith are, to the extent of such conflict, repealed.

Section 8. If any section, paragraph, clause, or provision of this resolution shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this resolution.

Section 9. This resolution shall bear the date of its adoption, and shall be effective upon its passage.

Section 10. A certified copy of this resolution shall be transmitted to the City Council of the City of Chicago.

#### Introduction.

Manufacturing has played a pivotal role in the nation's economy and in the emergence of the United States as a world power. In 1920, manufacturing surpassed agriculture as the major employer in the country, and it held that position until the mid-1980s when it was surpassed by the service sector. Today, there is a restructuring of America's industrial sector, largely due to technological changes and competitive global markets. Underlying this restructuring are a number of significant trends. Dr. David Birch identifies these trends in the book America's Future Industrial Space Needs, Preparing for the Year 2000. Among these are:

- 1. Shift in the mix of industries and types of goods being manufactured -- Emphasis has gone from basic industries, such as steel, food, cars and clothing to plastics, electronics, computers, pharmaceuticals, etc..
- 2. Shift in the size of manufacturers -- Most of the nation's recent industrial growth comes from small to mid-size companies which are innovative and grow rapidly.
- 3. Shifts in geographical location -- Manufacturers are no longer dependent upon the location of raw materials and traditional distribution methods. As a result, there is movement from the older rustbelt states of Ohio, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Illinois, to the sunbelt and western states.
- 4. Changing role for exporters -- Increasing levels of foreign trade have resulted in expansion of the nation's wholesale trade sector at the expense of manufacturing.
- 5. Available labor pool -- In the 1970s and 1980s, large numbers of new workers were available and absorbed into the work force. Future economic growth may be constrained by the availability of a labor force which is appropriately trained and skilled.

Dr. Birch states that continued industrial growth in the U.S. will result from high technology manufacturing and from traditional industries in which innovation comes from doing things in new, more competitive ways. A few examples of this innovation are the use of lasers to cut blouses, robots to assemble machines, computers to operate equipment and cryogenic technology to store frozen foods.

The restructuring of the country's industrial sector has greatly impacted major cities throughout the Northeast and Midwest, and many have seen the industrial bases in their cities change significantly. Major employers have downsized, relocated and/or gone out of business, and jobs for residents have disappeared. As a result, buildings and parts of buildings stand vacant, many of them made obsolete by contemporary industrial standards; tax bases erode; property values decline; personal income falls; and the impact ripples throughout the economy. Thus, in today's competitive national and international markets, it is extremely important that cities retain and invigorate their manufacturing base.

As in other cities, manufacturing has been the backbone of the economy in Chicago. The Illinois Bureau of Employment Security (I.B.E.S.) reports that, in 1970, manufacturing totaled 41.5 percent of "covered" employment in the City of Chicago.¹ However, within the past two decades, manufacturing has declined, bringing about losses in the number of industrial firms located in the City as well as declines in employment. According to I.B.E.S., in 1984, there were 1,125,827 "covered" employees in the City of Chicago. Of this total, 263,873 (or 23.4 percent) were employed in manufacturing and 339,139 (30.1 percent) were employed in the service sector. In 1990, "covered" employment in the City rose to 1,201,136, a gain of seven percent. During the same six year period, however, manufacturing employment declined by 18 percent to 216,190 while service employment rose by 20 percent to 408,020. In 1990, manufacturing only composed 18.0 percent of "covered" employment while service sector employment increased to 34.0 percent.

Despite these declines, manufacturing still plays an extremely important role in the City's economy. The Economic Development Commission (E.D.C.) of the City of Chicago published a report in August, 1991 which addresses the future development of industrial parks within the City. According to data from the Federal Reserve Bank which appeared in this report, 4,500 manufacturing firms are located in the City. They provide over one-quarter of a million jobs and generate millions of dollars in City property tax, head tax and utility tax revenues.

<sup>1 &</sup>quot;Covered" employment is defined as all employees covered by the Illinois Unemployment Insurance Act. The employment figures do not include State of Illinois workers because that data is not available by place of work.

In Chicago, manufacturing remains an important economic engine which sustains neighborhoods, providing well-paying jobs and enhancing the quality of life for residents. Moreover, industrial activity is important because it supports a number of other sectors of the local economy, bringing increases in employment and revenue to the City. The University of Illinois' Bureau of Business Research concludes that because of income paid to workers which is then spent elsewhere in the community and the connection between manufacturing and other economic areas, each manufacturing job supports approximately 3.2 other jobs. This compares to lower paying service sector jobs which support 1.7 additional jobs.

The previously cited E.D.C. report includes the findings of a survey conducted among local manufacturers. It indicates that Chicago has many important advantages for industrial companies. These include access to suppliers and markets, an excellent transportation network, large labor force, and an abundant, high quality water supply and treatment service. Various factors contribute to a firm's decision to relocate from, or not locate within the City, but the one cited most often is the lack of modern industrial space for expanding businesses.

Currently, the City has expressed a policy to maintain and enhance its existing industrial base, and has undertaken actions and adopted ordinances to improve and build upon it. Although the City has suffered from some significant losses, such as the departure of Spiegel, Inc. to Ohio, it is committed to preserving and improving its economic stature. The creation and preservation of jobs is a major economic development goal of the City. The City encourages economic diversity to enable it to reach this goal, adapt to changes in the regional and international market, and absorb the impact of these changes.

Industrial activity plays a significant role in a diversified economy. It provides highly paid employment for residents, supports important secondary jobs, and is an incubator for innovation from which new technologies and industries are created. To support the job creation goal, the City has adopted an industrial land use policy which seeks to:

- 1. Provide opportunities for synergy between related industrial activities:
- 2. Minimize the conflicts between industrial and other land uses;
- 3. Maximize the benefits of public investment in capital programming related to industrial investment.

The 72nd Street and Cicero Avenue Area encompasses approximately 72.5 acres and is composed of the Ford City Industrial Complex, including related parking and loading areas and service roads. It is immediately north of the Ford City Shopping Center. The building as well as the northern portion of

the Ford City Shopping Center were originally constructed as one complex. It was part of the former Ford Motor Company airplane engine testing plant, built at the beginning of World War II (early 1940s). Currently, the major tenant in the industrial building is Tootsie Roll Industries, Inc. (Tootsie Roll), which occupies 1,700,000 square feet of the 2,490,613 square foot building. Tootsie Roll employs over 950 in this plant. Other tenants include Knight Paper Box Company, Winfield Paper and Transload Lumber. Sweetheart Cup formerly occupied over 500,000 square feet, which is now vacant.

The 72nd Street and Cicero Avenue Area is surrounded by the Ford City Shopping Center on the south, industrial uses on the east, vacant land on the north and east, and the Cicero Avenue commercial corridor on the west. The Area is impacted by functional and economic obsolescence due to single purpose design, operational problems, inadequate parking, loading and service restraints, and limited access. The sections of the building occupied by Tootsie Roll suffer from advanced building defects, including deteriorated roofing and seepage throughout. These problems have resulted in the total vacancy of the Sweetheart Cup Company area and the need for capital improvements to the building, premises and related operational functions.

Access to the Area is provided by Cicero Avenue which connects to nearby expressways and major arterials. Private roads (72nd Street and Kostner Avenue) run along the north and east sides of the Area and connect to 77th Street to the south.

Existing site and development constraints must be overcome before achievement of the City's objectives for the maintenance and enhancement of its industrial base through private investment in new construction, modernization and expansion. Although City initiatives and expenditures have stimulated private investment in other industrial areas, the 72nd and Cicero Redevelopment Area as a whole (the "Redevelopment Project Area") has not been subject to growth and development through investment by private enterprise, and is not reasonably expected to be developed without the efforts and leadership of the City, including the adoption of the Tax Increment Financing Redevelopment Project and Plan and the substantial investment of public funds.

## Tax Increment Financing.

In January, 1977, tax increment financing ("T.I.F.") was made possible by the Illinois General Assembly through passage of the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act (hereinafter referred to as the "Act"). The Act is found in Illinois Revised Statutes, Chapter 24, Section 11-74.4-1, et seq., as amended. The Act provides a means for municipalities after the approval of a "redevelopment plan and project" to redevelop "blighted", "conservation" or "industrial park conservation" areas and to finance public redevelopment costs with incremental real estate tax revenues. Incremental

real estate tax revenue ("tax increment revenue") is derived from the increase in the equalized assessed valuation ("E.A.V.") of real property within the T.I.F. redevelopment area over and above the certified initial E.A.V. of the real property. Any increase in E.A.V. is then multiplied by the current tax rate which results in tax increment revenue. A decline in current E.A.V. does not result in a negative real estate tax increment.

To finance redevelopment costs a municipality may issue obligations secured by the anticipated tax increment revenue generated within the redevelopment project area. In addition, a municipality may pledge towards payment of such obligations any part or any combination of the following: (a) net revenues of all or part of any redevelopment project; (b) taxes levied and collected on any or all property in the municipality; (c) the full faith and credit of the municipality; (d) a mortgage on part or all of the redevelopment project; or (e) any other taxes or anticipated receipts that the municipality may lawfully pledge.

Tax increment financing does not generate revenues by increasing tax rates. It generates revenues by allowing the municipality to temporarily capture new tax revenues resulting from redevelopment. Under tax increment financing, all taxing districts continue to receive the tax revenue they received prior to redevelopment from property in the area. Taxing districts can receive distributions of excess increment when more tax increment revenue is received than is necessary to pay for expected redevelopment project costs and principal and interest obligations issued to pay such costs. Taxing districts also benefit from the increased property tax base after redevelopment project costs and obligations are paid.

The 72nd Street And Cicero Avenue Tax Increment Redevelopment Plan And Project.

This 72nd Street and Cicero Avenue Tax Increment Redevelopment Plan and Project (the "Redevelopment Plan") has been formulated in accordance with the provisions of the Act. It is a guide to all proposed public and private actions in the Redevelopment Project Area.

This Redevelopment Plan also specifically describes the Redevelopment Project Area and sets forth the conservation factors which qualify the Redevelopment Project Area for designation as a conservation area as defined in the Act.

In addition to describing the objectives of redevelopment, the Redevelopment Plan sets forth the overall program to be undertaken to accomplish these objectives. The "Redevelopment Project" as used herein means any development project which may, from time to time, be undertaken to accomplish the objectives of the Redevelopment Plan.

The Redevelopment Project represents an important economic opportunity for the City of Chicago. It will greatly improve the environment for private development, enabling a major manufacturing entity to expand and upgrade its facility. It also will enable the City to achieve three important objectives:

1) job retention and creation; 2) improvement of its tax base; and 3) retention of a major industrial employer that might otherwise move to the suburbs or out of state.

The goal of the City of Chicago, however, is to ensure that the entire Redevelopment Project Area be redeveloped on a comprehensive and planned development basis in order to ensure that new development occurs:

- 1. On a coordinated rather than a piecemeal basis to ensure that the land-use, pedestrian access, vehicular circulation, parking, service and urban design systems will functionally come together, meeting contemporary principles and standards.
- 2. On a reasonable, comprehensive and integrated basis to ensure that conservation area factors are eliminated.
- 3. Within a reasonable and defined time period so that the area may contribute productively to the economic vitality of the City.

Redevelopment of the Redevelopment Project Area is a complex undertaking, and it presents challenges and opportunities commensurate with its scale. To a large extent, the success of this effort will depend on the cooperation between the private sector and agencies of local government. The adoption of this Redevelopment Plan will make possible the implementation of a comprehensive program for the redevelopment of the Redevelopment Project Area. By means of public investment, the area will become a stable environment that will again attract private investment. Public investment will set the stage for improving the area with private capital.

Public and private investment is possible only if T.I.F. is used pursuant to the terms of the Act. The revenue generated by the development will play a decisive role in encouraging private development. Conditions that have precluded intensive private investment in the past will be eliminated. Through this Redevelopment Plan, the City will serve as the central force for marshaling the assets and energies of the private sector for a unified cooperative public-private redevelopment effort. Implementation of this Redevelopment Plan will benefit the City, its neighborhoods and all the taxing districts which are included in the 72nd Street and Cicero Avenue Project Area in the form of an expanded tax base, employment opportunities and a wide range of other benefits.

#### Redevelopment Project Area Description.

The boundaries of the 72nd Street and Cicero Avenue Redevelopment Project Area (the "Redevelopment Project Area") have been carefully drawn to include only the real property and improvements thereon substantially benefited by the proposed redevelopment project improvements to be undertaken as part of this Redevelopment Plan. The boundaries are more specifically shown in Figure 1, Boundary Map, and more particularly described as follows:

### Redevelopment Project Area Goals And Policies.

Managed growth in the form of investment in new development and facilities is essential in the Redevelopment Project Area. Redevelopment efforts in the Redevelopment Project Area will strengthen the entire City through additional employment opportunities, increased tax base and infrastructure and environmental improvements.

The Act encourages the public and private sectors to work together to address and solve the problems of urban growth and development. The joint effort between the City and the private sector to redevelop parts of the Redevelopment Project Area will receive significant support from the financing methods made available by the Act.

This section of the Redevelopment Plan identifies the goals and policies of the City for the Redevelopment Project Area. A later section of this Redevelopment Plan identifies the more specific program which the City plans to undertake in achieving the redevelopment goals and policies which have been identified.

#### General Goals.

-- Provide infrastructure improvements within the Redevelopment Project Area.

- -- Encourage industrial development by eliminating the influences and the manifestations of physical and economic deterioration and obsolescence within the Redevelopment Project Area.
- -- Provide sound economic development in the Redevelopment Project Area.
- Revitalize the Redevelopment Project Area to maintain it as an important activity center contributing to the regional and national focus of the City.
- -- Create an environment within the Redevelopment Project Area which will contribute to the health, safety and general welfare of the City, and preserve or enhance the value of properties adjacent to the Redevelopment Project Area.
  - Provide an increased real estate tax base for the City and other taxing districts extending into the Redevelopment Project Area.

#### Policies.

It is the policy of the City of Chicago to:

- Foster the City's industrial base and to maintain the City's diversified economy for the general welfare of its citizens.
- -- Encourage industrial investment, modernization, and expansion by providing for stable and predictable industrial environments.

# Conservation Area Conditions Existing In The Redevelopment Project Area.

The findings presented in this section are based on surveys and analysis conducted for the Redevelopment Project Area. As set forth in the "Act", "conservation area" means any improved area within the boundaries of a redevelopment project area located within the territorial limits of the municipality in which 50 percent or more of the structures in the area have an age of 35 years or more. Such an area is not yet a blighted area, but because of a combination of three or more of the following factors: dilapidation; obsolescence; deterioration; illegal use of individual structures; presence of structures below minimum code standards; abandonment; excessive vacancies; overcrowding of structures and community facilities; lack of ventilation, light or sanitary facilities; inadequate utilities; excessive

land coverage; deleterious land use or layout; depreciation of physical maintenance; or lack of community planning, is detrimental to the public safety, health, morals or welfare and such an area may become a blighted area.

While it may be concluded that the mere presence of three or more of the stated factors may be sufficient to make a finding as a conservation area, the evaluation of this report identifies all existing conservation factors so that reasonable persons can conclude not only that statutory compliance exists, but that public intervention is appropriate and necessary.

On the basis of this approach, the Redevelopment Project Area is eligible as a "conservation area" within the requirements of the Act. The Redevelopment Project Area contains one building subdivided into six tenant spaces and a small accessory building used by Commonwealth Edison. The principal building was constructed in the early 1940s making the structure over 50 years in age. The building used by Commonwealth Edison is over 35 years in age. In addition to age, eight of the fourteen qualifying factors required under the Act are present in the Redevelopment Project Area. These factors are reasonably distributed throughout the entire Redevelopment Project Area. The entire Redevelopment Project Area is impacted by and shows the presence of these conservation factors. Finally, the Redevelopment Project Area includes only real property and improvements substantially benefited by the proposed redevelopment project improvements.

The factors described below and shown in Figure 2, Summary of Conservation Area Factors, are present in the area.

#### 1. Obsolescence.

Obsolescence is present to a major extent. Conditions contributing to this factor include the functional and economic obsolescence of existing single-purpose building and the inadequate provision for vehicular access, off-street parking and loading.

#### 2. Deterioration.

Deterioration is present to a major extent and includes deterioration of building components, parking areas, site surface areas, and perimeter street paving.

#### 3. Structures Below Minimum Code.

The existing structures exhibit advanced defects in components which are below the minimum legal requirements established by the laws, ordinances and regulations of the City.

#### 4. Excessive Vacancies.

Excessive vacancies are present to a major extent. Over 500,000 square feet of space within the principal building is vacant, and a section containing 8.3 acres of land is vacant.

# 5. Excessive Land Coverage.

Excessive land coverage is present to a major extent. The existing building occupies over 75 percent of the site, resulting in limited and confined off-street parking, inadequate service and loading facilities, and limited access from available streets.

# 6. Deleterious Land-Use Or Layout.

Deleterious land-use or layout is present to a major extent. Conditions contributing to this include the improper placement/setback of the building, inconvenient vehicular circulation, and poorly located off-street parking areas.

# 7. Depreciation Of Physical Maintenance.

Depreciation of physical maintenance is present to a major extent and includes substantial deferred maintenance on buildings, parking and related storage and loading areas, perimeter streets and site improvements.

# 8. Lack Of Community Planning.

Lack of community planning is present to a major extent. The Redevelopment Project Area was developed without the benefit or guidance of a community plan with reasonable policies and standards for building setbacks, the location and arrangement of off-street parking, and for ensuring compatible relationships between industrial and retail areas and uses.

The analysis above is based upon surveys and analyses conducted by Trkla, Pettigrew, Allen & Payne, Inc.. The surveys and analyses conducted include:

- 1. Exterior and interior survey of the condition and use of the entire industrial complex;
- 2. Field survey of environmental conditions covering streets, sidewalks, curbs and gutters, lighting, traffic, parking facilities, landscaping, fences and walls, and general property maintenance;
- 3. Analysis of existing use of the Redevelopment Project Area and its relationships to its surroundings;
- 4. Comparison of current land use to current zoning ordinance and the current zoning map;
- 5. Analysis of original and current platting and building size and layout;
- 6. Analysis of vacant portions of the site and building;
- 7. Analysis of building floor area and site coverage; and
- 8. Review of previously prepared plans, studies and data.

5.

# 72nd Street And Cicero Avenue Tax Increment Financing Redevelopment Project.

This section presents the overall program to be undertaken by the City of Chicago or by private parties acting under redevelopment agreements with the City. It includes a description of redevelopment plan and project objectives, a description of redevelopment activities, a general land-use plan, estimated redevelopment project costs, a description of sources of funds to pay redevelopment project costs, a description of obligations that may be issued, identification of the most recent equalized assessed valuation of properties in the Redevelopment Project Area, and an estimate of anticipated equalized assessed valuation.

In the event the City determines that implementation of certain activities or improvements is not feasible, the City may reduce the scope of the overall program and Redevelopment Project.

# Redevelopment Objectives.

- Reduce or eliminate those conditions which qualify the Redevelopment Project Area as a conservation area. Section 4 of this Redevelopment Plan, Conservation Area Conditions Existing in the Redevelopment Project Area, describes existing conservation conditions.
- -- Strengthen the economic well-being of the Redevelopment Project Area and the City by increasing business activity, taxable values, and job opportunities.
- -- Assemble land into parcels functionally adaptable with respect to shape and size for disposition and redevelopment in accordance with contemporary development needs and standards.
- -- Create an environment which stimulates private investment in new construction, expansion and rehabilitation.
- -- Achieve development which is integrated both functionally and aesthetically with nearby existing development, and which contains a complementary mix of uses.
- -- Encourage a high quality appearance of buildings, rights-of-way and open spaces as well as high standards of design.
- -- Provide sites for needed public improvements or facilities in proper relationship to the projected demand for and in accordance with accepted design criteria for such facilities.
- -- Provide needed incentives to encourage a broad range of improvements in both rehabilitation and new development efforts.
- -- Encourage the participation of minorities and women in professional and investment opportunities involved in the development of the Redevelopment Project Area.
- -- Implement and achieve the Redevelopment Project Area Goals and Policies as set forth in Section 3 of this Redevelopment Plan.

# Redevelopment Plan And Project Activities.

The City proposes to achieve its redevelopment goals, policies and objectives for the Redevelopment Project through public financing techniques, including tax increment financing, and by undertaking some or all of the following actions:

1. Property Acquisition, Site Preparation, Demolition And Redevelopment.

Property acquisition and land assembly by the private sector for rehabilitation or redevelopment in accordance with this Redevelopment Plan will be encouraged. To achieve the renewal of the Redevelopment Project Area, property identified in Development Program, Figure 3, attached hereto and made a part hereof, may be acquired by purchase, exchange or long-term lease by the private sector or the City of Chicago and cleared of all improvements and either (a) sold or leased for private redevelopment, or (b) sold, leased or dedicated for construction of public improvements or recreational facilities.

The City may determine that to meet the goals, policies or objectives of this Redevelopment Plan property may be acquired where: a) the current use of the property is not permitted under this Redevelopment Plan; b) the exclusion of the property from acquisition would have a detrimental effect on the disposition and development of adjacent and nearby property; or c) the owner or owners are unwilling or unable to conform the property to the land-use and development objectives of this Redevelopment Plan. Further, the City may require written redevelopment agreements with developers before acquiring any properties.

Clearance and demolition activities will, to the greatest extent possible, be timed to coincide with redevelopment activities so that tracts of land do not remain vacant for extended periods and so that the adverse effects of clearance activities may be minimized. Clearance and demolition activities will include demolition of buildings, breaking-up and removal of old foundations, excavation and removal of soil and other materials to create suitable sites for new development, and provision of storm drainage.

As an incidental but necessary part of the redevelopment process, the City may devote property which it has acquired to temporary uses until such property is scheduled for disposition and redevelopment.

2. Rehabilitation Of Existing Buildings And Fixtures.

Existing buildings are in need of rehabilitation, modernization and expansion in order to overcome existing obsolescence and to maintain their competitive position in the market. Rehabilitation includes upgrading all building systems, including electrical, plumbing, utility, mechanical, ventilation and HVAC; and repair of all building components, including roof, walls, windows, floors, etc..

3. Provision Of Public Improvements.

Adequate public improvements and facilities will be provided to service the entire Redevelopment Project Area. Public improvements and facilities may include, but are not limited to, the following:

A. Utilities.

Adjustments and modifications to utility lines as may be necessary to facilitate and serve redevelopment in accordance with the objectives and provisions of this Redevelopment Plan.

B. Streets And Public Rights Of-Way.

The resurfacing, widening, reconstruction, closing, removal and other improvements of streets and other public rights-of-way.

C. Landscape.

Landscape/buffer improvements, street lighting and general beautification improvements.

4. Environmental Remediation.

Redevelopment of the Redevelopment Project Area may necessitate several actions which relate to environmental remediation. These include, but are not limited to, asbestos removal and abatement.

5. Job Training And Related Educational Programs.

A range of programs designed to increase the skills of existing employees may be implemented. Other programs may be created for future employees so that they can take advantage of the employment opportunities within the Redevelopment Project Area.

6. Analysis, Administration, Studies, Surveys, Legal, Et Al..

Activities include the long-term management of the T.I.F. Program as well as the costs of establishing the program and designing its components.

7. Redevelopment Agreements.

Land assemblage which may be by purchase, exchange, donation, lease, or eminent domain shall be conducted for (a) sale, lease or conveyance to private developers, or (b) sale, lease, conveyance or dedication for the construction of public improvements or facilities. Terms of conveyance shall be incorporated in appropriate disposition agreements which may contain more specific controls than those stated in this Redevelopment Plan.

#### General Land-Use Plan.

Figure 4, Land-Use Plan, attached hereto and made a part hereof, identifies land-uses and public rights-of-way to be in effect upon adoption of this Redevelopment Plan. The major land-use category included within the Redevelopment Project Area is industrial.

The Redevelopment Plan and the Redevelopment Project conform to the 1966 comprehensive plan for development of the City of Chicago as a whole. Further, the Redevelopment Plan and Redevelopment Project are consistent with, and are established pursuant to implementation of, general municipal development objectives and policies contained in development plans previously adopted by the City of Chicago and the Chicago Zoning Ordinance. The property on which the buildings are located is zoned M2-2 General Manufacturing District. The vacant property north of 72nd Street and south of the Clearing Rail Yard in the northwest corner of the Redevelopment Project Area is zoned C4 Motor Freight Terminal District.

All major thoroughfares and street rights-of-way are shown on the Land-Use Plan map. Their locations are subject to modification.

The Land-Use Plan as designated in Figure 4 provides a guide for future manufacturing-related land-use improvements and developments within the Redevelopment Project Area. It conforms to the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, which is cited below.

The following uses are permitted inclusive, provided that within 300 feet of a Residence District all business, servicing, or processing shall take place within completely enclosed buildings, unless otherwise indicated and except for automated teller machines and off-street parking and loading. Within 300 feet of a Residence District, all storage, except of

motor vehicles, shall be within completely enclosed buildings or may be located out-of-doors if it is effectively screened by a solid wall or fence (including solid entrance and exit gates) at least eight feet in height:

- 1. Any production, processing, cleaning, servicing, testing, repair or storage of materials, goods or products which shall not be injurious or offensive to the occupants of adjacent premises by reason of the emission or creation of noise, vibration, smoke, dust or other particulate matter, toxic and noxious materials, odors, fire or explosive hazards, or glare or heat.
- 2. Other compatible uses as defined in the Chicago Zoning Ordinance and approved by the City.

Special uses, performance standards, and use and bulk regulations as set forth in the Chicago Zoning Ordinance are applicable to development within the Redevelopment Project Area.

Estimated Redevelopment Project Costs.

Redevelopment project costs mean and include the sum total of all reasonable or necessary costs incurred or estimated to be incurred, and any such costs incidental to this Redevelopment Plan pursuant to the Act. Such costs include the following:

- 1. Costs of studies, surveys, development of plans and specifications, implementation and administration of the redevelopment plan including but not limited to staff and professional service costs for architectural, engineering, legal, marketing, financial, planning or other services (provided, however, that no charges for professional services may be based on a percentage of the tax increment collected).
- 2. Property assembly costs, including but not limited to, acquisition of real or personal property, or rights or interests therein, demolition of buildings, and the clearing and grading of land.
- 3. Costs of rehabilitation, reconstruction, repair or remodeling of existing public and private buildings and fixtures.
- 4. Costs of the construction of public works or improvements.
- 5. Costs of job training and retraining projects.

- 6. Financing costs, including but not limited to, all necessary and incidental expenses related to the issuance of obligations and which may include payment of interest on any obligations accruing during the estimated period of construction of any redevelopment project for which such obligations are issued and for a period not exceeding 36 months thereafter, including reasonable related reserves.
- 7. All or a portion of a taxing district's capital costs resulting from the redevelopment project and incurred in furtherance of the redevelopment plan and project, to the extent a municipality by written agreement accepts and approves such costs.
- 8. Relocation costs to the extent that a municipality determines that relocation costs shall be paid or is required to make payment of relocation costs by federal or state law.
- 9. Payment in lieu of taxes.
- 10. Costs of job training, vocational education or career education, provided that such costs (i) are related to the establishment and maintenance of additional job training, advanced vocational education or career education programs for persons employed or to be employed by employers located in a redevelopment project area; and (ii) when incurred by a taxing authority or taxing districts other than the municipality, are set forth in a written agreement among the municipality and the taxing authority or taxing districts, which agreement describes the program to be undertaken, including but not limited to the number of employees to be trained, a description of the training and services to be provided, the number and type of positions available or to be available, itemized costs of the program and sources of funds to pay for the same, and the term of the agreement.
  - 11. Interest cost incurred by a developer related to the construction, renovation or rehabilitation of a redevelopment project provided that:
    - a. Such costs are to be paid directly from the special tax allocation fund (the fund into which the incremental tax proceeds are deposited as pursuant to the Act);
    - b. Such payments in any one year may not exceed 30 percent of the annual interest costs incurred by the developer with regard to the redevelopment project during that year;

- c. If there are not sufficient funds available in the special tax allocation fund to make such payments, then the amounts so due shall accrue and be payable when sufficient funds are available in the special tax allocation fund; and
- d. The total of such interest payments incurred pursuant to this Act may not exceed 30 percent of the total (A) costs paid or incurred by the developer for such redevelopment project plus (B) redevelopment project costs, including any property assembly costs and any relocation costs, incurred by a municipality pursuant to this Act.

A range of activities and improvements will be required to implement the tax increment redevelopment project. The necessary improvements and their costs are shown in Table 1, Estimated Redevelopment Project Costs. To the extent that the City has incurred costs or municipal obligations have been issued to pay for such Redevelopment Project costs in anticipation of the adoption of tax increment financing, the City shall be reimbursed from real estate tax increment revenues for such redevelopment costs. The total redevelopment project costs are intended to provide an upper limit on expenditures. Within this limit, adjustments may be made in line items without amendment of this Redevelopment Plan. Additional funding in the form of state and federal grants, and private developer contributions will be pursued by the City as means of financing improvements and facilities which are of a general community benefit.

Sources Of Funds To Pay Redevelopment Project Costs.

Funds necessary to pay for redevelopment project costs and municipal obligations which have been issued to pay for such costs are to be derived principally from tax increment revenues and proceeds from municipal obligations which have as their revenue source tax increment revenue. To secure the issuance of these obligations, the City may permit the utilization of guarantees, deposits and other forms of security made available by private sector developers.

The tax increment revenue which will be used to fund tax increment obligations and redevelopment project costs shall be the incremental real property tax revenue is attributable to the increase in the current E.A.V. of each taxable lot, block, tract or parcel of real property in the Redevelopment Project Area over and above the initial E.A.V. of each such property in the Redevelopment Project Area. Other sources of funds which may be used to pay for redevelopment costs and obligations issued, the proceeds of which are used to pay for such costs, are land disposition proceeds, state and federal grants, investment income, and such other sources of funds and revenues as the municipality may from time to time deem appropriate.

Issuance Of Obligations.

The City may issue obligations secured by the tax increment special tax allocation fund pursuant to Section 11-74.4-7 of the Act.

<sup>\*</sup> Exclusive of capitalized interest, issuance cost, administrative cost, interest and other financing cost.

All obligations issued by the City pursuant to this Redevelopment Plan and the Act shall be retired within twenty-three (23) years from the adoption of the ordinance approving the Redevelopment Project Area, such ultimate retirement date occurring in the year 2016. Also, the final maturity date of any such obligations which are issued may not be later than twenty (20) years from their respective dates of issue. One or more series of obligations may be sold at one or more times in order to implement this Redevelopment Plan. The amounts payable in any year as principal of and interest on all obligations issued by the City pursuant to the Redevelopment Plan and the Act shall not exceed the amounts available, or projected to be available, from tax increment revenues and from such bond sinking funds or other sources of funds as may be provided by ordinance. Obligations may be of a parity or senior/junior lien natures. Obligations issued may be serial or term maturities, and may or may not be subject to mandatory sinking fund redemptions.

