AMENDMENT OF CHAPTER 10-28 OF MUNICIPAL CODE BY ADDING NEW ARTICLE X ENTITLED "OUTDOOR DINING STREET" AND MODIFYING SECTIONS 2-25-050 AND 9-8-010.

The Committee on License and Consumer Protection submitted the following report:

CHICAGO, May 31, 2023.

To the President and Members of the City Council:

Your Committee on License and Consumer Protection, having under consideration an ordinance introduced by Mayor Johnson, Alderpersons Reilly, Ramirez-Rosa, Dowell, Burnett, Martin, Silverstein, Mitts, Villegas, Scott, Lawson, Cardona, Sposato, Waguespack, Chico and Cruz (which was referred on May 24, 2023) to amend the Municipal Code by adding new Article X "Outdoor Dining Street" at Chapter 10-28 and amendment of ancillary Sections 2-25-50 and 9-8-010, begs leave to recommend that Your Honorable Body *Pass* the proposed ordinance which is transmitted herewith.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

Article I.

Outdoor Dining -- Closure Of Motor Vehicle Lanes.

SECTION 1. Section 2-25-050 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding the language underscored, and by deleting the language struck through, as follows:

2-25-050 Powers And Duties Of The Department.

- (a) General Powers And Duties. The Commissioner and department shall have powers and duties related to business affairs and consumer protection as set forth in this section and elsewhere in this chapter and Code.
- (b) Powers And Duties Of The Commissioner And The Department. The powers and duties of the Commissioner and Department shall be as follows:

(Omitted text is unaffected by this ordinance.)

- (6) To exercise all rights, powers, duties, obligations and responsibilities that relate to:
 - (i) the issuance, or <u>denial</u>, rescission, <u>or revocation</u> of licenses and public way use permits; and
 - (ii) the enforcement of license, permit and business taxation requirements formerly administered by the department of business affairs and licensing. Provided, however, that nothing in this item (6) shall be construed to limit the powers of the Department of Finance provided for in Chapter 2-32 of this Code;

(Omitted text is unaffected by this ordinance.)

SECTION 2. Section 9-8-010 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding the language underscored, and by deleting the language struck through, as follows:

9-8-010 Authorized -- Compliance Required.

(a) (1) Subject to subsection (a)(2), the commissioner <u>Commissioner</u> of transportation <u>Transportation</u> and the executive director <u>Executive Director</u> of emergency management <u>Emergency Management</u> and communications <u>Communications</u> are hereby authorized to

cause the placement, erection, maintenance, and removal of traffic-control devices as provided in the traffic code and Article X of Chapter 10-28, as required to make effective the traffic ordinance of the eity City, and as necessary to guide and warn traffic. Provided, however, that if city council City Council approval is required to install any traffic control device, eity council City Council approval shall also be required to remove such device. The commissioner Commissioner of transportation Transportation and the executive director Executive Director of emergency management Emergency Management and communications Communications are also authorized to place and maintain temporary traffic-control devices as needed in connection with construction or special events or experimental devices for the purposes of an engineering study; provided, however, that such devices shall not be maintained for longer than 180 days without city council City Council approval. Upon the authorization of the commissioner Commissioner of transportation Transportation or the executive director Executive Director of emergency management Emergency Management and communications Communications, the actual erection, placement, maintenance, and removal of any traffic-control device shall be performed by the appropriate city City department or bureau. All traffic-control devices placed and maintained pursuant to the traffic code shall conform to the manual and specifications approved by the State of Illinois Department of Transportation and shall so far as practicable be uniform as to type and location throughout the eity City. All traffic-control devices so erected and not inconsistent with the provisions of state law or this Code shall be official traffic-control devices.

- (2) Subject to Section 9-64-200, the comptroller Comptroller shall have the sole authority to cause or direct the placement, erection, and maintenance of parking meters.
- (3) In order to promote pedestrian safety, the commissioner Commissioner of transportation Transportation is authorized to place or maintain temporary pedestrian safety awareness signs on the public ways of the city; provided, however, no such sign shall be placed or maintained on any traffic-control device or any traffic-control device pole. In determining the design, size, location, and other features of such signs, the commissioner Commissioner of transportation Transportation shall consider the effect that such signs may have on traffic safety and aesthetics.

(Omitted text is unaffected by this ordinance.)

(d) No provision of any traffic ordinance for which traffic-control devices are required shall be enforced against an alleged violator if at the time and place of the alleged violation an official device is not in proper position and sufficiently legible to be seen by an ordinary observant person. Whenever a particular section does not state that signs or other devices are required, such section shall be effective even though no signs or other devices are erected or in place.

Any act involving a traffic-control device that would be a violation of this Code if the device had been authorized or caused to be erected by the commissioner Commissioner of transportation Transportation shall also be a violation of this Code if the act involved:

(1) a traffic-control device authorized or caused to be erected by the executive director Executive Director of emergency management Emergency Management and

communications <u>Communications</u> or (2) a parking meter installed and maintained: (i) by the comptroller <u>Comptroller</u>, or (ii) by a person (or such person's designee) acting pursuant to a concession agreement approved by the city council <u>City Council</u> for the operation, maintenance, improvement, installation, and removal of, and the collection of fees from, certain designated parking meters.

Any person violating subsections (b) or (c) of this section shall be fined no less than \$90.00 and no more than \$300.00 and may be required to perform reasonable public service.

SECTION 3. Chapter 10-28 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding a new Article X, as follows:

Article X.

Outdoor Dining Street.

10-28-590 Outdoor Dining Program With Street Closure.

(a) Wherever used in this article, unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Transportation.

"Curb lane" means that portion of the public way located between the sidewalk and a portion of a roadway where vehicular traffic is given preferential right-of-way, whether for motor vehicles or bicycles. The curb lane may include a parking lane.

"Outdoor Dining Street" means a street that has been blocked off, whether in full or in part, from motor vehicle traffic in order to use the space for the outdoor consumption of food and beverage.

"Outdoor Dining Street Permit" means "Outdoor Dining Street Full-Closure Permits" and "Outdoor Dining Street Curb Lane Permits".

"Permittee" means a business that has received an Outdoor Dining Street Permit.

"Retail food establishment" means any building, room, stand, enclosure, place or establishment occupied and used as a place of business for the purpose of serving, selling, and offering for sale at retail any article of food for human consumption. The term shall only include places that provide for the on-premises consumption of food, such as restaurants, coffee shops, cafeterias, luncheonettes, grills, tearooms, sandwich shops, and soda fountains.

"Street" has the meaning ascribed to the term in Section 9-4-010.

- (b) A permit shall be required to operate an Outdoor Dining Street.
- (c) Outdoor Dining Street Full-Closure Permit. Three or more licensees who hold valid retail food establishment licenses or tavern licenses may apply to the Commissioner of Transportation to close the street on a block between two intersections to obtain an Outdoor Dining Street Full-Closure Permit for the purpose of serving the food and beverage provided by their licensed establishments on the public way. To be eligible for an Outdoor Dining Street Full-Closure Permit, at least fifty percent of the licensees shall be retail food establishments and the licensed premises of participating establishments shall be located directly adjacent to the Outdoor Dining Street.
- (d) Outdoor Dining Street Curb Lane Permit. A licensee who holds a valid retail food establishment license or tavern license and has a licensed premises directly adjacent to the portion of the street sought to be temporarily modified may apply to the Commissioner to close a portion of a curb lane in front of the licensed premises to obtain an Outdoor Dining Street Curb Lane Permit for the purpose of serving the food and beverage provided by their licensed establishment on the public way.
 - (e) No smoking shall be allowed in the area designated for the Outdoor Dining Street.
- (f) An Outdoor Dining Street Permit shall be valid from May 1st to and including October 31st of the year of its issuance. The fee for an Outdoor Dining Street Permit shall be determined by the Commissioner, taking into account land values, and shall be set by rule.

10-28-591 Permit Application Procedure.

Application for any Outdoor Dining Street Permit shall be submitted to the Commissioner, who shall make available forms for this purpose. The applicant shall provide such information on the application as the Commissioner may require by rule, including, but not limited to:

- (a) Proof that the applicant holds a valid retail food establishment or tavern license issued to the establishment that will provide food for the outdoor dining.
 - (b) Proof of insurance as required by this article.
- (c) A plan for the outdoor dining space, complying with applicable rules, and shall contain:
 - (1) a site plan, showing the locations of proposed barricades, street closures, and access points;

- (2) a description of how the permittees, individually and collectively, will comply with the requirements of this article and rules issued pursuant to the article;
- (3) an emergency plan, including (i) an emergency contact; (ii) ingress and egress points for vehicles that may need to enter such as fire trucks, ambulances, police vehicles, and construction and utility vehicles;
- (4) a plan to ensure that the Outdoor Dining Street is cleaned on a daily basis; and
- (5) a plan demonstrating that the outdoor dining shall not unreasonably interfere with: (i) adequate pedestrian and bicycle flow; (ii) access to building entrances; (iii) pedestrian and traffic safety; and (iv) the aesthetic quality of the surrounding area.