Revenues shall be used for the scheduled and/or early retirement of obligations, and for reserves, bond sinking funds and redevelopment project costs, and, to the extent that real property tax increment is not used for such purposes, may be declared surplus and shall then become available for distribution annually to taxing districts in the Redevelopment Project Area in the manner provided by the Act.

Most Recent Equalized Assessed Valuation Of Properties In The Redevelopment Project Area.

Table 2 lists the most recent proposed 1992 equalized assessed valuation of property in the Redevelopment Project Area. The total estimated equalized assessed valuation for the Redevelopment Project Area is \$6,724,527.

# Anticipated Equalized Assessed Valuation.

In year 1999 (collection year 2000) when all improvements are completed, the estimated equalized assessed valuation of real property in the Redevelopment Project Area is estimated at \$7,568,500. This estimate is based on several key assumptions, including: 1) redevelopment for the uses specified in this Redevelopment Plan will occur in a timely manner; 2) the market value of the recommended industrial development will increase following completion of the redevelopment activities described in the Redevelopment Plan; and 3) the State Multiplier of 2.0897 as applied to 1992 assessed values will remain unchanged.

Phasing And Scheduling Of Redevelopment Project.

A phased implementation strategy will be utilized to achieve a timely and orderly redevelopment of the project area.

It is anticipated that City expenditures for redevelopment project cost will be carefully staged on a reasonable and proportional basis to coincide with expenditures in redevelopment by private developers.

**7**.

Provisions For Amending This Redevelopment.

This 72nd Street and Cicero Avenue Tax Increment Redevelopment Project and Plan may be amended pursuant to the provisions of the Act.

8.

#### Affirmative Action Plan.

The City is committed to and will affirmatively implement the following principles with respect to the 72nd Street and Cicero Avenue Tax Increment Redevelopment Plan and Project:

- A. The assurance of equal opportunity in all personnel and employment actions with respect to the Plan and Project, including, but not limited to: hiring, training, transfer, promotion, discipline, fringe benefits, salary, employment, working conditions, termination, etc., without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, handicapped status, national origin, creed or ancestry.
- B. This commitment to affirmative action will ensure that all members of the protected groups are sought out to compete for all job openings and promotional opportunities.

In order to implement these principles for this Plan and Project, the City shall require and promote equal employment practices and affirmative action on the part of itself and its contractors and vendors. In particular, parties contracting for work on the Project shall be required to agree to the principles set forth in this section.

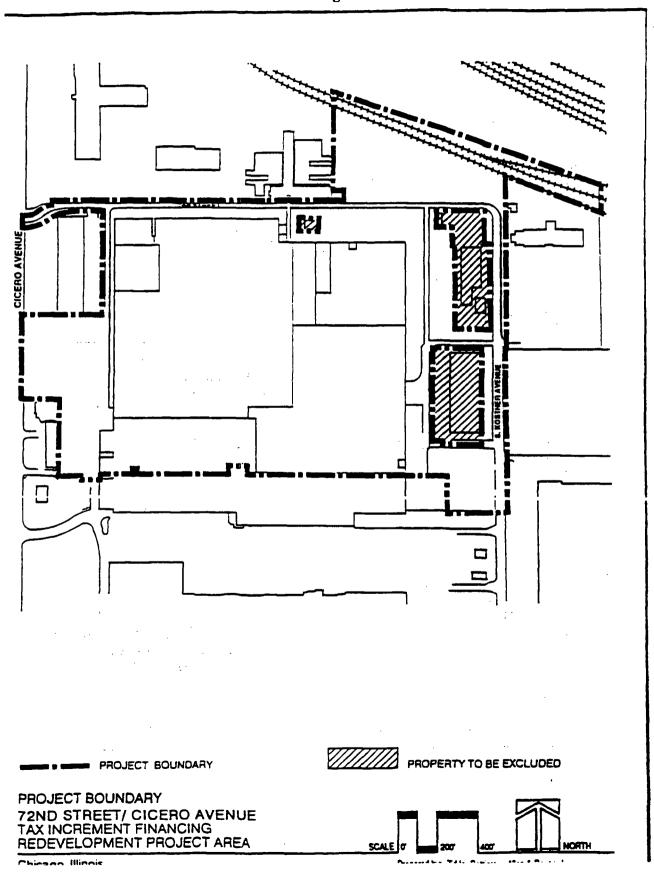
[Figures 1, 2, 3 and 4 attached to this Exhibit "E" printed on pages 41983 through 41986 of this Journal.]

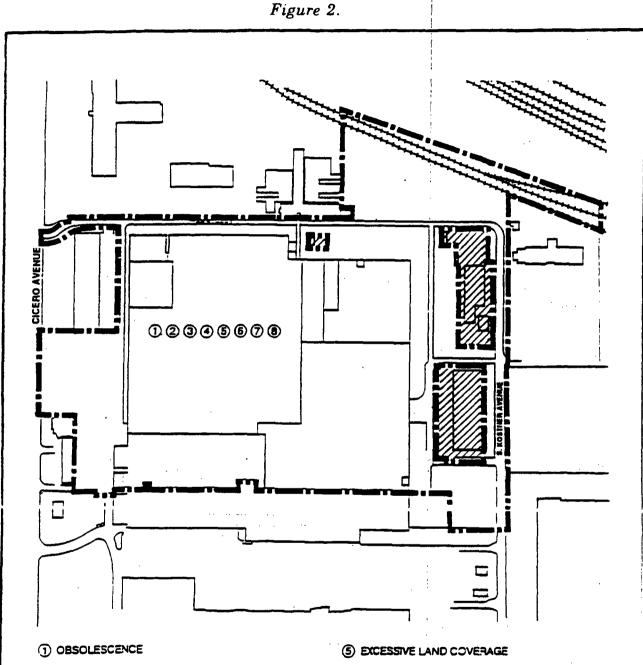

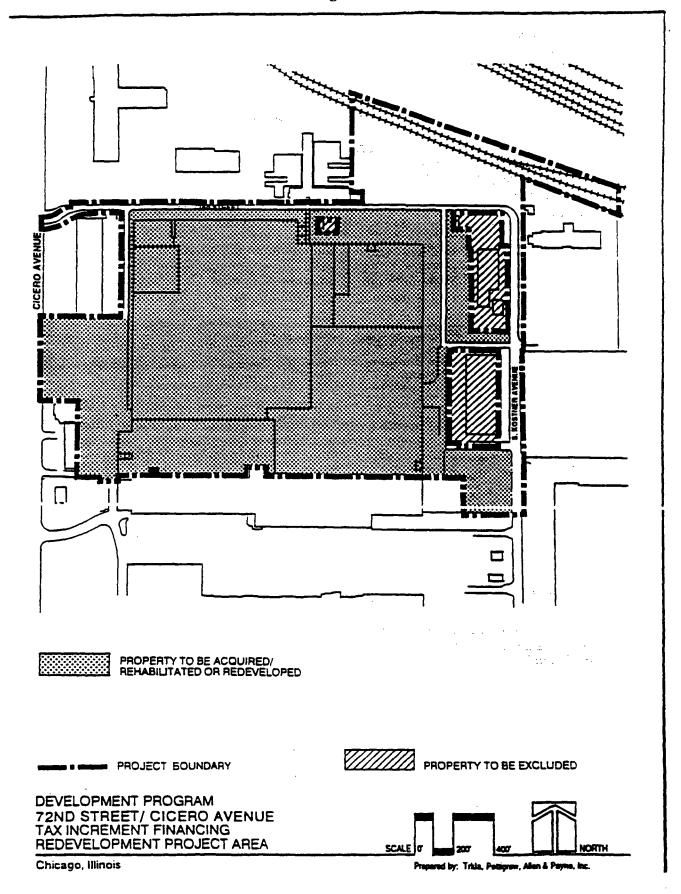

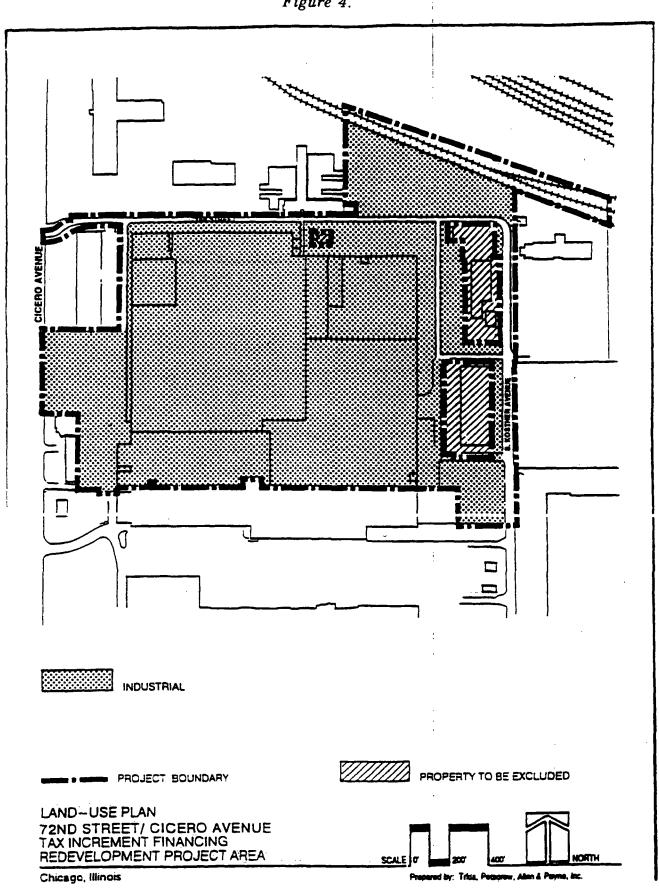

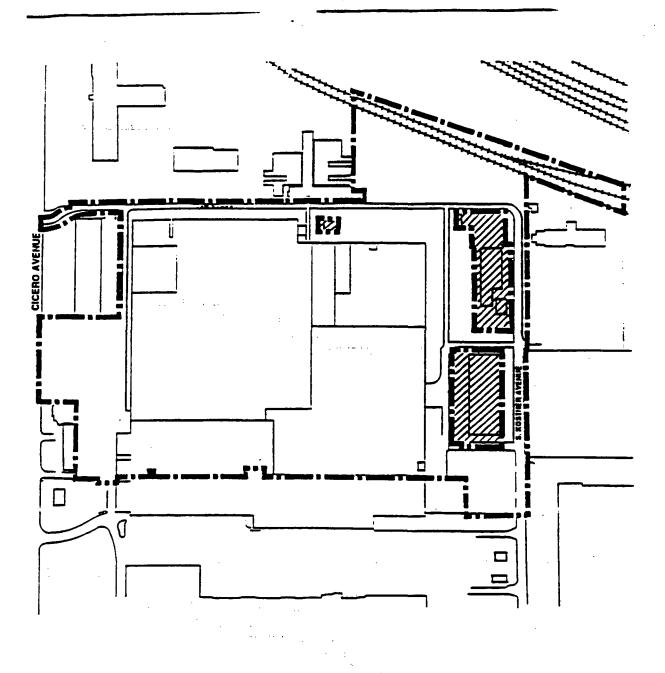

WHEREAS, It is desirable and in the best interests of the citizens of the City of Chicago, Illinois (the "Municipality"), for the Municipality to implement tax increment allocation financing pursuant to the Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act, 65 ILCS 5/11-74.4-1 et seq. (1992), as amended (the "Act"), for a proposed redevelopment plan and redevelopment project (the "Plan" and "Project") within the municipal

boundaries of the Municipality and within a proposed redevelopment project area to be known as 72nd and Cicero Redevelopment Project Area (the "Area") described in Section 1 of this ordinance; and

WHEREAS, The Community Development Commission and the City Council of the Municipality (the "Corporate Authorities") have heretofore adopted and approved the Plan and Project, which Plan and Project were identified in An Ordinance Of The City Of Chicago, Illinois, Approving And Adopting A Redevelopment Plan And Redevelopment Project For The 72nd And Cicero Redevelopment Project Area and were the subject, along with the Area designation hereinafter made, of a public hearing held on September 29, 1993; and

WHEREAS, It is now necessary and desirable to designate the Area as a redevelopment project area pursuant to the Act; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

- SECTION 1. Area Designated. The Area, as described in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference, is hereby designated as a redevelopment project area pursuant to Section 5/11-74.4-4 of the Act. The map of the Area is depicted on Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference. The street location (as near as practicable) for the Area is described in Exhibit C attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference.
- SECTION 2. Area Size. The Area is not less in the aggregate than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  acres, and there exist conditions which cause the Area to be classified as a "blighted area" under the Act.
- SECTION 3. Contiguity; Substantial Benefit. The Area includes only those contiguous parcels of real property and improvements thereon substantially benefitted by the proposed redevelopment project improvements.
- SECTION 4. Invalidity of Any Section. If any section, paragraph or provision of this ordinance shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.
- SECTION 5. Superseder and Effective Date. All ordinances, resolutions, motions or orders in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage and approval as provided by law.

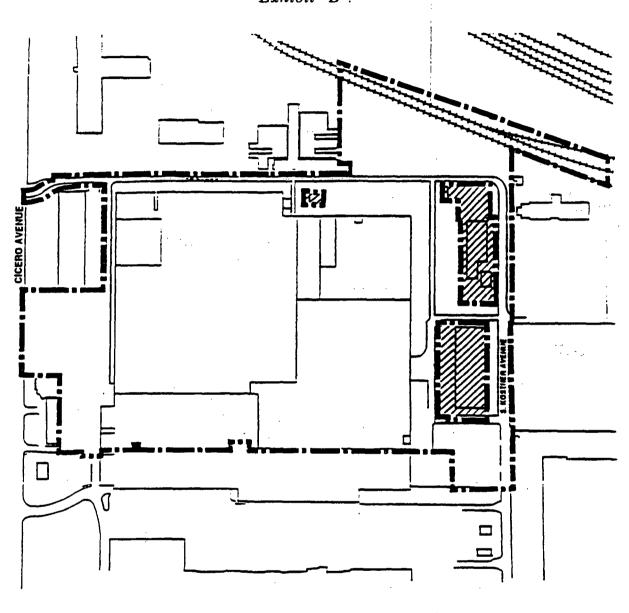

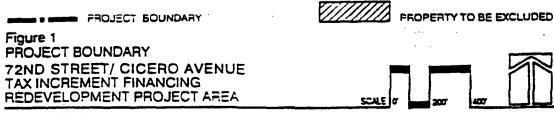

WHEREAS, The Municipality has heretofore adopted a redevelopment plan and project (the "Plan" and "Project") as required by the Act by passage of An Ordinance Of The City of Chicago, Illinois Approving And Adopting A Redevelopment Plan And Redevelopment Project For The 72nd And Cicero Project Area and has heretofore designated a redevelopment project area (the "Area") as required by the Act by passage of An Ordinance Of The City Of Chicago, Illinois, Designating The 72nd And Cicero Redevelopment Project Area Of Said City A Redevelopment Project Area Pursuant To The Tax Increment Allocation Redevelopment Act and has otherwise complied with all other conditions precedent required by the Act; now, therefore,

- SECTION 1. Tax Increment Financing Adopted. Tax increment allocation financing is hereby adopted to pay redevelopment project costs as defined in the Act and as set forth in the Plan and Project within the redevelopment project area as described in Exhibit A (the "Area") attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference. The map of the Area is depicted on Exhibit B attached hereto and incorporated as if set out in full by this reference. The street location (as near as practicable) for the Area is described in Exhibit C attached hereto and incorporated herein as if set out in full by this reference.
- SECTION 2. Allocation of Ad Valorem Taxes. Pursuant to the Act, the ad valorem taxes, if any, arising from the levies upon taxable real property in the Area by taxing districts and tax rates determined in the manner provided in Section 5/11-74.4-9(c) of the Act each year after the effective date of this ordinance until the Project costs and obligations issued in respect thereto, have been paid, shall be divided as follows:

  - (b) That portion, if any, of such taxes which is attributable to the increase in the current equalized assessed valuation of each taxable lot, block, tract or parcel of real property in the Area over and above the initial equalized assessed value of each property in the Area shall be allocated to, and when collected, shall be paid to the municipal treasurer who shall deposit said taxes into a special fund, hereby created, and designated the "72nd and Cicero Redevelopment Project Area Special Tax Allocation Fund" of the Municipality and such taxes shall be used for the purpose of paying Project costs and obligations incurred in the payment thereof.

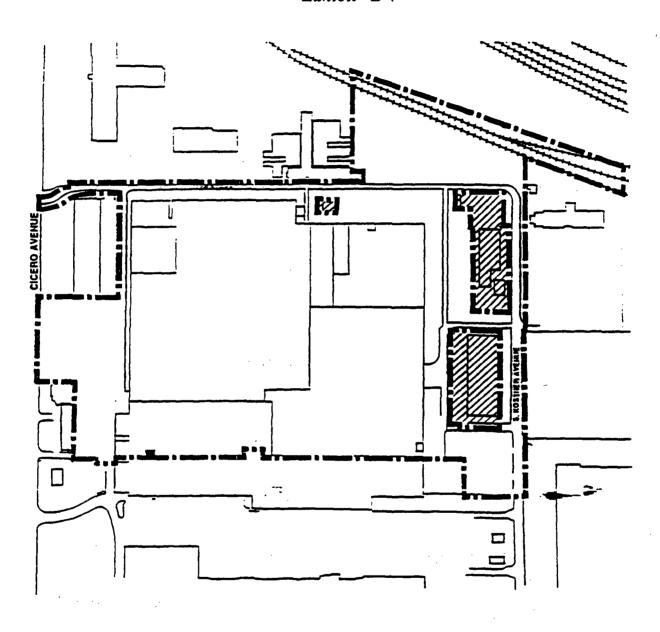
Street Location.

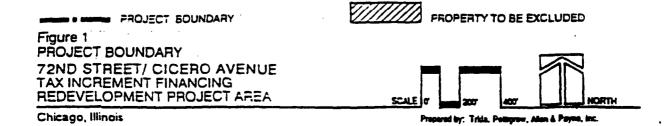
72nd And Cicero Tax Increment Financing District.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That the Commissioner of the Department of Streets and Sanitation is authorized to execute on behalf of the City an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Illinois Department of Central Management Services ("D.C.M.S.") substantially in the form attached hereto as Exhibit B, granting the City the right to store and remove salt upon D.C.M.S. Property, as set forth in Exhibit A attached hereto.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its passage.

### Exhibit "B".

Intergovernmental Agreement To Utilize Excess Space.

The Department of Central Management Services ("D.C.M.S.") makes this agreement with the Department of General Services, City of Chicago, to allow the City of Chicago ("City") to utilize the following excess property on the terms and conditions listed below:

- 1. Premises: Read Mental Health Center, the northwest quadrant of a 10 acre parcel of state surplus property identified on the attached survey plat. The site is adjacent to the south property line of the Wright College parking lot.
- 2. Term: The term of this agreement shall be for the period beginning December 1, 1993 and ending April 1, 1995.
- 3. Renewal: Upon the mutual consent of the parties, this agreement may be renewed for as many subsequent one year periods as necessary. No individual term will exceed one fiscal year in length.
- 4. Termination: This agreement may be terminated by either party upon giving the other party written notice 120 days prior to the termination.
- 5. Notice: All notices will be sent to the Commissioner of General Services and Sanitation and to the D.C.M.S. Bureau of Property Management.
- 6. Use of Premises: The City agrees to use the assigned property solely for the purpose of conducting City business.
- 7. Right of Entry: D.C.M.S. agrees to allow the City free access to the premises for the purpose of storing and removing salt.
- 8. Alterations: The City may make reasonable alterations to the premises with prior approval of D.C.M.S..
- 9. Assignment: Neither party may assign any of its rights under this agreement.
- 10. Operation of Programs: The parties agree that each party's programs and operations are to function as completely separate entities with no overlap of authority, duties or responsibilities other than those contained in this agreement.

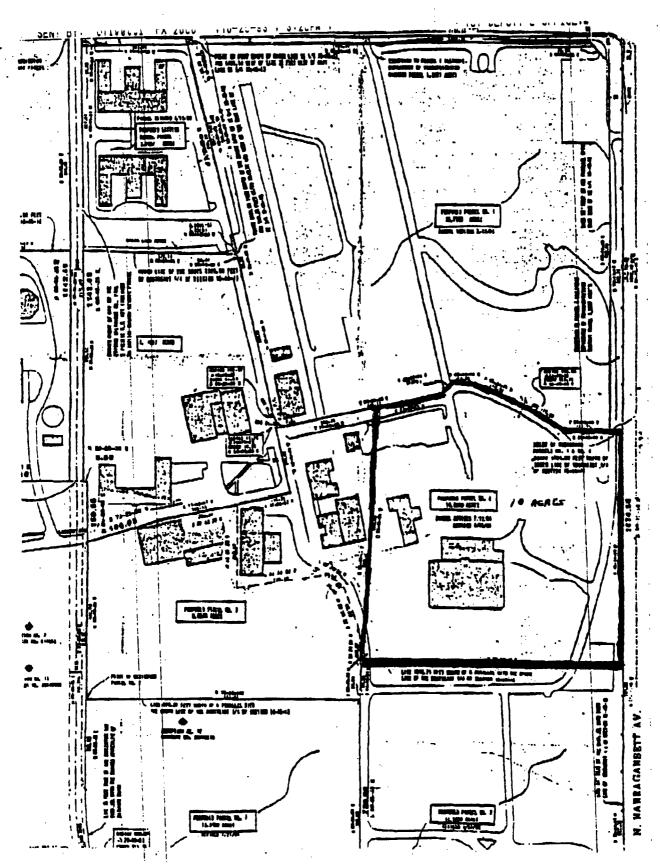

WHEREAS, Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center has expended over \$150,000,000.00 in the last fifteen years in the expansion and rehabilitation of its physical facilities and is currently planning additional improvements to its facilities to improve the delivery of health services to Chicago residents; and

WHEREAS, Historically, charitable, religious and educational institutions not conducted for private gain or profit have been exempt from the payment of City fees associated with, but not limited to, building

permits, inspection permits, licenses, warrants of collection, water rates and certain City levies, by orders and ordinances adopted by the City Council of Chicago, executive orders and pursuant to various provisions of Municipal Code of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center was required to submit to the City Council individual orders for each City fee and levy to which it is entitled to an exemption; and

WHEREAS, There is a significant costs and expenditure of time incurred by Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center and the City in processing individual City Council orders exempting the payment of each City fee and the processing of refund checks when a City Council order is not approved prior to the date payment is due and Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center is required to pay the City fee; and

WHEREAS, Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center is uniquely located in the Medical Center District, which district was created by "an Act in relation to the establishment of the Medical Center District in the City of Chicago, and for the control and management thereof", approved June 4, 1941, as amended, Illinois Compiled Statutes, Chapter 70, Act 915, Section 1, et seq. ("Act"); and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois Medical Center Commission was created by the Act for the purpose of managing and operating the Illinois Medical Center District pursuant to the Act; and

WHEREAS, The State of Illinois Medical Center Commission passed a resolution recommending that the City Council exempt Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center from the payment of City fees and levies as provided for in this ordinance; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. That Rush-Presbyterian-St. Luke's Medical Center, as an Illinois not-for-profit corporation, also doing business as Rush Children's Services, engaged in medical, educational and related activities ("Rush"), shall be exempt for the calendar year 1994 from the payment of all City fees including, but not limited to, fees associated with building permits, inspections permits, licenses, warrants for collection, water rates, uses of the public right-of-ways and all City levies to which it is entitled to an exemption pursuant to previously adopted City Council orders and ordinances, executive orders and provisions of the Municipal Code of Chicago, which exempt charities, religious or educational institutions not conducted for private gain or profit.

SECTION 2. That Rush shall be entitled to refunds for any City imposed fees which it may inadvertently or erroneously pay and to which it is exempt

pursuant to Section 1 of this ordinance without the need for an additional City Council ordinance or order.

SECTION 3. That the Commissioner of Buildings, the Commissioner of Streets and Sanitation, the Commissioner of Transportation, the Commissioner of Consumer Services, the Director of Revenue and the Commissioners or Directors of all other City departments are hereby directed to issue all necessary permits and licenses and provide other City services as described in Section 1 of this ordinance, free of charge, to Rush, provided, however, that Rush shall remain an Illinois not-for-profit corporation engaged in medical, educational and related activities.

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago ("City") is a duly constituted and existing municipality within the meaning of Section 1 of Article VII of the 1970 Constitution of the State of Illinois ("Constitution"), having a population in excess of 25,000, and is a home rule unit of local government under Section 6(a) of Article VII of the Constitution; and

WHEREAS, The City owns and operates an airport known as Chicago Midway Airport ("Airport") with the authority to lease premises and facilities thereon and to grant other rights and privileges; and

WHEREAS, The City currently has a Hangar and Hangar Site Agreement ("Lease") with Ameritech Corporation (formerly named American Information Technologies Corporation) ("Ameritech") for certain premises at the Airport; and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City approved a sublease between Ameritech and Midway Air Transportation, Inc. (doing business as "Midway Airlines") on October 7, 1993 for certain office space under the Lease; and

WHEREAS, Ameritech now wishes to sublease additional premises under the Lease to Midway Airlines; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The recitals set forth above are incorporated herein by reference.

SECTION 2. The Commissioner of the Department of Aviation ("Commissioner") is hereby authorized, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form and legality, to grant his approval to a

sublease between Ameritech and Midway Airlines in substantially the form attached hereto as Exhibit 1.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its passage.

#### Recitals.

Whereas, Beatrice Companies, Inc. ("Beatrice") leased a hanger site (the "Site") at Chicago Midway Airport (the "Airport") pursuant to a Hangar and Hangar Site Agreement between the City of Chicago (the "Landlord") and Beatrice, dated March 11, 1987 (the "Prime Lease"), a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A and incorporated herein by reference; and

Whereas, Beatrice subsequently caused to be constructed on the Site a hangar building ("Hanger Building"), which contains space in which to hangar aircraft ("Hanger Space"), space for offices ("Office Space"), a maintenance shop (the "Shop") and common areas, utilities and support space (the "Common Areas") (collectively, the Site, the Hangar Building and all other improvements thereon are called the "Property"); and

Whereas, Pursuant to various agreements between Sublandlord and certain Beatrice affiliates, the Prime Lease was assigned to Sublandlord, and Sublandlord became the "Tenant" as that term is defined in and used under the Prime Lease; and

Whereas, Subject to the consent of Landlord, Subtenant desires to sublease and license from Sublandlord and Sublandlord desires to sublease and license to Subtenant that portion of the Property subject to the Prime Lease (hereinafter called the "Premises") described in Section 1 hereof and depicted on Exhibit B attached hereto and made a part hereof, all upon the terms and subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth.

# Agreements:

In consideration of the mutual covenants contained herein, the parties agree as follows:

#### Section 1.

# Description Of The Premises.

- 1.1 (a) Sublandlord hereby subleases to Subtenant (i) approximately 6,928 square feet of Office Space referred to as the Subleased Office Space on attached Exhibit B ("Subleased Office Space") and (ii) approximately 976 square feet of the Shop Space referred to as Subleased Shop Space on attached Exhibit B ("Subleased Shop Space"). Sublandlord hereby agrees that Subtenant shall have a non-exclusive license to use (i) 30.40 percent of the Shop Space and Hangar Space (for the period November 1, 1993 to April 30, 1994), 52.40 per cent of the Shop Space and Hangar Space (for the period May 1, 1994 to October 31, 1994) and 70 percent of the Shop Space and Hangar Space (for the period from November 1, 1994 until the end of the Initial Term or the Extended Term, if applicable) referred to as Shop Space and Hangar Space, respectively on the attached Exhibit B ("Licensed Shop Space" and "Licensed Hangar Space", respectively), and (ii) the Common Areas referred to as the Common Areas on attached Exhibit B ("Licensed Common Areas"). Collectively, the Subleased Office Space, the Subleased Shop Space, the Licensed Shop Space, the Licensed Hangar Space and the Licensed Common Areas are referred to as the "Premises".
- 1.2 Sublandlord shall permit Subtenant during Sublandlord's business hours to use, when not being used by Sublandlord, the paint spray booth, bead blaster, flammable fluid storage and parts cleaning rooms located in the shed on the floor of the Hangar Building. The cost for maintenance of such facilities shall be included in Expenses reimbursable by Subtenant as part of Participation Rent pursuant to Section 4.3.

#### Section 2.

# Purpose Of Sublease And License Agreement.

2.1 The Licensed Hangar Space shall be used by Subtenant only for the hangaring and routine maintenance (as permitted under this Agreement) of Subtenant's aircraft.

Exhibition of aircraft shall be permitted only upon the advance written consent of Sublandlord, which shall be at Sublandlord's sole discretion. The balance of the Premises shall be used by Subtenant only as offices for the conduct of administrative operations in support of its commercial airline operation and the Subleased Shop Space shall be used by Subtenant for the maintenance of aircraft owned, leased or rented by Subtenant. Subtenant shall not use the Premises for any illegal, immoral or hazardous activity, whether within or outside the scope of the business of Subtenant, or for any purpose which would violate any use restrictions contained in the Prime Lease. Subtenant shall not store flammable fluids on the Premises, provided, however, Sublandlord will at Subtenant's request store reasonable quantities of flammable fluids in Sublandlord's flammable fluid storage room in the Shop Space.

#### Section 3.

# Terms Of Agreement.

3.1 This Agreement shall commence as of the date noted in the first paragraph hereof and, unless earlier terminated pursuant to the provisions hereof, shall expire on the same date ten years thereafter (the "Initial Term"). After the Initial Term, this Agreement shall automatically continue in existence for a term beginning on the expiration date of the Initial Term and extending until five days prior to the expiration date of the Initial Term of the Prime Lease ("Extended Term"), unless earlier terminated pursuant to the provisions hereof. Subtenant may terminate the tenancy at the end of the Initial Term by giving Sublandlord one year prior written notice.

# Section 4.

#### Rent.

4.1 Rent for the Premises shall consist of three components: "Base Rent", "Participation Rent" and "Additional Rent" as set forth below.

4.2 Subtenant shall pay to Sublandlord annual Base Rent for the Premises as follows:

Annual Base Rent shall be payable in equal monthly installments. Each such installment shall be due and payable in advance on the first day of each calendar month of the term hereof. If the term of this Agreement commences on a day other than the first day of a month, or ends on a day other than the last day of a month, Base Rent for such month shall be prorated; Base Rent for any such partial first month of the term hereof shall be paid on the day on which the term commences.