10-28-592 Insurance Required.

Each Outdoor Dining Street Permit participant shall furnish proof of insurance evidencing commercial general liability insurance with limits of not less than \$500,000.00 per occurrence, \$1,000,000.00 in the aggregate, for bodily injury, personal injury and property damage liability. The insurance shall provide for 30 days' prior written notice to be given to the Commissioner if coverage is substantially changed, canceled or non-renewed.

The City of Chicago shall be named as an additional insured on a primary, noncontributory basis for any liability arising directly or indirectly from the operations of an Outdoor Dining Street. Apart from and separate from any insurance requirement under this section, the permittee shall indemnify, defend and hold the City harmless from any loss that results directly or indirectly from the permit issuance.

In addition, if alcoholic beverages will be served at the Outdoor Dining Street, each Outdoor Dining Street Permit participant that serves alcoholic beverages shall provide proof of liquor liability (dramshop) insurance for the Outdoor Dining Street as required in Section 4-60-040(c)(2) of this Code.

Each permittee shall maintain the insurance coverage required under this section for the duration of the Outdoor Dining Street Permit. Proof of insurance shall be presented to the Commissioner prior to the issuance of a permit under this article. Proof of liquor liability (dramshop) insurance shall be presented to the Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection. Failure of the permittee to maintain the insurance required by this section shall result in the revocation of the Outdoor Dining Street Permit.

10-28-593 Review Of Application.

The Department of Transportation shall review an Outdoor Dining Street Permit application for compliance with this article and applicable rules:

- (a) The Commissioner shall solicit input from departments, including, but not limited to, the Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection, the Department of Police, the Department of Fire, the Office of Emergency Management and Communications, and the Mayor's Office for People with Disabilities and may consult with the Chicago Park District, and may also solicit input from stakeholders, including neighboring businesses, as to the factors the Commissioner considers in determining whether to grant the permit.
- (b) If the Commissioner finds that the permit application is complete, the Commissioner shall provide the application to the alderman of the affected ward. The alderman shall provide a recommendation to the Commissioner regarding the application within 30 days of receiving it, unless, the Commissioner determines that good cause exists for a reasonable extension, not to exceed 30 days. The recommendation regarding the application shall be based upon the alderman's analysis of the requirements of this article and the rules promulgated in furtherance of the article. Such recommendation shall not be unreasonably withheld. The Commissioner shall issue the Outdoor Dining Street Permit to the applicant if the Commissioner finds that the applicant meets the applicable requirements and the alderman's recommendation is that the permit application should be approved. If the Commissioner finds that the applicant meets the applicable requirements, but the alderman recommends that the permit application should be denied, the applicant, with the assistance of the Department of Transportation, may submit for City Council consideration an applicant-sponsored ordinance granting approval of an Outdoor Dining Street Permit.

(c) Denial.

- (1) If the Commissioner finds that the applicant fails to meet the requirements of this article or the rules promulgated hereunder, the Commissioner shall deny the application. The Commissioner shall notify the unsuccessful applicant in writing of the denial and the reasons therefor within 10 business days after the denial. An applicant for a permit that was found liable of violating Section 10-28-610(c) twice during the prior permit period shall be subject to denial of the permit for the permit period applied for.
- (2) Upon denial by the Commissioner of a permit application made under this section, the Commissioner shall notify the applicant, in writing, of such fact and of the basis for the denial. If no appeal is filed within 10 calendar days of the date of notice of the Commissioner's decision, that decision shall be deemed final. Within 10 days after such notice is mailed, the applicant may make a written request to the Commissioner for a hearing on the disapproved application. Within 10 days after such written request for a hearing is made, a public hearing shall be authorized before a hearing officer appointed by the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection. Such public hearing shall be commenced within 30 days after such hearing is authorized. Within 14 days after completion of such hearing, the hearing officer shall report the hearing officer's findings to the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection. If the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection determines after such hearing that the application should be denied, the

Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection shall, within 60 days after such hearing has been concluded, state the reasons for the Commissioner's determination in a written finding and shall serve a copy of such written finding upon the applicant. The Commissioner's determination shall be final and may be appealed in the manner provided by law.

10-28-594 Compliance With Plan And Other Components Of Application.

- (a) All permittees operating on an Outdoor Dining Street shall comply in all respects with the specifications set out in the plan submitted to the Commissioner, with the other components of the application, and with any additional requirements set by the Commissioner.
- (b) In the event that the application, including the plan, becomes inaccurate or incomplete in any respect as a result of circumstances or events outside the control of the permittee, the permittee shall notify the Commissioner within three business days of such circumstances or events.
- (c) Before taking any action that would result in the application, including the plan, becoming inaccurate or incomplete in any respect, the permittee shall seek the prior approval of the Commissioner.
- (d) Upon being notified of an actual or contemplated change pursuant to either subsection (b) or (c) of this section, the Commissioner shall review the change to determine whether such change is insubstantial or substantial, using the same criteria as relevant to the Commissioner's consideration of an initial application. If such change is insubstantial and if the application, as so changed, meets the criteria for an initial application, the Commissioner shall approve the change. If such change is insubstantial and if the application, as so changed, does not meet the criteria for an initial application, the Commissioner shall disapprove the change. If such change is substantial, a new permit application shall be required.

10-28-595 Permit -- Assignment Or Transfer Prohibited.

No permittee shall assign or transfer an Outdoor Dining Street Permit.

10-28-596 Permit For Food And Alcoholic Beverage Service Only.

No activity other than food and alcoholic beverage service shall be permitted at the Outdoor Dining Street. An Outdoor Dining Street Permit does not authorize food or alcoholic beverage service other than that which participant businesses have licenses

to conduct, provided that nothing in this section shall prohibit food service provided by retail food establishments at a curb lane operated by a tavern licensee pursuant to an Outdoor Dining Street Curb Lane Permit.

10-28-597 Operational Conditions.

- (a) Holders of an Outdoor Dining Street Permit shall not:
 - (1) operate earlier than 7:00 A.M. nor later than 11:00 P.M.
 - (2) play music, whether live or recorded, nor allow music to be played at the Outdoor Dining Street, other than through headphones.
- (b) The holder of an Outdoor Dining Street Permit shall install and maintain a physical boundary separating the permitted outdoor seating from the remainder of the public way. For Outdoor Dining Street Full-Closure Permits, the operator shall leave six feet of public way unobstructed for pedestrian passage. The construction, configuration, and other characteristics of the boundary, including landscaping, shall be set forth by rule.
- (c) Outdoor Dining Street Full-Closure Permit holders shall have the following requirements:
 - (1) At least one retail food establishment shall be open for outdoor business when a business with only a tavern license is open for outdoor business on the Outdoor Dining Street. A business with only a tavern license may not operate on the Outdoor Dining Street if there is no retail food establishment operating on the Outdoor Dining Street.
 - (2) At least two retail food establishments shall be open for outdoor business each day of the week. Retail food establishments shall be open for at least four consecutive hours. At least two retail food establishments shall be open between 5:00 P.M. and 7:00 P.M. However, no penalty for violation of this subsection shall apply to a business that has to shorten or discontinue its hours on a particular day as a result of inclement weather.
 - (3) Hours of operation for the street portion shall be posted by each retail food establishment.
 - (4) All licensees on the permit shall operate on the street portion at least two days a week at all times during the permitted operating hours.
 - (5) Only licensees which are named in the permit may operate on an Outdoor Dining Street.
 - (6) If a street has one or more lanes designated for bicycles, the Outdoor Dining Street shall allow for bicycle lanes through the street.

- (d) Outdoor Dining Curb Lane Permit holders who are taverns shall allow for food service on the premises of the curb lane.
- (e) Permittees shall follow Commissioner directives, including, but not limited to, modification or suspension of operations in order to make room for construction.

10-28-598 Alcoholic Beverage Service -- Requirements.

If a permittee serves alcoholic liquor at the Outdoor Dining Street, the permittee shall be licensed under this Code for such sales. Neither BYOB, as defined in Section 4-58-010, nor any other system for alcoholic beverages supplied by the customer or by any person other than the permittee shall be allowed at Outdoor Dining Streets.

10-28-599 Promulgation Of Rules; Force And Effect.