4.3 (a) As of the first day of the second month of the first year and of each month for that year and the following calendar year of the term hereof, Subtenant shall pay Participation Rent to Sublandlord, monthly in arrears. On the first day of January, 1995, Subtenant shall pay to Sublandlord Participation Rent for both the months of December, 1994 (in arrears) and January, 1995 (in advance). As of the first day of each other month for calendar year 1995 and each calendar year thereafter during the term hereof, Subtenant shall pay Participation Rent to Sublandlord monthly in advance. "Participation Rent" shall equal one-twelfth (1/12) of Subtenant's proportionate share of the estimated aggregate amount of Expenses for the relevant calendar year as reasonably determined by Sublandlord. Subtenant's portion shall be 40 percent for the period November 1, 1993 to April 30, 1994, 56 percent for the period May 1, 1994 to October 31, 1994, and 70 percent for the period from November 1, 1994 until the end of the Initial Term or the Extended Term, if applicable. Said estimated amount shall be based upon a complete calendar year's Expenses regardless of when the cost is incurred or paid during the calendar year. Sublandlord may, at any time and from time to time, furnish to Subtenant a revised statement of estimated Expenses for such calendar year and thereafter Subtenant's estimated Expenses shall change accordingly.

- (b) "Expenses" shall include all costs incurred by or on behalf of Sublandlord for owning, operating, managing, maintaining and repairing the Property and the personal property used in conjunction therewith including, without limitation: rent and all other amounts payable to the Landlord under the Prime Lease; real estate taxes, assessments, sewer rents, and any other federal, state or local governmental charge which may be levied, assessed or imposed against the Property or Sublandlord's interest therein; the cost of security and security devices and systems; snow and ice and trash removal; janitorial service for Hangar Space, Shop and Common Areas; landscapping; utility charges; insurance and payment of uninsured claims including deductibles; painting; supplies; sales, use and other taxes on supplies and services; and the cost of wages and salaries, including fringe benefits and payroll taxes, of all persons engaged in the operation, management, maintenance and repair of the Property. Expenses shall exclude depreciation of Sublandlord's investment in the Property and Sublandlord's mortgage interest. Expenses shall be limited to all reasonable costs necessary to maintain the Property and personal property in the same or similar condition as they are in as of the date of this Agreement, except for costs of any capital improvements required to be reimbursed to Landlord under the Prime Lease or which were made or installed for the purpose of reducing expenses or made or installed pursuant to governmental requirements or insurance requirement, which costs shall be amortized by Sublandlord in accordance with sound accounting and management principles and included as reimbursable Expenses in accordance with this Section 4.3.
- (c) Within a reasonable time after the end of each calendar year during the term hereof, Sublandlord will furnish to Subtenant a statement setting forth the actual amount of Expenses for said calendar year, as compared to the estimated Expenses. If Subtenant's proportionate share of actual Expenses is greater than the amounts paid by Subtenant as estimated Expenses on account of the previous calendar year, Subtenant shall reimburse Sublandlord for such excess as Participation Rent which shall be due with the next payment of monthly Base Rent regardless of whether Subtenant shall dispute the statement. If Subtenant has paid an amount greater than its proportionate share of the actual Expenses, Sublandlord shall credit such excess against the next installment of estimated Expenses payment due prospectively.
- (d) Subtenant shall continue to pay the estimated Expenses each month until Sublandlord notifies Subtenant of any change in such amount. Sublandlord's failure during the term hereof to prepare and deliver any estimates, statements, invoices or bills, or Sublandlord's failure to make a demand under this Agreement, shall not in any way be deemed to be a waiver of, or cause Sublandlord to forfeit or surrender, its rights to collect any monies referred to in this Agreement which may have become due. Subtenant's liability for the amounts due under this Agreement shall survive the expiration or sooner termination of this Agreement and may be billed to Subtenant at any time after Subtenant vacates.

- 4.4 Subtenant shall provide to Sublandlord as Additional Rent Midway Airlines ticket vouchers with a value of \$200,000 upon execution of this Agreement. Such vouchers shall remain valid for at least five (5) years from the date of receipt by Sublandlord. These vouchers may be used as a credit against the fare of any Midway Airlines flight, dollar for dollar, without discount or other restriction. Sublandlord shall reimburse Subtenant for any travel agent commissions and airport taxes assessed on a per passenger basis, both reasonably incurred by Subtenant and related to the vouchers.
- 4.5 (a) All Base Rent, Participation Rent and Additional Rent shall be paid without set-off or deduction whatsoever and shall be paid to Sublandlord at its office at the Airport, or at such other place as Sublandlord may designate by notice to Subtenant.
- (b) All past due installments of Base Rent and Participation Rent shall bear interest from the date due until paid at the rate per annum equal to two percent (2%) in excess of the Prime Rate (as hereinafter defined) in effect from time to time, which rate shall change from time to time as of the effective date of each change in the Prime Rate, unless a lesser rate shall then be the maximum rate permissible by law with respect thereto, in which event said lesser rate shall be charged. For the purposes of this Sublease, the term "Prime Rate" shall mean the rate of interest announced from time to time by the First National Bank of Chicago or its successors as its prime or corporate base rate.
- (c) In addition, if an installment of Base Rent and Participation Rent and all accrued interest thereon are not paid in full within five (5) days after said installment is due, Subtenant agrees and covenants to pay, as Participation Rent, a late fee equal to five percent (5%) of the amount of any delinquent payment. Such payment shall be deemed liquidated damages and not a penalty, and shall not excuse the untimely payment of rent.

#### Section 5.

# Condition Of Premises And Construction Of Improvements.

5.1 Subtenant's taking possession of the Premises shall be conclusive evidence as against Subtenant that the Premises were in good order and satisfactory condition when Subtenant took possession. No promise of Sublandlord to alter, remodel or improve the Premises, and no representation respecting the condition of the Premises have been made by Sublandlord to Subtenant. Upon the expiration of the term hereof, or upon any earlier termination of the term hereof or of Subtenant's right to possession, Subtenant shall surrender the Premises in at least as good condition as at the commencement of the term of this Agreement, ordinary wear and tear excepted; failing which, Sublandlord may restore the

Premises to such condition and Subtenant shall pay the cost thereof to Sublandlord on demand.

- (a) Subtenant shall not make any alterations, additions or improvements (collectively, the "Alterations") on or to the Premises without first obtaining the written consent of Sublandlord and, to the extent required under the Prime Lease, the Landlord. Sublandlord's consent shall not unreasonably be withheld, except for structural Alterations or Alterations visible from outside the Premises, which such consent may be withheld in Sublandlord's sole discretion. Further, Subtenant will not make Alterations which would materially affect Subtenant's use of utilities or affect Sublandlord's overall management of the premises subject to the Prime Lease without Sublandlord's consent which may be withheld in its sole discretion. The following conditions shall be deemed reasonable and shall be met by Subtenant each time that Sublandlord's reasonable consent is required as aforesaid prior to commencing any work in the Premises: (i) Subtenant shall first submit comprehensive working drawings (including revisions thereto) for all such work, prepared and certified by architects, structural engineers, mechanical engineers and/or electrical engineers as may be reasonably required by Sublandlord; (ii) Sublandlord shall have the right to review all such working drawings and, within a reasonable period of time, to notify the Subtenant of any corrections or revisions which Sublandlord desires to make in said working drawings, and Subtenant agrees to comply with all such corrections or revisions which Sublandlord may reasonably require; (iii) Alterations shall not affect structural or mechanical components of the Hangar Building; and (iv) Subtenant shall advise Sublandlord of the identity of each contractor hired to do any such work in the Premises, all of such contractors to be properly licensed, bonded, insured and reasonably acceptable to Sublandlord. Subtenant shall promptly reimburse Sublandlord for all expenses, if any, incurred by Sublandlord pursuant to this Section 5.2 (including, but not limited to, reasonable expenses incurred by Sublandlord in reviewing all drawings and plans pursuant to clauses (i) and (ii) above and a reasonable supervisory fee).
- (b) In the event Sublandlord consents to any Alterations, such Alterations shall be performed in a good and workmanlike manner, and Subtenant shall provide Sublandlord with a certificate of builder's risk insurance acceptable to Sublandlord prior to commencing work. Subtenant shall indemnify and hold harmless Sublandlord from and against any and all costs, expenses, claims, liens and damages to person or property resulting from the making of any such Alterations in or to the Premises. Subtenant shall not permit a mechanic's lien or liens to be placed upon the Premises or the Hangar Building as a result of any Alterations made by it and agrees, if any such lien be filed on account of the acts of Subtenant, its employees, agents or contractors, promptly either to pay the same, or to deposit with Sublandlord, pending resolution of the lien claim, an amount sufficient to pay the same. In the event Subtenant fails to pay any such lien, or to make any such deposit in lieu of payment, Sublandlord shall have the option of paying such lien and the cost thereof shall be charged to Subtenant as Participation Rent

under this Agreement. If any such Alterations are made without the prior written consent of Sublandlord, Sublandlord may correct or remove the same and Subtenant shall be liable for any and all costs and expenses incurred by Sublandlord in such removal. Any such Alterations shall be at the sole expense of Subtenant and shall become the property of Landlord if required by the terms of the Prime Lease, or at Landlord's option, the property of Sublandlord and remain on and be surrendered with the Property as part thereof at the termination of this Agreement.

- 5.3 Notwithstanding Paragraph 5.2 (b), Subtenant shall have the right to remove all personal property, trade fixtures and office equipment, provided that these items can be removed without serious damage to the Property. All holes or damages to the Property caused by removal of all items shall be restored or repaired by Subtenant promptly at Subtenant's expense.
- 5.4 (a) Subtenant shall maintain the Premises in good repair and tenantable condition, and shall be responsible for providing its own janitorial service for the Subleased Office Space, at its own cost, in a manner consistent with service provided in first-class office buildings in the Chicago metropolitan area.
- (b) It shall be Subtenant's responsibility and expense to repair all injury, breakage, or damage done to the Premises or the Hangar Building caused by Subtenant or the agents, servants, employees or visitors of Subtenant. Said work shall be performed by Sublandlord or Subtenant at Sublandlord's option. If Sublandlord undertakes to perform any such repairs in the Premises, then such repairs shall be performed at the expense of Subtenant, the reimbursement of which expense shall be collectible as Participation Rent hereunder. This provision shall be construed as an additional remedy granted to Sublandlord and not in limitation of any other rights and remedies which Sublandlord has or may have. Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, Sublandlord may at any time elect to alter, rehabilitate or renovate all or any portion of the Hangar Building of which the Premises are a part provided Subtenant's right to use the Premises in accordance with Section 2 hereof is maintained and there is not a material adverse impact on Subtenant's ability to conduct its business.

#### Section 6.

# Utilities And Sublandlord's Services.

6.1 The payment of rent by Subtenant shall entitle Subtenant to all of the services provided by Landlord to the Property under the Prime Lease; provided, however, that Sublandlord shall have no obligation to provide Subtenant with any services or to fulfill any of the obligations that Landlord is required to provide or fulfill under the Prime Lease, except to the extent

that such services are actually provided by Landlord and such obligations are actually fulfilled by Landlord.

- 6.2 Subject to the provisions of Section 6.1 of this Agreement, Sublandlord agrees to furnish gas, water and electricity to the Premises and heat and air conditioning in an amount that in Sublandlord's judgment will be reasonably required for the comfortable use and occupancy of the Premises. Subtenant shall use the electricity supplied by Sublandlord only for lighting, typewriters, personal computer networks, small reproduction machines and similar office equipment which in the aggregate does not exceed the design capabilities of the electrical system of the Hangar Building. Subtenant shall pay on demand to Sublandlord for use of electricity for any other purpose or for any unreasonable waste of electricity.
- 6.3 Subtenant agrees that Sublandlord shall not be liable in damages, by abatement of rent or otherwise, for failure to furnish or for delay in furnishing any service when such failure or delay is occasioned, in whole or in part, by repairs, renewals or improvements, any strike, lockout or other labor trouble, inability to secure electricity, gas, water, or other fuel at the Property, any accident or casualty whatsoever, the act or default of Subtenant or other parties, or any cause beyond the reasonable control of Sublandlord; and such failures or delays shall never be deemed to constitute an eviction or disturbance of Subtenant's use and possession of the Premises or relieve Subtenant from paying rent or performing any of its obligations under this Agreement.
- 6.4 Subtenant agrees to cooperate fully, at all times, with Sublandlord in abiding by all reasonable regulations and requirements which Sublandlord may prescribe for the proper functioning and protection of all utilities and services reasonably necessary for the operation of the Property. Throughout the term of this Agreement, Sublandlord shall have free access to any and all mechanical installations, and Subtenant agrees that there shall be no construction or partitions or other obstructions which might interfere with the moving of the servicing equipment of Sublandlord or from the enclosures containing such installations. Subtenant further agrees that neither Sublandlord nor its employees, agents, licensees, invitees or contractors shall at any time tamper with, adjust or otherwise in any manner affect Sublandlord's mechanical installations.

Section 7.

# Quiet Enjoyment.

7.1 Sublandlord covenants that Subtenant, upon paying rent and performing all of its obligations under this Agreement, shall peacefully and quietly have, hold, and enjoy the Premises throughout the term hereof, or

until this Agreement is terminated as herein provided, for all purposes permitted hereunder.

#### Section 8.

#### The Prime Lease.

- 8.1 This Agreement and all rights of Subtenant hereunder and with respect to the Premises are subject to the terms, conditions and provisions of the Prime Lease. Subtenant hereby assumes and agrees to perform faithfully and be bound by, with respect to the Premises, all of Sublandlord's obligations, covenants, agreements and liabilities under the Prime Lease and all terms, conditions, provisions and restrictions contained in the Prime Lease except:
  - (a) for the payment of ground rent and the reimbursement of utility charges, fees and taxes to Landlord; provided that this subsection shall not limit Subtenant's obligation to pay to Sublandlord Subtenant's proportionate share of such expenses as Participation Rent pursuant to Section 4.3 hereof;
  - (b) that Subtenant shall not have any obligations to construct or install improvements to the Property except as may be provided herein; and
  - (c) that the following provisions of the Prime Lease do not apply to this Agreement: description of space, term of lease, construction and rent terms, including but not limited to any provisions allowing or purporting to allow Sublandlord any rent concessions, abatements, construction allowances or payment to Sublandlord of the unamortized portion of construction costs.

# 8.2 Without limitation of the foregoing:

- (a) Subtenant shall not make any changes, alterations or additions in or to the Premises except as otherwise expressly provided herein;
- (b) If Subtenant desires to take any action, and the Prime Lease would require that Sublandlord obtain the consent of Landlord before undertaking any action of the same kind, Subtenant shall not undertake the same without the prior written consent of Sublandlord. Sublandlord may condition its consent on the consent of Landlord being obtained, and may require Subtenant to contact Landlord directly for such consent;
- (c) All rights given to Landlord and its agents and representatives by the Prime Lease to enter the premises covered by the Prime Lease shall

inure to the benefit of Sublandlord and its respective agents and representatives with respect to the Premises and in addition, Sublandlord shall have the right at any reasonable time or times, to enter the Premises for the purpose of (i) inspecting the alterations which it may be required to perform under the provisions of this Agreement or which it may deem desirable for the Premises, the Hangar Building, or any property owned by or under Sublandlord's control, including but not limited to repairs and improvements to space above, below and/or on the same floor as the Premises; (iii) showing the Premises to prospective purchasers or subtenants; and (iv) supplying janitorial service or any other service to be provided by Sublandlord hereunder. Sublandlord shall give notice prior to any such entry except that Sublandlord may enter without notice in the case of an emergency. In making such an entry, Sublandlord agrees to use reasonable efforts to avoid interfering with the regular and usual conduct of Subtenant's business and shall have no liability for entering the Premises:

- (d) Sublandlord shall also have all other rights, and all privileges, options, reservations and remedies granted or allowed to, or held by, Landlord under the Prime Lease;
- (e) Subtenant shall maintain insurance of the kinds and in the amounts required to be maintained by Sublandlord under the Prime Lease, provided that no self insurance or deductibles shall be permitted without Sublandlord's prior written consent, which may be given or withheld at Sublandlord's sole discretion. All policies of liability insurance shall name as additional insureds the Landlord and Sublandlord and their respective officers and directors, as the case may be, and the respective agents and employees of each of them, and shall be evidenced by a certificate of insurance, including a copy of the policy endorsement, delivered to Sublandlord simultaneously with the execution of this Agreement;
- (f) Subtenant shall not do anything or suffer or permit anything to be done which could result in a default under the Prime Lease or permit the Prime Lease to be canceled or terminated.
- 8.3 Notwithstanding anything contained herein or in the Prime Lease which may appear to be to the contrary, Sublandlord and Subtenant hereby agree as follows:
  - (a) Subtenant shall not assign, mortgage, pledge, hypothecate or otherwise transfer or permit the transfer of this Agreement or any interest of Subtenant in this Agreement, by operation of law or otherwise, or permit the use of the Premises or any part thereof by any persons other than Subtenant and Subtenant's employees, or sublet the Premises or any part thereof. Subtenant's (i) merger with Jet Express, Inc., a Delaware corporation, forming Midway Airlines Corporation, (ii) sale of less than twenty-five percent (25%) of its stock, and (iii) transfer to a majority-

owned (not less than 51%) subsidiary corporation shall not be considered a prohibited assignment, pledge, hypothecation or transfer for purposes of this subparagraph 8.3(a), provided that Subtenant shall obtain any consent of Landlord required under the Prime Lease in connection with the events listed in clauses i, ii and iii above. Any permitted subletting or assignment hereunder shall not release or discharge Subtenant of or from any liability, whether past, present or future, under this Agreement, and Subtenant shall continue fully liable hereunder. The Subtenant or subtenants or assignee shall agree to comply with and be bound by all of the terms, covenants, conditions, provisions and agreements of this Agreement to the extent of the space sublet or assigned, and Subtenant shall deliver to Sublandlord promptly after execution, an executed copy of each such sublease or assignment and an agreement of compliance by each such Subtenant or assignee;

- (b) Neither rental nor other payments hereunder shall abate by reason of any damage to or destruction of the Premises or the premises subject to the Prime Lease or any part thereof, or any condition rendering untenantable the Premises or the premises subject to the Prime Lease or any part thereof, unless, and then only to the extent that, rental and such other payments actually abate under the Prime Lease with respect to the Premises on account of such event;
- (c) Subtenant shall not have any right to any portion of the proceeds of any award for a condemnation or other taking, or a conveyance in lieu thereof, of all or any portion of the premises subject to the Prime Lease, or the Premises:
- (d) Subtenant shall not have any right to exercise or have Sublandlord exercise any option under the Prime Lease, including, without limitation, any option to extend the term of the Prime Lease or lease additional space; and
- (e) In the event of any conflict between the terms, conditions and provisions of the Prime Lease and of this Agreement, the terms, conditions and provisions of this Agreement shall, in all instances, govern and control. However, wherever the same are not in conflict with a specific provision herein, the obligations under the Prime Lease shall be supplemental and in addition to those set forth herein, and subject to the foregoing, all the terms, covenants and conditions in the Prime Lease contained shall be applicable to this Agreement with the same force and effect as if Sublandlord were the landlord under the Prime Lease and Subtenant were the tenant thereunder.
- 8.4 It is expressly understood and agreed that Sublandlord does not assume and shall not have any of the obligations or liabilities of Landlord under the Prime Lease and that Sublandlord is not making the representations or warranties, if any, made by Landlord in the Prime Lease.

With respect to work, services, repairs and restoration or the performance of other obligations required of Landlord under the Prime Lease, Sublandlord's sole obligation with respect thereto shall be to request the same, upon written request from Subtenant, and to use reasonable efforts to obtain the same from Landlord. Sublandlord shall not be liable in damages, nor shall rent abate hereunder, for or on account of any failure by Landlord to perform the obligations and duties imposed on it under the Prime Lease.

8.5 Nothing contained in this Agreement shall be construed to create privity of estate or contract between Subtenant and Landlord, except the agreements of Subtenant in Sections 14 and 15 hereof in favor of Landlord, and then only to the extent of the same.

#### Section 9.

#### Conduct On Premises.

- 9.1 (a) Subtenant shall conduct itself in a reasonable manner and shall comply with Sublandlord's rules and regulations and any governmental security requirements while on the Premises. Subtenant shall not interfere with the operations of Sublandlord or any of its affiliates or other Subtenants at the Premises or unreasonably encumber the Premises with any material, equipment, waste materials or rubbish.
- (b) Sublandlord shall conduct itself in a reasonable manner and shall comply with all governmental rules and regulations while on the Premises. Sublandlord shall not interfere with the operations at the Premises of the Subtenant or any of its affiliates permitted under this Agreement, or unreasonably encumber the Premises with any material, equipment, waste materials, or rubbish.
- 9.2 The parties agree that aircraft maintenance performed at the Premises shall be restricted to Maintenance Levels 1 and 2, and that no Level 3 Maintenance shall be performed at the Premises. The definitions of Maintenance Levels 1, 2 and 3 are set forth in Exhibit C attached hereto and made a part hereof.

#### Section 10.

#### Transfer Options.

10.1 (a) On November 1, 1996, and upon six (6) months prior written notice to the other party, Sublandlord shall have the option to transfer its

interest in the Property to Subtenant, and Subtenant shall have the option to require Sublandlord to make that transfer.

- (b) At any time from execution of this Agreement until April 30, 1994, Subtenant shall have the option to require Sublandlord to transfer its interest in the Property to Subtenant, provided such transfer shall be consummated by April 30, 1994.
- 10.2 In case of any of the transfers contemplated by Section 10.1(a) or (b) above, the transfer price shall equal one hundred ten percent (110%) of Sublandlord's unamortized book value of the Property as of the date of transfer (the "Option Price"). Upon payment by Subtenant to Sublandlord of the Option Price, Sublandlord shall transfer its interest in the Property to Subtenant, Subtenant shall assume Sublandlord's obligations under the Prime Lease, and this Agreement shall be terminated; provided, however, that no termination under this Section 10 shall relieve Subtenant from any obligations under this Agreement which accrued prior to such termination. Subtenant agrees to pay to Landlord the fee, if any, assessed by Landlord under the Prime Lease in connection with such transfer. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary implied by the terms of this Section, it is expressly understood that all transfers, assignments or subleases of the Property must conform to the requirements of the Prime Lease.

#### Section 11.

# Default By Subtenant.

# 11.1 Upon the happening of any of the following:

- (a) Subtenant fails to pay any Base Rent or Participation Rent within five (5) days after the date it is due;
- (b) Subtenant fails to pay any other amount due from Subtenant hereunder and such failure continues for five (5) days after notice thereof from Sublandlord to Subtenant;
- (c) Subtenant fails to perform or observe any other covenant or agreement set forth in this Agreement and such failure continues for twenty-one (21) days after notice thereof from Sublandlord to Subtenant; or
- (d) Any other event occurs which involves Subtenant or the Premises and which would constitute a default under the Prime Lease if it involved Sublandlord or the premises covered by the Prime Lease, Subtenant shall be deemed to be in default hereunder and Sublandlord may exercise,

without limitation of any other rights and remedies available to it hereunder or at law or in equity, any and all rights and remedies of Landlord set forth in the Prime Lease in the event of a default by Sublandlord thereunder.

11.2 In the event Subtenant fails or refuses to make any payment or perform any covenant or agreement to be performed hereunder by Subtenant, Sublandlord may make such payment or undertake to perform such covenant or agreement (but shall not have any obligation to Subtenant to do so). Sublandlord shall be permitted to make such payment or undertake to perform such covenant or agreement without regard to the expiration of any cure periods provided in this section whenever Sublandlord deems it necessary to do so to prevent a default under the Prime Lease. In any such event, amounts so paid and amounts expended in undertaking such performance, together with all costs, expenses and attorneys' fees incurred by Sublandlord in connection therewith, shall be Participation Rent hereunder.

#### Section 12.

#### Non-Waiver.

12.1 Failure of Sublandlord to declare any default or delay in taking any action in connection therewith shall not waive such default. No receipt of moneys by Sublandlord from Subtenant after the termination in any way of the term of Subtenant's right of possession hereunder or after the giving of any notice shall reinstate, continue or extend the term or affect any notice given to Subtenant or any suit commenced or judgment entered prior to receipt of such moneys.

#### Section 13.

# Cumulative Rights And Remedies.

13.1 All rights and remedies of Sublandlord under this Sublease shall be cumulative and none shall exclude any other rights or remedies allowed by law.

#### Section 14.

# Waiver Of Claims And Indemnity.

- 14.1 Subtenant hereby releases and waives any and all claims against Landlord and Sublandlord and each of their respective officers, directors, partners, agents and employees for injury or damage to person, property or business sustained in or about the premises subject to the Prime Lease or the Premises by Subtenant other than by reason of negligence or willful misconduct and except in any case which would render this release and waiver void under law.
- 14.2 Subtenant agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless Landlord and Sublandlord and Sublandlord and each of their respective officers, directors, partners, agents and employees, from and against any and all claims, demands, costs and expenses of every kind and nature, including attorneys' fees and litigation expenses, arising from Subtenant's occupancy of the Premises, Subtenant's construction of any leasehold improvements in the Premises or from any breach or default on the part of Subtenant in the performance of any agreement or covenant of Subtenant to be performed or performed under this Agreement or pursuant to the terms of this Agreement, or from any act or neglect of Subtenant or its agents, officers, employees, guests, servants, invitees or customers in or about the Premises or the Property. In case any such proceeding is brought against any of said indemnified parties, Subtenant covenants, if requested by Sublandlord, to defend such proceeding at its sole cost and expense by legal counsel reasonably satisfactory to Sublandlord.
- 14.3 Neither Party Shall Be Liable To The Other, Its Affiliates Or Any Third Party For Any Special, Consequential, Exemplary Or Incidental Damages (Including Lost Or Anticipated Revenues Or Profits Relating To The Same), Arising From Any Claim Relating To This Agreement, Whether Such Claim Is Based On Contract, Tort (Including Negligence Or Strict Liability) Or Otherwise, Even If An Authorized Representative Of A Party Is Advised Of The Possibility Or Likelihood Of The Same.

#### Section 15.

#### Waiver Of Subrogation.

15.1 Anything in this Agreement to the contrary notwithstanding, Sublandlord and Subtenant each hereby waive any and all rights of recovery, claims, actions or causes of action against the other and the officers, directors, partners, agents and employees of each of them, and Subtenant hereby waives any and all rights of recovery, claims, actions or

causes of action against Landlord and its agents and employees, for any loss or damage that may occur to the Premises or the premises covered by the Prime Lease, or any improvements thereto, or any personal property of any person therein, by reason of fire, the elements, or any other cause insured against under valid and collectible fire and extended coverage insurance policies, regardless of cause or origin, including negligence, except in any case which would render this waiver void under law, to the extent that such loss or damage is actually recovered under said insurance policies.

#### Section 16.

Movement Of Sublessee's Aircraft And Motor Vehicles.

- 16.1 Subtenant shall have only qualified persons taxi Subtenant's aircraft into or out of the Hangar Building.
- 16.2 Ground Transportation vehicles (automobiles, trucks, motorcycles, et cetera) will not be allowed access to the Hangar Building except in accordance with policies and procedures established by Sublandlord for Subtenant's use of the subleased garage space.

#### Section 17.

# Landing Fees, Records And Reports.

- 17.1 Subtenant agrees that it shall pay the current landing fees in effect at Chicago Midway Airport, Chicago O'Hare International Airport or at Merrill C. Meigs Field, for each landing at such airport.
- 17.2 Subtenant agrees that it shall keep and maintain records of its monthly traffic statistics covering its aircraft operations at Chicago Midway Airport, Chicago O'Hare International Airport and Merrill C. Meigs Field, in a form approved by the Commissioner of Aviation of Landlord and shall submit this form directly to the City Administrative Office at the Airport on or before the 10th day of the month following, together with payment for all landings made during the preceding month or portion thereof.

#### Section 18.

# Rights Reserved To Sublandlord.

- 18.1 Sublandlord reserves the following rights, exercisable at its election without notice and without liability to Subtenant:
  - (a) To change the name or street address of the Hangar Building.
  - (b) To install and maintain signs on the exterior and interior of the Hangar Building, except that Sublandlord will not install any sign on the Hangar Building with Subtenant's name thereon without Subtenant's consent, unless required by law.
  - (c) To prescribe the location and style of the identification sign or lettering for the Premises occupied by Subtenant. Subtenant shall have the right to erect interior and exterior signage at and on the facility in compliance with local ordinances and F.A.A. regulations at Subtenant's expense and subject to Sublandlord's approval, which approval shall be at Sublandlord's sole discretion.
    - (d) To retain at all times, pass keys to the Premises.
  - (e) To have access for Sublandlord and other tenants or occupants of the Hangar Building to any mail chutes according to the rules of the United States Postal Service.
  - (f) To require all persons entering or leaving the Property during such hours as Sublandlord shall determine to identify themselves to security personnel by registration or otherwise in accordance with security controls. Subtenant agrees to cooperate in any reasonable safety or security program developed by Sublandlord.

#### Section 19.

#### Termination.

19.1 At the termination of this Agreement, by lapse of time or otherwise, Subtenant shall yield up immediate possession to Sublandlord, and failing to do so shall pay as liquidated damages for the whole time such possession is withheld a sum equal to twice the amount of the rent herein reserved, prorated per day of such withholding. The provisions of this clause and the acceptance of any such liquidated damages by Sublandlord shall not constitute a waiver of any other rights Sublandlord might have against Subtenant for Subtenant's failure to yield up possession.

- 19.2 In the event of the termination for any reason of the Prime Lease, this Agreement shall terminate as of the date of such termination.
- 19.3 In the event Sublandlord and Subtenant shall enter into an agreement which transfers Sublandlord's interest in the Property to Subtenant, this Agreement shall terminate on the date of that transfer and upon Subtenant's assumption of Sublandlord's obligations under the Prime Lease; provided, however, that no termination under this Section 19 shall relieve Subtenant from any obligations under this Agreement which accrued prior to such termination.

#### Section 20.

# Brokerage Commissions.

20.1 Each party hereby represents and warrants to the other that it has had no dealings with any real estate broker or agent in connection with this Agreement, and that it knows of no real estate broker or agent who is or might be entitled to a commission in connection with this Agreement. Each party agrees to protect, defend, indemnify and hold the other harmless from and against any and all claims inconsistent with the foregoing representations and warranties for any brokerage, finder's or similar fee or commission in connection with this Agreement, if such claims are based on or relate to any act of the indemnifying party which is contrary to the foregoing representations and warranties.

#### Section 21.

# Successors And Assigns.

21.1 This Agreement shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of Sublandlord, and shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit of the successors of Subtenant and, to the extent any such assignment may be approved, Subtenant's assigns. The provisions of Subsection 8.2(e) and Sections 14 and 15 hereof shall inure to the benefit of the successors and assigns of Landlord.