- (a) The Commissioner, in consultation with the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection, is authorized to promulgate rules to carry out the purposes of this article, including without limitation rules governing:
 - (1) The location, arrangement, and design of Outdoor Dining Streets to ensure the flow of pedestrian traffic, the safety of pedestrians and auto traffic, the access to buildings and transportation facilities, the prevention of an excessive number of Outdoor Dining Streets, and the best service to the public;
 - (2) The size, design, and other specifications for tables and serving equipment to be used by operators, and the design of enclosures or partial enclosures;
 - (3) The types of food and beverages that may be served at Outdoor Dining Streets;
 - (4) The time periods during which application can be made for an Outdoor Dining Street Permit:
 - (5) Landscaping and other aesthetic components of Outdoor Dining Streets; and
 - (6) Any other matter pertaining to the enforcement and implementation of this article.
- (b) A permittee shall comply with the rules promulgated pursuant to this article, which shall have the force and effect of law.

10-28-610 Enforcement.

(a) The Commissioners of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection and of Transportation, through their designees, are authorized to take such action as necessary

to enforce this article, including conducting on-site inspections of retail food and liquor establishments associated with Outdoor Dining Streets to determine compliance with permitting and other requirements of this article, rules promulgated hereunder, and other applicable Code provisions.

- (b) Upon request by the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection or by the Commissioner of Transportation, or by their designees, any operator of an Outdoor Dining Street shall provide for inspection the documents required by this article to operate an Outdoor Dining Street, including the Outdoor Dining Street Permit, the plan for the Outdoor Dining Street, and proof of insurance.
- (c) Any Outdoor Dining Street for which a permit is required by this article, and which has failed to obtain such permit, or whose permit has been revoked, may be closed by the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection, or by the Commissioner of Transportation, or by their designees until such permit is obtained. Upon being notified of closure, all Outdoor Dining Street activity shall cease, and all obstructions in the public way, including barriers, tables, and chairs, shall be removed.
- (d) Any Outdoor Dining Street for which a permit is in effect under this article may be temporarily closed by the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee, if: (1) the Outdoor Dining Street contains a significant danger to public safety, including, but not limited to, (i) the footprint or Outdoor Dining Street-related objects or equipment on property beyond plan specifications, (ii) a missing, insufficient, or incomplete barrier, or (iii) obstruction of a fire lane; (2) a permittee has been issued notices of violation for conduct occurring on the Outdoor Dining Street on three different days during the permit period; or (3) a permittee has been issued at least one notice of noise violation for conduct occurring on the Outdoor Dining Street. Such temporary closure may include the cessation of outdoor business or the removal of all furniture and other appurtenances from the street and the reopening of the street to traffic. Upon being subjected to a temporary closure, the permittee may provide to the Commissioner evidence that the objectionable conditions have been fully remedied. Such temporary closure shall remain in effect until the Commissioner is satisfied that the violations have been properly remedied and will not reoccur.
- (e) In addition to fines and other penalties as provided for herein, a violation of any provision of this article or rules promulgated hereunder within a permit period shall subject a permittee to revocation of the Outdoor Dining Street Permit by the Commissioner.
- (f) In addition to fines and other penalties as may be provided under this Code, any license discipline for a violation of this Code or rules promulgated thereunder shall subject a permittee to revocation of the Outdoor Dining Street Permit by the Commissioner. For purposes of this subsection, "license discipline" means the revocation, suspension, or recission of a license, a voluntary closure in lieu of suspension, a closure order, a summary closure, or denial of the renewal of a license.

than the minimum number required permittees (a) If fewer of Street Full-Closure Permit are actively operating Outdoor Dining Outdoor Dining Street, the permit shall be subject to revocation. The Commissioner shall: (1) notify the each of the permittees, in writing, of the proposed revocation; (2) set a date and time for the permittees to appear before the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection to contest the proposed revocation, said date and time being no sooner than 10 calendar days after notice is issued; and (3) inform the permittees that they are entitled to present evidence at the hearing in opposition to the proposed revocation. Following the hearing, the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection shall affirm or reverse the decision to revoke the license. If no permittee appears at such hearing, the Outdoor Dining Street Permit shall be revoked. The findings, decision, and order shall be mailed to the permittee at least five days before the effective date of the revocation. The decision shall be final and may be appealed as provided by law. However, if fewer than the minimum number of required permittees on an Outdoor Dining Street Full-Closure Permit are actively operating on the Outdoor Dining Street, whether voluntarily or because permits have been revoked, and at least two permittees continue to actively operate on the Outdoor Dining Street and are not in violation of any provision of this article, the Commissioner of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection may allow the remaining two permittees to continue operating the Outdoor Dining Street for the remainder of the permit period.

10-28-611 Violation -- Penalties.

- (a) General Violations. Any person who violates this article or rules promulgated hereunder shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$200.00 nor more than \$500.00 for each offense, and each day such a violation continues shall be deemed a separate and distinct offense.
- (b) Failure To Obtain Permit. Any person who operates an Outdoor Dining Street without obtaining the applicable Outdoor Dining Street Permit, or who operates on an Outdoor Dining Street but is not listed on the applicable Outdoor Dining Street Permit, shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$500.00 nor more than \$2,500.00, and each day such a violation continues shall be deemed a separate and distinct offense.
- *(b) Interference With Enforcement. In addition to the above fine, any person who knowingly interferes with or impedes members of the Department of Transportation or the Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection in the enforcement of this article shall be subject to arrest by a duly authorized peace officer and imprisonment for a term not to exceed six months under the procedures set forth in Section 1-2-1.1 of the Illinois Municipal Code (65 ILCS 5/1-2-1.1) and under the provisions of the Illinois Code of Criminal Procedure.

(c) Orders To Remove. Any Outdoor Dining Street in operation without a valid Outdoor Dining Street Permit or subject to Section 10-28-610 (d) is subject to removal from the public way by the Commissioner or the Commissioner's designee. Section 10-28-010 (i) of this Code shall apply to the removal of any portion of an Outdoor Dining Street, from the public way, whether for unpermitted operation or for obstruction of the public way; provided, however, that the amount of the fine for a violation shall be as set forth in this section.

Article II.

Sidewalk Cafes.

SECTION 1. Article XII of Chapter 10-28 of the Municipal Code of Chicago is hereby amended by adding the language underscored, and by deleting the language struck through, as follows:

10-28-810 Permit Application And Approval Procedure.

Application for a sidewalk cafe permit shall be submitted to the commissioner Commissioner, who shall make available forms for this purpose. The applicant shall provide such information on the application as the commissioner Commissioner may require by regulation, including:

- (A) Proof that the applicant holds a valid retail food establishment license issued to the establishment that will provide food for the sidewalk cafe, or tavern license, or that the applicant is the owner or manager of an indoor retail market. The owner or manager of the indoor retail market is not required to obtain a retail food establishment license.
 - (B) A proof of insurance as required by this article.
- (C) A plan for the sidewalk cafe, complying with applicable regulations, and demonstrating that the sidewalk cafe shall not unreasonably interfere with: (1) adequate pedestrian flow; (2) access to building entrances; (3) pedestrian and traffic safety; and (4) the aesthetic quality of the surrounding area.

10-28-835 Permit For One Retail Food Establishment Only.

A sidewalk cafe shall be for the exclusive use of the licensed retail food establishment <u>or licensed tavern</u> stated on the application. Sharing or other joint use of a sidewalk cafe location by more than one retail food establishment <u>or tavern</u> shall not be permitted. The foregoing prohibition shall not apply to an owner or manager of an indoor retail market, who is allowed to operate a sidewalk cafe which can be shared by multiple retail food establishments which occupy space within the indoor retail market.

10-28-845 Operational Conditions.

(Omitted text is unaffected by this ordinance.)

- (C) The operator of a sidewalk cafe shall install and maintain a physical boundary separating the permitted outdoor seating from the remainder of the public way. The operator shall leave six feet of public way unobstructed for pedestrian passage; the commissioner may alter this requirement by regulation in a situation where adherence to the requirement would make operation of a sidewalk cafe impossible and reduction of the unobstructed portion of the public way would not compromise pedestrian safety. The construction, configuration and other characteristics of the boundary, including landscaping, shall be set forth by regulation.
- (D) Sidewalk cafes that are taverns shall allow for food service on the premises of the sidewalk cafe.

10-28-846 Extension In Front Of Neighboring Property.

If a permit application is made for a sidewalk cafe that would extend to any portion of a public right-of-way in front of a neighboring property, in addition to all other applicable requirements, the following requirements shall apply and shall be required for continued operation:

- (A) The insurance coverages furnished in compliance with Section 10-28-815 of the Code shall apply to the entire footprint of the sidewalk cafe as set forth in the approved plan;
- (B) The sidewalk cafe shall extend to the public right-of-way in front of the neighboring property without interruption;
- (C) The sidewalk cafe may not obstruct the view of any of the occupied neighboring property's windows from the street, or block the door of the neighboring property;
- (D) The sidewalk cafe may not extend to a public right-of-way in front of a neighboring property that is used for the operation of a retail food establishment or retail liquor establishment;
- (E) The extension shall be limited to the public right-of-way in front of a single neighboring property; and

(F) If the sidewalk cafe extends on the property side of the public right-of-way in front of the neighboring property, the applicant shall notify, in writing, the owner and occupant, if any, of such property of the applicant's plan to apply for a sidewalk cafe permit that would extend on the property side of the public right-of-way in front of the neighboring property. A copy of such notice shall be included with the sidewalk cafe permit application. No such notice shall be required if the sidewalk cafe extension is entirely on the curb side of the public right-of-way in front of the neighboring property.