#### Section 22.

## Entire Agreement.

22.1 This Agreement contains all the terms, covenants, conditions and agreements between Sublandlord and Subtenant relating in any manner to the rental, use and occupancy of the Premises. No prior agreement or understanding pertaining to the same shall be valid or of any force or effect. The terms, covenants and conditions of this Agreement cannot be altered, changed, modified or added to except by a written instrument signed by Sublandlord and Subtenant.

#### Section 23.

#### Notices.

- 23.1 In the event any notice from the Landlord or otherwise relating to the Prime Lease is delivered to the Premises or is otherwise received by Subtenant, Subtenant shall, as soon thereafter as possible but in any event within 24 hours, deliver such notice to Sublandlord if such notice is written or advise Sublandlord thereof by telephone if such notice is oral.
- 23.2 Notices and demands required or permitted to be given by either party to the other with respect hereto or to the Premises shall be in writing and shall not be effective for any purpose unless the same shall be served either by personal delivery with a receipt requested, by overnight air courier service or by United States certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, postage pre-paid; provided, however, that all notices of default shall be served either by personal delivery with a receipt requested or by overnight air courier service, addressed as follows:

Either party may change its address for receipt of notices by giving notice to the other party.

#### Section 24.

# Authority, Et Cetera.

24.1 Each party represents and warrants to the other that this Agreement has been duly authorized, executed and delivered by and on behalf of that party and constitutes the valid, enforceable and binding agreement of that party.

#### Section 25.

# Security Deposit.

- 25.1 (a) Subtenant shall at Sublandlord's election: (i) upon execution of this Agreement, deposit with Sublandlord the sum of Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000), and on May 1, 1994, deposit with Sublandlord the additional sum of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000), or (ii) upon execution of this Agreement, present an irrevocable letter of credit in the amount of Three Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$350,000), and on May 1, 1994, present an additional irrevocable letter of credit in the amount of One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000), in either case, such sums or such letters as security for the full and faithful performance of every provision of this Agreement to be performed by Subtenant.
- (b) Any letter of credit provided hereunder shall be issued by a bank or other financial institution which has a credit rating and which is otherwise satisfactory to Sublandlord, acting reasonably. Said letter of credit shall be drawable at an office of the issuer in the City of Chicago, Illinois. The letter of credit shall name Sublandlord or any designee of Sublandlord as beneficiary. The letter of credit shall provide that it is payable upon presentation by Sublandlord of a sight draft accompanied by a certificate of any officer of Sublandlord stating that: "Ameritech Corporation is entitled to draw upon your Letter of Credit No. \_\_\_\_\_\_ in the amount of the draw accompanying this certificate under the terms of a certain Sublease and License Agreement between Ameritech Corporation and Midway Air Transportation, Inc. dated November \_\_\_\_\_, 1993, as amended". Such letter of credit shall be otherwise in form and content satisfactory to Sublandlord

and shall have an initial expiration date not earlier than December 31, 1994. During the first twenty-one (21) days of the month of November, 1994, and during the same period of each November during the term hereof that any letter of credit securing Subtenant's performance under this Agreement is in force, Sublandlord shall have the option to require Subtenant to deposit with Sublandlord the sum of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) as security for such performance. Sublandlord shall exercise such option by giving Subtenant notice thereof within such twenty-one (21) day period. Subtenant must make the requested deposit within five (5) days after Landlord has given the notice. Upon the deposit of such amount by Subtenant, Sublandlord shall return any such letter of credit to Subtenant and Subtenant may permit any such letter of credit to lapse. In the event that Sublandlord shall fail to notify Subtenant by November 21 of any year during the term hereof that Sublandlord requires such cash deposit, and unless Subtenant shall already have made such cash deposit with Sublandlord, Subtenant shall automatically be obligated to renew such letter of credit in the amount of Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$500,000) for the following calendar year of the term hereof (or thirty (30) days after the expiration of the term hereof, if shorter). If Subtenant fails so to renew said letter of credit at least thirty (30) days prior to its expiration, or fails to deposit the requested cash with Sublandlord within five (5) days after Sublandlord has given the notice described above, Sublandlord may draw upon said letter of credit and hold the proceeds thereof as the security deposit hereunder. So long as the security deposit hereunder is in the form of a letter of credit, Subtenant agrees to pay to Sublandlord as additional Base Rent the following additional monthly amounts: Month of Agreement execution to May 1, 1994: \$1,458.00; May 1, 1994 -- expiration or other termination of Agreement: \$2,083.00.

(c) If Subtenant defaults with respect to any provision of this Agreement, including but not limited to the provisions relating to the payment of rent, Sublandford may use, apply or retain all or any part of said security deposit for the payment of any rent and any other sum in default, or for the payment of any other amount which Sublandlord may spend or become obligated to spend by reason of Subtenant's default or to compensate Sublandlord for any other loss or damage which Sublandlord may suffer by reason of Subtenant's default. If any portion of said security deposit is so used or applied, Subtenant shall, within five (5) days after written demand therefor, deposit cash with Sublandlord or increase the letter of credit in an amount sufficient to restore the security deposit to its original amount, and Subtenant's failure to do so shall be a material breach of this Agreement. Except to the extent required by law, Sublandlord shall not be required to keep said security deposit separate from its general funds and Subtenant shall not be entitled to interest on any security deposit. If Subtenant shall fully and faithfully perform every provision of this Agreement to be performed by it, said security deposit or any balance thereof shall be (i) returned to Subtenant (or at Sublandlord's option to the last assignee of Subtenant's interest hereunder) within thirty (30) days after the expiration of the term and Subtenant's vacation of the Premises, or (ii) at Subtenant's option, credited against the Option Price due Sublandlord by Subtenant in the event either party exercises its option described in Section 10 hereof. Nothing herein shall be construed to limit the amount of damages recoverable by Sublandlord or any other remedy to the security deposit.

#### Section 26.

# Consent Of Landlord.

26.1 The obligations of Sublandlord and Subtenant under this Agreement are conditioned and contingent upon the Landlord consenting hereto. Subtenant agrees to pay to Landlord the fee, if any, assessed by Landlord under the Prime Lease in connection with this Agreement and the sublease and license of the Premises contemplated hereunder. In the event Landlord's consent is not obtained within thirty (30) days after the date hereof, this Agreement shall automatically terminate and become null and void and neither Sublandlord nor Subtenant shall have any further obligations or liability hereunder or to each other with respect to the premises.

#### Section 27.

# Severability.

27.1 If any provision of this Agreement shall be held invalid or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed deleted from this Agreement and replaced by a valid and enforceable provision which so far as possible achieves the same economic and other benefits for the parties as the severed provision was intended to achieve, and the remaining provisions of this Agreement shall continue in full force and effect.

#### Section 28.

# Relationship Of The Parties.

28.1 Nothing contained herein shall be deemed or construed by the parties hereto or any third party as creating the relationship of principal and agent or of partnership or of joint venture between the parties hereto, it being agreed that neither the method of computation of rent nor any other provision herein, nor any acts of the parties hereto, shall be deemed to create

any relationship between the parties hereto other than the relationship of sublandlord-licensor and subtenant-licensee.

28.2 Neither party's employees shall be deemed for any purpose to be employees of the other party. Accordingly, no employee of one party shall be entitled as a result of this Agreement to any of the benefits under any employee benefit plan the other party presently has in effect or may put into effect. Each party shall be solely responsible for the withholding or payment of all applicable federal, state and local personal income taxes, social security taxes, and other payroll taxes with respect to its employees, as well as any taxes or contributions imposed by applicable state unemployment or worker's compensation act(s). Each party has sole authority and responsibility to hire, fire and otherwise control its employees.

#### Section 29.

# Choice Of Law.

29.1 The validity of this Agreement, the construction and enforcement of its terms, and the interpretation of the rights and duties of the parties shall be governed by the domestic laws of the State of Illinois.

#### Section 30.

# Examination.

30.1 Submission of this instrument for examination or signature by Subtenant does not constitute a reservation of or option for the Premises or in any manner bind Sublandlord, and no lease, sublease or obligation on Sublandlord shall arise until this instrument is signed and delivered by Sublandlord and Subtenant and the consent of Landlord is obtained as described in Section 26 above; provided, however, that the execution and delivery by Subtenant of this Agreement to Sublandlord shall constitute an irrevocable offer by Subtenant to sublease the Premises on the terms and conditions herein contained, which offer may not be revoked for fifteen (15) days after such delivery.

## Exhibit "A".

Hangar And Hangar Site Agreement Between The City Of Chicago And Beatrice Companies, Inc.

This Agreement, made this 11th day of March, 1987 by and between the City of Chicago, a municipal corporation of the State of Illinois (hereinafter referred to as "Landlord" or "City") and Beatrice Companies, Inc., a corporation organized and existing by virtue of the laws of the State of Delaware (hereinafter referred to as "Tenant"):

#### Witnesseth:

That Landlord, for and in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter contained, and made on the part of Tenant, does hereby demise and lease to Tenant the premises on Chicago Midway Airport (hereinafter referred to as "Airport", as the Airport is described on (Sub)Exhibit A attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof), situated in the City of Chicago, County of Cook, State of Illinois, such premises are described as follows:

Parcel 1 (Beatrice Parcel)

That part of the northwest quarter of Section 16, Township 38 North, Range 13 East of the Third Principal Meridian, bounded and described as follows:

commencing at the southwest corner of the southwest quarter of said Section 16; thence north 2 degrees 05 minutes 40 seconds west along the west line of the southwest quarter and along the west line of the northwest quarter of said Section 16, a distance of 3,456.80 feet; thence north 87 degrees 54 minutes 20 seconds east along a line drawn perpendicularly to said west line a distance of 35.00 feet to a point in the east line of South Central Avenue, said point being the beginning of the following described parcel of land; thence north 2 degrees 05 minutes 40 seconds west along the east line of South Central Avenue, being a line 35.00 feet east of and parallel with the west line of said northwest quarter, a distance of 689.67 feet; thence south 46 degrees 49 minutes 38 seconds east 689.67 feet; thence south 46 degrees 49 minutes 38 seconds east 579.00 feet to the point of intersection with a line 407.50 feet (as measured perpendicularly) east of and parallel with the east line of South Central Avenue; thence south 2 degrees 05 minutes 40 seconds east along said parallel line 278.35 feet to the point of intersection with a line drawn perpendicularly to the east line of South Central Avenue and passing through the aforesaid point of beginning; thence south 87 degrees 54 minutes 20 seconds west along said perpendicular line 407.50 feet to said point of beginning, in Cook County, Illinois.

Area = 197,235.5 square feet or 4.5279 acres as all designated on Exhibit B attached hereto and by this reference made a part hereof, subject to a reservation of easement rights by Landlord for the installation, maintenance, repair and replacement, if necessary, of such public utilities or Federal Aviation Administration installations as may now traverse the demised premises, or as may be necessary to be installed during the term hereof. After said work is completed, Landlord shall restore the premises to its original condition.

Tenant agrees to surrender, upon 60 days written notice, any ramp area bordering the taxiway should the Federal Aviation Administration mandate a permanent increase in the obstacle free area relative to the centerline of the taxiway. Under no circumstances, however, shall such surrendering of property interfere with Tenant's beneficial use of the demised premises as set forth in Article I hereinbelow.

To Have And To Hold, The same pursuant to the terms of this agreement for a period commencing on the day of authorizing ordinance of the City Council of the City of Chicago and terminating on July 31, 2007 (the "initial term").

In consideration of said demise premises and covenants and agreements hereinafter expressed, it is covenanted and agreed as follows:

#### Article I.

## Nature Of Tenancy.

Landlord hereby grants to Tenant the privilege of constructing and operating a hangar and other improvements at the Airport for storage and maintenance of its own corporate aircraft and for storage of the aircraft of any subtenants approved by the City Council of the City of Chicago.

In connection therewith, Tenant is granted the exclusive use of the demised premises, subject to the terms and provisions hereof and to rules and regulations promulgated by Landlord, which rules and regulations shall not interfere with Tenant's use of the premises for the foregoing privileges and for the operation of related administrative offices, for loading, unloading of trucks, parking of automobiles of its own or its subtenants, employees and

of others having business with Tenant or subtenants and for no other purpose whatsoever.

Landlord covenants that the premises are properly zoned for the uses described in Article I, and that access is provided from the demised premises to all of the runways at the Airport, and to the public streets. If, at any time, Tenant is prohibited, for more than thirty (30) days, by any governmental authority, from using the demised premises as described in Article I, or if it loses access to the Airport runways or public streets, for more than 120 days, then Tenant shall have the right to immediately terminate this agreement and payment to Tenant of the unamortized cost of the improvements as provided in Article VII hereof shall apply.

## Article II.

Restrictions Of Other Statutes And Agreements.

This agreement shall be subject and subordinate to any existing or future federal or state statute or any existing or future lease or agreement between Landlord and the United States or the State of Illinois relative to the development, construction, operation, or maintenance of the Airport, the execution of which has been or may be required as a condition precedent to the expenditure of federal or state funds for the development, construction, operation or maintenance of said Airport.

## Article III.

## The Right Of First Refusal.

If Tenant shall desire to extend its leasehold rights for ten (10) more years, Tenant shall notify Landlord in writing of this intention no less than one (1) year and no more than two (2) years prior to the expiration of the initial term of this agreement. Following such notification Landlord shall prepare a proposal based upon a fair market value rental of the hangar site and hangar facilities with the terms and conditions upon which the demised premises are to be released and submit it to Tenant at least nine (9) months prior to the expiration of this agreement. Tenant shall have sixty (60) days after receipt of the Landlord's proposed new lease to accept or reject the offer. If the offer is not accepted within the sixty (60) day period, Landlord may offer the property to others upon the terms and conditions as those offered Tenant. Landlord agrees, however, that for ninety (90) days after the expiration of this agreement, it will not enter into an agreement with any other private party containing terms and conditions differing from those last

submitted to Tenant. The rental for the ten (10) year option period (August 1, 2007 through July 31, 2017) shall be fair market rent as determined by two separate, current, fair market real estate appraisals, one commissioned and paid for by the Tenant and the other commissioned and paid for by the City. If the two independent appraisers cannot agree on a fair market rental, then they shall appoint an independent third appraiser to make a third appraisal to determine the fair market rent to be paid during the option period. The cost of the third appraisal is to be paid equally by Tenant and City.

In any event, any proposed new agreement must be submitted to the City Council of the City of Chicago for approval.

## Article IV.

Rentals, Reimbursement Utility Charges, Fees And Taxes.

Effective August 1, 1987 Tenant shall pay to Landlord at the Office of the City Comptroller of the City of Chicago (hereinafter referred to as "Comptroller") for said demised premises ground rent in equal monthly installments, in advance and without set-off of any kind, on the first day of each month at the rate of twenty-five (25) cents per square foot per year from August 1, 1987 through December 31, 1987, thirty (30) cents per square foot per year for the years 1988 through 1992, thirty-five (35) cents per square foot per year for the years 1993 through 1997, forty-five (45) cents for the years 1998 through 2002, and fifty-five (55) cents for the years 2003 through the initial term of this agreement.

Recognizing that continued use of the historical west ramp as a public taxiway would interfere with the efficient operation of the Airport, City requested federal and state funding for the new west ramp taxiway, as indicated on Exhibit B attached hereto. The main beneficiaries of this new taxiway are tenants with hangars along Central Avenue. Each such tenant agrees as a necessary condition of its respective hangar site agreement to reimburse City for the City's 5% share of the total cost of the new taxiway construction but not for more than a total of \$150,000 from all the Central Avenue hangar tenants combined. Tenant, therefore, agrees to pay its prorated share of 5% of that total cost based on a formula expressed by a fraction, the denominator of which will be the total length of the new taxiway and the numerator, the lineal feet of said new taxiway which lie directly east, i.e. front on each Tenant's leased areas.

Warrants billing each Tenant for an amount determined as outlined hereinabove will be issued as soon as the taxiway is constructed and the final total cost is known. One half of the total amount owed by each Tenant will be billed within 60 days of the determination of the final cost and one half will be billed a year from the date of the first billing.

Tenant shall pay, in addition to ground rental and the charges above specified, all water rates, utility charges, permit and license fees, and taxes and assessments, general and special, if any, levied or assessed upon the demised premises, or any part thereof, or upon any buildings or improvements at any time situated thereon, or lawfully levied or assessed upon the leasehold interest created thereby during the term of this agreement, subject to force majeure.

Any rental or fees payable by Tenant hereunder which are not paid within five (5) days after notice of non-payment shall bear interest at the rate of ten percent (10%) per annum from the due date thereof until paid. If any rental hereunder commences or terminates prior to the last day of any month, such rental for such month shall be determined on a pro rata basis according to the number of days of such month involved.

#### Article V.

Construction, Alteration And Maintenance Of Hangar.

Tenant, after securing necessary permits therefor, shall, at its own cost and expense, erect and install on the demised premises structures and improvements at a total capital expenditure of not less than \$5,000,000.00 including architect's and engineer's fees, costs of plans and specifications, and other costs incidental to such erection and installation. Plans and specifications, and changes thereto, for all such structures and improvements shall be subject to the advance approval in writing of the Commissioner of Aviation and the Commissioner of Public Works, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed. If not specifically disapproved within twenty (20) working days of submission, said plans and specifications shall be deemed to have been approved. Tenant agrees to pay in full, within thirty (30) days of being billed therefor by the City Comptroller, the fee required by the City to review plans and specifications of Tenant prior to issuance of any joint letter of approval by the Commissioners of Aviation and Public Works. The hangar and hangar site improvements shall be completed except for minor punch list items, within twenty-four (24) months of the effective date of this agreement, subject to force majeure.

During the period of construction, all construction work, workmanship, materials and installation involved or incidental to the construction of the hangar and hangar site improvements shall be subject at all times to inspection by Landlord, without additional cost to Tenant. Tenant shall give or cause to be given to the Commissioner of Aviation and Commissioner of

Public Works advance notice before starting any new work, and shall provide and cause the contractors and subcontractors to provide reasonable and necessary facilities for inspection. Tenant shall cause all construction work, workmanship, materials and installations to be in full compliance with plans and specifications.

Tenant shall furnish to the Commissioner of Public Works an itemized statement, certified by an authorized officer of the Tenant, showing the total cost of the fixed improvements as described herein, installed and established upon the demised premises, including architects' and engineers' fees, cost of plans and specifications and other costs incidental to said construction and installation, within sixty (60) days after the completion of the construction thereof, and shall, if requested by the City, produce copies of all invoices and other records in connection therewith. The Commissioner of Public Works shall review the material and notify the Tenant in writing within sixty (60) days after its receipt whether said itemized statement and supporting invoices or other records meet with this approval, or not, and, in the latter event, in what respect it is deficient; provided, however, that said statement shall constitute prima facie evidence of the cost shown thereon unless disputed in writing by the City within sixty (60) days following receipt thereof. Upon approval by the Commissioner of Public Works, said costs shall constitute the basis for the amortization contemplated in Articles I and VII; provided, however, that said statement, shall be deemed approved in the event the Commissioner of Public Works shall not so notify Tenant within such sixty (60) day period. The books and records of the Tenant relating to the project shall be subject to examination and audit by the Commissioner of Public Works to verify such costs.

Where Landlord has constructed or installed roadways and lines for water, sewerage, electricity, gas and storm drainage in the vicinity of the demised premises, Tenant, at its sole cost and expense, shall have the right to continue to construct, or have constructed or installed such roadways, lines and facilities and to connect the same to water supply and sewage lines, and to receive all necessary utilities and services; provided, however, that Tenant shall be responsible for securing or cause to have secured all necessary applications and permits and to pay all necessary application, and permit fees and user charges occasioned thereby.

Landlord covenants to continue and maintain all lines for water, sewerage and drainage which connect with the premises, and to provide public roads onto which access can be had.

Upon completion of the hangar and hangar site improvements it shall thereafter not be enlarged or otherwise modified without in each case the consent in writing of the Commissioner of Aviation and the Commissioner of Public Works first had and obtained, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed, and the other necessary permits received therefor.

Tenant shall at all times throughout the term hereof maintain the hangar and hangar site improvements and all other portions of the demised premises in good and serviceable condition and repair, reasonable wear and tear, acts of God and other unavoidable casualties excepted.

Tenant shall keep the demised premises and the hangar, improvements and facilities constructed thereon free and clear of any and all liens in any way arising out of the action, or use thereof, by Tenant; provided, however, that Tenant may in good faith contest the validity of any lien.

## Article VI.

Illumination, Signs, Inspection By Landlord.

Tenant shall illuminate the apron in front of the hangar and shall also install, maintain, and operate such obstruction or warning lights on structures in or constituting part of the demised premises as may from time to time be required to conform to Federal Aviation Administration standards or to conform to standards prescribed by any other governmental agency having jurisdiction.

Tenant shall not install, erect or place, or permit others to so do, any illuminated signs, placards, displays or other advertising media on the hangar or elsewhere on Airport, without the prior written consent of the Commissioner of Aviation, which shall not be unreasonably withheld or delayed.

Landlord, by its representatives, shall have the right at any reasonable time, with prior notice, and as often as it considers necessary to inspect the demised premises and (without any obligation so to do) to enter thereon to direct Tenant to make the repairs described in Article V hereof.

## Article VII.

Title, Cost Of Fixed Improvements And Amortization.

Title to the hangar upon and the hangar site improvements to the demised premises and to any and all subsequent alterations, modifications, and enlargements shall upon completion thereof vest in City.

In the event that the entire demised premises or such part thereof as will substantially impair Tenant's ability to use the premises for the purpose specified in this agreement, are required for Airport purposes prior to the

expiration of this agreement, the Commissioner of Aviation may, upon one hundred eighty (180) days advance written notice to the Tenant direct. Tenant to vacate the same and this agreement shall terminate. Landlord, within sixty (60) days after Tenant's removal therefrom, will pay to Tenant the unamortized portion of the cost of the permanent structures and improvements constructed and installed thereon; such amortization to be computed on a straight-line basis over the period from the completion of said improvements to the expiration date of the initial term hereof.

## Article VIII.

Access, Ingress, Egress, Conduct Of Operations.

Landlord hereby grants to Tenant the right of access and ingress to and egress from the demised premises to the taxiway and to the public streets by Tenant and its employees, contractors, suppliers, servicemen, sublessees, guests, patrons and invitees; provided that such rights of access, ingress and egress are at all times exercised in conformance with any City of Chicago ordinances and all regulations promulgated by Landlord or the Commissioner of Aviation or other lawful authority, for the care, operation, maintenance and protection of the Airport and the public.

The operations of Tenant and its employees shall be conducted in an orderly and proper manner so as not to annoy, disturb, or be offensive to others at the Airport. Landlord shall have the right to complain to Tenant as to the demeanor, conduct, or appearance of Tenant's employees, whereupon Tenant will take all steps necessary to remove the cause of the complaint.

Tenant and its employees, invitees, and those doing business with it shall have no right hereunder to park vehicles upon the Airport premises, other than in places demised to Tenant and pursuant to this agreement, or except in regular parking areas upon payment of regular charges therefor.

Landlord shall operate and maintain, in all respects in a manner consistent with that of a reasonably prudent operator of an airport, and keep in good condition and repair (including the removal of snow, vegetation, stones, and other foreign matter as reasonably as may be done, from runways, taxiways, connections therefrom, and roadways) all taxiways, connections therefrom, roadways, water lines, sewer lines, drainage ditches, additions, improvements, facilities, and equipment now or hereafter provided by City, serving the demised premises but located outside the demised premises.

## Article IX.

## Landing Fees, Records And Reports.

Tenant shall pay the current landing fees in effect at Chicago Midway Airport, Chicago-O'Hare International Airport or at Merrill C. Meigs Field, for each landing at such airport.

For its own, its sublessees' or either of their affiliate's corporate aircraft parked upon the demised premises Tenant shall not pay any parking fee.

Tenant agrees that it shall keep and maintain records on its monthly traffic statistics covering its aircraft operations at Chicago Midway Airport, Chicago-O'Hare International Airport and Merrill C. Meigs Field, in form as approved by the Commissioner, and shall submit this form, signed by the Tenant's representative, by the 10th day of the month following the month of report to the City Administrative Office at the Airport.

Landing fees shall not be assessed for any landing of an aircraft returning to the airport from which it took off because of meteorological conditions, mechanical or operating causes, or any similar emergency or cautionary reason.

## Article X.

## Abatement Of Rent.

Tenant shall not be obligated to operate the demised premises or to pay rent therefor during any time when all of the demised premises shall be untenantable, through no fault or negligence of Tenant, its employees and agents. In the event the demised premises are partially untenantable, through no fault or negligence of Tenant, its employees and agents, Tenant shall not be obligated to operate such part of the demised premises and the ground rent shall be proportionately and equitably abated. In the event that the Airport shall be closed for any period of time in excess of five (5) days by any order or direction of Landlord other than for weather or for normal maintenance and repair, or by any other governmental authority or agency, or by any order or direction of any court of competent jurisdiction, the ground rental shall abate for the period of such closing.

## Article XI.

## Insurance Requirements.

Tenant, at the expense of Tenant, shall keep in force, during the term of this agreement, insurance of the following types and in not less than the following amounts, in connection with Tenant's use and occupancy of the Airport, the hangar and the hangar site improvements:

- 1. General liability insurance with bodily injury and property damage limits of liability of \$5,000,000 per occurrence, including contractual liability coverage endorsed to include the indemnity agreement in Article XIII hereof.
- 2. Worker's compensation (and occupational disease) providing statutory benefits under the law of Illinois, and employer's liability insurance with limits of liability thereunder of \$500,000.
- 3. Aircraft public liability and property damage insurance with limits to liability of \$5,000,000 per occurrence.
- 4. During the course of construction of the improvements provided for herein, owners protective liability insurance in Tenant's name with limits of liability for bodily injury and property damage of not less than \$2,000,000 per occurrence.

Tenant shall furnish to Comptroller certificates evidencing such insurance coverage with the City of Chicago as an additional insured, as its interest may appear.

Tenant, at the expense of Tenant, shall keep in force, during the term of this agreement, insurance upon the buildings and improvements (1) for the replacement cost of the improvements (except as provided below), (2) covering such hazards as are insured against by fire and extended coverage insurance upon improvements of similar character, and (3) the proceeds of which will be disbursed in accordance with this agreement and the customary terms of the customarily available fire insurance policy. Tenant shall furnish to Comptroller certificates evidencing such insurance coverage within ten (10) days after the effective date of this agreement.

In any event, Tenant is not to commence to exercise any of the rights and privileges granted under this agreement until such time as all insurance directed and required to be furnished by Tenant is in full force and effect.

Tenant expressly understands and agrees that any insurance protection furnished by Tenant hereunder shall in no way limit its responsibility to indemnify and save harmless Landlord under the provisions of this agreement.

Tenant shall, before commencing construction of the hangar or hangar site improvements, furnish to Comptroller a Performance Bond in form similar to City Form No. P.W.O. 62 in the full amount of the hangar or hangar site improvement contract with sureties satisfactory to said Comptroller.

It is agreed that Tenant may at its option provide evidence of self insurance for any and all coverage including the aforementioned Performance Bond and in the amounts prescribed hereinabove in lieu of insurance policies issued by responsible insurance companies.

## Article XII.

## Damage To Or Destruction Of Premises.

If at any time during the term of this agreement the demised premises shall be damaged or destroyed in whole or in part by fire or by any other peril or perils for which insurance proceeds are or under this agreement should have been payable, Tenant shall, with all reasonable dispatch after such damage or destruction, cause plans, specifications and estimates of cost for repairing, replacing or reconstructing the damaged or destroyed property in accordance with the original design, subject to such modifications thereof as may be approved by the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioner of Aviation (which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld) to be prepared by a firm of architects selected by the Tenant and approved by the Commissioner of Aviation (which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld). The plans and specifications for such work (except for emergency repairs) shall be submitted to and receive the approval of the Commissioner of Aviation and the Commissioner of Public Works prior to the commencement of such work. Upon approval of the plans and specifications for such work as aforesaid and receipt by Tenant of insurance recovered on account of such damage or destruction, Tenant shall, with reasonable diligence, proceed, except for unavoidable delays, to repair, restore, replace or rebuild, in accordance with the approved plans and specifications, the buildings, structures or other improvements so damaged or destroyed as nearly as possible to their condition immediately prior to such damage or destruction.

In the event the architects referred to in the foregoing paragraph certify to the Commissioner of Aviation that the insurance proceeds are insufficient to repair, replace or reconstruct the hangar and hangar site improvements substantially to the same condition they were prior to the fire or other casualty, Tenant, at its option, may upon written notice terminate its tenancy under this agreement. In such case the insurance proceeds shall be paid to Landlord. If Tenant fails to exercise such right to terminate its tenancy, it shall repair, replace or reconstruct the hangar and hangar site improvements regardless of the sufficiency of insurance proceeds for such purpose.

Except in the case provided in the foregoing paragraph, in which Tenant may choose to terminate its tenancy, all insurance proceeds recovered on account of damage or destruction to hangar and hangar building contents are to be applied and disbursed as follows:

- 1. To pay or reimburse the Tenant for all expenses incurred in connection with the adjustment or collection of such loss.
- 2. To pay or reimburse the Tenant for all costs and expenses incurred in connection with the preparation of the aforesaid plans, specifications and estimates of cost for repairing, replacing or restoring the damaged or destroyed property.
- 3. To pay or reimburse the Tenant for the costs and expenses of such work as the same progresses so that the demised premises shall at all times be free from liens for any labor, services or materials performed, furnished or delivered in connection with such work.
- 4. Of the balance, if any, of the insurance proceeds, exclusive of interest, remaining after payment in full of all of the above described prior charges, Tenant shall pay to the Landlord such proportion thereof as the number of full Lease Years immediately preceding the Lease Year in which such damage or destruction shall occur bears to the term of the agreement, and the balance of any such remaining proceeds shall be retained by Tenant.

## Article XIII.

## Indemnity.

Tenant shall defend, indemnify and hold harmless the City, its officers, agents and employees, from and against all claims and liabilities of and to third persons, excluding claims and liabilities resulting from the primary or active negligence of the City, its officers, agents and employees, arising out of the use or occupancy of the premises by Tenant or others with its consent or out of any other acts or omissions of Tenant, its officers, agents and employees, on the premises or elsewhere on the Airport. In the event any claim is made or action brought which is covered by the foregoing indemnity

the City shall give prompt written notice of the same to Tenant and, if requested, Tenant shall attend to the defense of the same. The City shall not take any action, including settlement or compromise, which may in any manner adversely affect Tenant's ability to defend against any such claim or action, and if the City desires to defend itself without waiving its rights under the foregoing indemnity it shall do so at its own expense and Tenant shall be allowed to participate, at its expense, in the defense.