10-28-855 Compliance With Code And Rules And Regulations Required.

All holders of a sidewalk cafe permit, retail food establishments selling food or alcoholic beverages in a sidewalk cafe operated by an owner or manager of an indoor retail market, and their employees shall be subject to and comply with all applicable requirements and standards for retail food establishments <u>and taverns</u> contained in the <u>eode Code</u>, as amended, and the rules <u>and regulations</u> promulgated thereunder, and all laws, rules, and regulations pertaining to the sale of alcoholic beverages.

Article III.

Private Property.

SECTION 1. Those businesses who held permits to operate on private property under the Expanded Outdoor Dining Program in 2022, may apply for new permits and, if granted, operate with those permits until October 31, 2023. The authority granted to the Commissioners of Transportation and Business Affairs and Consumer Protection by ordinances establishing the Expanded Outdoor Dining Program, with record numbers SO2020-2891 (passed June 17, 2020), O2020-5783 (passed December 16, 2020), and O2021-5291 (passed December 15, 2021), shall extend in order to continue the program through this period.

Article IV.

Effective Dates.

SECTION 1. Section 10-28-611 shall take effect 10 days after passage and publication. All other provisions of this ordinance shall take effect after passage and approval.

WHEREAS, Jewell Lynn Caples, a native of Chicago, Illinois, was born on June 12, 1968, a world-class vocalist, singer, songwriter, author, entrepreneur and known as "The First Lady of Tha Row Records" and Queen of Hip-Hop Background Runs, exited this world on May 6, 2022; and

WHEREAS, Jewell was the lead singer in the choir at Free Holiness Church in Chicago. She sung gospel songs to promote the love that Jesus had for all mankind; and

WHEREAS, Jewell joined her mother Eula Caples traveling ministry at age nine and for two years, sung on the corner of 63rd and Ashland in the Englewood community. People would gather to listen, making statements, "Wow you sound like Mahalia Jackson", and "What a big voice for such a little girl". Some would offer her money to sing at birthday parties, but her mother would not allow that; and

WHEREAS, Jewell and her mother relocated to Los Angeles, California and Jewell continued singing in her mother's traveling ministry and passed out "Come to Jesus tracks" with her mom and other siblings, and Jewell attended several elementary schools and in the 5th grade her teacher Mrs. Sawyer sent a note home saying, "One day I may have to pay hundreds of dollars to hear Jewell sing, but for now can you please convince her to stop bursting out singing in class?"; and

WHEREAS, Jewell sang in her high school choir and, in 1988, began to sing in recording studios, Jewell gained notoriety as a recording artist with "Tha Row Records" under the stage name Jewell, and Jewell made her motion picture soundtrack lead vocal debut on the hit track "Love or Lust" from the 1992 film "Deep Cover". The soundtrack peaked at number 9 on Billboard's Top R&B/Hip-Hop Albums chart; and

WHEREAS, In the fall of 1992, Jewell performed for President-elect Bill Clinton at a Bloods & Crips Summit hosted by former Crip, Charles Rachal, and former Blood, Leon Gullet, who were running a small outreach program at the Community Youth Gang Services. The purposes of the summit was to discuss ways to curb the violence and increase peace in the community. Jewell was honored to lend her voice to such a great cause; and

WHEREAS, Jewell made history singing lead on the "Above the Rim" motion picture soundtrack, "It's Not Deep Enough". The album shipped over 2 million copies and won the Soundtrack of the Year award at the 1995 Source Awards. The success of the "Above the Rim" soundtrack album was unheard of for a motion picture soundtrack in the hip-hop genre; and

WHEREAS, Jewell became the hip-hop queen of background runs, lending her voice to many tracks for legendary rap stars, just to name a few, including but not limited to Tupac's "Thug Passion" from his last album recorded before his death, "All Eyez on Me", which was certified diamond, selling over 10 million copies, and listed in Rolling Stone's magazine 500 Greatest Albums of All Time; and