## Article XIV.

Applicable Laws, Ordinances, Rules And Regulations.

Tenant, its officers, agents, employees, and any other persons over which Tenant has control, shall comply with all lawful rules and regulations and amendments or supplements thereto governing or related to the use of the Airport or of the demised premises as may from time to time be promulgated by Landlord in the interests of health, safety, sanitation and good order which are not inconsistent with applicable rules and regulations of any federal, state or local governmental body having jurisdiction with respect thereto.

Tenant shall at all times faithfully obey and comply with all lawful present and future laws and ordinances of federal, state or local governmental bodies and rules and regulations lawfully promulgated thereunder, whether or not of the type enumerated, applicable to, or affecting Tenant and its operations and activities in the demised premises or elsewhere at the Airport not inconsistent with the provisions of this agreement.

## Article XV.

Legal Transfer Of Tenant Interest, Peaceful Possession.

Tenant shall not, except to majority owned (not less than 51%) subsidiaries and majority owned (not less than 51%) affiliates of the Tenant or Subtenant ("accepted transfers") assign, transfer, mortgage or pledge this agreement or the leasehold interest created therein, nor sublet the use of the premises or any part thereof, without the recommendation of the Commissioner of Aviation for City Council approval and the subsequent approval by the Council. City reserves the right to assess a one time fee for any assignment or sublease, except for accepted transfers, a fee which is to be negotiated by the City acting through its Commissioner of Aviation before the assignment or sublease is recommended to the City Council of the

City of Chicago, tenant shall not permit any transfer by operation of law of its interest created hereby. In the event of an assignment the right to self-insure provided in this agreement shall cease to be effective. Tenant shall keep its right to self-insure to the extent that it retains any obligations hereunder.

In addition, in the event an assignment or sublease of the aforesaid premises or any part thereof, is approved by the City Council, under no circumstances shall the income derived by Tenant therefrom exceed the amount of a proportionate share of Tenant's obligations and expenses, under the terms of this agreement, plus an additional amount not to exceed 10% of such total income to cover administration and risk burdens of Tenant.

It is expressly understood and agreed that the only activity which Tenant may conduct on or from the demised premises, directly or indirectly, alone or through others, is only as authorized under the terms of this agreement.

This agreement does not constitute either party the agent or representative of the other for any reason whatsoever.

Landlord covenants that Tenant shall and may peaceably and quietly have, hold and enjoy the premises or space leased exclusively to it during the term of letting thereof unless such term shall cease, close or expire sooner or shall be terminated as provided in this instrument.

It is expressly agreed that City, by executing this agreement approves the sublease between Tenant and American Information Technologies Corporation, a Delaware corporation, without imposition of the one time fee by City on Tenant or this subtenant as set forth in the first paragraph of this Article.

### Article XVI.

## Equal Opportunity.

Tenant, in performing under this agreement, shall not discriminate against any worker, employee or applicant, or any member of the public, because of race, creed, color, religion, age, sex, or national origin. Such action shall include, but not be limited to the following: employment, upgrading, demotion or transfer; recruitment or recruitment advertising; layoff or termination; rates of pay or other forms of compensation; and selection for training, including apprenticeship.

Tenant agrees to post in conspicuous places, on the premises hereof, available to employees and applicants for employment, notices setting forth the provisions of this non-discrimination clause. Tenant further agrees that

this clause will be incorporated in all contracts entered into with suppliers of materials or services, contractors and subcontractors, and all labor organizations, furnishing skilled, unskilled, and craft union skilled labor, or who may perform any such labor or services in connection with this agreement.

Attention is called to Executive Order 11246, issued September 24, 1965, 3 C.F.R., 1964 -- 1965, Compilation, p. 339, as modified by Executive Order 11375, issued October 13, 1967, 3 C.F.R., 1967, Compilation, p. 320; The Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. Section 2000d, et seq.; The Age Discrimination Act of 1975, 42 U.S.C. Section 6101, et seq.; and all amendments to those statutes and executive orders and regulations of the United States Department of Transportation, Title 49, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 21; to the State Acts approved July 26, 1967, Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 38, Sections 881 -- 887, inclusive; July 28, 1961, Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 38, Sections 13-1 to 13-4, inclusive; July 21, 1961, Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 48, Sections 851 to 856, inclusive; July 8, 1933, Ill. Rev. Stat., Ch. 29, Sections 17 to 24, inclusive (all in 1977); and to an ordinance passed by the City Council of the City of Chicago, August 21, 1945, Journal of Council Proceedings, p. 3877, Municipal Code of the City of Chicago, Ch. 198.7A.

To demonstrate compliance, Tenant and his contractors and subcontractors will furnish such reports and information as requested by the City.

Nondiscrimination In the Use Of The Premises By Tenant.

This agreement involves the construction or use of, or access to, space on, over, or under real property acquired, or improved under the Airport Development Air Program of the Federal Aviation Administration, and thereby involves activity which services the public.

Tenant, for himself, his personal representatives, successors in interest, and assigns, as part of the consideration hereof, does hereby covenant and agree as a covenant running with the land that (1) no person on the grounds of race, color, or national origin shall be excluded from participation in, denied benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination in the use of said facilities, (2) that in the construction of any improvement on, over, or under such land and the furnishing of services thereon, no person on the grounds of race, color or national origin shall be excluded from participation in, denied benefits of, or otherwise be subjected to discrimination, and (3) that Tenant shall use the premises in compliance with all other requirements imposed by, or pursuant to, the Department of Transportation Regulations.

## Prohibition Against Exclusive Rights.

It is hereby specifically understood and agreed that nothing herein contained shall be construed to authorize the granting of an exclusive right to provide aeronautical services to the public as prohibited by Section 308(a) of the Federal Aviation Act of 1958, as amended, and the Landlord reserves the right to grant to others the privilege and right of conducting any one or all activities of an aeronautical nature.

## Nondiscrimination In Furnishing Services.

The Tenant agrees to furnish services on a fair, equal and not unjustly discriminatory basis to all users thereof, and to charge fair, reasonable and not unjustly discriminatory prices for each unit of services; provided, that the Tenant may be allowed to make reasonable and nondiscriminatory discounts, rebates of other similar types of price reductions to volume purchasers.

## Affirmative Action.

Tenant assures that it will undertake affirmative action program as required by 14 C.F.R., Part 152, Subpart E, to insure that no person shall on the grounds of race, creed, color, national origin, or sex be excluded from participating in any employment activities covered in 14 C.F.R., Part 152, Subpart E. Tenant assures that no person shall be excluded on these grounds from participating in or receiving the services or benefits of any program or activity covered by this subpart. Tenant assures that it will require that its covered suborganizations provide assurances to Tenant that they similarly will undertake affirmative action programs and that they will require assurances from their suborganizations, as required by 14 C.F.R., Part 152, Subpart E, to the same effect.

### Article XVII.

## Prohibition Against Filing.

This agreement shall not and will not, nor shall any copy thereof, of any statement, paper or affidavit, in any way or manner referring hereto, to be filed in the office of the Recorder of Deeds of Cook County, Illinois, or in any other public office, by Tenant or any one acting for Tenant and that if the

same be so filed, this agreement and each and every provision hereof shall, at the option of Landlord, be and become absolutely null and void and Landlord may declare such filing a breach of this agreement. Notwithstanding the foregoing, either party may record a "short form" or memorandum of this agreement.

#### Article XVIII.

## Termination By Landlord.

In any of the following events which shall constitute "events of default", Landlord shall have the right at Landlord's election, immediately to terminate this agreement, or to terminate Tenant's tenancy hereunder:

- A. Tenant shall fail to pay the rent in the amounts and at the times and in the manner herein provided and such failure shall continue for fifteen (15) or more days after written notice thereof shall have been given to Tenant.
- B. Tenant shall make an assignment for the benefit of creditors, or shall file a petition in bankruptcy, or shall be adjudged a bankrupt, and such adjudication be not stayed or vacated within one hundred twenty (120) days thereafter, or the interest of Tenant under this agreement shall be levied upon and sold upon execution or shall by operation of law become vested in another person, firm or corporation because of the insolvency of Tenant; or in the event that a Receiver or Trustee shall be appointed for Tenant or the interest of Tenant under this agreement, and such appointment has not been vacated within one hundred twenty (120) days thereafter.
- C. Tenant shall vacate for more than one hundred twenty (120) days, or abandon said premises, or shall permit the same to remain vacant or unoccupied for more than one hundred twenty (120) days.
- D. Tenant shall fail to observe any other provision of this agreement after thirty (30) days written notice given by Landlord of such failure, or, if such failure cannot be cured with thirty (30) days through no fault of Tenant, Tenant shall have such further time as is reasonably necessary to cure.

## Article XIX.

## Default.

Upon the occurrence of any one or more of the events of default specified, in Article XVIII, Tenant's right to possession of the demised premises shall at the option of Landlord terminate and Tenant shall surrender possession thereof immediately. In such event Tenant hereby grants to Landlord full and free license to enter into and upon said premises, or any part thereof, to take possession thereof with or without process of law, and to expel and remove Tenant or any other person who may be occupying the said premises, or any part thereof, and Landlord may use such force in and about expelling and removing Tenant and said other person as may reasonably be necessary; and Landlord may repossess itself of the said premises as of its former estate, but said entry of said premises shall not constitute a trespass or forcible entry or detainer, nor shall it cause a forfeiture of rents due by virtue hereof, nor waiver of any covenant, agreement or promise in said lease contained, to be performed by Tenant. Tenant shall make no claim of any kind against Landlord, its agents and representatives by reason of such termination or any act incident thereto.

At its option, Landlord may terminate this agreement for any uncorrected event of default. Landlord in any case may sue for and recover all damages and rent accrued or accruing under this agreement or arising out of any breach thereof.

Landlord may, if it so elects, pursue any other remedies provided by law for the breach of this agreement or any of its terms, covenants, conditions or stipulations. No right or remedy herein conferred upon or reserved to Landlord or Tenant is intended to be exclusive of any other right or remedy, and each and every right and remedy shall be cumulative and in addition to any other right or remedy given hereunder, or now or hereafter existing at law or at equity or by statute.

The acceptance of rent by Landlord, whether in a single instance or repeatedly, after it falls due, or after knowledge or any breach hereof by Tenant, or the giving or making of any notice or demand, whether according to any statutory provision or not, or any act or series of acts except an express waiver in writing, shall not be construed as a waiver of Landlord's right to act or of any other right hereby given Landlord, or as an election not to proceed under the provisions of this agreement.

The obligation of Tenant to pay the rent reserved hereby during the balance of the term hereof shall not be deemed to be waived, released or terminated by the service of any five (5) day notice to collect, other notice to collect, demand for possession, or notice that the tenancy hereby created will be terminated on the date therein named, the institution of any action of forcible detainer or ejectment or any judgment for possession that may be

rendered in such action, or any other act or acts resulting in the termination of Tenant's right to possession of the demised premises. Landlord may collect and receive any rent due from Tenant, and payment or receipt thereof shall not waive or affect any such notice, demand or suit, or in any manner whatsoever waive, affect, change, modify or alter any rights or remedies which Landlord may have by virtue hereof.

## Article XX.

## Termination Of Agreement.

Upon termination of this agreement by lapse of time or otherwise as herein provided, Tenant agrees to surrender the demised premises and the hanger and improvements situated thereon in good condition and repair, normal wear, tear and casualty excepted, without the receipt of any demand for rent, notice to quit or demand for possession whatsoever.

Tenant shall be entitled during the term of this agreement and for thirty (30) calendar days after termination thereof, to remove from the premises any and all trade fixtures, tools, machinery, equipment, materials and supplies placed thereon by it pursuant to this agreement, subject, however, to any valid lien Landlord may have thereon for unpaid rentals or other amounts payable by Tenant to Landlord, and provided that Tenant shall have repaired all damage resulting from said removal.

Tenant shall be deemed to have abandoned to Landlord any of said equipment or property of Tenant which it has failed to remove from said premises within the aforesaid thirty (30) calendar days after the end of the period of this agreement or effective date of termination thereof, unless Landlord shall grant in writing a further period for this purpose.

## Article XXI.

#### Notices.

This agreement shall be deemed to have been made in and shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Illinois.

Notices to Landlord provided for herein shall be sent by registered or certified United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the Commissioner of Aviation of the City of Chicago, 20 North Clark Street, Suite 3000, Chicago, Illinois 60602, and notices to Tenant provided for

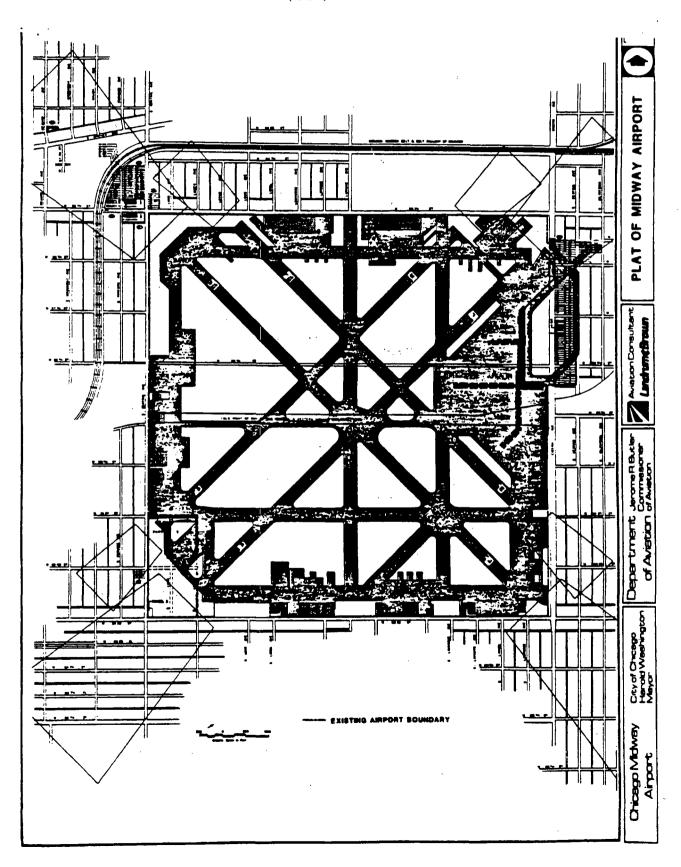
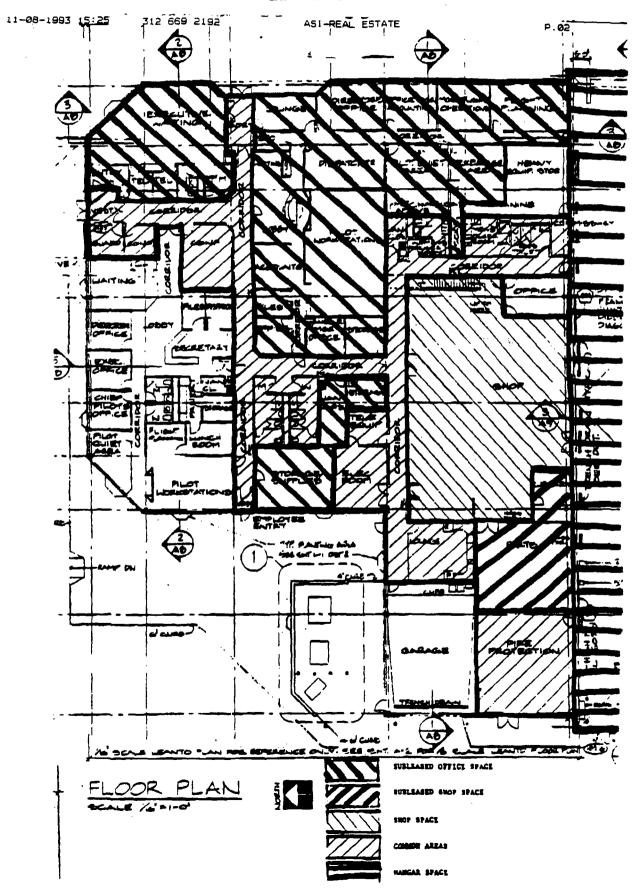

WHEREAS, Traditionally, the Department of Police has based its operation on a continuous around-the-clock shift rotation at regular intervals, presently every twenty-eight (28) days; and

WHEREAS, Incontrovertible and overwhelming medical evidence has since determined that this constant disruption of human circadian rhythms greatly increases the likelihood of failing health, most notably coronary, gastrointestinal and stress related disorders, alcoholism, chronic fatigue, insomnia, migraines and depression as well as the needless disruption of family and personal lives; and

WHEREAS, In the compelling interests of the overall health, longevity, morale and quality of life of police officers and their families, eleven of the twelve largest police departments in other United States cities, specifically New York City, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Houston, Washington (D.C.), Baltimore, Dallas, Boston, Milwaukee, San Francisco and Phoenix, have discontinued or are currently discontinuing around-the-clock shift rotation in favor of straight shifts; and

WHEREAS, In the interests of police management, numerous studies have conclusively proven that conversion to straight shifts has resulted in dramatic increases in the productivity, alertness and the overall physical and psychological fitness of police officers with corresponding decreases in the medical roll, injuries and accidents (vehicular and otherwise), response time in calls for service and complaints of excessive force; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That upon passage of this resolution, the City Council will recommend that the Department of Police immediately institute a written survey of the individual shift preferences of all sworn personnel, without regard to rank, and upon analysis of data, promptly implement a scheduling

system based on seniority which will vastly enhance the health and morale of police officers at no additional expense to the taxpayer while dramatically increasing the operational efficiency of the Department of Police; and

Be It Further Resolved, That upon passage of this resolution, the City Council will also recommend that until shift rotation has been eliminated by established Department policy, the Department of Police will direct the commanding officers of all districts and affected units to immediately encourage the rescheduling of personnel within the constraints of the operational needs of their respective commands, as determined by individual shift preference and seniority; and

Be It Further Resolved, That upon passage of this resolution, the City Council will also recommend that under no circumstances will shift rotation and/or undesirable shift assignment be used for disciplinary or punitive purposes.

Said ordinance, which failed to pass, reads as follows:

It is the policy of the Chicago Police Department to select for promotion only those officers who are the most qualified candidates for available positions (herein limited to sergeant, lieutenant and captain). Of central importance are the officers' abilities to exercise leadership, develop the abilities of their subordinates and encourage them to perform to the best of their abilities. They must also demonstrate sufficient administrative and managerial skills in order to accomplish the department's objectives and use available resources in an efficient manner.

A promotion process which results in the advancement of the most highly qualified candidates is an obvious advantage to the department, and is an important factor in insuring quality police services, an efficient use of the department's human and fiscal resources, and the achievement of department objectives. On a personal level, the promotion process in the means by which individual officers assume added responsibilities and advance their careers to positions of leadership. The department's chief executive is accountable for the integrity of this process and shall exercise sufficient control to insure compliance with these objectives and procedures.

The promotion process is divided into four phases:

Screening phase in which it is determined if those applying for the position meet eligibility requirements;

Testing phase in which all eligible applicants are evaluated to determine who are qualified for the position;

Appointment phase in which those who are the most qualified for the position are selected for promotion; and

Probation phase in which officers are evaluated during their first year in the new position.

# Procedural Requirements.

The Chicago Police Department's promotion process shall be designed to comply with the legal requirements established by the Department of Personnel laws and in compliance with E.E.O. standards. These include assuring that testing, interviewing and appointing activities are related to the determination of the knowledge, skills and abilities required by the position. Further, these activities shall be designed to be reliable, standardized, objective, valid, and nondiscriminatory in terms of race, sex or religious preference.

The Department of Personnel shall designate a specific individual(s) to assume responsibility for coordinating the department's participation in the promotion process and to be accountable for its relevance and integrity. Written directives shall govern the operation of all promotion activities, including, at a minimum, the following: a detailed description of the entire promotion process; eligibility criteria for each position; weighting given to various components; the methods used for testing qualified candidates; the use of a test developed by a qualified individual, organization or Department of Personnel and validated for use by the department either by a department-conducted task analysis or by a qualified consultant; the organization and administration of assessment centers; methods for selecting officers for promotion; probation requirements; and appeal procedures. If the department uses or is planning to use lateral entry to a position from outside the department as part of the promotion process, a written directive must stipulate the procedures for such entry. These directives shall be available to all officers and to members of the public and media.

The department recognizes that a central requirement for insuring an effective promotion process is a valid and reliable job analysis of each position. This analysis, conducted by either the department or a qualified outside organization, shall determine the necessary knowledge, skills and abilities an individual must possess to function effectively in the job. It shall also identify the non-cognitive personality characteristics needed for the position, such as self-expression, leadership abilities, commitment to department objectives, motivation to assume added responsibilities and interpersonal skills. The job analysis shall be conducted in three ways:

Interviews with the department's chief executive officers currently functioning in the position, officers currently functioning immediately below the position;

Direct observations of those officers currently functioning in the position; and

Task analyses of the activities conducted by those currently functioning in the position.

All the data and observations resulting from these activities shall be verified by officers currently functioning in the position and by those functioning immediately above the position.

The effectiveness of the promotion process also relies on timely and sufficient posting of examination announcements for the available positions. Such announcements shall describe the following elements: Procedures for completion of the application form; the closing date for filing the form; the minimum qualifications for the position; the schedule, dates and location of all testing activities; the relative weight of each testing activity; and, the methods for ranking and promoting qualified candidates.

The department shall determine the relative weight of each testing component in relation to the applicant's total score. These are arranged according to the following relevant testing components for each rank:

# Sergeant

- -- Written test;
- -- Promotional potential rating; and
- -- Oral interview.

#### Lieutenant

- -- Written test;
- -- Promotional potential rating; and
- -- Oral interview.

## Captain

- -- Written test;
- -- Assessment center: and
- -- Promotional potential rating.

#### The Promotion Process.

# Phase I: Screening.

The department shall establish the minimum requirements necessary for officers to be considered eligible for each position. Each requirement shall be clearly job related, nondiscriminatory and include requirements in the following categories:

- -- A minimum of two years, including probationary service, in the rank immediately subordinate to the position being sought;
- Successful completion of training program(s); and
- Adequate completion of application forms.

Requirements related to age, sex, political affiliation, religious beliefs, and prior military service shall not be used.

# Phase II: Testing Components.

Written Test. The first testing component shall be the administration of a written test to determine the applicants' knowledge of specific substantive areas, analytic skills, and problem-solving abilities. Any test that is used shall be validated for its internal integrity, as well as for the specific relevance to this department. Persons who develop the test shall be qualified in content and item construction. Further, characteristics of the group upon which the test was developed and validated shall be certified to resemble adequately the desired characteristics of the department's personnel.

Prior to administration of the test, applicants shall have access to all written materials from which the test was developed. These may include training course materials, operational directives, statutes, current professional literature, and textbooks.

The written tests shall be constructed to evaluate the applicants' mastery of the following areas: social ethics, management of human and fiscal resources, supervision, principles of administration, department policies and procedures, tactical and operational ability, criminal law and procedures, investigation procedures, community relations, and principles of leadership and employee development.

A cut-off score shall be established for the written test. Applicants shall receive written notification of their test scores within 30 days of the test date. Appeal procedures shall be made available to those applicants who think the test was biased, unfairly administered, incorrectly scored, or in some way invalid.

Promotional Potential Ratings. This rating shall be conducted in order to assess the applicants' ability to perform successfully in the position. Based upon a thorough understanding of the requirements of the future job, as well as of the personal traits required, the rating shall include the following categories: attitude and loyalty; technical skills and job knowledge; judgement; expression and communication; initiative and resourcefulness; and supervisory and leadership ability. The rating shall be conducted by two first-line supervisors who have directly supervised the applicant for a reasonable period and by a manager two ranks above the applicant. A composite score for each applicant shall be composed from the supervisors' independent ratings. Both the independent and composite ratings shall be reviewed for bias and personal conflict by the applicant's commanding officer. The scores shall range from 50 points (inadequate) to 100 points (outstanding) and shall be reviewed by an internal rating review board. The board, composed of division or bureau directors, shall adjust any inequities based upon different standards among department divisions or districts. A range of no more than five (5) points shall be permitted in the mean ratings between the highest and lowest division or districts.

Each applicant shall have an opportunity to review his or her independent and composite promotional potential ratings. Appeals shall be requested in writing to the applicant's division director, whose decision may be appealed to the chief executive.

Supervisors shall be held accountable for their ratings. Written narrative shall be supplied on the rating form to justify each score, giving examples or citing specific instances in which the behavior was observed. Further, supervisors shall be evaluated, in part, on their effectiveness in rating applicants for promotion.

Oral Interview. Oral interviews shall be administered by a panel of qualified and trained senior officers. Senior officers from other law enforcement agencies and civilians may be members of the interview panel in order to minimize favoritism and personal biases among department officers. The questions used shall be standardized and related to the required knowledge, skills, and abilities of the job. The interviews shall be conducted in order to determine the applicant's communication skills, problem-solving abilities, self-confidence, commitment to department objectives, and management style.

Assessment Center. The assessment center shall consist of a variety of exercises, such as written tests, group discussions, in-depth interview, role playing, and in-basket tasks that are structured to evaluate job-related behavior.

The center shall be administered by a minimum of three qualified senior officers or consultants. Each applicant shall be evaluated by all assessors, who shall together submit a composite score for each applicant. The applicants shall be sent written notice of their composite scores and, if they receive a failing score, an explanation of the score.

# Phase III -- Appointment.

The names of the officers who have successfully completed all testing components shall be compiled and listed in a public place. This list shall remain valid for a period of time that accommodates the department's growth and attrition rate, as well as the size of the candidate pool.

The department's chief executive shall select officers for promotion from the final certified list based on a review of the individuals' test scores, performance ratings and service record. All efforts shall be made to comply with affirmative action goals established by the department.

#### Phase IV -- Probation.

Following the promotion to either sergeant or lieutenant, each officer shall perform one year of probationary service. During this year, he or she shall successfully complete an in-service training program designed to equip him or her with the necessary skills and knowledge needed for the new position and be rated at three month intervals by a minimum of two direct supervisors. If, at the end of the year, his or her performance has been unsatisfactory, the chief executive may extend the probation period for three months or the officer may be demoted to his or her former rank.

This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its date of passage and due publication.

AMENDMENT OF TITLE 4 OF MUNICIPAL CODE OF CHICAGO BY ADDITION OF NEW CHAPTER 305 ESTABLISHING REGULATIONS FOR IMPROVEMENT OF SAFETY AND SECURITY AT ELECTRONIC BANKING MACHINE LOCATIONS.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago is a home rule unit pursuant to the 1970 Illinois Constitution, Article VII, Section 6(a); and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to its home rule powers, the City of Chicago may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs, including protection of the public health, welfare and safety; and

WHEREAS, In recent years, there has been a significant growth in the number of electronic banking machines in the City of Chicago; and

WHEREAS, Given the growth of electronic banking machines in the City of Chicago and the public convenience afforded by the use of these machines, there has been an increase in the number of residents in the City of Chicago who utilize these machines to accomplish their banking activities; and

WHEREAS, Given that certain electronic banking machines dispense cash, electronic banking machines on occasion have been sites for criminal attacks, particularly robberies; and

WHEREAS, Given the opportunity for criminal attacks at these locations, the City of Chicago has decided to take action to regulate the operation of certain electronic banking machines to improve or protect the safety and security of these locations for the protection of the patrons of electronic banking machines; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Municipal Code of the City of Chicago is amended by adding a now Chapter 4 305 as follows:

# 4-305-010 Definitions:

- (a) "Access area" means any paved walkway or sidewalk that is within 50 feet of any remote service terminal. The term does not include any street or highway open to the use of the public.
- (b) "Access device" means "access device" as defined in Federal Reserve Board Regulation E, 12 C.F.R. Part 205, promulgated pursuant to the Federal Electronic Fund Transfer Act, 15 U.S.C. Section 1601, et seq..
- (c) "Candlefoot power" means the light intensity of candles on a horizontal plane at 36 inches above ground level.
- (d) "Control" of an access area or defined parking area means to have the present authority to determine how, when and by whom such access area is to be used, lighted and landscaped.
- (e) "Customer" means a natural person to whom an access device has been issued for personal, family or household use.
- (f) "Defined parking area" means that portion of any parking area open for customer parking that is:
  - (i) Contiguous to an access area with respect to a remote service terminal:
  - (ii) Regularly, principally and lawfully used for parking by users of the remote service terminal while conducting remote service terminal transactions during the hours of darkness; and
  - (iii) Owned or leased by the operator of the remote service terminal or owned or controlled by the party leasing the remote service terminal site to the operator.

The term does not include any parking area which is not open or regularly used for parking by users of the remote service terminal who are conducting remote service terminal transactions during the hours of darkness. A parking area is not open if it is physically closed to access or if conspicuous signs indicate that it is closed. If a multiple-level parking area satisfies the conditions of this paragraph and would therefore otherwise be a defined parking area, only the single parking level deemed by the operator of the remote service terminal to be the most directly accessible to the users of the remote service terminal shall be a defined parking area.

- (g) "Financial institution" means a state or federally chartered bank, savings and loan association, savings bank or credit union.
- (h) "Hours of darkness" means the period that commences 30 minutes after sunset and ends 30 minutes before sunrise.
- (i) "Operator" means any financial institution or other business entity or any person who operates a remote service terminal, but does not include any person or entity whose primary function is to provide for the exchange, transfer or dissemination of electronic fund transfer data.
- (j) "Public road" means any public right-of-way, including, but not limited to, structures, sidewalks, facilities, and appurtenances incidental thereto.
- (k) "Remote Service Terminal" means any electronic information processing device which accepts or dispenses cash in connection with a credit, deposit or convenience account. The term does not include devices used solely to facilitate check guarantees or check authorizations or which are used in connection with the acceptance or dispensing of cash on a person-to-person basis, such as a store cashier or service desk representative.

#### 4-305-020 Intent.

The intent of the City Council of the City of Chicago in enacting this chapter is to enhance the safety of consumers using remote service terminals in the City of Chicago without discouraging the placement of remote service terminals in locations convenient to consumers' homes and work places. Because decisions concerning safety at remote service terminals are inherently subjective, the standard of care applicable to the operators of remote service terminals is compliance with the objective standards and information requirements of this chapter.

It is not the intent of the City Council of the City of Chicago in enacting this chapter to impose a duty to relocate or modify remote service terminals upon the occurrence of a particular event or circumstance, but rather to establish a means for the evaluation of all remote service terminals as provided in this chapter.

A violation of the provisions of this chapter will not constitute negligence per se. Substantial compliance with the objective standards and information requirements of this chapter is prima facie evidence that the operator of the remote service terminal in question has provided adequate measures for the safety of users of the remote service terminal.

4-305-030 Safety Evaluation Procedures And Date Of Compliance.

On or before July 1, 1995, with respect to all existing installed remote service terminals in the City of Chicago, and any remote service terminals installed in the City of Chicago after July 1, 1994, the operator shall adopt procedures for evaluating the safety of the remote service terminals. These procedures shall include a consideration of the following:

- (i) the extent to which the lighting for the remote service terminal complies or will comply with applicable standards;
- (ii) the presence of landscaping, vegetation or other obstructions in the area of the remote service terminal, the access area and the defined parking area; and
- (iii) the incidence and circumstance of crimes in the immediate neighborhood of the remote service terminal as reflected in the records of the local law enforcement agency of which the operator has actual knowledge. Each operator of a remote service terminal shall request copies of such records from the Superintendent of Police not less frequently than annually.

4-305-040 Procedures And Provisions For Adequate Lighting And Date Of Compliance.

- (a) Each operator of a remote service terminal installed on or after July 1,1994, shall comply with the provisions of this chapter commencing on the date the remote service terminal is installed. Compliance with the provisions of this chapter by operators as to remote service terminals existing as of July 1, 1994 shall be optional until July 1, 1995 and mandatory thereafter. This chapter shall apply to an operator of a remote service terminal only to the extent that the operator controls the access area or defined parking area to be lighted.
- (b) If an access area or a defined parking area is not controlled by the operator of the remote service terminal, and if the person who leased the remote service terminal site to the operator controls the access area or defined parking area, the person who controls the access area or defined parking area shall comply with the provisions of this chapter as to any remote service terminals installed on or after July 1, 1995, commencing on the date the remote service terminal is installed and as to any remote service terminal existing as of July 1, 1994, commencing no later than on July 1, 1995.
- (c) The operator or other person responsible for the remote service terminal shall provide lighting during the hours of darkness with respect to an open and operating remote service terminal and any defined parking

area, access area and the exterior of an enclosed remote service terminal installation according to the following standards:

- (i) there shall be a minimum of ten candlefoot power at the face of the remote service terminal and extending in an unobstructed direction outward five feet; and
- (ii) there shall be a minimum of two candlefoot power within 50 feet from all unobstructed directions from the face of the remote service terminal. In the event the remote service terminal is located within ten feet of the corner of the building and the remote service terminal is generally accessible from the adjacent side, there shall be a minimum of two candlefoot power along the first 40 unobstructed feet of the adjacent side of the building; and
- (iii) there shall be a minimum of two candlefoot power in that portion of the defined parking area within 60 feet of the remote service terminal.

# 4-305-050 Notices To Customers And Date Of Compliance.

- (a) The issuer of an access device shall furnish a customer receiving the device with a notice of basic safety precautions which the customer should employ while using a remote service terminal. This information shall be furnished by personally delivering or by mailing the information to each customer whose mailing address as to the account to which the access device relates is in the City of Chicago.
- (b) If an access device is issued on or after July 1, 1995, the information described in this section shall be furnished at or before the time the customer is furnished with his or her access device. With respect to a customer to whom an access device has been issued prior to July 1, 1994, the information shall be delivered on or before July 1, 1995.
- (c) Only one notice need be furnished per household, and if access devices are furnished to more than one customer for a single account or set or accounts or on the basis of a single application or other request for access device, only a single notice need be furnished in satisfaction of the notification responsibilities as to those customers.
- (d) The information may be included with other disclosures related to the access device furnished to the customer, such as with any initial or periodic disclosure statement furnished pursuant to the federal Electronic Fund Transfer Act.

# 4-305-060 Record Keeping.

- (a) Each operator of a remote service terminal shall maintain records for each separate remote service terminal location. These records are to be updated annually and should contain information on the following subjects:
  - (i) measures taken to comply with and maintain compliance with this chapter. Specifically, the procedures adopted pursuant to Section 3 of this chapter, including measures taken to comply with the lighting, landscaping, and notice requirements of this chapter; and
  - (ii) information on any criminal or threatening activity occurring at the remote terminal site, such information obtained either through actual knowledge or through police reports.
- (b) Each operator of a remote service terminal located in the City of Chicago shall file a copy of the records to be maintained pursuant to clause (i) of Section 6(a) with the Clerk of the City of Chicago. These records must be updated by a filing with or certification to the Clerk of the City of Chicago made not less frequently than annually. Each operator of a remote service terminal located in the City of Chicago shall make records to be maintained pursuant to clause (ii) of Section 6(a) with respect to such remote service terminal available for inspection by the Superintendent of Police during normal business hours.

4-305-070 Remote Service Terminals To Which This Chapter Does Not Apply.

This chapter does not apply to any remote service terminal which is located:

- (i) inside a building, unless it is an installation that exists for the sole purpose of providing an enclosure for the remote service terminal; or
- (ii) inside a building, except to the extent a transaction can be conducted from outside the building; or
- (iii) in any area, including any access area, building, enclosed space or parking area, that is not controlled by the operator.

4-305-080 Persons Or Entities To Which This Chapter Does Not Apply.

The provisions of this chapter shall not be construed to create any duty, responsibility or obligation for any person or entity whose primary function

is to provide for the exchange, transfer or dissemination of electronic fund transfer data and is not otherwise a financial institution or an operator, as defined in this chapter, and such person or entity shall have no liability or any nature to any customer or user of a remote service terminal and shall not be named in any action by a customer or user of a remote service terminal for any claim concerning any provision of this chapter or relating to the use or attempted use of a remote service terminal.

SECTION 2. If any provision, clause, section, part or application of this chapter to any person or circumstance is declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect, impair or render invalid the remainder hereof or its application to any other person or circumstance. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent of the City Council that this chapter would have been adopted had such invalid provision, clause, section, part or application not been included herein.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and publication.

EXPRESSION OF SUPPORT TO AMERITECH ILLINOIS "ADVANTAGE ILLINOIS" PROPOSAL PENDING BEFORE ILLINOIS STATE COMMERCE COMMISSION.

WHEREAS, Ameritech/Illinois Bell has a regulatory reform proposal before the Illinois Commerce Commission commonly known as Advantage Illinois; and

WHEREAS, Advantage Illinois freezes basic residential telephone rates until 1997 and guarantees that changes in overall telephone rates would be capped below the inflation rate; and

WHEREAS, Ameritech has pledged to spend Three Billion Dollars over five years to modernize and expand its Illinois network as a part of its proposal and if approved Ameritech Illinois has agreed to:

- 1. Support the development of a job corps facility in Chicago by connecting it and selected City Colleges with fiber optic technology; and
- 2. Deploy fiber optic technology over the next one to two years to two industrial corridors targeted by the City's Model Corridor Program planned investment; and
- 3. Work closely with the Department of Planning and Development to determine the appropriate deployment of fiber optic technology to the remaining industrial corridors with the objective of deployment to all corridors within five years; and
- 4. Link the Chicago Public Library System via fiber optic technology, beginning, possibly, with links between the Harold Washington Library and its regional affiliates; and

WHEREAS, This plan does not deregulate local telephone service, or diminish the oversight authority of the Illinois Commerce Commission, or diminish the right of consumer advocates to challenge the reasonableness of Ameritech's rates; and

WHEREAS, This plan will help keep jobs in Chicago, help the local economy and help establish Illinois' reputation for regulatory leadership in telecommunications; now, therefore,

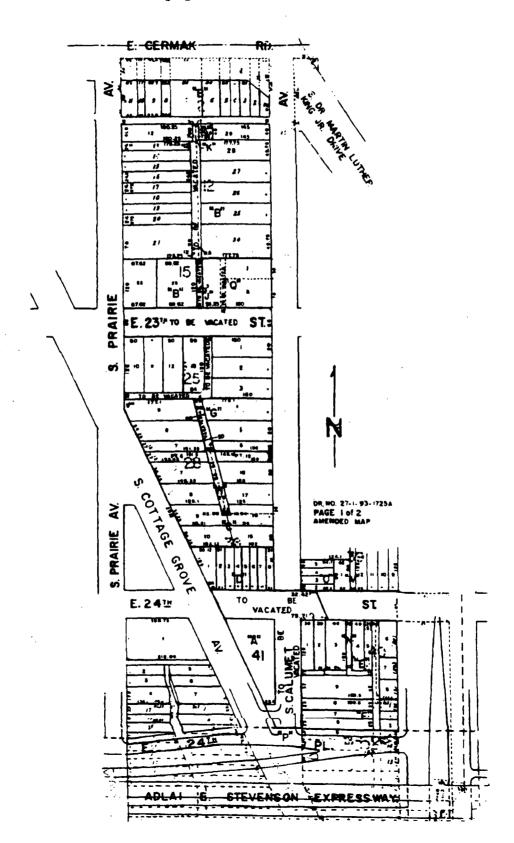

- (b) the Municipal Occupation Tax authorized by Section 8-11-2(2a) of the Illinois Municipal Code and imposed by Chapter 3-40 of this Code applies to sales of gas by local public utilities but not to sales by sellers outside the state of Illinois;
- (c) the City has the home rule power to tax the use of tangible personal property such as gas purchased from sellers not subject to the Municipal Occupation Tax.

SECTION 1.2 The Municipal Code of Chicago is amended by adding a new chapter, designated as Chapter 3-41, to read as follows:

#### 3-41-010 Title.

This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Chicago Gas Use Tax Ordinance". The tax shall be known as the "Chicago Gas Use Tax" and is imposed in addition to all other taxes imposed by the City of Chicago, the State of Illinois or any other municipal corporation or political subdivision of the State of Illinois.

#### 3-41-020 Definitions.

When any of the following words or terms are used in this chapter, they shall have the meaning prescribed to them in this section:

- A. "Chicago Occupation Tax" means the tax imposed by Chapter 3-40 of this Code on persons engaged in the business of distributing, supplying, furnishing or selling gas.
  - B. "City" means the City of Chicago, Illinois.
- C. "Department" or "Department of Revenue" means the department of revenue of the City.
- D. "Director" or "Director of Revenue" means the director of revenue of the City.
- E. "Person" means any natural individual, firm, trust, estate, partnership, association, joint stock company, joint venture, corporation, municipal corporation or political subdivision of this state, or a receiver, trustee, conservator or other representative appointed by order of any court.
- F. "Public utility" means a public utility as defined in Section 3-105 of the Public Utilities Act.
- G. "Public Utilities Act" means the Public Utilities Act, as amended, Illinois Compiled Statutes, Chapter 220, Section 5/1-101, et seq..
- H. "Retail purchaser" means any person who purchases gas in a sale at retail.
- I. "Sale at retail" means any sale by a retailer to a person for use or consumption, and not for resale.

#### 3-41-030 Tax Imposed.

- A. Except as otherwise provided by this chapter, a tax is imposed on the privilege of using or consuming in the City gas that is purchased in a sale at retail. The tax shall be at the rate of 1.5 cents per therm.
- B. The ultimate incidence of and liability for payment of the tax is on the retail purchaser, and nothing in this chapter shall be construed to impose a tax on the occupation of distributing, supplying, furnishing or selling gas.
- C. The retail purchaser shall pay the tax, measured by therms of gas delivered to the retail purchaser's premises, to the public utility designated as the City's collection agent pursuant to Section 3-41-050 of this chapter.

- D. The tax shall not apply to the use or consumption of gas by (1) a governmental body, (2) a person purchasing the gas for use as vehicle fuel, as that term is defined by Chapter 3-52 of this Code, or (3) a public utility engaged in the business of distributing gas.
- E. To prevent multiple taxation, the use of gas in the City by a retail purchaser properly subject to a tax imposed by any state or by the City or any other municipality with respect to the sale at retail of such gas, whether such tax is imposed (1) upon the retail purchaser or (2) upon the seller and separately charged to the retail purchaser by the seller, shall be exempt from the tax imposed by this chapter. For purposes of this subsection, any charge imposed on a retail purchaser pursuant to Section 9-221 or Section 9-222 of the Public Utilities Act with respect to a sale at retail shall be treated as a tax properly imposed on the retail purchaser by this state or by this City or other municipality.
- F. Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to impose a tax upon any person, business or activity which, under the constitutions of the United States and the state of Illinois, may not be made the subject of taxation by the City.

#### 3-41-040 Complementary Relation To Chicago Occupation Tax.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, the tax shall not apply to the use or consumption of gas if the gross receipts from the sale of the gas would not be taxable under the Chicago Occupation Tax despite all elements of the sale occurring in the City.

#### 3-41-050 Collection Of Tax.

The director is authorized to enter into a contract for collection of the tax imposed by this chapter with any public utility providing gas service in the City. The contract shall include and substantially conform with the following provisions:

- (i) the public utility will collect the tax imposed by this chapter as an independent contractor;
- (ii) the public utility will remit collected taxes to the department no more often than once each month;
- (iii) the public utility will be entitled to withhold from tax collections a service fee equal to 3% of the amounts collected and timely remitted to the department;

- (iv) the public utility will treat partial payments first as charges due to the public utility for items other than the tax;
- (v) the obligation of the public utility to collect and remit the tax shall not apply to gas billed by the public utility to a retail purchaser prior to a date four months subsequent to the execution of such contract;
- (vi) the public utility shall not be liable to the City for any tax not actually collected from a retail purchaser; and
  - (vii) such additional terms as the parties may agree upon.

#### 3-41-060 Books And Records.

- A. Every taxpayer shall keep accurate books and records, including original source documents and books of entry, denoting the activities or transactions that gave rise, or may have given rise, to any tax liability or exemption under this chapter. All such books and records shall be kept in the English language and, at all times during business hours of the day, shall be subject to and available for inspection by the department.
- B. Every person that delivers customer-owned gas within the corporate limits of the City shall furnish to the department, upon the department's request, the names, addresses and therms delivered with respect to such deliveries.

#### 3-41-070 Rules And Regulations.

The director is authorized to adopt, promulgate and enforce reasonable rules and regulations pertaining to the administration and enforcement of this chapter.

#### 3-41-080 Application Of Uniform Revenue Procedures Ordinance.

Whenever not inconsistent with the provisions of this chapter, the provisions of the Uniform Revenue Procedures Ordinance, Chapter 3-4 of this Code, as amended, shall apply to and supplement this chapter. For purposes of the tax imposed pursuant to this chapter, a public utility collecting the tax pursuant to Section 3-41-50 of this chapter shall not be a "tax collector" within the meaning of the Uniform Revenue Procedures Ordinance.

SECTION 2. Chapter 4 236 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 4-236-010 Definitions.

For the purpose of this chapter, whenever any of the following words, terms or definitions are used [herein], they shall have the meaning ascribed to them in this section:

\* \* \* \* \*

"Person" means any natural person, trustee, court-appointed representative, syndicate, association, partnership, limited liability company, firm, club, company, corporation, business trust, institution, agency, government corporation, municipal corporation, district or other political subdivision, [contractor, supplier, vendor, vendee, operator, user or owner, or any officers, agents, employees or other representative, acting for himself or for any other person in any capacity,] or any other entity recognized by law as the subject of rights and duties. [The masculine, feminine, singular or plural is included in any circumstances.]

#### 4-236-020 Tax Imposed.

- (a) There is [hereby levied and] imposed upon the use and privilege of parking a motor vehicle in or upon any parking lot or garage[, as defined in this chapter. in the City of Chicago a tax of [\$1.00] \$1.25 for each such motor vehicle parked in or [on] upon each parking lot or garage for every 24-hour period or [any] fraction thereof, provided, however, that if the charge for parking[. If a motor vehicle is parked in or on a parking lot or garage for which a charge] is made on a weekly or monthly basis, the [amount of] tax shall be calculated at the rate of [\$5.00] \$6.25 per week or [\$20.00] \$25.00 per month, respectively. [The parking tax herein imposed applicable for a period other than daily, weekly or monthly, shall be computed by multiplying the sum of \$1.00, \$5.00 or \$20.00, whichever amount is applicable, by the total number of days, weeks or months in the particular period of time involved. The weekly tax of \$5.00 and the monthly tax of \$20.00 shall not be increased or decreased on account of Saturdays, Sundays or legal holidays falling within such weekly or monthly period of time, whether or not the motor vehicle is actually parked in or on said parking lot or garage on such days.]
- (b) The ultimate incidence of and liability for payment of [said] the tax is [to be borne by] on the person who seeks the privilege of occupying space [within said] in or upon the parking lot or garage [, said] (such person hereinafter referred to as the "recipient.")

\* \* \* \* \*

- (d) The tax [herein levied] imposed by this chapter shall be paid in addition to any and all other taxes. It shall be the duty of the operator of every parking lot or garage to secure [said] the tax from the recipient of the parking privilege and to [pay over to] remit the tax to the Department [Director] of Revenue [said tax] under procedures prescribed by the Director of Revenue [, and] or as otherwise provided in this chapter.
- (e) Every person required to collect the tax [levied] imposed by this chapter shall secure [said] the tax from the recipient at the time [he collects] the price, charge or rent to which it applies is collected. If the recipient is given any invoice, receipt or other statement [or memorandum] of [said] the price, charge or rent paid or payable, the tax shall be stated, charged and shown separately on [said documents] the document.
- (f) Hospitals shall be exempt from the collection of any tax from their employees as provided for in *this chapter* [Chapter 4-236 of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago].

#### 4-236-030 Rules And Regulations -- Authorized -- Publication.

[The director of revenue shall make and publish in pamphlet form, for distribution to the public, rules and regulations appropriate to and in furtherance of the purpose of this chapter.] The Director of Revenue is authorized to adopt, promulgate and enforce rules and regulations pertaining to the administration and enforcement of this chapter.

SECTION 3. Section 3-40-170 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 3-40-170 Gross Receipts Tax.

A tax is imposed upon all persons engaged in the business of distributing, supplying, furnishing or selling electricity for use or consumption within the corporate limits of the City, and not for resale, at the rate of [four] five percent of the gross receipts from such business [after December 31, 1973,]; subject, however, to all the provisions, conditions and limitations in Section 8-11-2 of the Illinois Municipal Code 1961, authorizing this tax, and to all the provisions, conditions and limitations in this ordinance, consistent with the powers conferred upon the City by [said] Section 8-11-2 and other relevant law.

SECTION 4. Section 4-156-010 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting the language in italics, as follows:

4-156-010 Definitions.

\* \* \* \* \*

"Person" means any natural individual, firm, society, foundation, institution, partnership, limited liability company, association, joint stock company, joint venture, public or private corporation, receiver, executor, trustee or other representative appointed by the order of any court, or any other entity recognized by law.

\* \* \* \* \*

SECTION 5. Chapter 3-44 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, the Chicago Liquor Tax Ordinance, is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

3-44-030 Tax Imposed.

In addition to any and all other taxes authorized by law, a tax is hereby imposed on the retail sale of alcoholic beverages in the City. [Such] This tax [is to] shall be paid by the purchaser and nothing in this chapter shall be construed to impose a tax on [upon] the occupation of retail or wholesale alcoholic beverage dealer. [This] The tax shall be levied according to the following schedule:

- [(1) Wine, a tax at the rate of \$.15 per gallon;]
- [(2) Alcohol and spirits, a tax at the rate of \$.50 per gallon;]
- [(3)] (1) Beer, a tax at the rate of [\$.12] \$0.16 per gallon [.];
- (2) Alcoholic liquor, other than beer, containing 14% or less of alcohol by volume, a tax at the rate of \$0.20 per gallon;
- (3) Alcoholic liquor containing more than 14% and less than 20% of alcohol by volume, a tax at the rate of \$0.50 per gallon;
- (4) Alcoholic liquor containing 20% or more of alcohol by volume, a tax at the rate of \$1.50 per gullon.

The tax rate stated above shall be apportioned in sales involving a fraction of a gallon, and shall be rounded down to the nearest cent when less than one-half a cent is due and rounded up to the nearest cent when one-half cent or more is due.

3-44-065 Inventory Report.

On or before June 30, 1994, every retail dealer of alcoholic beverages shall file with the department, on a form prescribed by the director, an inventory of alcoholic beverages in the retail dealer's possession or control on the effective date of this section. The retail dealer shall include with the inventory report any tax due on the sale of such alcoholic beverages to retail purchases for which all applicable tax has not been collected by a distributor.

SECTION 6. Chapter 3-4 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, the Uniform Revenue Procedures ordinance, is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

3-4-020 Definitions.

When any of the following words or terms are used herein, whether or not capitalized, they shall have the meaning or construction ascribed to them in this section:

"Person" means any natural individual, corporation, partnership, limited liability company, association, joint stock company, joint venture, foundation, receiver, estate, executor, trust, trustee, assignee, conservator or other representative appointed by order of any court.

3-4-100 Credits And Refunds.

F. Any credit or refund allowed under this section shall bear interest at the rate of [one-half] one-quarter of one percent per month, or fraction thereof, from the date the department received the erroneous payment or remittance until the date the director approves in writing a credit or refund.

\* \* \* \* \*

SECTION 7. Section 3-70-040(D) of Chapter 3-70 is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

3-70-040 Collection Of Tax By Retailers.

\* \* \* \*

(D) For [calendar year 1992] periods beginning on or after January 1, 1994, retailers may retain 1.75 percent of the tax they collect to reimburse them for expenses incurred in connection with collecting and remitting the tax, less any charge allowed by the Illinois Commerce Commission that permits them to recover such expenses. This commission shall not be allowed for taxes not timely remitted to the department.

SECTION 8. Section 2-64-020 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

2-64-020 Board Of Directors -- Statutory Authority.

The board of directors provided for by statute and appointed in accordance therewith shall have control and management of all matters pertaining to the Chicago Public Library in accordance with the provisions of the [act of the General Assembly entitled, "An Act to authorize cities, villages, incorporated towns and townships to establish and maintain free public libraries and reading rooms", approved March 7, 1872,] Illinois Local Library Act, as amended. The board shall have the authority to rent out rooms and space within library buildings for private use, but in no event shall any such rental exceed one day or be for the purpose of sale of any thing or service to library patrons, except with the prior approval of the City Council. The form of such rental agreements shall be subject to approval of the Corporation Counsel. The board in its bylaws may impose reasonable fees for the borrowing of films and recordings, as well as reasonable charges for the late return or failure to return library materials of any nature. Nothing in this section or in the

bylaws of the board prohibits or restricts the right of the City to prosecute any person under Sections 2-64-040 and 2-64-050 of this code.

SECTION 9. Section 2-112-300 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting the language in italics, as follows:

2-112-300 Fees And Charges.

The Department of Health is hereby authorized and directed to collect fees and make charges, as indicated in this section for the following services:

Medical, Hospital and Related Services. Reasonable compensation based on actual cost, shall be charged and collected from any person who is received, cared for, or treated, and who is able to pay, for occupancy, nursing, care, medicine, laboratory services or attendance in connection with services at any facility maintained and provided by the Department of Health. Ability to pay shall include third-party payments through insurance or other sources of payment to which the person is entitled. These privileges shall be extended free of charge to residents of the City of Chicago, who are unable to pay for them.

Municipal Communicable Disease Hospital. A fee, based on a fee schedule filed annually by the Department of Health with the City Council Finance Committee, shall be charged and collected from neighboring municipal and county authorities for cases cared for at the Municipal Communicable Disease Hospital.

Laboratory Examinations. The rates prevailing in local laboratories shall be charged and collected from neighboring municipal and county authorities for examinations and analyses made in the municipal laboratories.

Reinspections. Unless otherwise specifically provided in this code, a fee of \$25 for the second and each subsequent inspection during a license period of any place, machinery, equipment, vehicle, process or article where necessary to assure compliance with this code or the regulations of the board.

SECTION 10. Section 4-5-010 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 4-5-010 Establishment Of License Fees.

This chapter shall establish fees for various licenses created by this title unless otherwise provided. The following fees shall apply for the specified licenses. The chapter in which each fee requirement is created is also provided. Unless otherwise stated, fees shall be assessed on an annual basis.

SECTION 11. Section 4-36-050 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

4-36-050 Classification Of Plants -- Fees -- Separate Licenses Required.

(a) Frozen dessert plants are hereby divided into classes and the annual license fee for each class is as follows:

Frozen dessert plant -- freezer capacity shall be frozen dessert plants (except frozen dessert distributors) which manufacture or process mix or frozen desserts by approved methods which involve the use of freezer capacity, which are located within the City of Chicago. The annual license fee shall be as set forth in Section 4-5-010.

Frozen dessert plant -- outside City shall be frozen dessert plants (except frozen dessert distributors) located outside the City of Chicago. The annual license fee shall be as set forth in Section 4-5-010.

Frozen dessert plant -- distributor shall be frozen dessert distributors having mix or frozen desserts to be sold, disposed of or delivered within the City of Chicago. The annual license fee shall be as set forth in Section 4-5-010.

Frozen dessert plant -- non-freezer capacity shall be frozen dessert plants (except frozen dessert distributors) which manufacture or process frozen desserts or mix by approved methods which do not involve the use of freezer capacity, and which are located within the City of Chicago. The annual license fee shall be as set forth in Section 4-5-010.

(b) Each licensee hereunder shall pay an annual frozen dessert vehicle inspection fee for each vehicle owned by, controlled by, or operated under contract with such licensee, used for the sale or delivery of its frozen desserts or mix within the [City, according to the capacity of each such vehicle, as] City. The fee for each inspection shall be \$50 per vehicle, and shall be in addition to the license fee set forth in Section 4-5-010.

No permit or sticker emblem shall be issued or renewed with respect to a vehicle unless the annual frozen dessert vehicle inspection fee for such vehicle shall first be paid. Each applicant for a frozen dessert vehicle license shall specify in the application the weight capacity of the vehicle for which application is made.

(c) No license issued hereunder shall entitle the licensee to engage in the business of manufacturing or distributing mix or frozen desserts in any place or places other than that described and set out in such license, and a separate license shall be applied for and a separate fee shall be paid for each and every place at which such business is engaged in. Provided, however, that if any licensee shall desire to engage in the business of manufacturing or distributing mix or frozen desserts at more than one place and operate or employ the same vehicles at each place of business, such licensee shall not be required to pay more than one inspection fee to the City of Chicago for each such vehicle.

SECTION 12. Section 4-44-040 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting the language in italics, as follows:

4-44-040 Fees And Combination Licenses.

Every person selling, offering for sale, exposing for sale, exchange or delivery, or disposing of milk or milk products in and from any milk plant shall pay an annual truck license fee on the basis of \$50.00 for each vehicle receiving packaged milk or milk products from said plant for distribution in the City.

Such persons shall also pay an additional annual milk vehicle weight license fee for each motor truck or trailer, according to the capacity thereof, used for the delivery or sale of milk or milk products owned by, or controlled and operated under contract with, and displaying the name of said persons, as set forth in Section 4-5-010.

Each applicant shall specify the weight capacity of the milk in the vehicle for which an application for license is made.

Every person selling, offering for sale, exposing for sale, exchange or delivery, or disposing of milk or milk products which are not intended to be consumed on the premises, in and from any milk plant such as a milk depot, store, stand, booth, vending machine, market place or any building

or enclosure or establishment of a similar character shall pay an annual license fee as set forth in Section 4-5-010.

A single or "combination" license may be issued to an applicant to permit him to conduct or operate the business of food purveyor and to sell milk and milk products at retail, not for consumption on the premises, in conjunction with such business of food purveyor on the same premises. This provision shall not apply to licenses for milk plants or milk-receiving stations. The fee to be paid for such single or "combination" license shall equal the sum of fees which the applicant would be required to pay if separate licenses for each business were issued to him.

Every person who is subject to this chapter shall also pay an inspection fee of \$50 for each inspection of a vehicle by the board of health to determine the vehicle's compliance with the sanitation requirements of this chapter and the regulations issued hereunder.

SECTION 13. Section 4-276-020 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

4-276-020 Inspection Fees.

The Commissioner of Consumer Services shall demand and receive for the use of the city, before the delivery of certificates provided for by this chapter, the following fees:

- SECTION 14. Section 9-48-020 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:
  - 9-48-020 Horse-Drawn Carriages -- Areas Designated For Use -- Permit For Use In Other Areas.
  - (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), horse-drawn carriages shall be allowed to operate only in such areas or on such routes as are designated from time to time by the commissioner of transportation, subject to the approval of the City Council.
  - (b) Operation of carriages in areas or on routes not designated pursuant to subsection (a) shall be by permit only. Such permits shall be issued by the Commissioner of Transportation, for a fee of [\$25.00,] \$50.00 per day, only upon application of a licensed operator at least 72 hours prior to the date of the proposed use and only for a period of time not to exceed eight hours per day. Each permit shall specify the route on which the permit holder may operate, the location of permitted stops, and the hours for which the permit is valid.
- SECTION 15. Section 9-92-080 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language backeted and inserting the language in italics, as follows:
  - 9-92-080 Release Procedure For Impounded Vehicles.
  - (a) The owner or other person entitled to possession of a vehicle impounded pursuant to Section 9-92-030 may obtain immediate release of the vehicle either (1) by paying the full amount of the applicable towing and storage fees, as provided in subsection (b), or (2) by requesting a hearing, to be held within seven days, and making a deposit of 50 percent of the applicable towing and storage fees. Such person may also, without paying a deposit or obtaining immediate release of the vehicle, request a hearing be held within 24 hours. The hearing referred to in this subsection shall determine the validity of the impounding of the vehicle and any towing or storage fees imposed.
  - (b) The owner or other person entitled to possession of a vehicle lawfully impounded pursuant to Section 9-92-030 shall pay a fee of [\$100.00,] \$105.00, or [\$125.00] \$135.00 if the vehicle has a gross weight of 8,000 pounds or more, to cover the cost of the towing and a fee of [\$5.00] \$10.00 per day, or [\$15.00] \$25.00 per day if the vehicle has a gross weight of 8,000 pounds or more, to cover the cost of storage.