WHEREAS, Jewell's infectious runs on Dr. Dre's "Dre Day" from "The Chronic album", which peaked at number 1 on the Billboard U.S. Hot Dance Music/Maxi Singles Sales chart and certified gold, selling over 800,000 copies, there were also UK and German 12-inch vinyls of "Dre Day". Jewell sang lead on the "Dre Day Remix" and made it her own with the lyrics, "Only you can hang with my G girl swang"; and

WHEREAS, Jewell followed up her signature vocals on Dr. Dre's "The Chronic's", "Let Me Ride", a sample of Parliament Funkadelic's Mothership Connection (Star Child). The chorus was sung by Jewell and Ruben. Dr. Dre won a Grammy for the track in 1994 for Best Rap Solo Performance. "Let Me Ride" peaked at number 3 on Billboard's Hot Rap Songs chart and peaked at number 1 on Billboard's Hot Rhythmic Chart; and

WHEREAS, Jewell took singing with Snoop Dogg to a whole new level when she created the vocal runs gospel style for Snoop Dogg's "Who am I (What's my Name)?". Jewell was heard all over the world when the song charted in over 12 countries, including Australia, Ireland, The Netherlands, Belgium, Germany, Sweden, France, Switzerland and many more; and

WHEREAS, In 1994, Jewell produced her own rendition of Shirley Brown's hit "Woman to Woman", Jewel's version peaked at number 16 on Billboard's Hot R&B/Hip-Hop Songs chart; and

WHEREAS, From 1994 to 2004, Tha Row Records sponsored an annual Single Mother's Day Luncheon which featured the dynamic vocals of Jewell and Tupac, and after Tupac's death in 1996, Jewell performed solo and with other various artists, and

WHEREAS, In October 2011, Jewell published her own memoir, "My Blood My Sweat My Tears", soundtrack which was on the Amazon Best Sellers list in five categories: CDs, vinyl, soundtracks, R&B and pop; and

WHEREAS, Jewell always put the needs of her family above her own. In 2016, she had a medical emergency, but her faith caused her to refuse treatment because she did not want to leave her 17-year-old son. This act of sacrifice prompted family and a community of people to raise the funding she needed to persevere with the treatment which prolonged her life just a little while longer; and

WHEREAS, In February of 2022, Jewell was in a podcast development project titled "Words of Wisdom from Mama G" it would feature short messages of inspiration; and

WHEREAS, Jewel, a beloved daughter, sister, mother and grandmother, was a real-life example of overcoming extraordinary circumstances and being humble to the Most High; now, therefore,

GRATITUDE EXTENDED TO NASHVILLE, TENNESSEE POLICE OFFICER REX ENGELBERT FOR DISPLAY OF BRAVERY.

WHEREAS, On the morning of March 27, 2023 in Nashville, Tennessee, a mass shooting occurred at the Covenant School, where seven people were killed, including three nine-year-old children and three staff members; and

WHEREAS, Officer Rex Engelbert, one of the lead Nashville officers who took down the shooter, grew up in Chicago's Jefferson Park neighborhood; and

WHEREAS, The Chicago City Council has been informed of Rex's bravery by the Honorable Samantha Nugent, Alderperson of the 39th Ward; and

WHEREAS, Officer Engelbert had not been scheduled for duty at the time of the shooting and was coming in to handle the administrative tasks of his job when he received a radio call that there was an active shooter at the school; and

WHEREAS, Though not assigned to the team, Officer Engelbert, a four-year veteran of the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department (MNPD), worked together with his fellow first responders as they quickly prepared and entered the school, knowing that every second wasted could cost lives; and

WHEREAS, Described by his older brother, Kevin Engelbert, as a "gentle giant" who has "always [been] there for those in need", Officer Engelbert's courage and selflessness saved lives on that day; and

WHEREAS, While Officer Engelbert has already been commended by the Fort Worth Police Officers' Association for displaying "courage in the face of evil", the City of Chicago would also like to recognize Officer Engelbert and the great debt owed to all public servants who put themselves in harm's way; now, therefore,

WHEREAS, With a distinct building and a secret recipe to set themselves apart from the other hotdog stands popping up around the city following the war, all the Bermans needed was a name, and they found inspiration in the superheroes in the widely-popular comics; it's not a wiener, it's not a frankfurter, it's not a red hot -- it's a Superdawg; and