- (c) If the state registration number of the impounded vehicle is included on the immobilization list maintained pursuant to Section 9-96-010, in addition to paying the applicable towing and storage fees provided in subsection (b) of this section, the owner or other person entitled to possession shall, prior to securing the release of the vehicle, take one of the following actions:
  - (1) Paying all the fines and penalties, if any, on the outstanding parking violation complaints for which notice had been sent pursuant to Section 9-96-010 prior to the date of impoundment; or
  - (2) Completing appearance forms on all outstanding parking violation complaints for which notice had been sent prior to the date of impoundment and depositing collateral in the amount of 50 percent of the total fines for these outstanding parking violation complaints, or \$500.00 whichever is less.
- (d) If the state registration number of the impounded vehicle is included on the immobilization list maintained pursuant to Section 9-100-120, in addition to paying the applicable towing and storage fees provided in subsection (b) of this section, the owner or other person entitled to possession of a lawfully impounded vehicle shall also pay all fines and penalties remaining due on each final determination of parking violation liability issued to such person prior to the release of the impounded vehicle.
- (e) A lienholder asserting its right to possession of an impounded vehicle pursuant to its conditional sales agreement may obtain immediate release of such vehicle by paying the applicable towing and storage fees provided in subsection (b) of this section and submitting a photocopy of the conditional sales agreement and title certificate, an affidavit stating that the purchaser is in default of the agreement and an indemnification certificate executed by an authorized agent of the lienholder. The requirements of subsections (c) and (d) of this section shall not apply to a lienholder asserting its right to possession of an impounded vehicle as provided herein.
- SECTION 16. Section 9-96-010 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:
  - 9-96-010 Vehicle Immobilization Program.
  - (a) The City parking administrator is authorized to direct and supervise a program of vehicle immobilization as provided in this section. The program of vehicle immobilization shall provide for immobilizing any eligible vehicle upon the public way by placement of a restraint in such a

manner as to prevent its operation or if the eligible vehicle is parked or left in violation of any provision of the traffic code for which such vehicle is subject to an immediate tow pursuant to Section 9-92-030, or in any place where it constitutes an obstruction or a hazard, or where it impedes City workers during such operations as snow removal, the City parking administrator may cause the eligible vehicle to be towed to a City vehicle pound or relocated to a legal parking place and there restrained. For the purposes of this section only, "public way" means any sidewalk, roadway, alley or other public thoroughfare and any City-owned parking facility or other City property.

- (b) A vehicle shall be eligible for immobilization as provided herein any time after inclusion of its state registration number on an immobilization list. A vehicle's state registration number shall be included on an immobilization list only if:
  - (1) The registered owner of the vehicle has accumulated ten (10) or more parking violation complaints in the Circuit Court of Cook County on which no payment has been made or appearance filed within the time specified by the complaints;
  - (2) At least twenty-one (21) days prior to placing the registration plate number of the vehicle on the immobilization eligibility list, notice of impending vehicle immobilization has been sent to the registered owner first class mail, postage prepaid, at the address of the registered owner recorded with the Secretary of State or, in the case of a vehicle bearing a registration number of a state other than Illinois, at the address of the registered owner recorded in that state's registry of motor vehicles.
- (c) The notice required in subsection (b) shall state the name and address of the registered owner, the state registration number of the vehicle, the nature of the ordinances violated and the numbers and issue dates of the outstanding complaints. The notice shall also advise that a person may challenge the validity of the notice of impending vehicle immobilization by appearing in person and submitting evidence which would conclusively disprove liability, such as the following:
  - (1) That the person was not the owner or lessee of the vehicle on the date or dates the notices of parking violations were issued; or
  - (2) That the fines or penalties for the violations cited in the report were paid; or
  - (3) That the registered owner has not accumulated ten (10) or more parking violation complaints which are unpaid, not adjudicated or for which no appearance has been filed.

- (d) Upon immobilization of an eligible vehicle, a notice shall be affixed to the vehicle in a conspicuous place. Such notice shall warn that the vehicle is immobilized and that any attempt to move the vehicle may result in its damage. The notice shall also state that the unauthorized removal of or damage to the immobilizing restraint is a violation of Sections 16-1 and 21-1 of the Illinois Criminal Code. The notice also shall provide information specifying how release of the immobilizing restraint may be had, and how the registered owner may obtain an immobilization hearing pursuant to this section.
- (e) Except where the vehicle is otherwise subject to towing, if the immobilizing restraint has not been released pursuant to subsection (f) within twenty-four (24) hours of its placement, the restraint shall be released and the vehicle towed and impounded.
- (f) Prior to a hearing on the validity of the immobilization as provided in subsection (h), the owner of an immobilized vehicle or other authorized person shall be permitted to secure release of the vehicle by:
  - (1) Paying the immobilization and towing and storage fees, if applicable, specified in subsection (i); and
    - (2) Taking one of the following actions:

Paying all the fines and penalties, if any, on the outstanding complaints for which notice had been sent prior to the date of the immobilization; or

Completing appearance forms on all outstanding parking violation complaints for which notice had been sent prior to the date of the immobilization and depositing collateral in the amount of 50 percent of the total fines for these outstanding parking violation complaints, or \$500.00, whichever is less.

- (g) Within ten (10) days after a vehicle has been impounded, notice of impoundment shall be sent by certified mail, return receipt requested, to the registered owner of the vehicle at the address to which the notice specified in subsection (b) (2) was mailed. The notice shall state that the owner has the right to a post-immobilization and post-towing hearing as provided in subsection (h), and that if the car is not claimed within thirty (30) days from the date of the notice, the vehicle may be sold or otherwise disposed of in accordance with the traffic code.
- (h) The owner of an immobilized vehicle shall have the right to a hearing to determine whether the immobilization or any subsequent towing was erroneous or whether the vehicle was properly included on an immobilization list, if the owner files a written demand for a hearing with the city parking administrator within fourteen (14) days after issuance of the notice specified in subsection (g) or within fourteen (14) days of the immobilization, whichever is later. A hearing shall be conducted within

forty-eight (48) hours of receipt of a written demand for hearing, unless otherwise mutually agreed by the parties. Failure to request or attend a scheduled hearing shall be deemed a waiver of the right to a hearing. In event of such failure, any amount deposited pursuant to subsection (f) (1) shall be forfeited. A hearing provided by this section shall not determine the validity of or otherwise adjudicate any citation or notice of parking violation issued relative to the immobilized vehicle.

- (i) The fee for immobilization shall be \$60.00; the fee for towing subsequent to immobilization shall be [\$100.00] \$105.00, or [\$125.00] \$135.00 if the vehicle has a gross weight of 8,000 pounds or more; and the storage fee shall be [\$5.00] \$10.00 per day, or [\$15.00] \$25.00 per day if the vehicle has a gross weight of 8,000 pounds or more, provided that no fees shall be assessed for any immobilization or tow which has been determined to be erroneous.
- (j) It shall be unlawful to relocate or tow any vehicle restrained by an immobilizing device without the approval of the city parking administrator. The registered owner of the immobilized vehicle and any person who relocates an immobilized vehicle in violation of this subsection shall each be subject to a penalty of \$500.00 for such violation.

SECTION 17. Section 9-100-020 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

9-100-020 Violation -- Penalty.

- (a) The violation of any provision of the traffic code prohibiting or restricting vehicular standing or parking shall be a civil offense punishable by fine, and no criminal penalty, or civil sanction other than that prescribed in the traffic code, shall be imposed.

When an investigation or investigations, whether upon complaint or otherwise, disclose the existence of a violation or violations of Title 17 of this Code or of Titles 13, 14 and 15 (excluding Chapters 13-14, 13-72 and 14-4), or Chapters 4-120, 5-4, 7-28 and 11-8 of this Code, that are likely to endanger life and safety in cases of fire, panic, or other accident, or endanger or impair the health of any occupants of any building, structure or place covered by the regulations of this Code, the buildings commissioner shall give notice in writing to an owner, agent or registered agent, occupant, lessee or person in possession or control of such building, structure, premises or place to make such changes, alterations or repairs, or to perform such work, or to take such action as the provisions of the Code, or the safety or health of any person may require within such time as shall be designated by the buildings commissioner, which shall in no event exceed fifteen (15) days after the service of such notice unless the commissioner deems a longer period necessary and reasonable.

In the event that the changes, alterations, repairs or requirements ordered by the notice of the buildings commissioner are not made or performed to the satisfaction of the buildings commissioner within the time specified in the notice, the commissioner may institute enforcement proceedings based on violations of this Code by referring the matter to the code enforcement bureau as provided in Chapter 13-14 or to the corporation counsel for prosecution. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting the referral of violations of this Code to the code enforcement bureau or to corporation counsel for prosecution irrespective of whether the notice of violation specified herein was transmitted or received.

The records of such investigations, including inspections of a building, structure, premises and contents thereof, shall be preserved as public records and shall be admissible in an administrative or judicial enforcement proceeding as prima facie evidence as to the contents thereof.

Upon request of the owner or his agent, it shall be the duty of the buildings commissioner to issue or cause to be issued to the owner or his

agent, a statement attesting that such building, structure or premises either complies in substantial respects with or is in violation of the building provisions of this Code in the respects enumerated, such certificate to be a report of the information contained in the records of the department of buildings and not a finding, estoppel, or legal determination. No person shall use or rely upon the certificate or the information contained therein as a basis for any legal action against the City.

The fee for said certificate shall be payable to the Director of Revenue and shall be computed as follows:

If, in the judgment of the buildings commissioner, further evidence is necessary of the adaptability or safety of such materials, methods, systems, arrangements, or safety qualifications, he may require further tests to be made or additional data to be submitted by the applicant.

The fee for such application shall be [\$100.00] \$125.00 payable to the Director of Revenue of which fee 50 percent shall be refunded to the applicant only in the event said application shall be disapproved.

The buildings commissioner shall inspect, or cause to be inspected annually and periodically, all amusement riding devices, mechanisms and

structures and such other mechanical structural devices or contrivances which will permit the movement of a person by mechanical means in any direction for amusement, where such devices are erected and operated within a building, amusement park, fair or carnival situated on any lot, tract of land or public way, before said devices will be opened to the public. A fee for each annual inspection of a mechanical amusement riding device in an amusement park, other than coin-operated riding device, shall be [\$50.00] \$100.00.

Where said devices are taken down, removed, reassembled or re-erected in another location, the buildings commissioner shall inspect or cause to be inspected said devices after each removal and before said devices are opened to the public for the purpose of ascertaining whether they comply with the provisions of this code and the rules and regulations of the department of buildings. No device shall be operated unless they do comply with the provisions of this code and the rules and regulations of the department of buildings. Load test, where required, shall be performed in the presence of the enforcing authority.

Every permit application for a mechanical amusement riding device shall be accompanied by a certificate of comprehensive general liability and property damage insurance, which will name as an additional insured the City of Chicago, its officers and employees, in an amount of \$500,000.00 for any one person and \$1,000,000.00 for any one accident and be filed with the buildings commissioner and the city comptroller. The applicant or permittee shall maintain such insurance policy in full force and effect at all times during the permit period. Each policy shall include a provision to the effect that it shall not be subject to cancellation, reduction in the amounts of its liabilities, or other material change until notice thereof has been received in writing by the city comptroller, not less than 30 days prior to such action. Failure to maintain insurance coverage as required by this section shall result in the revocation of the mechanical amusement riding device permit.

A permit as required in Section 13-32-190 for every new or previously unregistered mechanical amusement riding device installed or altered, a fee as provided in Section 13-32-310 shall be paid. Where amusement riding devices are erected within a building above the lowest floor, a plan shall be either made or checked and certified by an architect or structural engineer approving the strength of the floor load.

Every permit application for a mechanical amusement riding device shall be accompanied by a letter from the organization sponsoring the carnival, a letter from the owners of the property where the rides are to be located, an alderman's letter of permission and a description of the toilet facilities; also a street permit when a mechanical amusement riding device is to be located upon a public way, as required in Sections 10-28-590 through 10-28-640 of this Code.

Every carnival permit and inspection for a mechanical amusement riding device shall be for a term of not more than 14 days. A renewal of every carnival permit and reinspection for a mechanical amusement riding device shall be made every 14 days. A fee as provided in Section 13-32-310 shall be paid.

A permit and inspection for each location shall be required annually for every coin-operated mechanical amusement riding device. A fee as provided for in Section 13-32-310 shall be paid.

SECTION 36. Section 13-20-340 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-20-340 Tanks -- Inspection Fee.

For every such annual inspection, it shall be the duty of the owner to pay an inspection fee of [\$26.00] \$50.00 for each such tank.

SECTION 37. Section 13-24-060 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-24-060 Appeal Procedure.

The person, firm or corporation who is desiring review of an order or decision of the buildings commissioner pertaining to building permits shall file with the chairman of the building board of appeals a written petition, on a form to be provided, within 14 days after the particular order or decision to be reviewed has been issued by the commissioner, requesting that the particular order or decision be reviewed by the building board of appeals. The person, firm or corporation requesting such review shall also file with the chairman any and all pertinent data or information that he or it may care to present to the building board of appeals for its consideration, together with a filing fee payable to the City of Chicago in the amounts as follows:

- (a) [\$50.00] \$100.00 for single-family dwellings and miscellaneous buildings and structures as defined in Chapter 58-11;
- (b) [\$75.00] \$150.00 for buildings containing two to four dwelling units;
  - (c) [\$150.00] \$250.00 for all other occupancies.

Upon the filing of a petition to review any decision or order of the buildings commissioner any and all work or operations which will or may be directly or indirectly affected by any such decision or order shall cease and no such work or operations shall be commenced until and after a decision or decisions have been rendered by the building board of appeals; and any and all terms and provisions of any such decision or decisions of the building board of appeals shall have been fully complied with.

SECTION 38. Section 13-32-260 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-32-260 Permits To Be Obtained Prior To Commencement Of Wrecking -- Violation -- Penalty.

It shall be unlawful for any person to perform any wrecking operation of any kind without first having obtained such necessary permit and bond as required in Sections 13-32-230 through 13-32-250. Any person found in violation of this section shall be subject to a fine of up to \$1,000.00. [\$100.00, or six months in prison, or both such fine and imprisonment.] Each day on which such violation exists shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 39. Section 13-32-270 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-32-270 Warm Air Furnaces -- Permit Required.

It shall be unlawful for any person to construct, replace or install any warm air heating furnace, with appurtenances, ducts, or registers, without first obtaining a permit from the buildings commissioner for such work, as provided by this chapter. Any person who violates this section shall be subject to a fine of \$200 for each offense. Each day that a violation of this section exists shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 40. Section 13-32-310 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-32-310 Permit Fees -- Generally.

The fee of [\$61.00] \$70.00 shall be paid to the director of revenue for the approval of plans, and inspection, and test, of any plumbing within any building containing not more than five plumbing fixtures. An additional fee of [\$9.00] \$10.00 shall be paid for every plumbing fixture in excess of five within such building.

SECTION 43. Section 13-32-340 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-32-340 Plumbing Fixture Replacement -- Fees.

The fee for the replacement of one to five plumbing fixtures shall be [\$47.00] \$55.00. An additional fee of [\$7.00] \$10.00 shall be paid for each additional plumbing fixture replaced within the same building.

SECTION 44. Section 13-84-410 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-84-410 Building Capacity -- Signs To Be Posted.

(a) In every theater, public assembly unit or open air assembly unit and in every room or in any portion of such units which is used as a place of assembly, there shall be conspicuously posted signs indicating the number of persons who may legally occupy such rooms and space. Such signs shall read as follows:

- (b) Such signs shall be furnished by the department of buildings and shall be 15 inches in width by 12 inches in height. The lettering thereon indicating the lawful occupancy shall be of bold gothic type in red on a background of white, shall not be less than one inch in height and the numerals shall be one and one-quarter inches in height, and such lettering and numerals shall be properly spaced to provide good visibility. The fee for each such sign so issued shall be [\$50.00] \$100.00 up to 300 occupants plus \$.50 for each additional occupant. [\$30.00] \$50.00 shall be charged for the issuance of each duplicate card.
- (c) Such signs shall be illuminated, shall be durable, and shall be substantially secured to wall or partition.
- (d) Such signs shall be located at the main entrance to such space or room so as to be conspicuously visible to a person entering such space or room.

SECTION 45. Section 13-96-500 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 13-96-500 Permits.

- (a) Permits for tents shall be limited to a period of 60 days.
- (b) The fee for a permit for each tent, as defined in Sections 13-96-480 and 13-96-490 shall be based on the square footage of the area covered as follows:

Within two years after the erection or installation of any exposed metal structure and its supports, permitted by this code upon or above the roof of any building, and at least once every five years thereafter, every such exposed metal structure now existing or hereafter erected shall be subject to a critical examination by a licensed architect or a registered structural engineer, employed by the owner, agent or person in possession or control of the building. The licensed architect or registered structural engineer shall prepare a report in writing showing the structural condition of the structure and its supports. Two copies of the report shall be submitted to the buildings commissioner. A report review fee in the amount of [\$12.00] \$25.00, payable to the department of revenue, shall be required at the time of submission to the buildings commissioner. One copy of the report shall, if satisfactory to the buildings commissioner, be returned to the owner, agent or person in possession or control of the building, bearing a stamp of approval, signed by the buildings commissioner.

Any person or entity who fails to comply with the provisions of this section shall be fined not less than \$100.00 but not more than \$500.00 for each offense.

SECTION 47. Section 13-180-210 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-180-210 Permit Issuance And Fees.

The buildings commissioner shall issue a permit upon the payment of a fee of [\$35.00] \$40.00 for every water heater to be installed or connected. The receipt for the payment of said fee, together with the approved application, shall constitute the permit required for such installation or connection.

SECTION 48. Section 13-184-130 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-184-130 Permits And Fees.

(1) It shall be unlawful for any person to construct, replace or install any warm-air-heating furnaces or appurtenances thereto within the city without first obtaining from the buildings commissioner a permit to do such work, for which said person shall pay to said buildings commissioner, for the use of said permit, \$25.00 for each furnace installed, and \$15.00 for each furnace renewed or repaired [the sum of \$12.50].

Before a permit to install a forced warm-air-heating plant is issued, a diagram of the premises and estimate of the type of furnace to be used and sufficient information showing that all provisions of this code are being complied with including the details of the mechanical devices for moving or forcing warm air shall be filed with the buildings commissioner. Provided, however, that permission to install a warm-air-heating plant shall not in any manner approve the installation of same until after tests of same have been made to the satisfaction of the buildings commissioner.

(2) No heating permits shall be required for minor repair work. By minor repair work is meant the incidental repairs to furnaces, which shall not affect the general action of the system, such as renewal of grates, smoke pipes and resetting old furnace in same location; or renewing of single warm air pipes in basement; but when additional runs or new stacks are installed, a permit shall be required, for which the person installing said additional runs or new stacks shall pay to the buildings commissioner, for the use of the City of Chicago, the sum of \$10.00 for each permit.

SECTION 49. Section 13-192-730 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-192-730 Fees For Permit Issuance.

The fees for the issuance of a permit for the installation of a refrigeration system shall be as follows:

Class A: [\$90.00] \$100.00 for each compressor or generator unit

Class B: [\$68.00] \$75.00 for each compressor or generator unit

SECTION 50. Section 13-192-740 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

13-192-740 Fees For Annual Inspections.

The fees for the annual inspections of refrigerating systems shall be as follows:

[\$16.00] \$20.00 for each compressor or generator unit of three tons or less capacity

[\$34.00] \$40.00 for each compressor or generator unit over three tons and not over 30 tons of capacity

[\$41.00] \$50.00 for each compressor or generator unit over 30 tons and not over 100 tons capacity

[\$47.00] \$75.00 for each compressor or generator unit over 100 tons and not over 1,000 tons capacity

[\$68.00] \$100.00 for each compressor or generator unit over 1,000 tons capacity.

Compressor capacity shall be based on the applicable Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration Institute (A.R.I.) published rating for the equipment involved.

The provisions of Section 13-192-740 shall not apply to any system containing less than four pounds of refrigerant.

SECTION 51. Section 14-12-820 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-12-820 Circuit Of 50 Amperes Or Less.

The inspection fee for each nominal 20-ampere or less, branch circuit, including fixtures, sockets or receptacles, shall be [\$8.00] \$10.00 per circuit for the first 50 circuits and [\$4.00] \$5.00 for each nominal 20-ampere or less, branch circuit thereafter. The inspection fee for 21-to 50-ampere branch circuits shall be [\$16.00] \$20.00 per circuit.

The inspection fee for a 21-ampere to 50-ampere fixed lighting circuit shall be [\$16.00] \$20.00 per circuit.

SECTION 52. Section 14-12-830 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-12-830 Outlets.

For the inspection of additional outlets on existing circuits and including the fixtures, sockets or receptacles attached to such outlets the fee shall be [\$1.00] \$2.00 for each outlet.

SECTION 53. Section 14-12-840 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-12-840 Motors Or Current-Consuming Devices.

The inspection fees for the inspection of each electric motor or currentconsuming device, other than lighting fixtures, shall be as follows:

SECTION 55. Section 14-12-880 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-12-880 Minimum Fee.

No inspection shall be made for an amount less than [\$30.00] \$40.00.

SECTION 56. Section 14-12-890 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-12-890 Plan Examination.

The fees for examination of plans shall be [\$15.00] \$25.00 per half hour or fraction thereof per plan examiner.

SECTION 57. Section 14-12-900 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-12-900 Displays, Exhibitions, Carnivals And Similar Temporary Installations.

The fees for inspection of the electrical work in connection with displays, exhibitions, carnivals and similar temporary installations shall be [\$30.00] \$50.00 per hour or fraction thereof per inspector.

SECTION 58. Section 14-12-930 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

SECTION 59. Section 14-12-490 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

### 14-12-940 Electric Lampposts.

Inspection fees for the original installation of street lighting equipment shall be at the rate of [\$4.00] \$10.00 for each lamppost. Annual inspection fees shall be at the rate of [\$3.00] \$5.00 for each lamppost.

SECTION 60. Section 14-28-1140 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 14-28-1140 Categories -- Permit -- Fee.

Projectors and projection equipment are divided into three categories for the purposes of this Code, as follows:

a. Miniature Nonprofessional Type. Equipment ordinarily used by the general public for home movies and family entertainment specifically approved and labeled by a testing laboratory. For use with slow-burning film, 16mm or less in width and with a maximum film capacity of 2,000 feet;

- b. Nonprofessional Type. Approved equipment which utilizes slow-burning film, 16mm or less in width and with a maximum film capacity of 2,000 feet;
- c. Professional Type. Equipment of a class and type ordinarily used in motion picture theaters, shows, exhibitions and other such locations, where people assemble to be educated or entertained. Projectors and equipment in this category shall comply with all applicable provisions of Section 14-28-1150.
- d. A permit shall be obtained from the bureau of electrical inspection prior to the use and for each use of any professional type projector or any nonprofessional type projector which has a rating in excess of 15 amperes or utilizes any voltage in excess of 150 amperes between conductors or between any conductor and ground. All such equipment shall be specifically approved by the bureau of electrical inspection before it is used. The minimum permit fee shall be \$100.00 for a professional type projector and \$10.00 for a nonprofessional type projector. [and it] The permit shall be prominently displayed during each use of the projector or equipment.

SECTION 61. Section 14-40-140 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 14-40-140 Permit Fees.

The original permit fees shall cover the first annual inspection fee. Subsequent annual inspections shall be subject to the annual inspection fee stated in Section 14-40-170. Permit fees shall be computed as follows:

- (a) Electric or illuminated signs projecting over the public way: [\$22.00] \$100.00 per sign, plus [\$0.70] \$1.00 per square foot of area of each face. The area of an irregular shaped sign shall be computed by using the area of the outer perimeter design of the sign.
- (b) Electric or illuminated signs on private property, illuminated signs flat against a building (flat signs), illuminated painted wall signs and illuminated signboards: [\$22.00] \$100.00 per sign.
- (c) Electric or illuminated roof signs: [\$32.00] \$50.00 per sign, plus for each sign over 500 square feet [\$0.35] \$1.00 per square foot for each square foot over 500. The fee shall be computed on the actual area of the display surface.
- (d) Electric or illuminated ground signs, any part of which projects over the public way -- fees shall be the same as computed for projecting signs as specified in subsection (a).

Electric or illuminated ground signs, entirely over public property: [\$22.00] \$50.00 per sign.

- (e) Permits issued for the re-erection or alteration of any electric sign, illumination of signboards or illumination of flat or wall signs: [\$22.00] \$50.00 per sign.
- (f) Permits issued for electric or illuminated signs to be erected for a period not to exceed 60 days: one-half of the sign permit fee. No fee shall be less than [\$11.00] \$25.00.
- (g) The fee for cancellation of any sign permit shall be [\$11.00] \$25.00 and shall be deducted before the remaining amount is refunded.
- SECTION 62. Section 14-40-150 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-40-150 Sign Plan Examination Fees.

The fee for the examination of sign plans shall be [\$15.00] \$25.00 per one-half hour or fraction thereof.

SECTION 63. Section 14-40-170 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by inserting the language in italics, as follows:

14-40-170 Annual Inspection Fees.

The annual inspection fee to be charged for the signs described in Section 14-40-160 shall be as follows:

- (a) Electric or illuminated signs projecting over the public way: [\$22.00] \$100.00 per sign, plus [\$0.70] \$1.00 per square foot of area of each face. The area of irregular shaped signs shall be computed by using the area of the outer perimeter design of the signs.
- (b) Electric or illuminated signs on private property, illuminated signs flat against a building (flat signs), illuminated painted wall signs and illuminated signboards: [\$22.00] \$100.00 per sign.
- (c) Electric or illuminated roof signs: [\$32.00] \$50.00 per sign, plus for each sign over 500 square feet [\$0.35] \$1.00 per square foot for each square foot over 500. The fee shall be computed on the actual area of the display surface.

- (d) Electric or illuminated ground signs, any part of which projects over the public way -- fees shall be the same as computed for projecting signs as specified in subsection (a).
- (e) Electric or illuminated ground signs, entirely over public property: [\$22.00] \$50.00 per sign.

SECTION 64. Section 11.5-1 of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 11.5-1 Plats.

Every application for a building permit shall be deemed to be an application for a zoning certificate and shall be accompanied by:

- (1) A plat, in duplicate, of the piece or parcel of land, lot, lots, block or blocks, or parts or portions thereof, drawn to scale showing the actual dimensions and certified by a Land Surveyor or Civil Engineer licensed by the State of Illinois, as a true copy of the piece, or parcel, lot, lots, block or blocks, or portions thereof, according to the registered or recorded plat of such land; and
- (2) A plat, in duplicate, drawn to scale in such form as may, from time to time, be prescribed by the Zoning Administrator, showing the ground area, height, and bulk of the building or structure, the building lines in relation to lot lines, the use to be made of the building or structure or land and such other information as may be required by the Zoning Administrator for the proper enforcement of this comprehensive amendment. When a building permit application for the repair, remodeling and/or alteration of pre-ordinance (built before July 8, 1957) residential buildings, or buildings of mixed residential occupancy containing not more than six dwelling units is filed with the Department of Zoning, and zoning certification is sought for the present number of dwelling units existing at the time of submittal of such application, such zoning certification shall be limited to certify not more than one unit over the number of units, originally authorized. The said permit application must be accompanied by such documents and be in such form as may, from time to time, be prescribed by the Zoning Administrator, to substantiate the density existing prior to the effective date of this comprehensive amendment. Such documents may include, but not be limited to, affidavits, leases, utility records, or any other instruments

deemed necessary by the Zoning Administrator to make a determination of authorized non-conformity.

One copy of each of the two plats shall be attached to the application for a building permit when it is submitted to the Office of the Zoning Administrator for a zoning certificate and shall be retained by the Zoning Administrator as a public record.

- (3) The fee for said application shall be payable to the Department of Revenue and shall be computed as follows:
  - a) For New Construction:
    - 1) [Fifteen dollars] \$50 for all structures aggregating 10,000 square feet or less in area.
    - 2) [Seven dollars] \$15 for each [5,000] 2,500 square feet of floor area in excess of 10,000 up to 100,000 square feet.
    - 3) [Seven dollars] \$15 for each [10,000] 5,000 square feet of floor area in excess of [100,000] 250,000 square feet.
  - b) For Repairs and Alterations to Existing Construction:
    - 1) [Seven dollars] \$15 for residential construction of five units or less.
    - 2) [Twenty-three dollars] \$50 for residential construction in excess of five units and for all non-residential construction.

SECTION 65. Section 11.12 of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

#### 11.12 Fees.

Any application for an amendment or special use filed by, or on behalf of, the owner or owners of the property affected shall be accompanied by a fee of [two hundred and fifty dollars,] \$500.00 shall be paid to the [City Comptroller.] Department of Revenue. There shall be no such fee,

however, in the case of applications filed by members of the City Council, the Mayor, Departments of the City of Chicago; or by a duly constituted public body such as, but not limited to, United States Government, State of Illinois, [The Metropolitan Sanitary District of Greater Chicago,] The Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, Board of Education of Chicago, Chicago Housing Authority, Chicago Park District and Chicago Public Library.

The provisions in this section however do not apply to any application for an amendment for a Planned Development which subject is covered by Section 11.11-1, any application for an Amendment for an Air Rights Planned Development which subject is covered by Section 11.11-2 and any application for a variation which subject is covered by Section 11.11-3.

SECTION 66. Section 11.12-1 of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

11.12-1 Application For An Amendment For A Planned Development.

Any application for an amendment for a Planned Development shall be filed by, or on behalf of, the owner or owners of the property affected and shall be accompanied by a fee of [one hundred dollars,] \$250.00 per net developable acre in the Planned Development or [five hundred dollars] \$500.00, whichever is greater, plus the fee for a zoning amendment as described in Section 11.12, which shall be paid to the [Director] Department of Revenue. There shall be no such fee required in the case of an application filed by a duly constituted public body such as but not limited to, City of Chicago, Chicago Housing Authority, Chicago Park District, Chicago Public Library; or by the Commissioner of Planning and Development.

SECTION 67. Section 11.12-3 of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by deleting the language in brackets and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

# 11.12-3 Application For A Variation.

Any application for a variation filed by, or on behalf of, the owner or owners of the property affected shall be accompanied by a fee of [one hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00)] \$250, which shall be paid to the [City Comptroller.] Department of Revenue. There shall be no such fee, however, in the case of applications filed by members of the City Council, the Mayor, departments of the City of Chicago; or by a duly constituted public body such as, but not limited to United States Government, State of Illinois, The Metropolitan [Sanitary] Water Reclamation District of

Greater Chicago, Board of Education of Chicago, Chicago Housing Authority, Chicago Park District and Chicago Public Library.

SECTION 68. Section 11.12-4 of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

### 11.12-4 Application For An Exception.

Any application for an exception, filed by, or on behalf of, the owner or owners of property affected shall be accompanied by a fee of [one hundred fifty dollars (\$150.00)] \$250, which shall be paid to the Department of Revenue. There shall be no such fee, however, in the case of applications filed by members of the City Council, the Mayor, departments of the City of Chicago, or by a duly constituted public body such as, but not limited to, United States Government, State of Illinois, the Metropolitan [Sanitary] Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago, Board of Education of Chicago, Chicago Housing Authority, Chicago Park District and Chicago Public Library.

SECTION 69. The Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by adding a new Section 11.12-5, as follows:

# 11.12-5 Application For Advisory Opinion.

Any application for an advisory opinion on the interpretation or application of this comprehensive amendment shall be accompanied by a non-refundable fee of \$25.00. The Zoning Administrator shall not issue an advisory opinion in the absence of the fee required under this section.

SECTION 70. The Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by adding a new Section 11.12-6, as follows:

#### 11.12-6 Reinspection Fees.

The Zoning Administrator shall assess and collect a fee of \$25.00 for the second and each subsequent inspection of any place, building or property where necessary to determine compliance with this comprehensive amendment. The fee shall be paid to the Department of Revenue.

SECTION 71. Section 11.13 of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, is hereby amended by deleting the language bracketed and inserting the language in italics, as follows:

### 11.13 Penalties.

A person who violates, disobeys, omits, neglects, or refuses to comply with or resists the enforcement of any of the provisions of this comprehensive amendment shall be fined not less than [50 dollars] \$200.00 and not more than [200 dollars] \$500.00. Each day such a violation or failure to comply is permitted to exist after notification thereof shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 72. The procedures described in Section 11.9 of the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, shall not apply to the amendments made to that Title of the Municipal Code in this ordinance.

SECTION 73. If any provision (including any clause, sentence, paragraph, section, exemption or part) of this ordinance, or the application of any provision, is held unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such occurrence shall not affect other provisions of this ordinance or their application that can be given effect without the unconstitutional or invalid provision or its application. Each unconstitutional or invalid provision, or the application of such provision, is severable unless otherwise specifically provided. It is declared to be the legislative intent of the City Council of the City of Chicago that this ordinance would have been enacted had the unconstitutional or invalid provision not been included.

SECTION 74. This ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 1994, with the following exceptions: (a) Sections 1.1 and 1.2 shall take effect upon passage and approval (except for Section 3-41-030 of new Chapter 3-41 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, which shall take effect on May 1, 1994); (b) Section 5 of this ordinance shall take effect on April 1, 1994; (c) amendments to Section 4-5-010 contained in this ordinance shall take effect on January 1, 1994, but changes in license fees contained in such amendments shall be implemented upon the first renewal of any existing license occurring on or after the effective date.

On motion of Alderman Austin, the City Council took up for consideration the report of the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations, deferred and published in the Journal of the Proceedings of November 10, 1993, pages 40817 through 40928, recommending that the City Council adopt a Series of Amendments to the 1994 Budget Recommendations.

### 1994 ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE, AS AMENDED.

On motion of Alderman Austin, the City Council took up for consideration the report of the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations, deferred and published in the Journal of the Proceedings of November 10, 1993, pages 40929 through 41582, recommending that the City Council pass the proposed 1994 Annual Appropriation Ordinance, as amended.

On motion of Alderman Austin, the said proposed ordinance was *Passed* by yeas and nays as follows:

The following is said ordinance as passed (for printing purposes, the following 1994 Annual Appropriation Ordinance, as amended, incorporates all amendments passed by the City Council on November 17, 1993):

### THE ANNUAL APPROPRIATION ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF CHICAGO FOR THE YEAR 1994.

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago (the "City") is a home rule unit of government as defined in Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Illinois Constitution, and as such may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, The management of its finances is a matter pertaining to the government and affairs of the City; and

WHEREAS, It is appropriate and in the best interests of the City that the City Council adopt an annual appropriation for the year 1994 in accordance with the powers granted to the City, including its powers as a home rule municipality; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

- SECTION 1. The following sums of money set apart according to departments and other separate agencies of the City Government are appropriated from the respective funds designated in this ordinance for the objects and purposes stated herein, and no other, to defray necessary expenses and liabilities of the City of Chicago to be paid or incurred during the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1994. References hereinafter to Community Development Block Grant funds are provided for descriptive purposes only, and shall not be considered appropriations.
- SECTION 2. The estimates of current assets and liabilities as of January 1, 1994, the estimates of the amounts of such assets and of the revenues available for appropriation, the amounts appropriated, the objects and purposes of such appropriations and the salary rates of all City officers and employees are shown in detail hereinafter.
- SECTION 3. In any appropriation where the designation .9001 through .9099 appears immediately after the department code number, expenditures thereunder shall be accounted for under statutory standard accounts, as expended, designating objects and purposes of operation and administration. The objects and purposes for which appropriations are made are designated herein by asterisk, except for the accounts .9001 through .9099 and the accounts .0901 through .0999, which specifically designate each object and purpose.

Included in the appropriation for Personal Services in SECTION 4. applicable departments, bureaus and agencies is an account appearing as Code No. ".0015 Schedule Salary Adjustments" provided for the purpose of implementing the compensation plan for classified City employees adopted by the City Council, the Salary Schedules of which plan, class grade one to twenty-one, both inclusive, are made a part hereof. The amounts set up under account .0015 "Schedule Salary Adjustments" are for the adjustments of salaries (a) of all employees who are at the entrance rate indicated in the schedule for the grade level of their positions and who after six months of satisfactory service are entitled to a salary increase under Schedule B for the grade level of their respective positions after completing the additional period indicated; and (b) of employees who are entitled to salary adjustments under Schedule C after completing the periods of service specified in said Schedule C; and (c) base salary schedules for Sworn Police Personnel, as set forth in Schedule D; and (d) base salary schedules for Uniformed Fire Fighters as set forth in Schedule F; and (e) base salary schedules for Registered Nurses as set forth in Schedule S; and (f) base salary schedules for physicians and dentists as set forth in Schedule M; and (g) base salary schedules for technical employees as set forth in Schedule G; and (h) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for public safety employees as set forth in Schedule I; and (i) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for Plumbers Local No. 130 employees as set forth in Schedule J; and (i) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for Chicago Typographical Union employees as set forth in Schedule N; and (k) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for Teamsters Local No. 726 employees as set forth in Schedule P; and (1) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for Machinist Lodge No. 126 employees as set forth in Schedule R; and (m) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for Carpenters Local No. 112 employees as set forth in Schedule T: and (n) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for Laborers Local No. 1092 employees as set forth in Schedule U; and (o) base salary schedules and longevity salary schedules for Laborers Local No. 1001 employees as set forth in Schedule V and defined in the classification and pay plan as maintained by the Commissioner of Personnel. The class grade for each class of positions in Schedule A as on file with the Department of Personnel shall determine the salary range applicable to all positions of the class. The Title Bargaining Unit Table as on file with the Department of Personnel shall determine the salary schedule applicable to bargaining unit and non-bargaining unit employees. The resolution setting forth employee benefits, and the Classification and Compensation Plan for City employees, adopted by the City Council, is by reference thereto incorporated herein and made a part hereof.

SECTION 5. The appropriation for liabilities at January 1, 1994, shall not be construed as approval of any such liabilities, but shall be regarded only as appropriations for the payment thereof when they have been found to be valid and legal obligations against the City of Chicago and have been properly vouchered and audited.

SECTION 6. The appropriations herein made for personal services shall be regarded as maximum amounts to be expended from such appropriations. Such expenditures shall be further limited to personnel only as needed, or as may be required by law, not to exceed the maximum designated in this ordinance for any office or position by title. When there is no limitation as to the maximum that may be employed for any officer or position by title, one person may be employed or more than one person may be employed with the approval of the Budget Director and the Comptroller regardless of whether such title is printed in the singular or plural. The salary or wage rate fixed shall be regarded as the maximum salary or wage rate for the respective offices or positions, provided that salaries or wage rates are subject to change by the City Council during the fiscal year in accordance with contracts approved by the City Council. The salary or wage rates fixed are on a yearly basis unless otherwise indicated. Abbreviations or symbols used in this ordinance are as follows: m. monthly; d. daily; h. hourly.

Initial appointments to any positions shall be made at the entrance rate of the salary range prescribed for the applicable class grade. In exceptional cases, upon recommendation by the department head and approval of the Commissioner of Personnel and the Budget Director and the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, initial appointment may be made at a rate above the normal entrance rate. Entrance above the normal entrance rate shall be based on the outstanding and unusual character of the applicant's education, experience and training over and above the minimum qualifications specified for the class. An employee may be assigned to a title not appearing within the appropriation of the employee's department, in lieu of a specific title appearing in the appropriation, upon the written recommendation of the department head and approval of the Commissioner of Personnel, the Budget Director and the Chairman of the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations. Such assignment may be requested and approved when the title requested is appropriate to the function of the department, and reflects the skills, training and experience of the employee. In no event shall the authority conferred herein be exercised in violation of the Shakman Judgment.

No officer or employee shall have the right to demand continuous employment or compensation by reason of any appropriation if, upon the determination of the department head, his services are not needed or it becomes necessary to lay him off on account of lack of work or lack of funds. In case of a vacancy in any office or position, the head of the department in which the vacancy occurs shall not be required to fill such office or position if, in his judgment and discretion, there is no necessity thereof.

The Director of the Office of Budget and Management shall prepare a report to be presented to the City Council on the twentieth day following each quarter indicating all employees whose titles appear herein under one department or agency and who have been working for another department or agency for more than 60 days in the previous three-month period. Such report shall indicate the name, title and salary of each such employee, the department or agency in which the title appears, the department or agency to which the employee is assigned, and a description of the duties being performed under the assignment. The provision shall not apply to work performed by one department or agency for another pursuant to contract. The first report shall be presented on April 20, 1994, and shall cover the period beginning January 1, 1994.

SECTION 7. The Commissioner of Personnel shall prepare and present to the City Council on the twentieth day of each month a written report of all vacancies occurring during the preceding month due to resignation, retirement, death, layoff, promotion, demotion, discharge or termination. The report shall be submitted on a form to be prepared by the Commissioner of Personnel. The Commissioner of Personnel shall prepare and present to the City Council monthly reports on all City employees hired during the preceding quarter.

The City Comptroller shall prepare and present to the City Council on the twentieth day of each month a report of the overtime compensation paid to employees during the preceding month, on a form to be prepared by the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations.

SECTION 8. In accordance with procedures prescribed by the Mayor, and subject to the limitations of this section, the Mayor and the heads of the various departments and agencies of the City Government are authorized to apply for grants from governmental and private grantors; to execute grant agreements and amendments thereto to effectuate the purposes of such grants; to indemnify the grantor with respect to the performance of the grant, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel; and to execute such documents, provide such additional information, assurances and certifications as are necessary in connection with any of the foregoing.

To the extent that revenue of a grant is not described in the appropriation from Fund 925 -- Grant Funds, or that an amendment increases the budget of a project beyond the appropriation described hereinafter, no expenditure of such grant revenues shall be made without prior approval of the City Council.

The Comptroller and the heads of the various departments and agencies of the City Government shall administer the revenues of grants received by standard accounts, in accordance with the standard classification of accounts and with the manual of the Department of Finance.

No later than the tenth day of each month, the Budget Director shall file with the Committee on Finance a compilation of all grants awarded to the City in the preceding month.

On or before May 15, 1994, and on or before November 15, 1994, the Office of Budget and Management shall file with the City Council a report showing all federal and state funds received or administered by the City for the time periods October 1, 1993, through March 31, 1994, and April 1, 1994, through September 30, 1994, respectively. Community Development Block Grant funds shall be excluded from this report. The report shall list the amounts disbursed and purposes for which disbursements were made, and shall indicate the Grantor of the funds, purpose, service area(s) and number of positions supported.

SECTION 9. Any employee who is required and is authorized to use his personally owned automobile in the regular conduct of official City business shall be allowed and paid  $27\frac{1}{2}$  cents per mile allowance for the number of miles per month use of such privately owned automobile, to a maximum amount of \$160 per month; and provided further that this allowance is subject to change by the City Council during the fiscal year in accordance with contracts approved by the City Council, between the City of Chicago and recognized collective bargaining agents.

City-owned or leased automobiles shall be used only for City business. The attached Schedule A1 lists the departments, agencies, commissions and boards entitled to use City-owned or leased automobiles, and the aggregate number of automobiles authorized for use by each department, agency, commission or board. Attached Schedule A1 includes all automobiles authorized to be purchased or leased with City, state and federal funds. Those departments, agencies, boards or commissions that currently have automobiles in excess of the number designated in Schedule A1 hereto shall turn over control of such automobiles to the Commissioner of Fleet Management who shall distribute such automobiles to such departments, agencies, boards or commissions which do not currently have the number of automobiles authorized by this ordinance. The Purchasing Agent is hereby authorized and directed to sell any City-owned automobile and to terminate, according to the contract terms, the lease of any automobile in excess of the total number of automobiles listed in Schedule A1. No department, agency, board or commission shall lend or otherwise secure an automobile for an employee, officer or commissioner of any department, agency, board or commission.

The Department of Fleet Management shall coordinate the maintenance of all authorized automobiles, except for those under the control of the Department of Police and the Fire Department, and shall submit a quarterly report to the City Council concerning the use of all such automobiles. The report shall list the make and model of the vehicle, the odometer reading, the state license number of the vehicle, the telephone number (if the vehicle is equipped with a telephone), and the employee to whom or the section or department to which the vehicle is assigned.

The head of any department, agency, commission or board may submit to the City Council a request for the lease or purchase of vehicles in excess of those designated in Schedule A1 for 1994. The request shall specify the reason for the purchase or lease of any automobile, the anticipated cost, the person or persons who shall use the automobile, and in the case of a lease, the anticipated lease term and monthly cost.

All automobiles and other vehicles which are owned or leased by the City, except those used by the Department of Police and those vehicles used by other departments for investigative purposes, shall display permanent "municipal" state vehicle registration plates.

SECTION 10. In accordance with Section 2-60-080 of the Municipal Code, no expenditure may be made from any fund or line item account herein for the purpose of executing settlement agreements or entering into consent orders except upon order of the City Council. Provided, however, that this section shall not apply to settlement agreements or consent orders entered into where the amount is \$100,000 or less.

SECTION 11. The head of each department or other agency shall submit to the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations on or before June 15, 1994, a detailed report showing what steps have been taken to improve or maintain productivity in the department or agency since June 1, 1993, and the results which those steps have brought about. The form of the report shall be defined by the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations, and shall be submitted to the Budget Director by May 1, 1994, for distribution to the various departments and other agencies.

SECTION 12. To the extent that any ordinance, resolution, rule, order or provision of the Municipal Code, or part thereof, is in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance, the provisions of this ordinance shall be controlling. If any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall be held invalid, the invalidity of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the other provisions of this ordinance.

The Office conducts management studies, salary and wage surveys, municipal finance and taxation research studies. It administers the city's Compensation Plan and prepares an annual capital budget for the city. It also reviews city requests for Federal and State funds for budgetary and program impacts. The Office also coordinates the allocation of Federal Community Development Block Grant funds by monitoring expenditures and reporting on program performance.

#### DEPARTMENT OF LAW

The head of the Law Department shall be the Corporation Counsel. The Corporation Counsel shall be and act as the legal advisor of the Mayor, the City Council and of the several officers, boards and departments of the City. He shall appear for and protect the rights and interests of the City in all actions, suits, and proceedings brought by or against it or any City officer, board or department, including actions for damages when brought against such officer in his official capacity; provided, however, that when an officer or employee of the City is sued personally, even if the cause of action arose out of his official duties, the Corporation Counsel shall appear for such officer or employee only in case the City Council directs him to do so, Illinois Revised Statutes, Ch. 24 Sec. 21-11.

### DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH

The Department of Health enforces all State laws and City ordinances relating to public health. It determines when a disease is epidemic and carries out necessary public health control programs for the protection of citizens. The Department performs the function of planning all aspects of health systems within its jurisdiction.

#### BOARD OF HEALTH

It shall be the duty of the Board of Health to be well informed regarding all matters affecting the health of the citizens of Chicago. It shall formulate policies and otherwise advise the Mayor and the Commissioner of Health on all health issues: The Board also formulates regulations for the implementation of health ordinances and, when required,

The Police Board adopts rules and regulations for governing the Police Department, reviews and approves the annual budget of the Police Department, and hears disciplinary cases involving suspensions of more than 30 days as well as hearings and recommendations by the Superintendent of Police for the removal or discharge of officers and employees of the Department. The Board also reviews candidates for the Office of the Superintendent of Police.

#### ASPHALT PLANT CAPITAL ACCOUNT

The Asphalt Plant Capital Account is established for the purpose of manufacturing and delivering asphalt for street pavements, the expense for which is to be reimbursed from appropriations of City funds or funds of other governmental agencies.

This account shall be maintained and used subject to the conditions and limitations of Sections 7-24.1 to 7-24.10 of the Municipal Code of Chicago and the conditions and limitations herein set forth.

Asphalt and the delivery thereof to jobs shall be made on standard schedules of rates as determined by the Commissioner of the Chicago Department of Transportation and approved by the Comptroller. The rates as determined from time to time shall be reported to the Committee on Finance of the City Council showing the various details included as parts of the total rate. Such rates shall be revised and adjusted from time to time on the basis of the total cost, including maintenance and depreciation of the asphalt plant buildings and equipment, and plus not to exceed ten per cent for general administrative, overhead and other expense.

Expenditures are authorized for salaries and wages of authorized titles, material and supplies, truck service and other expense incident to the manufacture and delivery of asphalt.

New grants not included in this appropriation, grant funding that exceeds the amount hereby appropriated, and public works capital projects and planning grants covered under City-State agreements are subject to approval by the Budget Director and appropriation by the City Council.

The following is said ordinance as passed (for printing purposes, the following ordinance authorizing the submission of Final Statement of Objective and Projected Use of Funds for Year XX, as amended, incorporates all amendments passed by the City Council on November 17, 1993):

WHEREAS, Pursuant to the enactment of the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, the City of Chicago proposes to submit the Final Statement of Objectives and Projected Use of Year XX entitlement funds, unexpended funds of prior federal years and related revenues in the amount of \$133,479,317; and

WHEREAS, It is provided in the Act and in regulations promulgated thereunder that the City provide certain assurances to the federal government; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor and the City Council of the City of Chicago are cognizant to the conditions of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, and are desirous of complying therewith; and

WHEREAS, The Mayor and the City Council are desirous of establishing procedures which insure fair, open and equitable administration of federal grant funds; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago is a home rule unit of government as defined in Article VII, Section 6(a) of the Illinois Constitution, and as such may exercise any power and perform any function pertaining to its government and affairs; and

WHEREAS, The management of its finances is a matter pertaining to the government and affairs of the City; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The Mayor of the City of Chicago is hereby authorized to make Year XX submission for funds, including the Final Statement of Objectives and Projected Use of Funds, in the sum of \$133,479,317 in entitlement funds, unexpended funds of prior years and related revenues, as set forth in this ordinance and all understandings and assurances contained herein, pursuant to the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, and regulations issued thereunder.

SECTION 2. The Mayor is further authorized to act in connection with the admission, to provide such assurances as are necessary and such additional information as may be required.

SECTION 3. The criteria for Community Development Block Grant funded programs previously approved by the City Council remains in effect.

SECTION 4. Except for those funds specifically appropriated for contractor-delegate agencies, the City may reprogram up to \$25,000 appropriated for any object or purpose set forth in the Year XX Community Development Block Grant Ordinance or allocations from prior block grant years, provided that no appropriation for any object or purpose shall be reduced by reprogramming below an amount sufficient to cover all obligations incurred and payable from that appropriation.

All proposed reprogramming of funds as outlined in the Final Statement of Objectives and Projected Use of Funds by program for the Year XX and in the allocations for prior years shall be made by providing citizens with reasonable notice of the opportunity to comment on any proposed reprogramming of 10% or more of funds from one activity to another, which includes the deletion or addition of any activity.

SECTION 5. The Office of Budget and Management shall notify aldermen of projects in their respective wards contemplated under this program.

SECTION 6. The award of any grant over \$50,000 in any program category, project or activity which is not included by specific designation in the Community Development Block Grant Appropriation Ordinance shall be subject to review and approval by the City Council, provided that the City Council shall complete its review within 21 days after submission of the grant to the City Council, and provided further that the City shall not engage in discrimination based on race, color, religion, sex, national origin, disability, sexual orientation, geographic location or political affiliation or belief.

SECTION 7. The approval of any loan in the amount of \$150,000 or more, funded in whole or by 25% or more with Year XX Community Development Block Grant funds or funds from prior block grant years shall be subject to the same procedure as approval of grants in excess of \$50,000. Within 30 days after the end of the midpoint and the end of the program year, the head of each department or agency through which loans are processed and administered shall file a report with the City Council concerning all loans of Community Development Block Grant funds made by the department or agency during the preceding half of the program year. Each report shall contain the following information concerning each loan: the name and address and nature of business of the borrower; the purpose of the loan; the federal program year and loan program involved; a summary of the terms and conditions of the loan; and a copy of the borrower's economic disclosure statement, if the loan did not require City Council approval.

SECTION 8. Funding for a minimum of two rounds of Community Development Float Loan competitions will be drawn down from the Year XX letter of credit. The amount of funding for each round will depend on the availability of funds in the letter of credit at the time of each round as well as the total amount of gap financing needed by qualifying applicants.

SECTION 9. The following sums of money set out according to the departments and agencies of City government and contractor-delegate agencies are allocated from the Community Development Block Grant to the City of Chicago for Year XX, and are to be expended during the fiscal year beginning January 1, 1994, and ending December 31, 1994, for the objects and purposes set forth in Section 12 hereof. Account numbers shall be interpreted in the same manner as their counterparts in the Annual Appropriation Ordinance of the City of Chicago for the Year 1994. Included in allocations for personal services in the Community Development Block Grant Appropriation Ordinance is an account appearing as Code No. ".0044 Fringe Benefits" for the purpose of providing City employees with health insurance, dental insurance, optical insurance, pension (employer's share), unemployment insurance, workers' compensation, tuition reimbursement, paid vacation, in-house training programs, sick leave, deferred compensation, holidays, time off with pay for family death, paid salary while on jury duty and disability payments.

SECTION 10. The appropriations set forth in the Community Development Block Grant Appropriation Ordinance for personal services shall be regarded as maximum amounts to be expended from such appropriations. Such expenditures shall be further limited to employment of personnel only as needed, or as may be required by law, not to exceed the specified maximum number designated in the ordinance for any office or position or title. When there is no limitation as to the maximum number that may be employed for any office or position by title, one person may be employed or more than one person may be employed with the approval of the Budget Director and the City Comptroller, regardless of whether such title is printed in the singular or plural. The salary or wage rate fixed shall be regarded as the maximum salary or wage rates for the respective offices, positions and titles; provided that wage rates fixed on a daily or monthly basis are subject to change by the City Council in accordance with contracts approved by the City Council between the City of Chicago and recognized collective bargaining agents. The salary or wage rates fixed are on a yearly basis unless otherwise indicated. Initial appointments shall be made at the entrance of the salary range prescribed for the applicable class grade. In exceptional cases, upon recommendation of the department head and approval of the Commissioner of Personnel, the Budget Director, City Comptroller and the Chairman of the City Council Committee on Finance, initial appointments may be made at a rate above the normal entrance rate. Entrance above the normal entrance rate shall be based on the outstanding and unusual character of the applicant's education, experience and training over and above the minimum qualifications specified for the class. An employee may be assigned to a title not appearing within the appropriation of the employee's department, in lieu of a specific title appearing in the appropriation, upon written recommendation of the department head and approval of the Commissioner of Personnel, the Budget Director, the City

Comptroller and the Chairman of the City Council Committee on the Budget and Government Operations. Such assignment may be requested and approved when the title requested is appropriate to the function of the department, and reflects the skills, training and experience of the employee. In no event shall the authority conferred herein be exercised in violation of the Shakman Judgment.

No officer or employee shall have the right to demand continuous employment or compensation by reason of an appropriation if, upon determination of the department head, his services are not needed and it becomes necessary to lay him off on account of lack of work or lack of funds. In case of a vacancy in any office or position, the head of a department in which the vacancy occurs shall not be required to fill such office or position if, in his judgment and discretion, there is no necessity therefor.

All City of Chicago employees compensated by Community Development Block Grant funds shall receive the same benefits and conditions as other City employees performing similar work and compensated by other funds.

SECTION 11. Any employee who is required and authorized to use his personally owned automobile in the regular course of City business shall be allowed and paid an allowance of  $27\frac{1}{2}$  cents per mile for the number of miles per month use of such privately owned automobile, to a maximum of \$160 per month. This allowance is subject to change by the City Council in accordance with contracts approved by the City Council between the City of Chicago and recognized collective bargaining agents. City-owned or leased automobiles shall be used only for City business.

SECTION 12. The objects and purposes for which allocations are made in this ordinance are classified and standardized by the following items:

- (1) Personal Services
- (2) Contractual Services
- (3) Travel
- (4) Commodities
- (5) Equipment
- (6) Permanent Improvements
- (7) Land

An appropriation in one or more of the items specified above shall be construed in accordance with the definitions and limitations specified in Section 8-2-5 of the Illinois Municipal Code of 1961, as amended, unless this ordinance otherwise provides. An allocation for a purpose other than one specified and defined in this section shall be considered a separate and distinct item of appropriation.

SECTION 13. All work to be performed by the City of Chicago pursuant to the Community Development Block Grant Appropriation Ordinance shall be done using the current work force of the City of Chicago and the persons on the following lists shall have preference over any new employees to be hired for positions for which such lists exist in accordance with the City's Personnel Rules:

- (a) Persons on City of Chicago layoff lists;
- (b) Persons on City of Chicago reinstatement lists;
- (c) Persons on City of Chicago reemployment lists; and
- (d) Persons on City of Chicago promotion lists.

Provided, however, that the preferences hereinabove specified shall not apply where other methods of hiring must be utilized in order to comply with the terms of any order or decree of a court or administrative agency, collective bargaining agreement or Title 42 U.S.C., § 2000(e), et seq.

SECTION 14. For all funds expended under the Community Development Block Grant program for the Year XX, the Office of Budget and Management shall submit to the City Council a report on the expenditure and obligation of funds within 45 days after the end of the first half of the program year and within 90 days after the end of the program year. The report shall include an accounting for all funds expended during the preceding half year for all prior block grant years, all income generated from the current block grant year and previous grant years and a projection of income for the remaining half of the program year. The report shall also include a statement of the reasons for all unencumbered and unexpended allocations in all block grant years, as reported in the Department of Finance's monthly "Community Development Block Grant Fund, Schedule of H.U.D. Approved Allocations, Current Committee Approved Allocations, Expenditures, Accruals, Encumbrances and Available Balances".

SECTION 15. Except as provided in Section 4 hereof, all unencumbered and unexpended Community Development Block Grant funds of Year XX and all prior program years shall be reviewed by the Budget Director and the Comptroller for the purpose of preparing the Year XXI Community Development Block Grant Proposed Statement. This joint review committee shall prepare a report of funds available for reprogramming and proposed use of such funds in Community Development Block Grant Year XXI.

This report shall be submitted to the City Council and shall be subject to public comment and hearings along with the Year XXI Community Development Block Grant Proposed Statement. Action on these funds will take place concurrently with action on the proposed Year XXI Community Development Block Grant Final Statement.

SECTION 16. Pursuant to Section 104(a)(2)(D) and Section 104(b)(5) of the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974, as amended, the City shall provide citizens with reasonable access to records of the past use of all Community Development Block Grant funds. Such information shall be available, on request, through the Office of Budget and Management and the Department of Finance.

SECTION 17. In the event that the final entitlement of the City of Chicago to Year XX Community Development Block Grant funds, as determined by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development, does not equal the amount estimated in the Community Development Block Grant Appropriation Ordinance, the Budget Director shall compute the percentage difference, and the allocations made herein for every department, agency and contractor-delegate agency shall be adjusted by the same percentage. Notice of such adjustment shall be given to every affected department, agency and contractor-delegate agency as soon as possible after the adjustment has been computed.

SECTION 18. In the event that any contractor-delegate agency has not executed a contract authorized in the Community Development Block Grant Appropriation Ordinance by March 31, 1994, the allocation for such contract shall lapse. Provided, however, that this section shall not apply if it is determined by the Budget Director that the delay is not the fault of the contractor-delegate agency, but has been occasioned by difficulty in processing the contract within any department of the City government.

Your Joint Committee of the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations and the Committee on Buildings, having had under consideration an ordinance authorizing an amendment to Chapter 15 of the Municipal Code of Chicago necessary to adopt various regulations pertaining to underground storage tanks, having had the same under advisement, begs leave to report and recommend that Your Honorable Body Pass the proposed ordinance transmitted herewith.

This recommendation was concurred in by a viva voce vote of the members of the committee.

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Chapter 15-24 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding a new Article XI, as follows:

#### Article XI.

#### Underground Storage Tank Violations.

Section 15-24-1230. Any person who installs, maintains, repairs, removes or abandons in place any underground storage tank in violation of any section of Title 41, Chapter I, Part 170, Subpart B of the Illinois Administrative Code as amended from time to time shall be considered to have violated this section. The Corporation Counsel shall have the authority to enforce the above-cited provisions which are incorporated herein by reference and to obtain any and all applicable relief, including injunctions, court costs and fees. Any person found in violation of these provisions shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500 for each violation. Each day on which such violation exists shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 2. Chapter 15-28 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding a new Article XXI, as follows:

#### Article XXI.

Underground Storage Tank Violations.

Section 15-28-1220. Any person who installs, maintains, repairs, removes or abandons in place any underground storage tank in violation of any section of Title 41, Chapter I, Part 170, Subpart B of the Illinois Administrative Code as amended from time to time shall be considered to have violated this section. The Corporation Counsel shall have the authority to enforce the above-cited provisions which are incorporated herein by reference and to obtain any and all applicable relief, including injunctions, court costs and fees. Any person found in violation of these provisions shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500 for each violation. Each day on which such violation exists shall constitute a separate and distinct offense.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage.

### ANNIVERSARY TRIBUTE TO LATE MAYOR HAROLD WASHINGTON.

#### Referred -- MS. SHARON GRANT CALLED UPON TO RESIGN AS PRESIDENT AND MEMBER OF CHICAGO PUBLIC SCHOOL BOARD.

Alderman Tillman presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Sharon Grant, president of the Chicago School Board, has removed her child from the public school system; and

WHEREAS, Governor Jim Edgar has displayed considerable insensitivity towards ensuring sufficient funding for the education of the children of the Chicago Public School System; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago Public School District is the only one in the state mandated to have a balanced budget before the doors can open, and a School Finance Authority (Oversite Committee); and

WHEREAS, Parents of children in the Chicago Public School System have consistently requested equal protection under the law; and

WHEREAS, Despite these facts, Sharon Grant was invited and stood with supporters of Governor Jim Edgar during his re-election announcement; and

WHEREAS, Based on these facts the citizens have lost confidence in Sharon's ability to lead the school board for the betterment of all the children in the system; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That we call for the immediate resignation of Sharon Grant from her position as president of the Chicago Public School Board and as a member of said board.

Two committees having been called, the Committee on Committees, Rules and Ethics and the Committee on the Budget and Government Operations, the foregoing proposed resolution was Referred to the Committee on Committees. Rules and Ethics.

Rules Suspended -- CONSIDERATION TO HONORARILY DESIGNATE PORTION OF EAST 44TH STREET AS "BISHOP A. R. POWELL STREET".
